COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AND WORKER PROTECTION land, New York City will become a safe haven, I repeat, a safe haven for those that are pregnant to access safe and quality reproductive care. As those New Yorkers and residents from other states travel to New York City to access care, we must ensure that people that enter pregnancy service centers are aware that these centers are unlicensed and unregulated providing clients with anti-abortion misinformation. Pregnancy service centers in New York have been known to delay appointments with clients multiple times in an attempt to prolong the process past a point when someone can have access to a safe abortion. While abortion is not under attack legislatively in New York City, PSCs are an insidious industry seeking to impair New Yorkers access to safe and quality reproductive care. Intro 506-A would require the city to produce a public education campaign about deceptive advertisements and misleading information by facilities that present like they provide reproductive health services. The campaign would provide residents with information of what these facilities typically provide, how they advertise their services, how these facilities can impact timely and safe access to pregnancy care, and how a

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person can file a complaint about the deceptive

practices they may experience. By equipping New

Yorkers with this essential information, the City

will minimize the harmful impact of pregnancy service

centers.

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We are also voting today on a package of legislation related to Con Edison and other energy utilities. This past January, many city residents experienced dramatic and unexpected increases on their Con Ed bills. Over 400,000 New Yorkers are 60 days or more behind on Con Ed payments, totaling over 800 million dollars, once again, 800 million dollars, and utility arrears in New York state have increased by over 1 billion dollars since the start of the pandemic. While the price increases that occurred in January 2022 may have been caused by forces outside of Con Ed's control, it's time for the City to increase its oversight over utility companies. I'm proud that we're voting on my bill, Proposed Resolution 174-A, which calls on Con Ed to improve communications with city residents about increases in utility costs. Con Ed has a robust notification system to alert city residents before major storms of the possibility of power outages. The purpose of this

notification system is so residents have the necessary time to prepare for potential outages.

Given that many residents were shocked to see the increase in their utility bills this past January,

Con Ed clearly could've done more to preemptively notify city residents of this expected increase and what steps residents could have taken to decrease the

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cost of their bills.

We'll also be voting today on Proposed

Introduction 372-A, a bill sponsored by the Speaker

by request of Borough President Levine, which will

establish an Office of Utility Advocate that can work

directly with city residents to make their voices

heard in Albany so that Con Ed and other public

utilities cannot ignore the struggles of their

biggest consumer base.

Resolution 162 by Council Member Lee would call on our State Legislators to set a percentage cap that an annual rate increase cannot exceed which would enhance consumer protection by ensuring a utility cannot request a high-rate case.

Resolution 172 by Council Member

Salamanca calls on New York State to increase the number of Commissioners in the Public Service

Commission and give the Mayor the power to appoint 2

3 Commissioners.

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Proposed Resolution 173-A by Council

Member Ung calls on the Governor to expand financial relief programs to residents struggling to pay their utility bills. The communities experiencing the most significant impact of rising utility prices are low-income communities and communities of color that have been hit hardest by the pandemic. This Resolution, therefore, calls on the State to take further action to ensure city families are not plunged into further debt.

I am proud of the legislative package we are voting on today, and, as Chair of this Committee, I'll fight and legislate to ensure that the consumers of this city are properly protected. Whether you're a New Yorker or a tourist seeking quality reproductive care or a family experiencing utility debt, this Council hears your concerns and is taking action.

With that said, I'd like to thank my central staff team, Senior Counsel Stephanie Jones, Senior Policy Analyst Noah Meixler, my Chief-of-Staff Alex Anderson, and my Deputy Chief of Staff Jackie Crossan for their hard work.

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2 I'll now turn it to Council Member Lee 3 for her statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEE: Hi, everyone. Thank you so much, Chair Velazquez and Colleagues. It's my pleasure once again to speak on Resolution 162 which calls for amendments to the New York City Public Service Law, and it's a privilege to have this bill be part of the larger legislative package involving the Speaker, Chair Velázquez, Council Member Salamanca, and Council Member Ung. As New Yorkers continue to fight through the pandemic, experience inflation, gas prices, supply chain shortages, it is even more important for us to make sure that their bills are not hiked and that they're paying unfair prices. We're currently in the middle of the summer, increasingly relying on AC units and utilities to stay cool, and our families and constituents should not have to worry about keeping the lights on and the water running. Thank you so much, Chair Velázquez, and I want to thank my Colleagues for their support as we look to get Resolution 162 on the Stated Floor for a vote. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER SALAMANCA: Thank you, Chairwoman Velázquez and Members of the Committee, for letting me speak today. Reso 172 will call on the State to increase the number of Commissioners on the Public Service Commission and permit New York City to appoint 2 of its Commissioners. Overseeing and regulating the State's electric, gas, steam, telecommunications, and water utilities, the 7-member Commission is entirely made up of nominations appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the State Senate for 6-year terms. The sole public entity who oversees the state electric utility companies, PSC, regulates Con Ed's presence in New York City, approving their license, service offerings, and rate increases. As too many of our Constituents know, Con Ed has been the source of much aggravation and stress, both mentally and financially. Despite the well-documented blackouts, service cuts, shocking customer bill increases, in some cases thousands of dollars of unexpected cost, the PSC continue to approve Con Ed's unchecked monopoly on New York City.

2	As the body that represents the 8.9 million people
3	who are forced to utilize Con Ed services, we must
4	demand that New York City has a seat at the table.
5	That is why I introduced Reso 172 which calls on the
6	State to increase the number of Commissioners on the
7	PSC and subsequently allow the Mayor with the New
8	York City Council approval to appoint 2 members to
9	the Commission. Having 2 city-appointed Commissioners
10	will ensure the voices and interests of the City
11	residents are adequately heard, and I ask that all
12	the Members of the Committee vote yes on Reso 172.
13	Thank you, Madam Chair, for allowing me to speak.
