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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Thank you. Cloud is up. Good afternoon, everyone. Welcome to today's New York City Council vote on Consumer Affairs and Business Licensing. At this time, will all panelists please turn on their videos. To minimize disruption, can you please place electronic devices on vibrate or silent mode? Thank you. Chair Ayala, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Thank you. Good afternoon. My name is Diana Ayala and I am the Chair of the Committee on Consumer Affairs And Business Licensing. I would like to welcome you to our vote today. Before we get started, I would like to acknowledge that we have been joined by Council members-- wait. I'm sorry. Let me just go back. Chin, Yeger, Lander, Menchaca, Barron, Brannan. If I missed anyone, I will come back around. Today, we will be voting on three important bills, two related to sidewalk cafes and a third that seeks to address waste caused by plastic single use ware. The first bill we will vote on today is proposed Introduction number 2096-A, sponsored by Council member Kallos, which seeks to improve the sidewalk café licensing

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING Under the current sidewalk café licensing system. process, applications are reviewed by multiple city agencies, the Council, as well as community boards. Even when this process runs smoothly, it can take as long as four to five months to be finalized. restaurants still struggling as to having been closed for indoor dining for so long and with the likelihood of having to endure another slow winter and new COVID variants, proposed Intro 2096-A would speed up the sidewalk café licensing process. If enacted, proposed Intro 2096-A would allow DCWP to issue temporary operating licenses to applicants for a sidewalk café license if the plans for the new sidewalk café are identical to the plans for previously operating sidewalk café at the same location. This bill would also allow the Department to issue a temporary operating license for new sidewalk café applicants whose petitions have been approved but are pending registration by the Comptroller.

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The second bill we will be voting on today also seeks to address the lengthy sidewalk café application process. Under the current scheme, sidewalk café applicants must include a plan of their

committee on consumer affairs and business licensing proposed layouts that's prepared by a licensed architect or engineer. DCWP agrees that this requirement and burdensome and expensive for applicants and has also testified that it is unduly challenging for agency staff who review the plans without any background in engineering or architecture. Intro 2134, sponsored by Council member Salamanca, would address this issue by allowing sidewalk café applicants to self prepare such plans.

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The final bill we will be voting on today is proposed Intro 1775-C, sponsored by Council member This bill will finally address the Van Bramer. mountains of waste created by unnecessary single-use eating utensils and food ware, soft packages, and Globally, more than 320 million tons of napkins. plastic are consumed each year and more plastic has been produced in the last decade than ever before. While plastics last for centuries, they are often only used once before being discarded. 95 percent of plastic packaging, for example, is only used once and only 14 percent is collected for recycling. As a result, millions of tons of plastic lead into our oceans each year, endangering fish and aquatic birds.

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING The World Economic Forum predicts that, under a business as usual scenario, there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish by 2050. In the United States, over 100 million plastic utensils are used daily and some analysts estimate that the U.S. wastes 40 billion plastic utensils per year. Ocean Conservancy lists cutlery as among the most deadly items to sea turtle, birds, and mammals. time to address the climate crisis is now if we want to leave a habitable planet for the children of this We must take immediate action to create a more city. green and sustainable society. For consumers, a major way to reduce our waste and be more environmentally conscious is to reduce our reliance on plastics. Proposed Intro 1775-C would decrease the amount of plastic waste used in our city. Consumers at food service establishments will have to ask for plastic utensils, sauce packages, napkins, or extra bowls and cups instead of automatically receiving them from the restaurant for takeout and delivery orders. This bill is common sense win-win scenario. It will lead to a reduction in utensil purchasing and waste for businesses. Less plastics will be used by consumers and, as a result, our city

3	Council members to vote yes on this bill and the two
4	sidewalk café licensing bills. Before I ask the

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Chair, may I be 6 7 excused to explain my vote? 8 CHAIRPERSON AYALA: You may. 9 COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you. Ι'm sure you're surprised by that request. First, I just 10 11 wanted to say it's been an honor and privilege to 12 serve on this committee with you. I came to be a 13 member of this committee later in my term in the 14 Council and, honestly, I was asked to do so as a seat 15 filler at a time when we were down a couple of 16 members and there were some elections that had been 17 cancelled and we just needed bodies on different 18 committees and I agreed to do it really as just a 19 favor to the Council. And the Chair at that time was 20 Chair Cohen, my friend and our friend who has left on 21 to greener pastures or so he thinks. But once you 2.2 became Chair, I told the Council that I would be 2.3 happy to stay. You're an incredible leader, a good friend, and you're somebody who was always open to 24

hearing opposing views, even if it's not one that you

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING agree with, but you've given the floor to members who didn't agree with you which is where we stand today because I am not voting aye on all, as I'm sure you're shocked. I am voting aye on Intro 2134 which I am a cosponsor to make it easier to apply for the revokal [sic] of consent for sidewalk cafés. As a member of the community board for 18 years before I came to this Council, we heard my of these applications and I think that the place for -- an application for a revokal of consent is that it ought to be applied for in order to be heard and in order to be decided upon and, for that same reason, I'm voting no on Intro 2096 because I believe that if the ownership of an establishment changes, it ought to go back through the application process. I don't see how the world ends if somebody wants to have a sidewalk café and they are new establishment just because there was a café there prior there, too, under a different entity. It shouldn't necessarily exclude the new owner from having to go through that process and make the case for why one is necessary, needed, or whether or not they are a good proprietor and responsible enough to be entrusted with our valuable space on the streets. I am voting no on

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING Intro 1775 because, while I agree with everything you said, Chair, and that there is too much plastic and that we ought to do better with the environment and we ought to do better about paying attention to how much waste we're creating in the world. But at the same time, I've been very consistent for 47 and a half months in the Council voting for bills that impose fines and penalties on the smallest businesses in the city. It's just not something I'm comfortable with. I would have been comfortable with if this bill, as I said when we heard it a number of weeks ago, if this bill had a provision that the first violation when the summons warriors go storming into businesses around this city to throw around their summonses, the first time that they walk into a restaurant that has, in their estimable view, violated this provision of law, they issue a warning. Now, the statute does have a provision that no violation can be issued before July 1st of 2023, but at the same time, this is still a new requirement so it should always be-- for a new requirement or a new statute-- the law should be-- and I've been consistent about this -- no penalty for the first No penalty for the first because otherwise the

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING 1 agencies are encouraged to run around and build the 2 3 city's budget on the backs of small businesses in 4 this city and so, for that reason and that reason alone, no matter what the fine folks in the environmentalist lobby have said about this bill, 6 7 because I do agree with them on this, but I can't impose these fines on small businesses. So I vote no 8 on Intro 1775. Thank you very much, Madam Chair. CHAIRPERSON AYALA: 10 Thank you, Council 11 member. 12 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Council member Kallos? Council member Kallos? 13 COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I had to bring the 14 15 car to a full and complete stop. I vote aye on all. 16 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Council 17 member Koslowitz? 18 COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: I vote aye on 19 all. 20 COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. Chair Ayala, 21 by a vote of nine in the affirmative, zero in the 2.2 negative, and zero abstentions, Intro 2134 was 23 adopted. By a vote of eight in the affirmative, one

negative, and zero abstentions, Intros 1775-C and
