last Stated Meeting of this City Council's
legislative session. As I usually do, I want to
remind all members that masks are required to be worn
throughout the Stated, even when speaking.

Today, we're voting on 28 Bills and 13
Resolutions. Among the Bills is one to ban the use of gas in new buildings, helping us transition to a greener future. This legislation is part of our efforts to protect our environment and to reach carbon neutrality by the year 2050. Also, as prepared food is a growing part of New Yorkers diets, this afternoon we're voting on a bill to require added sugar notification in the menu of chain

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 24 restaurants and we're voting on summer rezoning's including the SOHO neighborhood plan.

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Before we go any further, I want to wish you, your family and friends a very happy holiday season. I want to congratulate the amazing New York City Football Club for winning the 2021 Major League Soccer Cup. This is their first MLS Championship in the Clubs history, so congratulations to NYCFC. And as we head into the winter holidays and into the winter months, I want to remind everyone to be vigilant as we continue to battle COVID-19. The death toll in the United States is about to reach another tragic milestone. We are close to reaching 800,000 deaths from COVID-19 in our country and 75 percent of those have died, approximately 600,000 were 65 years or older.

As of December 14th, we have lost 34,922

New Yorkers to COVID. I hope that you and your

families stay safe and well. I also want to take a

moment to acknowledge other important losses in our

city. I'm sad to say that we have had another death

from 911 related illnesses. We mourn the death of

retired NYPD Detective Terence Terry Mulvey. Retired

Detective Mulvey died on December 1st at 62-years of

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 25 age. I also want to remember those who lost their lives on the job. Yesterday, Delivery Worker Fadhl Moosa was shot and killed by an armed robber. He was working inside of a deli in Crown Heights Brooklyn when he was killed. He was 20-years-old.

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And on December 10th, we lost Diego Rodriguez Celi. Diego was a Window Washer who was working on a high rise building in Brooklyn when he tragically fell to his death. He was 34-years-old. This weekend we had devasting news that several tornados ripped through parts of Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee killing more than 70 people. The tornado's killed several people working the Friday night shift at the Candle Factory in Mayfield Kentucky and at least six at an Amazon warehouse in Illinois. I want to take this moment to send our deepest condolences to the families and friends of those killed. And yesterday, we marked the nine year anniversary of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting. We are still grieving for the 20 children and six educators whose lives were taken away from their families and friends. Sandy Hook was one of the deadliest school shootings in our nations history but as we work to reform our

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 26 gun laws, school shootings like the recent one in Michigan continue. So, if we could please rise and have a moment of silence for all of those that we have lost. Thank you.

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Before we jump into our docket for the day, I want to wish the best to Nadia Johnson, a Senior Policy Analyst who is leaving the City Council. We thank her for many contributions to our efforts to create and implement meaningful food policy and to encourage a green and sustainable agenda. We wish her luck in her future endeavors. We also want to say goodbye to Rebecca Chasan, the Senior Counsel in the Finance Division after seven and a half years in the Council. We thank her for her work that she has done on the budget, through the capital process. Thank you Rebecca [APPLAUSE]. As well as her work on legislation to help low-income and vulnerable home owners. Best of luck Rebecca, thank you for everything.

Today, we're also saying goodbye to Amy

Levitan who has been at the Council — she has been at

the Council for 36 years in the Land Use Division.

[APPLAUSE] 36 years. Amy has literally worked — she

has literally worked on projects in every

neighborhood in New York City and has been an incredible mentor to so many staff members. A trusted advisor to hundreds of Council Members and speakers. Few people represent the profession of public service as well as Amy does, so I want to thank her for her incredible contributions to our city and to the City Council. Thank you very much Amy for everything. [APPLAUSE]

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We are also bidding farewell to Julie
Lubin, the General Counsel in the Land Use Division.
Julie has been with the Council for six years and has worked tirelessly to navigate the complicated legal issues in the world of land use. Working on everything from the East Midtown Rezoning to the creation of MIH, the closure of Rikers Island. Julie has been incredible. Is she with us? Is she in here? Is she upstairs? Julie, thank you so much. A big round of applause for Julie as well. [APPLAUSE]

And last, and last but certainly not least, I want to extend my warmest wishes and my deep, deep gratitude for someone who each one of us know, I want to thank Latonia McKinney, the Director of the City Council's Finance Division. [APPLAUSE] Who is leaving the Council after 23 years of service,

Latonia has helped every single one of us individually in this room with our budget priorities and our discretionary allocations. has also helped the entire body and our city immensely by ensuring that we pass a fair, balanced, equitable and responsible budget every single year. Latonia, the City Council is deeply grateful for your 23 years of service. Thank you for everything you have done and we will miss you. [APPLAUSE]

This is my last Stated Meeting as Speaker of the New York City Council. Nearly eight years ago, I raised my hand and took the oath of office to serve as Council Member for District 3 and four years ago, I had the incredible honor as being elected as Speaker of this body. The opportunity to work alongside each of you on behalf of our neighborhoods and the city's most vulnerable has been one of the most unbelievable experiences of my life.

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At this point, I'm sure you all have

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heard me use a motto that I learned from my mom. Do

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the most good for the people who need it the most.

That's the creed that I have tried to live by and

that I've used to shape the work that we have all

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done together. To uplift our communities to help the

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most vulnerable. And the past four years haven't

always made that easy for us. In fact, we have faced

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unprecedented challenges from the threats posed by

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the Trump Administration to the COVID-19 global

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worldwide reckoning of racial injustice that

pandemic, the horrific murder of George Floyd and the

Despite those challenges, and sometimes

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followed.

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because of them, we strove every day to address the 16

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historic circumstances facing our beloved city.

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Council passed a record breaking, the most number in

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a single session, a record breaking 719 Bills over

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the last four years. Many of those initiatives that

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we advanced, like the open streets plan, outdoor 2.2 dining, the streets master plan will transform every

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day life in this city for years to come. The Climate

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Mobilization Act, ending qualified immunities,

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creating homeless set asides, increasing voucher

rates, tackling some of the biggest issues facing not just New York but the issues that our country and our world face. And still others, the let's go in securing our future reports, charting a road map for our city's future. We weren't afraid to take bold action to significantly reduce carbon emissions and to ensure that Rikers Island eventually closes.

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We fought for the most vulnerable with fair fares and changed the conversation around our city's streets. We even convinced the Mayor to put a bike lane on the Brooklyn Bridge, which is really a win for the thousands of people who walk across that bridge every single day. And in addition to these large accomplishments that have changed the entire city of New York for decades to come, we have also each one of us, dedicated ourselves to serving our districts and our constituents, the people that sent us here. We help them with problems ranging from overflowing waste baskets and traffic congestion to helping our unsheltered neighbors and navigating bureaucratic red tape.

Together, we built and maintained tens of thousands of units of affordable housing for our neighborhoods and fought for our beloved small

We built and renovated schools, community centers, and parks that will stand for generations. We also danced with our neighborhoods in those parks at block parties.

It has been the privilege of a lifetime to serve as Speaker of the City Council and I am humbled by the work that we have done collectively together. I will always cherish the friendships that I have made here and I am grateful for your support over the years.

I want to take a moment to acknowledge and thank the hundreds of staff members, hundreds both here and in our district offices across the city. Now, I can't name all of the folks that have served here at the Council and I'm just going to name a few and if I don't name you, it doesn't mean I don't love you. But I want to first of all thank the Chief of Staff for the City Council Jason Goldman for everything that he has done over the last four years.

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I want to thank Genevieve Michaels, someone else who has been by my side. An amazing, amazing person [APPLAUSE]. I want to thank Kelly Taylor my Counsel, Jim Caras my Counsel, both of them amazing, amazing people. I want to thank Jeff Baker our Legislative Director who has helped each and every one of us. I want to thank Louis Cholden-Brown who has been with me since the first day I joined this body and as Director of Policy here at the City Council. I want to thank Ed Atkin and I want to thank Anthony Perez. I want to thank all of them for everything that they have done. Thank you, thank you, thank you all.

I want to thank from my district office Matt Green my District Director, he has been with me STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 33 since day one. Patrice Comerford, Laurie
Hardjowirogo, Jordan Feiner. I want to thank all of them. They have done hard work day in and day out.
So, thank you all very much. 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I want to — I know I speak for all of us when I say that from the bottom of our hearts collectively, to every member of the staff here at the City Council in our district offices, anyone who has helped us, we say thank you. We wish all of you and your families a warm and safe holiday season and we hope to see you very, very soon. I want to acknowledge that we are joined by two former Council Members here today. Former Council Member and now Judge Andy Cohen is with us. [APPLAUSE] Thank you Andy, it's great to see you. Eric Dinowitz is doing a great job and I want to thank Mark Weprin our friend as well. [APPLAUSE]. Former Council member,

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Now, onto our agenda for this afternoon. The Council will be voting on the following Finance items: We're voting on Introduction Number 2470 to extend the date by which the Fiscal 2023 Preliminary Budget must be released from January 16, 2022, to February 16, 2022. We're also voting on a Preconsidered Resolution sponsored by Council Member Brad Lander to support subject to appropriations, future undertakings related to the taxi medallion relief program. This important program provides much needed debt relief for struggling taxi medallion owners including guarantee that the city will cover shortfalls in payments on restructured loans. Resolution sets for the Council's support to continue to fund that guarantee of additional money should be required and to continue to help taxi medallion owners.

As a reminder, if you would like to vote no or abstain from any of today's Resolutions, you can approach Dias, announce your voice vote at the appropriate time or email the legislative documents unit at the Council. We'll also be voting on a few

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 35 budget items including a transparency resolution, an expense budget modification and a revenue budget modification.

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The Council will be voting on the following land use items: SoHo NoHo Neighborhood plan will create the special SoHo NoHo mixed use district, apply MIH to the new special district and replace existing zoning districts with a mix of medium and high density mixed use districts. Council Members Margaret Chin and Carlina Rivera can share more details about the many improvements to the plan and the investments they have secured as part of this project. Also, in Council Member Chin's district, 250 Water Street will facilitate a new 324 foot tall mixed use building, where 20 percent of the residential floor area will have 40 percent AMI affordable apartments.

This project will also direct \$50 million to the South Street Seaport Museum. We have 175 Park in Council Member Keith Power's district, which will facilitate the development of a new two million square foot commercial office and a hotel tower on the current site of the Grand Hyatt Hotel adjacent to Grand Central Terminal. This project will make

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 36 hundreds of millions of dollars of investment in transit at Grand Central. We have three applications in Council Member Steve Levin's district. The Special Brooklyn Navy Yard District will establish a new Special Brooklyn Navy Yard District to facilitate the build out of the Navy Yard's Master Plan by adding 4.6 million square feet of development over the next 10 to 15 years.

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River Ring, which will facilitate the development of a Proposed Waterfront Mixed Use development with approximately 1,050 dwelling units.

263 of them are affordable on a vacant site formally owned by Con Edison and the construction of approximately 200 units of senior housing. The Council modification restores the floor area that can be generated by the piers and platforms.

And 79 Quay Street, will facilitate the development of a new nine-story mixed use building with approximately 86 dwelling units, up to 22 affordable. The Coney Island Amusement Park Project Plan, the Third Amendment to the Special Process Agreement to extend the leases for properties that have suffered as a result of COVID in Council Member Mark Treyger's District. 103-16 Van Wyck Expressway

Rezoning will facilitate the development of a new four story mixed use building with 18 dwelling units, five affordable in Council Member Adrienne Adam's district. 160-05 Archer Avenue seeks to establish a curb cut authorization in the special downtown Jamaica District in Council Member Daneek Miller's District.

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Finally, the Fresh Proposal would support the construction of neighborhood grocery stores within underserved neighborhoods across the city.

Moving on the Council will be voting today on the following 12 Resolutions. The first one from the Committee on Civil and Human Rights from Council Member Paul Vallone, Resolution Number 1872 will declare December 8th as Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Jee Day in New York City.

We will have six Resolutions from the Committee on Education. The first is from Council Member Adrienne Adams. Resolution Number 561 calls on the Department of Education to provide human trafficking prevention training to public school administrators, teachers and staff. The other five Education Resolutions are from Council Member Mathieu Eugene. Resolution 204 declares May 4th as New York

City teachers, educational administrators and

education support staff recognition day.

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Resolution 205 calls on the New York City
Department of Education to include instruction on
peaceful conflict resolution as part of its
curriculum. Resolution 206 calls on the state to
offer swimming lessons and water safety education to
all students in public schools. Resolution 207 calls
on the New York City Department of Education to add
the history of Haiti to its Black History Curriculum.

Resolution Number 308 calls on the New
York City Department of Education to acknowledge the
participation Haitian soldiers in the siege of
Savanna and the impact of the Haitian Revolution on
Louisiana purchase by adding these events to our
social studies curriculum. The next two resolutions
are from the Committee on public housing and they are
sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera.

Resolution Number 1222 calls upon the
United States Congress to pass and the President to
sign the Green New Deal for Public Housing Act.
Resolution 1201 A calls on the Congress to pass and
the President to sign the Public Housing Emergency
Response Act. Moving on from the Committee on Public

Safety, we're voting on Resolution Number 1782,
presented by the Chair of that Committee, Council
Member Adrienne Adams. The Resolution calls upon the
State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign
the Wondering Officers Act. Resolution Number 1840
sponsored by Council Member Ben Kallos from the
Committee on Housing and Buildings, calls upon the
State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign
legislation prohibiting eviction without good cause.

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Lastly, Resolution Number 638, sponsored by Council Member Eugene from the Committee Health calls upon the State Department of Health to create isolation centers or units for the treatment of patients with infectious diseases.

Moving on, we're voting on two bills form the Committee on Parks. First, Introduction Number 2462 sponsored by Council Member Daneek Miller will officially rename St. Albans Park in Queens to Archie Spigner Park. [APPLAUSE]

The second bill from Parks is

Introduction 2447, a bill to co-name almost 200

thoroughfares and public spaces across the city on

request from all the members of the Council. One of

the co-naming's in my district is TIN PAN ALLEY on 28th Street between 6th Avenue and Broadway. TIN PAN ALLEY is often cited as the birth place of American music for making sheet music available to countless American households. The designation of this row of five buildings also represents the diverse history of TIN PAN ALLEY acknowledging the harsh realities and racism faced by African Americans at the turn of the 20th Century, as well as their achievements and contributions. I want to thank for the staff on these bills and street naming's Chris Artory(SP?) and Patrick Mulvihill.

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Next up from the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management. Introduction Number 2430 A sponsored by Council Member Joe Borrelli completes the most recent revision cycle to the New York City Fire Code. Thank you to Joshua Kingsley and William Hongatch(SP?). From the Committee on Technology, we have two bills. First, Introduction Number 2158 A sponsored by Council Member Steve Levin, would require the commissioner of the Department of Information, Technology and Telecommunications to designate an employee to serve as a Geospatial Information Officer.

Next, Introduction Number 1806 A sponsored by Council Member Peter Koo, will require an annual report by agencies and algorithmic tools used by city agencies. For these two bills, I want to thank Irene Bohofsky(SP?).

Moving on, Introduction Number 2020 A sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal and out of the Committee on Civil and Human Rights, requires that movie theaters provide open caption for at least one quarter of all showings and a movie is shown four more times. Also sponsored by Council Member Rosenthal, Introduction Number 1208 B will require ads for any employment position located within New York City to include the minimum and maximum salary offered. I want to thank from the staff for these two bills Jayasri Ganapathy, Wiom Diory(SP?) and Jack Kern.

Next, we're voting on three Bills from the Committee on Governmental Operations. The first is Introduction Number 2117 A sponsored by Council Member Keith Powers. This bill will require all mayoral executive orders to be posted online within one business day. Next, is Introduction Number 2438 A sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal. Which

will require the City's Voter Guide to be published in the 11 most commonly spoken languages in New York City. The online guide would now include a video statement from each candidate along with captioning and American sign language translation.

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The third bill from the Committee on Governmental Operations Introduction Number 66 A sponsored by Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo. The bill would require the Mayor to establish a new office for neighborhood safety and the prevention of gun violence. I want to thank for these three bills Nell Beekman, Jesse Fong(SP?) and CJ Murray.

Next out of the Committee on Women and Gender equity and sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Introduction Number 2424 B will require the creation of an advisory board to advise the Mayor and the Council on the issue of street harassment prevention. I want to thank Smeet De Deshmukh(SP?) and Nicholas Conall(SP?).

Next, we're voting on Introduction Number 2439 A, from the Committee on Public Safety sponsored by its Chair Council Member Adrienne Adams. This bill will require the Police Department to train officers on responding to incidents involving

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 43 domestic violence, sex crimes, or human trafficking.

I want to thank Joshua Kingsley, Robert Calandra(SP?) and Matt Thompson.

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Moving on, we have out of the Committee on General Welfare two bills. First, Introduction Number 2081 A sponsored by Council Member Francisco Moya. This bill will help make emergency rental assistant grants, also known as one shot deals, more accessible and improve transparency around the program. Second, Introduction Number 1358 sponsored by the General Welfare Committee Chair Council Member Stephen Levin. This bill will require the Administration for Children Services to report on the use of psychiatric medication by children in its legal custody. I want to thank from the staff for these two bills Aminta Kilawan and Nicole Bramstedt.

Next, we have Introduction Number 2005 sponsored by Council Member Farah Louis and out of the Committee on Mental Health. This bill will requires the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to track and issue a report on the mental health of New Yorkers during the COVID-19 emergency. I want to thank from the staff Sara Liss and Cristy Dwyer.

Next, we have five buildings out of the Committee on Housing and Buildings, Introduction

Number 2265 B sponsored by Majority Leader Laurie

Cumbo. It will give certain tenants with children under the age of six the option of receiving either stove knob covers or replacement locking stove knobs.

From the staff, I want to thank Genan Zilkha and Christopher Pepe. Introduction 2476 A sponsored by Council Member Kalman Yeger will extend the J51 tax exemption and abatement program through June 30, 2022. I want to thank Audrey Son.

Next, we're voting on Introduction 2246 A sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan. This bill creates a taskforce to study the feasibility of converting both vacant and commercially unviable office spaces to different uses. I want to thank Andrey Son for that one. Introduction Number 2411 A sponsored by Council Member Robert Cornegy will authorize the Department of Housing, Preservation and Development to enforce the affordable housing provisions within HPD's responsibility. I want to thank Audrey Son for that.

The final bill from the Housing and Buildings Committee is Introduction 2249 A sponsored

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 45 by Council Member Vanessa Gibson. This bill will relax certain owners penalties and regulatory requirements for one to four family homes and thank you to Audrey Son again for that one.

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Next, we have two bills from the

Committee on Environmental Protection. They are both
designed to limit the unnecessary deaths of migratory
birds Introduction Number 271 A sponsored by Council
Member Justin Brannan will require the installation
of occupancy sensors to limit illumination in city
owned buildings. Introduction 274 A sponsored by

Council Member Helen Rosenthal will require that
nonessential outdoor lighting in city owned or
exclusively leased buildings be turned off at night
during peak migration periods. For these two bills I
want to thank [INAUDIBLE 47:10], Samara Swanson,
Nadia Johnson and Ricky Chawla.

From our Committee on Consumer Affairs, we have two bills designed to improve the Side Walk Café Licensing Process. Introduction Number 2096 sponsored by Council Member Ben Kallos, who will allow the city to issue temporary operating license to applicants for a sidewalk café license if they plan to maintain an existing café. Introduction 2134

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 46 sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca will allow sidewalk café applicants to prepare their own plans rather than use an architect. For these two bills, I want to thank Stephanie Jones, Leah Skrzpiec and Noah Meixler.

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Now, from the Committee on Health, we have Introduction Number 1326 A sponsored by the Chair Mark Levine that will require added sugar notifications in chain restaurant menus. From the staff, I want to thank Sara Liss, Harbani Ahuja, Jayasri Ganapathy and Zeah Manuel Halu(SP?).

Our last Bill of the day and of the 2018-2021 legislative session will help us curve, will help us reach the city's net zero for carbon neutrality by 2050. We're in a climate crisis and we must take all necessary steps to fight climate change and protect our city. Introduction 2317 A sponsored by Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel will ban the combustion of substances with certain emission profiles in new buildings in certain renovations. This bill will direct the Commissioner of Buildings to deny construction documents and permits in connection with a new building that would require the combustion of the substances with some exceptions. I

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 47 want to thank from the staff Genan Zilka, Samara Swanston, Nadia Johnson, Ricky Challah, Brad Reed and Terzah Nasser. That is our final agenda and this final Stated Meeting of the New York City Council for this legislative session.

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And with that, with gratitude, what thanks to you Madam Majority Leader for presiding over this body in a very great way over the last four years, I turn it back to you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much Speaker Corey Johnson for that very robust legislative package. We will now move into discussion of General Orders.

Seeing that we have on the docket, we will begin with Council Member Gennaro followed by Council Member Rosenthal, Rivera, Kallos, and Chin and then Koo.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you Madam Majority Leader. Regarding Intro. 2317 A, which the Speaker just referenced, [INAUDIBLE 49:49]. I thank Council Member Ampry-Samuel for her leadership and putting forward this great bill, which will ultimately lead the city to an all-electric city drawing from 100 percent green and renewable grid.

We are light years away from that now but this puts us irreversibly on that course. This bill alone will yield a savings of 2.1 million tons of Co2 by 2040, which is equal to the carbon as reduced from 450,000 cars in a whole year. But that is just the beginning. When first put forward this bill was more of a concept bill and the journey of this bill from concept at detailed final bill was one of the most difficult negotiations of the hundreds of negotiations I have done over the years. And with stakeholder meetings with advocates, industry, labor and the Administration, including the Mayor himself was the most challenging.

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I thank Council Member Ampry-Samuel for being steadfast on the elements of the bill that were a must for her. I thank the Speaker and Jason Goldman for their great leadership and for giving what I thought was the most ambitious yet implementable possible. And very special thanks to Jeff Baker for being with me the whole way to get the great bill to what we have today. One that will be a template for the nation as we charter course through a carbon neutral future. Special thanks as well for Paul Ochoa and Ben Ferguson from the Administration

and to [INAUDIBLE 51:13] and Advanced Energy Studies [INAUDIBLE 51:18] who provided critical guidance and to my wonderful LB Maddie Cower(SP?) for her great work on this bill. But we wouldn't be here today without Council Member Ampry-Samuel's vision. So, I will end where I began in thanking her for putting this bill forward and being a great advocate for it. Her legacy is a green city and a growing green economy to get us there.

much. I'm proud to speak today about my bills that are passing. We owe a debt of gratitude to our Speaker, Corey Johnson whose brilliant staff negotiated the strongest language possible to help all New Yorkers. Because of their work, all job postings must include salary ranges which have been shown to close the gender pay gap. We have to address street harassment, which many of us have experienced particularly women, the LGBTQAI plus

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 50 community, specifically transgender women and most recently those of Asian descent.

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For those who are hard of hearing or deaf, movie theaters must include open captions to some of their show times. The maximum number would be four. Two during peak hours, two non-peak hours, and requires all candidates participating in the CFB Matching Funds Program, must have a video voter guide with open captions and ASL and increases the number of languages provided in printed guides to ten.

Going forward, all police officers must be trained in victim centered trauma informed questioning so it's not to discourage survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and those who are victims of human trafficking from coming forward.

And last but not least, we are eliminating non-essential outdoor lighting on city buildings during peak avian time periods, which will decrease the number of birds hitting glass. This past year, we saw hundreds of yellow song birds and every year, hundreds of thousands of birds are killed.

I want to thank Jason Goldman, Jeff
Baker, Kelly Taylor, Jayasri Ganapathy, Josh
Kingsley, and everyone else whose name I forgot, but

I know that I'll work with many of you in and out of government as we move forward. This is the last of the call 34 and 2013 where we pass the History Community Safety Act and I think we have shown even through a pandemic, changing leadership, changing state or city, state and nation, that we are committed to making sure that our city government keeps going. I want to thank the partnership of this body. The Speaker, Majority Leader, of everyone for being able to pass 14 bills in my short time as the

Public Advocate. And it's times like this that reminds us, even myself that these are fleeting.

Elections come and go. The seats we hold will never be more important than the people we are representing. But also, each of us, as we come in with our own ego's our own agenda's, I think the public sometimes understand the difficulties that goes into trying to make something happen with 51 people who have 51 districts. And so, I want to applaud us even as we disagree, just remembering the humanity in each of us and to the Speaker, even through lots of things. The difficulty of running this body should not be understated.

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So, I just want to say thank you to all of you. To the Speaker, the Majority Leader, all of my colleagues in government and to the staff. I'm very much excited and looking forward to see what the next Council will do. Peace and blessings to you all. Love and light.

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A green new deal for NYCHA would significantly reduce the carbon footprint of the nations largest public housing authority, foster a healthier environment for families and create hundreds of thousands of green jobs for New Yorkers

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 54 who need them most. And for far too long, the federal governments failure to fund public housing has led to petty fights between New York City and state.

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Resolution 1201 calls on Congress to pass and the President to sign the Public Housing

Emergency Response Act, to dedicate \$70 billion in funding for capital repairs and upgrades in our countries public housing development.

Today, you will also vote on the SoHo

Rezoning, which marks a critical change to our city's historic practices of focusing our neighborhood rezoning's in communities of color which are comprised of a majority of lower income families.

This rezoning will now move us toward a more equitable future where all neighborhoods participate in our ongoing fight against the housing crisis facing this city.

Finally, I'm proud to be honoring a few street co-naming's. I want to specifically mention Donald Subs Jr. whose activism and artistic work forever changed the East Village Community and we will be co-naming a street after Adele from Casa Adele. Please, if you've never been to the

And lastly with my last second, I want to thank everyone for the opportunity to speak. I want to thank you all for your ongoing support, your friendship, collaboration these past four years and wherever next year finds you, be it here in chambers or elsewhere, I look forward to our continued partnership and service of this city. Thank you so much everyone. And you're going to hear from Margaret Chin on SoHo NoHo, she'll speak brilliantly.

Majority Leader. Thank you everyone. Yes, today we're going to be voting on the SoHo NoHo rezoning. As you heard from my colleague Council Member Rivera, we fought very hard to make sure that every single neighborhood, especially the wealthier neighborhood with job opportunity, great transit that they have to do their part to help give opportunity for affordable housing. And I think that we have done this in this rezoning. We have spent at least almost three years talking with neighbors, stakeholders, small businesses, bid associations, to really gather input.

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Look, the zoning hasn't been changed for almost 50 years. And this way, residential won't be allowed and mandatory inclusionary zoning will have to be implemented to create affordable housing here, so that working families will have the opportunity to live in neighborhoods like SoHo that have so much resources.

And my staff and us in our office, and thank you know to my colleague Council Member Rivera, we work very hard. There were lots of early morning meetings and meeting with agency to make sure that we get all the questions answered. And on top of that, we have gotten an investment in our district for more parks, open space, affordable housing on city owned site that is surrounding the SoHo NoHo neighborhood. Because there is no city owned site in the rezoning area but we were able to get the city to commit to building affordable housing in the surrounding area.

I know that I share with my colleagues
the points of agreement. There's a lot we got for
our district but I really want to thank you know our
Speaker. Corey, you've been so supportive and of
course Jason, texting me and so, what's going on?
But giving me the support to get into the finish

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 58 builds off of Local Law 49 of 2018 to open algorithms law, which was sponsored by my predecessor, former Council Member Jimmy Walker.

Whether you realize or not, your day to day activities are impacted by this ultimate decision making systems. They determine everything from the school your child attends to what hospital EMS brings you to. These systems also determine what interpretation services available at your poll site and provided data which forms the basis of facial recognition technology.

It is imperative that these systems and this information used by them are vetted for transparency to ensure accountability. Intro. 1806 A increases transparency by requiring agencies to report on what algorithms and automated decision systems are used each year, how they are used and information on the data use collected and analyzed along with information on the vendor. Thank you to former Council Member James, Jimmy Walker, my former Committee Counsel Irene Bohofsky, Patrick Mulvihill, Sebastian Bacchi, Charles [INAUDIBLE 1:04:26-1:04:29] Jeff Baker and Jason Goldman.

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Thank you also to Speaker Johnson and

much Madam Majority Leader. I'll save my mushy remarks for when I vote to speak to bills now.

First, I'm so excited about Intro. 2317

A, that Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel is sponsoring to transform our city into an all-electric city. We do not have time to continue to burn fossil fuels. I want to give props to the coalition that fought for that and I want to give special props to Alicka Ampry-Samuel because I know it was a big, strong fight.

We have a lot of work to do to make sure that we convert our energy grid to solar and wind and renewables, so that the energy power that is powering our buildings is clean and renewable as well. And I look forward to fighting hard to continue that in the Comptroller's office and I know this body will as well.

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I want to give props to Minority Leader Borelli for Intro. 2430 A, which pushes forward and establishes standards for battery storage for solar power, which is critical if we're going to convert the grid to clean electricity. I don't think I've ever spoken for one of the Minority Leader's bills on the floor before today. So, it's nice to get it in before I get out the door.

I'd like to ask members to support 1870. My Resolution expressing the City Council's support for the Taxi Medallion Debt Relieve program. to give props to Council Member Levin for his work and to Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez and especially to the Taxi Workers Alliance for showing us the plight of those taxi workers crushed by medallion This is a smart program to help working taxi drivers be able to feed their families and save their homes.

And finally, I want to note that in the Street Co-Naming Bill, we're actually un-naming a street today. We are removing Margaret Sanger's name from the street outside the Manhattan Planned Parenthood health center. And I think this is worth pausing on, first to praise Planned Parenthood of

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Greater New York for doing real work to recon with
their history, to recon with the systemic racism in
their past, to own up to it and to make hard changes.
But I want to shout it out because I think at the
same time, allies of reproductive justice and
abortion rights better get louder in defending the
rights of women in this country, of people who need
abortion care and of reproductive justice. So, while
I will be voting yes to remove Margaret Sanger's name
from the street outside the Planned Parenthood health
center, you better believe I'm going to get louder on
reproductive justice and abortion rights and I hope
you'll join me. Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you Council
Member Lander. Now, we'll have Council Member
Menchaca.

Majority Leader. Sorry I cant be there in person but I just want to say hello and [SPEAKING IN SPANSIH 1:07:28]. I am speaking on a few bills and some thank you's. There's a lot of work to do and I just don't want to move without saying, thank you for the conversation we had last week. I'm going to carry those conversations that I've had with many of you as we move forward for implementation and engagement for all communities. So, thank you. Thank you Speaker Johnson. It's been a pleasure doing this work with you.

I also want to thank in my last few seconds my team, who has brought me here to this last

moment. Cesar Vargas, Lorena Lucero, Nancy
Allyssa(SP?) in the district. Thank you so much for
everything you have done to ensure that legislatively

I'd also like to take a moment to congratulate the families of Nicholas Heyward Sr., Alyssa Torres, Rita Saunders, and Kenneth Kasia(SP?) whose years of advocacy paid off today as the Council votes to approve the street conaming's in their honor. And to honor these members of our community and make sure that their legacies live on.

I just wanted to also acknowledge, I'm disappointed. I sponsored a bill 2047, which is the Fair Chance for Housing Act. I do appreciate all of

I'm hopeful that this bill will pass in the next session. Everybody deserves to have a home. And so, I'm disappointed that this bill is not passing today but I am very confident, very confident that in the future this legislation will pass and I look forward to seeing that day here in the New York City Council. and state has set lofty goals to reduce our gas related emissions. As many children of the 70's and 80's, I remember celebrating Earth Day and taking personal responsibility for the earth and environment. We people have had to contend with the

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The responsibility has always been on individuals. Multiuse water bottles, shorter showers, home recycling, this Council also prohibited single use straws, plastic bags and reduce the usage of plastic flatware. We have literally made personal environmental responsibility a letter of the law. But buildings are responsible for nearly half of the greenhouse emissions that are destroying our earth every day.

Today, is the last Stated of this Council term and it has been an honor and privilege to represent my community where we see a 32 percent higher exposure rate to dangerous pollutants from greenhouse emissions. A community where the Council staff recognizes best practices and believes in New York as a leader. So much so that they brought this idea to me in its infancy stages. Immediately recognizing the intersectionality of climate and racial justice. I knew that this was a charge that the 41st Council must have set. Together, we worked tirelessly with advocates to develop this bill and push it through.

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Although we have few surprising allies, we have some surprising challengers as well. But we held strong and as we look to the future, I thank

Speaker Johnson and my colleagues for supporting this gas ban bill which essentially codifies our emission reduction goals. And I thank Jim Gennaro, excuse me, I thank Council Member Gennaro — can you give me one minute?

I thank Council Member Gennaro for helping me to sharpen my debate skills. That was quite the challenge. So, as I come to a close with my remarks and my time in the Council, I thank all of the advocates that gave us a master class and data for days on emissions, gas, the grid, pollutants. I thank Pete Sikora and Johnathan, We Act NYCC and countless others. And I want to really thank Jeff and Jason for working so hard because I know at midnight on some days, I could have been a bit much. It was tough but worth the fight.

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I just want to talk briefly about my bill, which has been the culmination of a couple of years of work alongside the Fire Department. It is the regular and often update of our city's fire code. We adapt the work of the International Fire Code to the unique challenges in New York and to get a really thumbs up from Brad Lander is really incredible and I appreciate his support for this. Because in truth, this is actually one of the most green pieces of legislation that this Council has ever done. We're taking lithium ion batteries which are the wave of the future, the way we generate electricity and store it within our homes, within our apartments. Now, we're allowing that to be brought inside residential buildings, inside apartments, inside high rises.

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This is going to change the way the city generates electricity. This is going to change the way the city uses electricity. We're also going to change the way we allow lithium ion micro mobility in buildings around the city. We're also going to allow hydrogen fuel energy generation. So, we're doing actual, actual green things with the City's Fire Code and it's been a pleasure to do that. One of the best things we're doing though is allowing distilleries to operate legally within New York City.

So, I know it's a big priority for many of you who enjoyed distilled spirits, made right here in New York City. It's great that we have any manufacturing industry wanting to come here and it turns out we had distillers who wanted to come here and opened up tasting rooms and little sheik places where they can produce liquor and sell it for all of our enjoyment. And you can enjoy some of that distilled spirits now in my back yard at my fire pit, which will be legal finally the minute the Mayor signs this law, which is a great thing. So, I invite you all in the future. Again, thank you all. I thank the Speaker and thank you to all of my colleagues and enjoy the day.

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COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you Madam Majority Leader. While the COVID-19 pandemic is winding down, we are left with a catastrophic mental health crisis within our city. Many New Yorkers witnessed family, friends and beloved community members succumb to the vicious COVID-19 virus. endured an unhealthy level of isolation. Housing issues, food insecurity, unemployment and much more that contributed to the deteriorating mental health of New Yorkers. Communities of color in particularly, the 33 neighborhoods hardest hit by COVID-19, they suffered the most casualties during the pandemic. We also witnessed a tragic rise of hate crimes among Asian, South Asian, and Jewish communities during the pandemic. These communities are infamous for being mental health deserts. the lack of quality healthcare and mental health services which further compounds the mental health crisis we're experiencing here in New York.

The recent allocation of additional funding to various mental health services is a commendable initiative by the Administration. It is

definitely not enough and the goals of Thrive NYC are noble. It's not enough. However, there has been little to no change in the quality of mental health services and affordable medical insurance available to the most disadvantaged New Yorkers. Mental Health services is not an issue we can throw money toward and expect improvement. These services provided must be specialized for the very needs of New Yorkers while being culturally appropriate. However, as we have seen and heard over the past few years, especially now during the COVID-19 pandemic, there is a dangerous and unacceptable lack of critical information on the state of mental health of New Yorkers.

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Without access to such information, the resources provided failed to contour themselves toward the needs of the individuals they are supposed to target. Regardless of the amount of money that is being expended. If I could have one more minute Madam Majority Leader.

If we are truly committed to holistically tackle the mental health crisis that is running rampant in our city, we have to understand the gravity of what we're dealing with. So, today, I

I'm not old enough to collect my pension, so I'm a little disappointed about that. I was elected on February 24, 2009, along with Julissa Ferreras and Kenny Mitchell in a nonpartisan special election. A week and a half after my 24th birthday, I was only 24-years-old. I didn't know what the hell I was doing to be honest with you and then I remember quite clearly having a meeting across the street in 250 Broadway with Ed O'Malley, he was a great guy and a great friend and from Queens. And I said, well, we have the PS Budget and the OTS Budget and I said, I'd like to order some new furniture for my district office. And he said, I

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 151 don't think that you should do that. And I said, why? The money is in the budget, they told me I could use the OTPS to buy new furniture.

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And he looked at me and he said, well, we really don't know how long you're going to be here.

So, I'm still here. I got elected four times in that district. I told that story at the Ed O'Malley's retirement party and everybody laughed because he was retiring and I was still here.

So, I just want to say what an honor its been to represent my community and my constituents here at City Hall. I feel like I'm a better person for it and I want to thank Corey and Jason. By the way, they are a piece of cake. When I got here, I had to deal with Ramone and Christine Quinn, so you know Jason and Corey is like a walk in the park for me.

And you know they were tough but they were very fair. Ramone sent me a beautiful text this morning. We became very close and he really set the bar very high for how hard the central staff works and he was a great friend and a great leader here. But the point is that I've enjoyed every minute of it. I always try to bring levity to the meetings. I

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 15 always tried to bring good humor to some of the hearings because sometimes, sometimes we get bogged down in all the stress and anxiety and the things going on back in the district. Or you know a struggle that we're having with a colleague but you know, if you love what you do, you'll never have a bad day at work. And I've loved every minute of it and I want to thank my constituents for sending me here. I want to thank all of you for your friendship, your partnership, your patience in many cases, and I wish you all the best. I don't know where I'm going yet, that's in God's hands and Eric Adams, but that's another story for another day, so we'll figure that out soon.

And I also know the story about your hair in the members lounge and that's going to be a story for a different time, for the after party. We'll leave that for a different time.

The class of 2017 is incredible. We came here together. Some of us knew each other, some of us did not know each other. Madam

President, I'm going to ask you for some time because that's going to beep and I know how that works.

We came here a week after election day.

Council Member Rivera, Councilman Powers, Ayala,

Gjonaj, Diaz, Moya, Adams, Holden, Ampry-Samuel,

Brannan and myself. Great class of eleven or maybe

not so great. Councilman Holden's election hadn't been cold yet, so he wasn't invited and it was just the ten of us and we really got to know each other. And you know there were the lectures from Ramone and Speaker Mark-Viverito came by but we really got to know each other and the friendships that began that week, I think have led us to 48 months later where we are today.

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Uhm, I get into heated disputes here on this floor about what I think it right. Uhm, because you know when I think it's right, it's right and I'm going to say so. Like Frank said, I'll state my case of which I'm certain.

But that's not to say that I don't respect you. 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I want to thank Jason Goldman for always taking my calls as well. It seems like he didn't get back to me as quickly as he did to some of you but he always delivered and was always so kind and I know that this is going to be a friendship that's going to last. And I want to thank Lance here, he has been my incredible legal counsel, making me look good. Checking to make sure everything is going fine when folks like Yeger and Gjonaj want to do amendments and I get all nervous. He makes sure that it happens appropriately and by the law and to the letter. So, I thank you so much for your leadership and for always working alongside of me to make me feel confident in being the Majority Leader.

I want to thank my son. Uhm, I just want to read you something very quickly. Everybody knows Prince and if you didn't know him by now, you've gotten a Christmas card from him so you've seen him. It says, from his school, Prince's

vocabulary and critical thinking skills are amazing. He loves story time and is particularly focused during group writing activities, recognizing letter, sound relationships and sight words. He works independently during seat work and asks for help when needed. He is also helpful with peers if they need assistance. He has a kind and loving heart.

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So, I just wanted to read that to you because many of you know my journey. When I first found out I was going to have a baby, I had no idea if I could be a full-time mom and a full-time Majority Leader and when I got that in the mail in terms of his report card, it answered my prayers that I could in fact do it. So, I want to just shout out all the moms out there who wonder if they can make it happen, if they can do it all. It's hard, it's a tough road but you absolutely can do it.

I want to thank my parents who continue to hold me down that take those three o'clock in the morning calls when I don't know if I've done the right thing, if I voted the right way. Who always give me that encouragement. I want to thank

my grandparents who are not living. Raymond Cumbo and Emma Cumbo. I want to thank my maternal grandparents. I want to thank Fanny May Booker and William Booker and I just want to note that William Booker was the first African American to ever attend the democratic national convention recognizing Michigan in the 1940's.

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I also want to thank my partner Bobbie for all of his work and helping me get through this. I want to celebrate my staff members Jasmine Quello(SP?) Tasha Young, GeGe Davis Elliot(SP?). They are I guess all three my Chief of Staff's. I want to thank Tahera Manard(SP?), Arna Lipkin and many others. I also want to thank the Women's Caucus. The Women's Caucus are the baddest, more fiercest, most hard working women you ever will meet and this body has kicked down the doors for 31 women to now enter this body. This is so incredible. [APPLAUSE]

But what I want to say is, for me as an African American woman, I show up and do the best I can every day because I want to chart a new path.

We have spoken so much about what women's leadership is going to do. We have to make sure

That we work together and we show this city, this state, this nation and this world what is possible through women's leadership. This is an important time and we have to show them what we've got. You know who you So, Ebony Meeks, thank you for holding me down always and Land Use Raju Mann and Brian Paul, I call them all the time. Finance Latonia McKinney, where's Nathan? Rebecca, I also want to thank Regina, Chuck Davis. Nobody really likes to get a call from Chuck Davis because we know it's about some sort of compliance but he does it and he does it well.

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I want to thank Bill Allitrice(SP?) for always capturing my best side and Heraldo and the whole media team for all their work. I want to thank Carl De Alba and Rafael Perez and all of the Sergeant at Arms for their incredible work. I want to thank — this is a different one. I want to thank Paul Ochoa from the Mayor's side because I call him at least three times a day every day. He

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 171 has been phenomenal and I want to thank my BFF's Jeff Rodis(SP?) and David Greenfield who I also call so often. And I just want to thank this entire body.

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And I just want to close with saying, when we look around this room, we see all of the diversity that is here today. It's beautiful but it's challenging and we should always be in a place where we welcome the challenge because it gives us different perspectives, different ideas.

I want to say to the new members, never be afraid to be your full and complete self. Bring your whole self to the Council because to dim your light or to silence yourself or to oppress yourself is not giving the body the full measure of the life experiences that you bring to this body. I thank you so much for allowing me to be the first African American woman elected or appointed rather as Majority Leader. And I hope I paved the way for many more to sit in this seat. Thank you so much and God Bless you all. This is the best Council, the greatest ride and meeting all of you was phenomenal. I love you. I love you Corey Johnson. Thank you for all of your phenomenal work.

Just one quick thing. You know, when I was 16years-old in a small town in Massachusetts, I was
extremely suicidal. I didn't think there were any
other gay people in the world besides me. And when
I came out to my mom, who I speak to twice a day
every day my entire life, she immediately told me
she loves me and that everything was going to be
okay.

And then I came out at school and I was the only openly gay student out of 1,300 kids in my school and I had just been captain of the football team. I showed up in New York City, this city, my home. I'll live here the rest of my life with two duffle bags on May 1, 2001. I knew one person. I was 19-years-old. And two years later I found out

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 173 that I HIV positive and I lost my health insurance one week later. I was paying \$400 a month to live in someone's kitchen at 21st Street and 8th Avenue in Chelsea. I had to push the refrigerator over at night to pull out the futon and then push it back during the day when I left. \$400 a month I was paying to live there.

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There were months that I couldn't buy my HIV medicine in my first year that I found out that I HIV positive because I lost my job. And when I decided to run for the City Council, everyone told me not to run. Danny Dromm didn't but everyone else — no really, every one told me not to run. My mom worked three jobs when I was growing up. She was my lunch lady at school. She was my dental hygienist after school and she cleaned houses every Saturday that I can remember in large, big, beautiful homes and we lived in one of the 12 units of public housing in the town that I grew up in.

I never thought this was possible. I never thought it was possible to be a successful gay person. I never thought I'd be able to come out. I never thought I could make it in New York City. I didn't think any of that was possible.

And so, if you are a small Black girl in New York
City, look at Laurie Cumbo and look at Debbie Rose
and look at Selvena Brooks-Powers and look at
Vanessa Gibson and look at Adrienne Adams and look
at Farah Louis and look at Alicka Ampry-Samuel.
Dream big.

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If you are a new immigrant to this country, listen to the stories of Margaret Chin and Peter Koo and Inna Vernikov.

And if you are a young gay person, who is struggling with who you are, dream big. You are worth it and you can do it. I would not be here and everyone of us could say this if it weren't for the hard work and sacrifices that my grandparents and parents made for me and the people that came before me that paved the road. Whether it was Marry Pinkett for you or Tom Dwane for me that made it possible.

So, I'm not feeling emotional. I'm feeling grateful. I'm feeling extremely grateful.

I'm grateful that I've had this opportunity for eight years and I don't want to sound hockie or sacrin but I've gone to have relationships and friendships with people that represent every corner

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 175 of the greatest city in the world. I never would have been to parts of this city if I was not a member of the New York City Council.

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The amount of work we have been able to do that people don't even know about, hear about, understand whether it is libraries or parks or the person who is about to get evicted, or the person who can't get the hospital bed. We do this work every single day and we don't talk about it. We don't Tweet about it. We just do it because we love people and we want to make the world a better place, each and every one of us. No matter if we disagree with each other sometimes and we fight with each other like a dysfunctional family. We got in this because we want to change the city and change the world.

And so, when I was 16 and I wanted to take my life and when I was 22 and I found out I was HIV positive and when I was living in that kitchen next to the refrigerator for \$400 a month, I couldn't see this path.
