May our leaders find personal 21 peace and joy in their public responsibilities by 2.2 helping others and assuring a bright future for all. 2.3 We are now, hopefully, moving beyond the devastation of serious illness and loss of life in our city. 24 2022, the year of tiger, may all beings live without 25

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fear and co-exists in peace. May we work diligently to find a positive way to help our city regain its strength and purpose and bring safety and hope to all. We pray in the name of our spiritual leaders, (Speaking a foreign language). Thank you.

stated meeting by taking a few minutes to remember 2 two of our young public servants that we recently 3 4 lost. We are all mourning the deaths of Jason Rivera and Wilbert Mora, who ultimately lost their lives in their commitment to improving and protecting our 6 7 city. They were both promoted posthumously to 8 detective first grade, the highest rank for a detective in the New York City Police Department. Detective Rivera was the son of Dominican immigrants 10 11 and fulfilled his childhood dream by becoming the 12 first person in his family to become a police 13 officer. The letter he wrote detailing why he wanted 14 to join the NYPD was a testament to his commitment to 15 our city. Detective Rivera wrote about his past 16 encounters with the NYPD including a situation when 17 his brother was stopped and frisked for no reason. 18 He wanted to improve the NYPD and public safety by 19 Detective Mora also a native of the serving. 20 Dominican Republic, left his homeland at the age of seven for New York City. Police Commissioner Sewell 21 rightly called him, "Three times a hero", first for 2.2 2.3 choosing public service, a second time for protecting others, and a third time for being an organ donor. 24 He saved five more lives through his selfless organ 25

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2 donation. Detective Rivera was 22 years old.

Detective Mora was 27 years old. We are forever grateful for their service and our hearts are with

5 their families, colleagues, and communities.

It is clear that our city and cities across this nation are facing increased violence, largely driven by qun violence. We must confront this challenge now and always, but this crisis is not new, particularly in communities of color, but it has only worsened throughout this long pandemic. honor and mourn the lives of all those New Yorkers who have lost their lives to violence, making our city safer and bringing an end to this violence will require a multifaceted approach that requires collaborative and comprehensive solutions. Public safety is a shared responsibility, and we must treat it that was to keep our communities safe. There is an important role for all stakeholders. The NYPD has an important role to play, and we must support good policing that keeps people safe in partnerships with communities. True safety requires an equal role from all the relevant city agencies, communities, and other stakeholders as well. We have to focus on preventing violence before it even occurs by

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2 investing in community-based safety solutions, 3 violence prevention programs, mental healthcare, and crisis resistance, youth programing, and a range of 4 other community investments that promote the wellbeing of all our neighborhoods. Communities that are 6 7 healthy and well are best equipped to address 8 underlying challenges that prevent crime and violence. We must invest in the health and stability of New Yorkers, especially those at greatest risk of 10 11 experiencing violence because of where they live. 12 need to provide our young people with education and 13 employment opportunities and support. Public safety 14 is a top priority for this council and a top priority 15 It is necessary for the present and the future of our entire city. We also cannot confine 16 17 ourselves to efforts to gun violence because the 18 reality is that people across our city and country 19 are experiencing various forms of violence. 20 Throughout the pandemic, our city and nation have 21 experienced a deeply disturbing rise in hate violence. Hate, in all of its pernicious forms must 2.2 2.3 be rooted out and unequivocally condemned. week, two alarming antisemitic incidents occurred in 24 Brooklyn, in both Council Member Osse's district and 25

2	in Council Member Restler's district. This is
3	completely unacceptable, and we must stand in
4	solidarity with our Jewish neighbors to confront this
5	antisemitism. Our Asian-American communities are
6	still dealing with anti-Asian hate violence. New
7	Yorkers must feel safe as they walk our streets, take
8	public transit, and go about their everyday lives,
9	and hate has no place in our city. It has not been
10	confined to the boundaries of our city. Across the
11	country, many historically black colleges and
12	universities, including my alma mater, Spellman
13	College, have received repeated bomb threats. These
14	threats and violence may be intended to instill fear,
15	but instead will only strengthen our resolve to
16	combat hate together. COVID continues to impact our
17	way of life. The Omicron variant hit us hard in New
18	York City. Since we last met here, colleagues, 1754
19	New Yorkers lost their lives to the Coronavirus.
20	Each of those lost lives is tragic and has a rippling
21	effect on loved ones and communities. We are
22	encouraged to have passed the peak of Omicron with
23	the case numbers now receding, and we look forward to
24	a brighter future. Let us now stand and pause for a
25	moment of silence for all those lost New Yorkers now

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gone due to the pandemic, violence, and other causes.

Thank you. You may be seated.

Yesterday in Midwood, a 5-yearold boy was critically injured by a vehicle pulling 10 11 out of a nearby driveway. Both in Council Member Vernikov's district, and yesterday in Far Rockaway, 12 in my own district, a vehicle hopped the curb and 13 14 struck three pedestrians, injuring two, and killing 15 Davina Afokoba, a 10-year-old girl. Today, I met 16 with her family who are completely devastated by this 17 loss. I ask that we keep each of these victims in 18 our thoughts and prayers. New Yorkers from all walks 19 of life deserve safe streets. One traffic death is 20 one death too many, and with District 31 having 11 traffic fatalities in 2021, leading all other council 21 districts, there's a lot of work to be done to ensure 2.2 2.3 that communities that have been underinvested in and neglected receive the proper resources that they 24 need, and I just wanted to make those 25

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2 access their medical appointments and care in the 3 event of an emergency lock-in. Yesterday afternoon, I toured Riker's Island with Commissioner Molina and 4 my colleagues in the Committee on Criminal Justice. We visited the tragic punitive segregation unit at 6 7 the George R. Vierno Center and a youth housing unit and school floor at the Davoren complex. While at 8 GRVC, we spent time at the on-sight correctional health services clinic where we discussed Sit-Call, 10 11 the process by which incarcerated individuals can request medical care. We were told lock-ins are few 12 13 and far in between. We were told appointments are not missed or delayed, but testimony from a currently 14 15 incarcerated individual shared at Tuesday's meeting 16 at the Board of Corrections, says calls for medical 17 care to the dedicated nurse hotline went unanswered. 18 Cases were only responded to on a seemingly arbitrary 19 Currently, this nurse hotline is the only way basis. 20 someone can access medical care during a lock-in and lock-ins are not rare. While at GRVC, we found that 21 the last lock-in at the facility was that very 2.2 2.3 morning. I cannot fathom anything less than swift action towards addressing the critical needs and 24 providing medical care services at Riker's Island. 25

Mayor, you should be ashamed of yourself to use the blood of an 11-year-old child, the blood of police officers, and other innocent people who were killed to try to push back on no-bail, no-cash bail. Let's stick with the facts. This is data-driven. The fact of the matter, 98 percent of the people that got no-cash bail, did not commit another crime. Nobody in this city can get no-cash bail if you're charged with a violent felony. So, for the mayor to get up there and use the blood of innocent people to manipulate you emotionally, and to tell us to debate the mother, not him; that was unconscionable and totally

unacceptable. Raise the age keeps young people in family court so that they can be rehabilitated and not in adult courts and jails, so they can become hardened criminals and punished, and recidivism goes high. So, I'm calling on us. I'll be putting a Resolution forth to support the no-cash bail. It's for non-violent offenses pre-trial detainees that got exorbitant bails like Kalif Bradda (SP?), I'll remind you, thousands of dollars' worth of bail, spent three years in jail for allegedly taking a backpack that he didn't take and put in solitary confinement which the mayor wants to (CROSS-TALK) ...

Public safety is a conversation that we have to be
having in the city. The mayor being accused of
wanting to lock people up, and the mayor being
accused of using the blood of a child and using the
victimhood of the child's parents, anybody who knows
Eric Adams (SP?) and I know the gentleman does, knows
that that's just a not a fair and accurate
description of what the mayor's position is or what
the mayor's been saying. The mayor has been crystal
clear on this and he's right across the hall and if
anybody is in this building and feels like showing up
and having a conversation with the mayor, this mayor

has shown that he's going to have a conversation with				
the members of this council. He's shown that he's				
willing to have a conversation with the members of				
the state legislature. A real conversation or we car				
sit at home and we can Zoom in and we can talk about				
who should be ashamed of themselves and the				
condemnation of a particular word or fact, but at				
least, let's get it right, and I would just throw in				
Josh Sewell (SP?), as the gentleman said, let's just				
look at the words and make sure we're condemning				
exactly what was exactly said. Thank you very much,				
Mr. President.
