9 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Reverend 10 Martinez, and thank you for being with us today. I'm 11 going to now ask Council Member Carmen De La Rosa to 12 spread the invocation on the record.

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Thank you so much, Mr. 13 14 Majority Leader. A few words on Dr. Rev. Louisa 15 Martinez, who hails from my district, who was born in 16 Sánchez Samaná, Dominican Republic in 1946. Since her 17 early years under the guidance of her mother, she, 18 she began participating in community organizing and 19 church ministry at the Iglesia Evangélica Dominicana, 20 where she became a youth leader in her spare time and taught literacy skills in after school for her 21 2.2 community.

With her ministerial work, Doctor Reverend Louisa
Martinez participated in numerous grassroots
organizations with the Latino community, civic and

2	professional organizations with the United Methodist
3	Conference. Reverend Martinez is a member of the
4	Human Rights Association of the Dominican Republic.
5	She has been a source of light and blessing for
6	my community, for myself personally. And after her
7	retirement, Reverend Martinez continues to
8	participate in community organizing and advocacy
9	fundraising and mentoring new, young pastors and, and
10	young people in my community, uh, on 100, on 228^{th} ,
11	the Marble Hill section of my District.
12	We are honored to have Doctor Reverend Louisa
13	Martinez as our invocational speaker today. Mister
14	Majority Leader, Madame Speaker, uh, we thank Doctor
15	Reverend Louisa Martinez for being here and I make a
16	motion for unanimous consent to spread the invocation
17	in full upon the record.
18	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member

22	going to have communication from Speaker Adrienne
23	Adams.
24	SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you, Majority Leader. Good
25	afternoon, everyone. As a reminder, masks are

strongly encouraged to be worn throughout the Stated 2 3 Meeting and Council Chambers. We are currently 4 experiencing a sixth COVID wave, and infection rates in New York City have surpassed 15% City-wide with 5 some neighborhoods seeing positivity rates above 20%. 6 7 Please take the necessary precautions. Get tested often. And if you have not done so already, please 8 9 get vaccinated and boosted so you're protected from the worst impacts of COVID. 10

11 Since the last time we met, the United States 12 Supreme Court has made several rulings that have made 13 us less safe, stripped away rights that we have 14 counted on for decades, and cast our future in doubt. 15 The Supreme Court's decisions on guns, abortion 16 rights, environmental protection, and a range of civil rights have taken our country backwards at a 17 time when we can least afford it. 18

Our nation has been tormented by the scourge of gun violence, yet the Court decided to strike down New York's century-old gun law, putting all of us at greater risk. From Highland Park, Illinois, Uvalde, Texas, to neighborhoods across our City, we are continuing to experience violence that inflicts harm and trauma on our communities. We must come together

2	as a City and as a country, to bring an end to the
3	dangerous proliferation of guns, provide care and
4	healing to help victims of violence recover, and
5	invest in the health and wellbeing of our neighbors.
6	On the federal level, Congress finally passed
7	bipartisan gun safety measures that will ultimately
8	save lives. While much more is needed to curb this
9	crisis, it is a step in the right direction after the
10	lack of un-realization of any progress for years.
11	Our state partners, led by Governor Hochul,
12	Senate Majority Leader Stewart-Cousin, and Assembly
13	Speaker Heastie, made New York a national leader by
14	enacting gun safety laws in their special session
15	after the Supreme Court decision. These laws will
16	protect New Yorkers, especially the expansion of
17	sensitive areas that restrict guns in locations that
18	this Council identified as in need of protection. We
19	will continue to be strong partners in this work
20	because we cannot allow gun violence to continue to
21	hurt our City.

During the special session, New York also made clear to the entire country that we are a safe haven for civil rights, abortion access, and reproductive healthcare at a time when we are all under attack.

The State Legislature advanced the first step to add an equality amendment to the state constitution and in short time, this amendment will come before voters to enshrine equal rights and protect our right to safe and accessible reproductive care.

7 Today, we will take action by voting on the New 8 York City Abortion Rights Act, an unprecedented 9 legislative package to safeguard and expand abortion and reproductive healthcare across our five Boroughs. 10 11 Those who live here, and those who come to New York 12 City will have access to care and will be protected, 13 because in our City, we firmly believe that safe 14 access to reproductive healthcare is a human right. 15 And the prioritization of these issues is what it 16 looks like when women are a majority in the 17 legislature, more accurately reflecting our city.

We are proud of the incredible work of our Members and staff who have shown national leadership and we'll dive deeper into the respective bills of this package later in the agenda.

Since the start of the year, 10 people have died at Rikers Island while under the watch of the Department of Correction. It is deeply troubling and, quite frankly, horrifying. Most recently, we lost

2 Elijah Muhammed, who was kept in isolation for more 3 than 30 hours, and it reportedly took several hours 4 before any staff member discovered his death.

The violence and dysfunction on Rikers represent 5 an abject failure of our City. When people within a 6 7 City system are repeatedly dying, it is a reflection 8 that something is deeply wrong. We are witnessing a 9 humanitarian crisis, and we cannot accept this as normal. Conditions must change, and this Body is 10 11 going to have to take significant action to contribute towards ending this current state. 12

Let us take a moment to remember the 10 people whom we've lost this year due to violence and neglect on Rikers: Tarz Youngblood, George Pagan, Herman Diaz, Dashawn Carter, Mary Yehudah, Emmanuel Sullivan, Anibal Carrasquillo, Albert Drye, Antonio Bradley, and Elijah Muhammad.

19 Thank you.

July is Disability Pride Month. It's a time when we celebrate the accomplishments and contributions of New Yorkers with disabilities, commemorative historic laws that promote inclusivity and accessibility for all, while renewing our commitment to strengthen and

2 expand those policies. Let's continue to uplift New3 Yorkers with disabilities this month and beyond.

4 Last weekend, more than one million Muslim New Yorkers celebrated Eid, Eid al-Adha, the Festival of 5 Sacrifice and Community. Eid is not only a time to 6 7 reflect on the importance of values like compassion 8 and justice, but to also partake in charitable 9 actions by distributing food to those who need it most. On behalf of the New York City Council, I wish 10 11 everyone who celebrated, a happy and joyous Eid.

Before we move on, I want to announce that a 12 Member of our City Council Staff will be departing 13 14 later this month. Emily Rooney, an Assistant Deputy 15 Director in the Council's Oversight and 16 Investigations Division, started in 2015. She started 17 as an intern for former Council Member Ydanis 18 Rodriguez. She then joined the Legislative Division 19 as a Legislative Policy Analyst for the Committees on 20 Transportation and Aging. Emily went on to become a Senior Legislative Policy Analyst before her current 21 2.2 role.

Emily is a hardworking, intelligent, and thoughtful colleague who has worked on significant issues during her time with the council. Emily, we

2 wish you all the luck and all the best at New York3 Law School and your legal career.

And while we will certainly miss Emily, I am so excited to announce that the Council has welcomed two new members of our staff, Aaron Mendelsohn, Director of our Oversight and Investigations Division, and Perris Straughter, Director of the Land Use Division. Welcome to the Council, and I'm excited to work with you.

And finally, please join me in congratulating Council Member Kevin Riley and his family on the arrival of their beautiful baby boy. We welcome baby Caleb with you, Council Member. We are so excited to welcome him to our extended Council family. Bless his heart.

17 Now, we have a very big, sated agenda today, so 18 let's get to it. Today we're voting on several 19 legislative land use rules and finance items. We will 20 be voting on the following land use items: 34 21 Morningside Avenue, ANCP Cluster, will facilitate the renovation of a cluster of partially occupied, City-2.2 23 owned residential buildings and their conversion from rentals to coops owned by the tenants in Council 24 Member Richardson Jordan's District. 25

41 Summit Street rezoning will facilitate the construction of a four-story residential building, with four housing units in Council Member Hanif's District.

77-39 Vleigh Place rezoning will facilitate the 6 7 development of a new five-story mixed use building, as modified by the Council. It will include 8 9 approximately 75 housing units, ground floor retail space, and on-site parking. The Council is modifying 10 11 to reduce the density in order to better conform with the existing character of the neighborhood while 12 still creating approximately 23 permanently 13 14 affordable housing units under the MIH program in 15 Council Member Gennaro's District.

11th Street and 34th Avenue rezoning will 16 17 facilitate the construction of two eight-story mixed 18 use buildings, with an estimated 382 apartments, 19 including 100 units affordable under MIH, local 20 retail, arts, and light industrial space in the Ravenswood, Ravenswood area of Astoria, Queens. The 21 Council is modifying the MIH text amendment to strike 2.2 23 option two in Council Member Won's District. Wetherole Street and 67th Avenue rezoning will 24 facilitate the development of a new eight-story 25

2 residential building. It will include approximately 3 21 housing units, five affordable units, as well as 4 eight bicycle and 11 car parking spaces. The Council 5 is modifying the MIH text amendment to strike option 6 two in Council Member Schulman's District.

7 Resilient Edgemere, a package of zoning changes, Urban Renewal Plan amendments and disposition 8 9 approvals to facilitate the implementation of HPD's quote, "Resilient Edgemere Community Plan." End 10 11 quote. In summary, the Plan with reduce development in the area of the neighborhood with the greatest 12 flood risk by downsizing and advancing a community 13 14 land trust to manage low density housing and open 15 space while facilitating the development of five HPD 16 sponsored mixed use buildings with affordable 17 housing, commercial spaces, and community facilities 18 along the subway line. The Council is modifying the 19 application to remove a largely privately owned block 20 from the rezoning area and reduce density in Majority 21 Whip Brooks-Powers' District.

Lastly, two applications in Council Member Dinowitz's District. 4541 Furman Avenue will facilitate the redevelopment of a new mixed use residential, commercial, and community facility

building. It would include approximately 150 affordable housing units and 52 parking spaces on the sub cellar level. The Council will modify to eliminate the proposed expansion of the transit zone. The site selection of a 696 seat primary school in Community District Eight.

8 We will also be voting on the following finance 9 items. Preconsidered Resolution 255 sponsored by 10 Finance Chair Justin Brannan, to approve the new 11 designation and changes in the designation of certain 12 organizations to receive funding in the expense 13 budget.

14 In addition, we will vote on several 15 appointments. The Council will provide advice and consent for the following: Juan Camilo Osorio, for 16 17 appointment as a member of the New York City Planning 18 Commission, David Gold for appointment as a member of 19 the New York City Planning Commission, Rasmia 20 Kirmani-Frye for appointment as a member of the New York City Planning Commission, and Christine Yoon for 21 appointment as a member to the Board of Standards and 2.2 23 Appeals.

24 The Council also will vote to confirm the 25 following: Nicole Yearwood for appointment to the

Equal Employment Practices Commission and Ngozi Okaro
for appointment to the, to the Equal Employment
Practices Commission.

Lastly, we will be voting on the following 5 legislation: Introduction 480-A, sponsored by the 6 7 Council's Parks and Recreation Committee Chair, Council Member Shekar Krishnan, would co-name 78 8 9 thoroughfares and public spaces throughout the City based on requests of Council Members whose Districts 10 11 include the location. A complete list of the conamings can be found on the Council's legislative 12 database. We thank you to our staff, Chris Sitorri 13 14 (SP?), Patrick Mulvihill, and Chima Obichere.

15 Next, we're voting on Introduction 212-A, 16 sponsored by our General Welfare Committee Chair 17 Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala, which would require a 18 monthly report on emergency housing usage. This bill 19 would also require that report to be updated to include information on the total number of all 20 individuals utilizing emergency housing in the City 21 and the total number of families with children, adult 2.2 23 families, single men, and single women, utilizing temporary emergency housing. 24

2	Additionally, Introduction 212-A would require
3	the Mayor's Office of Operations to report on the
4	exits from various City-admitted facilities including
5	the Department of Youth and Community Development,
6	Department of Homeless Services, Department of
7	Housing Preservation and Development, and Human
8	Resources Administration Facilities.
9	Finally, the bill would require the Mayor's
10	Office of Operations to report on the financings,
11	starts, and completions, of permanent housing for
12	those existing City-administered facilities. In
13	addition, this bill would make related technical
14	amendments. We thank you to our staff Imenta (SP?)
15	Killawon (SP?).
16	Next, we will vote on a package of legislation
17	intending to increase the City's involvement in

to increase the City's involvement ın 1 / intenaing utility related issues and pressure Con Edison to 18 19 take action to prevent a similar crisis from 20 occurring in the future. Time and time again, new Yorkers experience dramatic and unexpected increases 21 in their Con Ed bills propelling a public outcry and 22 23 investigations in rate hikes.

The City Council is taking action of our own to address this matter. I'm very proud of the bill I

2	sponsored, Introduction 372-A, which would create an
3	Office of the Utility Advocate in the City for the
4	very first time. This Office would be charged with
5	receiving feedback from City customers on their
6	energy utility providers, advocating for utility
7	customers at public hearings, assisting utility
8	customers with accessing financial help to pay their
9	utility bills, and educating City utility customers
10	on their rights and methods to lower their bills.
11	We also have several Resolutions in this package.
12	Resolution 162, sponsored by Council Member Linda
13	Lee, calls on the New York State Legislature to pass
14	amendments to prevent to prevent a utilities rate
15	case from exceeding a certain percentage each year.
16	Beyond the Public Service Commission rejecting a rate
17	case proposal, there are no mechanisms to prevent a
18	utility from proposing an exorbitantly high rate
19	case.
20	Resolution 172, sponsored by Council Member
21	Rafael Salamanca, calls on, on New York state to
22	increase the number of Commissioners on the Public
23	Service Commission and permit New York City to
24	appoint two of the Commissioners. The Public Service
25	Commission approves the rate increases for utilities

and ensures New Yorkers receive adequate service. 2 3 While Con Ed holds a near monopoly over the 4 electricity market, the City does not have the power to appoint any Commissioners to the PSC. By granting 5 the City power to appoint Commissioners, the City 6 7 would gain greater oversight over the PSC and utilities would become more accountable to the City. 8 9 Resolution 173-A, sponsored by Council Member Sandra Ong, calls on the Governor and the New York 10 11 State Legislature to expand financial relief programs 12 to assist City residents struggling to pay their 13 utility bills. Outstanding utility debt could impair 14 the City residents' credit and the City's economic 15 recovery from the pandemic. Further state funding 16 should be allocated to assist New Yorkers unable to 17 pay their utility costs. 18 Resolution 174-A, sponsored by Council member 19 Marjorie Velázquez, calls on Con Ed to improve

20 communication with City residents about increases in 21 utility costs. Many City residents were shocked to 22 find the dramatic rise in their utility bills in 23 January 2022. Con Ed must improve communication to 24 ensure all residents are aware of impending price 25 increases. We thank you to staff Noah Meixler.

2	And finally, the Council will vote on a
3	monumental reproductive rights package. In the wake
4	of the United State Supreme Court's dangerous
5	decision to overturn Roe v Wade in Dobbs v Jackson
6	Women's Health Organization, this Council is taking
7	action to safeguard abortion and advance reproductive
8	healthcare in New York City. The right to safe and
9	legal abortion is a fundamental human right and must
10	be protected for all who seek reproductive
11	healthcare, especially in the aftermath of the
12	Supreme Court's dangerous decision.
13	This package of Council legislation will help
14	ensure the necessary protections and expanded
15	resources to meet New Yorkers' reproductive health
15 16	resources to meet New Yorkers' reproductive health needs and those of all who come to our City in need

2	First, is Introduction 465-A, which would require the
3	Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to annually
4	report on the number of births and the number of
5	abortions providing in the City each year for both
6	the individuals who are residents of New York City at
7	the time of such birth or abortion, and for those who
8	are not residents.

DOHMH would also be required to assess the 9 ability of licensed medical providers in the City to 10 11 provide reproductive healthcare, identify any 12 challenges faced by license medical providers to provide reproductive healthcare, and make 13 recommendations for increasing the capacity of such 14 15 providers to provide reproductive healthcare. We 16 thank you, staff, Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and 17 Andrea Vazquez.

Introduction 466-A, also sponsored by Public 18 19 Advocate Jumaane Williams and Council Member Shahana Hanif, would prohibit City agencies from using City 20 resources including, but not limited to, time spent 21 by employees and the use of City property to detain 2.2 23 persons for performing or aiding with abortions or to cooperate or provide information to out of state 24 25 entities related to abortions performed in New York

State. We thank you to our staff, Brenda McKinney,
 Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

4 Now, we will also vote on two bills co-sponsored by Council Member Shahana Hanif, Introduction 475-A, 5 which is also co-prime sponsored by Council Members 6 7 Cabán, Farah Louis, Carlina Rivera, Crystal Hudson, and Amanda Farias, and Public Advocate Jumaane 8 9 Williams. This Introduction would create a private right of action for interference with reproductive or 10 11 endocrine medical care. A person would be able to 12 bring a legal claim of interference with medical care 13 when a lawsuit is commenced against them on the basis 14 of their accessing medical care related to the human 15 reproductive or endocrine systems that is legal in 16 New York City and which was provided in whole or in 17 part in New York City. Thank you to staff members, 18 once again, Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea 19 Vazquez.

Introduction 474-A, also sponsored by Council Member Hanif, and co-prime sponsored by Council Members Williams, Hudson, and Cabán, and Public Advocate Williams, would require the City to engage in a public education program about safe access to reproductive healthcare. Specifically, the bill would

2 require the City to post information about the City's 3 Access to Reproductive Healthcare Facilities Law that 4 protects areas surrounding these facilities and 5 protections for people making reproductive health 6 decisions under the City's Human Rights Law.

7 The bill would also require the City to include 8 information on accessing resources, to find 9 comprehensive reproductive healthcare, and privacy 10 protections, and would require a media campaign on 11 reproductive healthcare as well.

We are also voting on two bills sponsored by 12 Council Member Carlina Rivera. Introduction 506-A 13 14 would require the Department of Consumer and Worker 15 Protection to implement a public outreach and 16 education campaign on facilities that deceptively 17 advertise or are misleading in their offerings of 18 reproductive health services. This would provide 19 information on what services these facilities provide 20 and do not provide, how they advertise their 21 services, how these facilities can impact timely and 2.2 safe access to pregnancy care, and how a person can 23 file a complaint about their deceptive practices. Introduction 507-A, sponsored by Council Member 24 Rivera, and co-prime sponsored by Council Members 25

Gutiérrez and Joseph, would require DOHMH to provide 2 3 FDA approved medication for medication abortion at no 4 cost to a patient at health clinics operated by DOHMH. DOHMH would provide such medication to 5 patients who seek to terminate their pregnancy when 6 7 the use of such medication is indicated and in 8 accordance with a medically reasonable and good faith 9 professional judgement of such patient's medical provider. 10

DOHMH would also provide counseling and timely referrals to other health facilities and qualified family planning providers if needed for other services. Thank you once again to Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

Also included in this package are several 16 17 Resolutions. Resolution 195, sponsored by Council 18 Member Gail Brewer and co-prime sponsored by Council 19 Member Julie Menin, calls upon the New York State 20 Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign the 21 Reproductive Freedom and Equity Program which would 2.2 establish a grant program to provide funding to New 23 York abortion providers and non-profit organizations to increase access to abortion care. Thank you staff 24

2 members Brenda, Brenda McKinney, and Anastasia 3 Zimina.

Resolution 196-A sponsored by Majority Whip 4 Selvena Brooks-Powers, calls upon the New York State 5 Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign Senate 6 7 Bill 9137, Assembly Bill 10356, which would allow out of state physicians to provide reproductive 8 9 healthcare services in this state while awaiting full licensure. Thank you once again, staff Brenda 10 11 McKinney and Anastasia Zimina.

12 Resolution 197, sponsored by Council Member Cabán 13 and co-prime sponsored by Council Members Velásquez 14 and Hudson, and Public Advocate Williams, declares 15 New York City as a safe city for all those in need of abortion related care. Regardless of your background, 16 17 everyone is welcome here in New York City to get the 18 proper care they need. Thank you again, Brenda 19 McKinney and Anastasia.

20 Resolution 200, sponsored by Council Member Julie 21 Menin, recognizes the importance of the Roe v Wade by 22 declaring January 22, 2023, as Roe v Wade Day in New 23 York City. January 22, 2023, will mark the 50th 24 anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision. 25 While Roe v Wade may be overturned, it will forever

2 be commemorated here in our City. Thank you once3 again, Brenda McKinney and Anastasia Zimina.

Resolution 242-A, sponsored by Council Member 4 Menin, would support Assembly Bill 10468, Senate Bill 5 8797B, which seeks to amend Article One of the New 6 7 York State Constitution in relation to equality of 8 rights and protection against discrimination. The 9 amendment would add an equal rights provision that would expand the list of protected classes to include 10 11 ethnicity, national origin, disability, or sex, 12 including pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes, sexual 13 orientation, gender identity, and gender expression. 14 This proposal was recently approved by the 15 Legislature and now requires another approval next 16 legislative session in order to be placed before the 17 voters of New York State to amend the State Constitution. 18

19 Resolution 245, sponsored by Public Advocate
20 Jumaane Williams, calls upon the United States Senate
21 to Pass and President Joe Biden to sign the Women's
22 Health Protection Act to reinstate and protect the
23 federal right to abortion through its codification
24 into federal law. Thank you once again, Brenda
25 McKinney, and Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez. Also,

2 thank you to Jayasri Ganapathy, William Nori (SP?),3 Noah Meixler.

This is an incredible package of bills that reflects the leadership of so many of our members, whose efforts are to be applauded during such an important moment in our country's history. I thank you for your attention. Now, I will turn it back into the hands of our Majority Leader.

10 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. That was a 11 long one. Lot, lot of items today, a lot of good 12 items on there. Thank you, Speaker Adams. We're going 13 to now move in to discussion of General Orders. We 14 are going to begin with Council Member Brewer 15 followed by Council Member Barron.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I'm, 17 uh, just here because we have a Resolution that I 18 think is part of the Speaker's and the Council's 19 amazing, uh, package. This particular Resolution 20 supports funding in Albany for, uh, those who are 21 coming to the City of New York from other states who will be desires of abortion services. I think it's 2.2 23 the number 195.

And the reason I mention it is, if you see the papers today just as an example, there's a 10-year-

2	old who lives in Ohio and was raped and had to go to
3	another state. And unfortunately, this is happening
4	over and over again. So, that particular bill, uh,
5	that we are resolving to support, um, I think was
6	asking for \$50 million. It won't pass necessarily in,
7	um, this, uh, session, but hopefully the next one.
8	And I just, as the Speaker has indicated, um,
9	also the State however, I want to thank the Governor,
10	has put in \$35 million into a fund to both, in the
11	first round help those organizations that are
12	providing abortion, and then in the second round do
13	even more independent clinics and provide security,
14	because unfortunately that's needed. So, we're part
15	of a very big process, um, but New York is certainly
16	leading. I just want to thank all of us, the entire
17	City Council, for their support. Thank you very much.
18	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, and just, uh,
19	we're going to do any talk on, if you're talking
20	about a Resolution, just when we get to the
21	Resolutions. So, we have a list for that as well. So,
22	if you are signed up, it's okay. If you're signed up
23	to speak, uh, on a Resolution, we'll add you to that
24	list when we get to that point. Uh, we're going to go

2 now to Council Member Barron and then we'll hear from 3 Council Member Rivera.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Uh, thank you. My 5 colleagues, I rise to highlight two great men in my District whose names will be adorning our street 6 7 signs. Now, one is Mister Jose Rosado and the other is Mister Melvin Faulkner. Jose Rosado was a member 8 9 of Community Board Five. He helped so many families. He helped so many individuals whether it's 10 11 employment, whether it's housing issues, but his pet 12 project was the Latin Souls Little League. Not only did he turn them into athletic winners, but he also 13 14 turned them into men and young women who knew how to 15 now navigate the community that they lived in as they 16 grew older. So, we honor Mister Jose Rosado.

17 And then, Mister Melvin Faulkner who worked in my 18 office for many, many years. This man was incredible. 19 He helped over 100 families out of foreclosure. He 20 went down and before lawyers got a hearing from the 21 judges, they heard from Mister Melvin Faulkner. His seniors, he made sure their housing was taken care 2.2 23 of. He made sure that all of the seniors got the food that they needed. And Melvin Faulkner, he never 24 stopped working. I couldn't even get him to stop 25

working. "Take a break, Melvin," but may you rest in peace now and take that well deserved break that you needed when you were here on earth. So, to those two, I just wanted to rise and honor them as we put their names on street signs.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Council Member
Barron. We're now going to hear from Council Member
Rivera, followed by Council Member Joseph.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Okay. New York has always 10 11 been a leader in protecting reproductive, health, and 12 rights and I want to thank Speaker Adams and my colleagues in the Women's Caucus for putting forward 13 14 such a comprehensive and important package of bills 15 that will both protect our existing rights and 16 improve access to abortion care in this post-Roe era. The bills that we're passing today should act as a 17 18 model for cities throughout the rest of the country 19 for what we can and must do to protect our basic 20 right to bodily autonomy and increased access to 21 important healthcare.

I am particularly proud of my bills, Intro 506, that I introduced with the Bronx Borough President Vanessa Gibson to implement an outreach and education program to inform New Yorkers about the deceptive

advertisements and misleading information provided by facilities that say that they provide reproductive health services, but they're actually fake. They're anti-abortion centers that prey on patients in what will be one of the most vulnerable times in their life.

And Intro 507 required DOHMH to provide FDA 8 9 approved medication for medication abortion at no cost to a patient at health clinics that they 10 11 operate. And I want to thank Council members Gutiérrez and, and Joseph. This legislation will 12 13 ensure that the people most impacted by abortion bans across the country will be able to access reliable 14 15 healthcare should they come to New York City seeking 16 abortion care.

17 Again, I want to thank Speaker Adams for your 18 leadership, my colleagues in the Women's Caucus, 19 Bronx Borough President Vanessa Gibson, and the 20 Advocates. There are so many, NIRH, Planned 21 Parenthood of Greater New York, the Latina Institute, 2.2 and everyone who has rallied, protested, called your 23 elected representative and spoken out about this injustice from the Supreme Court and for making sure 24 that New York remains committed to protecting the 25

2 reproductive rights of everyone who needs access to 3 care. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now
going to go to Council Member Joseph, followed by
Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, Majority
Leader. I'd like to speak today in honor of Sarita
Rein who was called home to God on July 25, 2020.
Sarita was a lifelong educator and today she is being
honored with a vote for a street renaming, in my, in
the district of my colleague, Council Member Inna
Vernikov.

Born on October 19, 1935, Sarita came to Brooklyn, New York from Lima, Peru for a visit. But she decided to stay in New York when she met her husband, Arnold. They had two children, Greg, who works at the Department of Education, and my friend, Bridget, who works at the UFT.

20 Sarita was a gold standard for her dedication to 21 young people. She began her career with the 22 Department of Education as a parent coordinator where 23 she was promoted to assist Bill Thompson, who at the 24 time was the School Board and Vice President. Among 25 her many accomplishments, she was elected President

2	of the District 21 School Board, as well as President
3	of the New York Association for Brain Injured
4	Children. She served as the Committee on Special
5	Education Chairperson for Community School District
6	12 in the Bronx, and she later moved to Community
7	School District Two in Manhattan as a Deputy
8	Superintendent.
9	Sarita taught aspiring educators about the
10	fundamentals of special education at the College of
11	Staten Island and was the initial planning team for
12	the creation of Edward R Murrow High School. Last,
13	last, but certainly not least, she was the parent,
14	the PTA Association President until 1985.
15	A street co-naming is a tremendous honor. Sarita,

15 A street co-naming is a tremendous honor. Sarita, 16 I am sure you are listening to us from up above and I 17 thank you for your years of service to our young, to, 18 to the City's young people. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're nowgoing to go to Council Member Brooks-Powers.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you and good 22 afternoon. Um, I, too, would like to celebrate the 23 passage of a strong reproductive rights package 24 today, including my own bill, Resolution 196-A, 25 calling on the state to pass legislation that will

2 allow out of state physicians to provide reproductive 3 health services in New York while they await full 4 licensure.

New York has long been a sanctuary for women
seeking abortion and other reproductive care
services, and we will continue to be. We cannot delay
in the fight to protect, protect abortion access and
bodily autonomy for people across this country.

I'd also like to congratulate Nicole Yearwood for 10 11 her nomination to the Equal Employment Practices Commission. As a fellow soror of Delta, Sigma, Theta 12 13 Sorority, Incorporated, and from her years of 14 advocacy on behalf of marginalized communities to 15 bolster voter engagement and strengthen our 16 democracy. I know Nicole will do good work on the 17 Commission and the fight for a fair workplace.

I'd also like to acknowledge a street co-naming bill we are passing, which includes two new conamings in Rosedale recognizing the lives and contributions of W. O'Brien and Oswald Grannum. I was honored to work with the Rosedale community to honor both of these Rosedale residents and their years of community service.

25

2	And finally, I'd like to speak on the Resilient
3	Edgemere Land Use item. Today's vote is in support of
4	resiliency and a path to home ownership for black and
5	brown families, but there is much more work left to
6	be done. This project, in its original form, was one
7	of how many land use proposals we've seen have placed
8	a burden on marginalized communities with no clear
9	path to critical investments that would sustain such
10	a project and help the community thrive.
11	Although we have secured many commitments, there
12	is more work left to be done. But there are many
13	positive components of this project. Through the
14	community advisory board, we will continue to shape
15	this project in a way that benefits Rockaway. We
16	reduced the proposed density by half on the peninsula
17	and, and also was able to secure a 35% floor for home
18	ownership, financial resources to remove barriers to
19	affordability, and down zoning to promote resiliency
20	and protect our coastal community.
21	We are investing in our roads to eradicate
22	chronic flooding and congestion, as well keeping the
23	City's foot to the fire when it comes to investments
24	in schools in our community, as our, um, need will

grow with the development. We are modernizing our

2 evacuation plan to match the new footprint of our 3 community and prepare for stronger storms.

I would like to thank Chief of Staff Jeremy John,
First Deputy Chief of Staff Faiza Ali, the Land Use
staff, for their, their extremely hard work on this
as well as my own Alex, um, Hunter, my Policy
Director, tying up the commitments made by the
administration overnight and well into today.

10 My community sent me here to fight for them and 11 bring home the best project. And that's what we've 12 done. And with that, I encourage my colleagues in the 13 Body to vote in support of this. Thank you. 14 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now 15 going to go to Council Member Farias followed by 16 Council Member Williams.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER FARIAS: Thank you, Majority 18 Leader. Um, I want to shout out the Women's Caucus 19 legislative package being introduced today which 20 focuses on accessibility, agency, and safety for 21 women, trans, and gender-expansive people to have 22 real access to abortion care.

There are five bills from the package being voted on today, which includes Reso 195, Intro 465-A, 466-A, 475-A, and 507-A. All of these bills create a

2 number of proactive protections so that New York City 3 can maintain abortion access for all people with the 4 capacity for pregnancy.

I know that abortion may not directly affect 5 everyone, every one of us in this room, but in a 6 7 country with a high maternal mortality and a lack of childcare infrastructure, it is important and our 8 duty as legislators to protect the lives of women, 9 trans, and gender-expansive people which makes 10 11 signing protective bills like these that much more critical. I urge all of my colleagues today to vote 12 13 yes on every bill in the package.

14 I also have another bill, Intro 179-A, which 15 would require the Mayor's Office on Workforce 16 Development to report on the role of women and 17 gender-expansive workers in nontraditional careers. 18 Data like this is how we first assess what is and is 19 not working in our agencies. There has never been a 20 more critical time than now to focus on getting women in the workforce as we continue to recover from the 21 2.2 pandemic. Women deserve the high paying, stable, 23 union jobs that construction and other nontraditional careers offer. By passing this bill today, we are 24 prioritizing women and gender-expansive peoples' 25

2 economic wellness and making sure every sector in our 3 workforce has the best people in the job for it.

With my last 25 seconds, I'd also like to 4 acknowledge the street co-naming of Marie Reed Way in 5 my District. Marie Reed gave all of herself to the 6 7 Soundview community. She was a dedicated member of 8 Soundview Presbyterian Church and I'm really proud 9 today to be introducing a street co-naming, um, for our community back in Council District 18. Thank you. 10 11 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll hear from Council Member Williams, followed by Council 12 Member Hanif. 13

14 COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you. I am very 15 proud to co-prime 474-A, uh, sponsored by Council Member Hanif, uh. As, um, you know, we think about 16 17 the pivotal moment in the fight for equal access to 18 reproductive healthcare, the overturning of Roe v 19 Wade should not discourage us, but instead ignite us 20 to act. And that is exactly what we are doing today. Um, I am excited about the amendments to the bill 21 and really want to thank the bill sponsor for her 2.2 23 flexibility in making sure that, um, we strengthen our efforts, um, and include additional City agencies 24 to make sure we maximize our impact. 25

2	I am equally excited to be voting on the
3	appointments, uh, for the Equal Employment Practices
4	Commission. This Commission has, uh, had some
5	vacancies for quite some time, so I know they are
6	excited to welcome, uh, two new members, Ms. Yearwood
7	and Ms. Okaro. And I just want to thank the Speaker
8	and Council Leadership for prioritizing both of these
9	very important measures. Thank you.
10	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And, uh, we'll
11	hear from Council member Hanif followed by Council
12	Member Narcisse.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you, first, to
14	Council Member, um, Williams. Um, I want to thank
15	Chair Williams and Cabán for championing, uh, my
16	bills, Intro 474-A and Intro 475-A. Um, I also want
17	to thank Public Advocate Williams, Council Members
18	Hudson, Louis, Rivera, Farias for introducing these
19	bills alongside me. And of course, gratitude to
20	Speaker Adams for facilitating today's important
21	package of reproductive rights legislation before us.
22	I want to thank the, the folks behind the scenes
23	who made these bills possible, including Council
24	Staff Jayasri Ganapathy, Rachel Cordero, David
25	Seitzer, Brenda McKinney, and Andrea Vazquez, as well

as my Legislative and Budget Director Alex Liao,
Chief of Staff Nora Brickner, and of course, NYCLU
for their invaluable insight.

New York City's abortions protections are 5 underutilized, with many New Yorkers simply not aware 6 7 they exist, and 474-A addresses this information gap by requiring the City to conduct language-accessible 8 9 public education and media campaigns about existing protections. These include the right to access the 10 11 health facilities without harassment and prohibitions against employment or housing discrimination on the 12 basis of reproductive health decision. 13

14 Additionally, following the Dobbs decision, there 15 will be an influx of people travelling to New York 16 City for reproductive care. People seeking trans-17 affirming hormone treatment will also travel here for care as well. These folks are vulnerable to civil 18 19 suits for receiving medical procedures that are legal 20 in our city, but illegal in their home state or 21 municipality. And so, 475-A addresses this issue by establishing these suits as interference with medical 2.2 23 care and allowing people to countersue under New York City law. If the countersuit prevails, the plaintiff 24 will be awarded \$10,000 in damages and also awarded 25

2 costs of litigation. These bills in the legislative 3 package before us cement our City as a true bastion 4 for reproductive rights.

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I also want to note that I am voting aye on the 5 41 Summit Place rezoning in my District. At the 6 outset, I was super hesitant to support this 7 application because I believe there's greater need 8 9 for manufacturing districts than the continued development of market-rate housing. After several 10 11 rounds of negotiations and community input, we were 12 able to secure a fourth of the building for new, uh, for affordable housing at 60% AMI and a commitment of 13 14 \$20,000 in improvements for the community garden. I 15 sent out an email, and I appreciate the ways in which my colleagues have responded. So, thank you so much. 16 17 And also, big day for my District. We, we are co-18 naming. 19 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council 20 Member. 21 COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Kensington as Little 2.2 Bangladesh. 23 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Very Good. Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member, I believe last 24

2 but not least, we'll now hear from Council Member 3 Narcisse.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Um, for the street co-5 naming, first and foremost, I have to say thank you 6 to, um, Council Member Darlene Mealy for introducing 7 the co-naming of East 56th Street and Lindon 8 Boulevard to Kade Ashton Tyler Lewin Way in honor of 9 my constituent.

Kade Lewin was an innocent, intelligent, fun, 10 11 loving, 12-year-old, who lack was, I mean, life was cut short due to another act of senseless gun 12 13 violence in our street, streets. It is my hope that this mem, this memorial in the form of the street co-14 15 naming serve as a reminder to all of us that we must 16 work together to bring an end to gun violence in our 17 community. It is time for us to walk the walk, not 18 just talk, but to address the inequities all over New 19 York City. And, once again, thank you.

And I am proud that New York City is standing up for female reproductive rights and it will serve us as, um, this will serve the City as a safe haven for those residents of states who have been denied the right to choose. We women should be able to have a right over our body. We must do all we can to protect

2	the right and the safe of abortion, not only for New
3	Yorkers, but for all Americans who arrive in our
4	state seeking to make their choice about their
5	bodies. So, thank you. I hope all my colleagues will
6	vote and I believe in 31 women strong. Thank you.
7	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We have two
8	more. We're going to hear from Council Member Avilés
9	followed by Council Member Richardson Jordan.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: Great. I guess, um, first,
11	I'd like to extend my congratulations to Council
12	Member Riley and his growing family. And, Speaker, I
13	think it may be time to talk in earnest about a
14	daycare center here in the Chambers or in the
15	building somewhere close.
16	Um, there's a great deal of work to be proud of
17	today, especially the reproductive health package
18	that we will be voting on earlier. I'm also delighted
19	to vote on a host of street co-namings that honor New
20	York City's everyday heroes. Look at this long list
21	of incredible people. It should remind us about the
22	collective power and responsibility and how
23	incredible New Yorkers do acts of kindness and love
24	every single day.
25	

2	Of course, I have to pay special tribute to
3	someone from my District being honored by a street
4	co-naming as well. Sandra Vizcaino was a long time
5	Sunset Park resident and community activist who
6	emigrated to Sunset Park in 19, in 1977 from the
7	Dominican Republic. She was a mom, a wife, a sister,
8	a friend, a neighbor, and educator. And she was the,
9	also the first educator in New York City to die from
10	COVID-19.
11	To Sandra and her family, gracias. The District,
12	District 38 community thanks you for your service to
13	our youth and families and for being such a dedicated
14	New Yorker. And please pay attention. We are not out
15	of this pandemic. And in her honor, please take extra
16	precautions to protect yourself and your families.
17	Thank you, Sandra.
18	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear
19	from Council Member Richardson Jordon.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDSON JORDAN: Hi. Thank you. 21 I, um, wanted to call people's attention to LU 45 22 which is on, uh, today's Stated. It's a housing 23 project in my District. Um, this was, this was a long 24 one, but we did reach resolution and I really want to 25 thank some Members of Land Use, uh, particularly

Chelsea Kelly, Andrew Lassiter, and Perris Straughter. Um, I also would like to thank Jay Coe (SP?) from the Speaker's Office, uh, and, uh, my very own Ovi (SP?) Latimore (SP?), um, Legislative Director, uh, for District Nine, um, because we got there.

Um, and, and I'm just glad 14 that we were able to work out something that worked 15 for the residents and their own empowered decisionmaking in, in a difficult process. 16

17 Um, I would also very much like to thank Council 18 Woman Stevens, Council Woman De La Rosa, Council Man 19 Kagan, and Council Man Barron for signing on to a 20 letter, uh, that I had put out around the budget for, 21 uh, support for the TILs and this is not something 2.2 that's going away. Uh, because while we are taking a 23 step forward with some residents, we have other residents who still need support. So, we, as a 24

2 Council, must fund TIL. So, I wanted to thank those 3 Council Members as well, uh, for their advocacy. 4 Um, also, Council Man Marte and Council Woman Nurse, uh, for showing interest and, and having 5 further discussions. And Chair Louis, uh, for being 6 7 open to a possible hearing around the TILs, uh, and 8 continuing further discussion. So, uh, but overall 9 great work and, um, and we'll also continue the fight. Um, today's a 5 big day and I, I think we have a lot to be proud of. 6 7 Um, even before the far-right wing used a mix of 8 perjury and dirty tricks to highjack and pack its 9 majority with far-right wing fundamentalist ideologues, the Supreme Court already had all the 10 11 makings of an illegitimate anti-democratic 12 institution.

And we've been fed this fallacy that the 13 judiciary is some apolitical institution. Not 14 15 ironically, its exactly because I was a practicing 16 attorney who litigated our constitutional rights in 17 court every day, that I know that courts and judges 18 that preside over them, are just as, as inherently 19 political as the other two branches of government. 20 And it's with that knowledge that we can then say 21 enough. So, enough deference to this collection of 2.2 religious fundamentalists and corporate extremists, 23 enough talk about how the Court serves as a check on the legislative and executive branches. It's time to 24 25 start talking about how those branches can, should,

2 and must check the Court. And the extremist 3 majority's indefensible decision to overturn Roe v 4 Wade is a searing affront to human rights, a 5 precursor to immense death and suffering and a call 6 for us all to get organized.

7 And we've said this many times before, it's going to take an immense ground swell of action to get what 8 9 we really need, the guaranteed right to a safe, legal abortion on demand, without apology, and at no dollar 10 11 cost for anyone who determines that they need one. Um, and what we can do today is ensure that New York 12 13 is a safe city for anyone receiving, performing, or assisting in abortion care. 14

15 So, I'm really proud that many of my colleagues 16 have risen to this occasion and crafted a wide array 17 of legislation to counteract this attack on all 18 people who, who can get pregnant. And so, it's with 19 that in mind that I emphatically vote aye on all of 20 the abortion related, um, legislation and, uh, aye on 21 everything else. And abstaining on, uh, Res 264. Thank you. 2.2

New 14 York is notoriously considered a beacon for all those 15 who are pushed to the margins of our society. As 16 other states begin and continue to heavily restrict 17 access to abortion and abortion care, these proposals 18 are essential in preparing New York's bandwidth for 19 the expected influx of people seeking reproductive healthcare from outside of state. 20

We must aptly prepare to ensure that not only, uh, people from outside of state, but also people right here living in New York who do not have access to healthcare are provided with imperative car that they need, um, and, and services that they're looking

2 for. These services are never truly available until 3 we remove the barriers that prohibit or limit people 4 from seeking medical assistance.

This means that we must provide ample funding, 5 access to information, expanded services, language 6 7 axis, language access, and expediting the process to 8 receive potentially lifesaving medical attention and 9 prescriptions to ensure that we are delivering equal and equitable reproductive and abortion services in 10 11 New York City. So, I want to thank the colleagues for 12 this historic package.

13 I also want to take a moment to acknowledge the co-naming of Ramona Elizabeth Rodriguez Way, who was 14 15 a woman who unfortunately, was killed by her husband 16 in an act of domestic violence in my District. Her 17 sisters, her daughters, who are watching us right 18 now, have started an organization, Long Live our Butterfly, to provide direct access to domestic 19 20 violence and intimate partner violence survivors in 21 our District. And so, I wanted to take a moment to 2.2 acknowledge the scourge of intimate partner violence 23 that continues to take over our City and thank them for turning their pain into action on behalf of 24 Ramona Elizabeth Rodriguez. 25

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Permission to explain my 5 vote? 6 7 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead. 8 COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: I want to acknowledge 9 two street co-namings that I am sponsoring in my District, Joseph Hennessy Way. Joseph Hennessy was a 10 11 long time Chair of Community Board Six in Queens for over 30 years and very active in the community. And 12 Greg Stein who was an LGBTQ activist and active with 13 14 the AIDS Center of Queens County and many other 15 organizations.

16 And I also want to, um, say that on LU 83, 17 Resolution 281, and LU 84, Resolution 282, those are, 18 that's a project in my District that I am very happy 19 to say, I was able to get deeply affordable housing 20 for. It's a small, it's a small development, but it's 21 another development in my, in my District that I'm 2.2 able to, um, have more families be able to, to come 23 and, and live in the community.

24 Uh, and I also want to thank, um, the Speaker for 25 her leadership on the historic access to reproductive

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 70 rights and healthcare, um, in this package led by 2 3 this historic body of women. Uh, thank you and I vote 4 aye on all. 5 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Stevens? 16 SPEAKER ADAMS: I'd just like to, uh, acknowledge 17 once again, uh, my extreme pride in this Body. Um, 18 first time ever women majority in the New York City 19 Council looking out for the reproductive rights and 20 the healthcare of women, not just in New York City, 21 but across this great country of ours.

I'd also like to acknowledge a street co-naming in my District 28, which I call the Great 28, will have a street naming after Ritawantee, also known as Auntie Rita, Persaud Way. Auntie Rita was hit by, uh,

a hit and run driver a couple of years ago in my
District, in Richmond Hill. And I want to uplift her
in her memory today.

5 And I'd also like to uplift two bastions of 6 southeast Queens. I believe that the Saint Albans 7 area, uh, David and Renee Bluford. They will also be 8 commemorated in a street co-naming. They were 9 bastions in community service and pride for those of 10 us who grew up under their leadership in southeast 11 Queens.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now move to discussion of Resolutions. We'll first hear from Council Member Ung.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER UNG: Good afternoon and thank you 23 for opportunity to speak about Resolution number 173-24 A. This Resolution calls on New York state to expand 25 financial relief programs to help struggling

2	residents who are falling behind on their utility
3	bills due to a nearly threefold increase in the cost
4	of energy at the start of the yar. Utility customers
5	here in New York City both unaware of impending price
6	increase and coping with a colder than usual January
7	were surprised by their bills that incurred dramatic,
8	unexpected increases. Many were already suffering
9	economically due to the pandemic and had to make the
10	difficult decision between covering their housing,
11	food, and medical costs or paying their utility bills
12	to keep their power on.

As we approach the hottest months of the year, energy usage will go up, and these same New Yorkers will likely fall even behind on their energy costs. Experts predict rising utility debt will affect residents' credit scores, result in service being disconnected, and even lead to homelessness which is already at crisis levels in New York City.

20 While the Governor and the State Legislature 21 created a program to forgive the utility debt of many 22 low-income New Yorkers, the funding is not nearly 23 enough to meet the current need. I urge my colleagues 24 to join me in supporting this important piece of 25 legislation. Thank you.

2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear 3 from Council Member Menin.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you, Majority Leader 5 Powers. When Roe v Wade was overturned, we faced the 6 unconscionable reality that our daughters have less 7 rights today than we did. And we literally have 8 turned back the clock of time on women's rights by 9 100 years.

That is why I am proud to sponsor two Resolutions 10 11 that the Council will vote on today that are part of the reproductive rights package. Resolution 200 would 12 set January 22, 2023, as Roe v Wade Day in the City 13 of New York to commemorate the 50th anniversary of 14 15 the landmark Supreme Court decision. We will not forget such an important court case and that moment 16 17 must be remembered.

In addition, Resolution 242 calls on the New York State Legislature to pass an equal rights amendment to the State Constitution. This would basically codify reproductive rights, uh, rights around sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, and other rights that are not currently enshrined in the State Constitution.

2	Lastly, I just want to thank the Speaker and my
3	colleagues for this legislative package today. It's a
4	really proud moment to be voting on all this. Thank
5	you.
6	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Is anyone else
7	signed up, or would like to? Oh, Council Member
8	Brooks-Powers.
9	COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Um, thank you. I
10	just wanted to speak briefly on the bill I'm

12	Member Holden, followed by Council Member Lee.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority
14	Leader. Uh, today I introduce, uh, Intro, uh, 573,
15	which would prohibit the operation of horse-drawn
16	cabs in Central Park, effectively banning horse-drawn
17	carriages in New York City for good. Whether it was
18	passing legislation creating the AC, uh, an ACC
19	shelter in each Borough or to creating the heat index
20	for horse-drawn carriages, to establishing an Office
21	of Animal Welfare, increasing animal cruelty
22	reporting, the banning of trafficking of wild birds,
23	this Body has come together in the past to do great
24	work on animal rights issues. Uh, and it's time,
25	it's, it's time once again to step up for the
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2 defenseless. It's time to advocate for the horses who 3 have suffered for far too long.

We are here today to declare this City horse carriage free. And I need you, my colleagues, to help us achieve this. This is 2022. It's not 1822. We should not have horses serving humans for our greedy desires. We should not allow drivers to make a buck off the backs of these poor horses.

10 Other cities in Europe, Asia, the Middle East, 11 and Mexico have already done this. New York City 12 needs to be among them, and we need to be the leaders 13 of this in the United States of America.

The drivers will be able to work more with 14 15 electric carriages. They won't lose time due to the 16 heat index or inclement weather as they do now. The 17 jobs would be prevailing wage and without great 18 benefits. Let's all work together to end the misery 19 of these horses finally. Let's end horse carriages in 20 New York City once and for all. Anyone who feels that horses have to serve man in the 21st century is out 21 of touch. 2.2

I thank the advocates who have pushed for this. And I especially thank my colleagues who have signed on to this bill as, uh, Pre-Intro sponsors, uh.

Please sign on to Intro 570, 573, and help us again
do the right thing by our animals. Thank you,
Majority Leader. Almost made it.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear
from Council Member Lee followed by Council Member
Won.

COUCNIL MEMBER LEE: Hi, everyone. Sorry, I just 8 9 wanted to make a quick announcement. So, I'll send you guys all an email, but, um, just wanted you to be 10 11 aware that this Saturday, uh, I'm sure you quys have heard about 988 which is the federal number to reach 12 13 out about mental health versus 911. So, that is 14 actually rolling out on Saturday, so I just wanted 15 you guys to be aware of that. Um, and I'll send all 16 of you information on it so that you can put it out 17 on social media or let your constituents know about it. 18

Um, and I just had a meeting today with them about which languages. Uh, so far, right now, it's just English and Spanish. They're working with community partners for LGBTQ, Asian, and other, other organizations cause they want to find out which groups are on the ground doing the work in the mental

2 health side. So, reach out if you guys, um, have any 3 groups you'd like to recommend.

And, um, there was one other thing which I forgot. Um, but that, but I just wanted you all to be aware of that cause it's important. There are going to be kinks, obviously, when it comes to the roll out, but they are going to be monitoring that closely.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to have Council Member Won followed by Council Member Brewer.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER WON: Thank you so much, Majority Leader Keith Powers. I just want to thank our 14 15 Speaker, Adrienne Adams, as well as all of my Council 16 colleagues on this historic day where we are passing 17 legislation to protect reproductive rights and 18 leading the way for all other cities to follow suit. 19 As a new mother who gave birth about fourth 20 months ago, I cannot imagine if, during my second or 21 third trimester of pregnancy, someone told me that I was forced to, that I had no option to opt out of 2.2 23 fully delivering a child that did not want. And I believe that this is truly a healthcare issue, where 24 this issue should solely be between the individual, 25

2 their partner, as well as their healthcare provider, 3 and nobody else. So, I am incredibly grateful to be 4 part of this legislative body to make sure that we're 5 fighting for reproductive rights.

And I also want to point out that today, uh, with my Council colleagues Gutiérrez and Menin, we are introducing Intro 568, 598, and 599, where we will continue to legislate to make internet, affordable internet, accessible to all, so I encourage all of my colleagues to sign on. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to hear from Council Member Brewer followed by Council Member Riley.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I 16 have some sad news. Um, Joe Goldbloom died an hour 17 ago. He was staff member for Archie Spigner, Leroy 18 Comrie, Daneek Miller, and he certainly knew Council 19 Member Williams and he was a real advocate for, um, 20 Community, CD 27. He lived in Manhattan, commuted 21 back and forth, and was a member of, uh, Community 2.2 Board 11. So, it's a loss. He loved this City Council 23 very much.

I am also supportive of, uh, Intro 563 which is being introduced today. Um, this is based, I think as

2	you know, on local law 46. 2013 when I passed the
3	paid sick days, I remember DeBlasio took credit for
4	it, but I was the one that actually passed it. And I
5	also remember, um, that it took a lot of, uh, great
6	work by Consumer Affairs. But just because we've had
7	a long history of making sure that the, uh, powers
8	that it provides particularly during COVID where
9	people can get support for, uh, five days of paid
10	sick days so they could take care of themselves or
11	their family.

However, despite all the great efforts, there has been a recent study by A Better Balance and the Community Service Society whereby we learned that a significant percentage of working people in the City of New York, particularly women, did not know or have access to paid sick days. They just don't know about it.

So, that means that although the law passed nine years ago, there are many barriers of education and access to this law and workplaces in our City. And so, we need to make sure that not only can you file with Department of, of Consumer and Worker Protection, but we also want to have a right to file a private civil right of action. And that's what

2 these studies are calling for and that's what this 3 bill calls for.

4 Thank you very much, and our prayers are with Joe5 Goldbloom's family.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now
hear from Council Member Riley, followed by Council
Member Barron.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader. 10 And I just want to thank my colleagues for the well 11 wishes to my family on our new addition. Um, I'm 12 happy to partner with my colleague, Chair, uh, Rita 13 Joseph to introduce legislations, Intro 588, which 14 would require the DOE to disclose school admission 15 and policies on its website for every school.

16 This bill would enhance the clarity of our 17 infrastructure, giving further insight and 18 transparency to where and how we can improve our 19 education system. Providing online visibility 20 including, but not limited to the application 21 process, selection criteria, and priority groups, 2.2 procedures for application, evaluation, and seat 23 assignment criterias for every New York City school, encourages equity and accessible, accessibility to 24

2 inform essential to educational planning of our 3 families.

Intro 588 will present the opportunity to codify 4 and quantify these already common practices to a 5 digital scale. Ensuring that we continue to upgrade 6 7 our system is a conducive, it's conducive to supporting the needs of our families and uplifting 8 9 scholars with the education they deserve. Thank you. MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. we'll now hear 10 11 from Council Member Barron followed by Council Member 12 Gutiérrez.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Uh, thank you Mister 14 Chair. I just wanted to say to my colleagues, I stand 15 now to give credit to those who voted against this 16 budget. Those who said no to \$215 million cut from 17 the Department of Education. Council Member Ossé, 18 Council Member Feliz, Council Member Nurse, Council 19 Member Richardson Jordan, and Council Member Barron 20 and Council Member Cabán.

I feel a sense of vindication now that the City Council is considering, uh, putting that money back in a budget mod in November. We didn't even have to do that. You had the power to leave it in there in the first place. And I'm just hoping that we use the

2	power of this City Council during the budget process
3	to prioritize the people and not pet projects because
4	education is for liberation. And to deny these
5	children what the administrators need to make
6	education more qualitative in our communities. We're
7	seeing it now all over. They're complaining. There's
8	hurt. And it's not just the Department of Education.
9	Most of the Departments, City Departments, are
10	suffering because of this budget that was passed.
11	So, we may not be in favor with the Speaker or
12	the Mayor, and we may not get as much as the rest of
13	you, but we get a good night's sleep because we did
14	the right thing in not voting for a budget that over
15	funded the police with \$11 billion and underfunded
16	education with \$215 million. I hope you can do the
17	right thing this time and restore it in November.
18	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go
19	to Council Member Gutiérrez followed by Council
20	Member Schulman.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Thank you, Majority.
22	Uh, thank you. Um, uh, I'm proud to work alongside
23	Council Member Won to introduce a package of bills
24	today that look towards building equity when it comes

2 to what should be considered a public utility, the 3 internet.

I am tired of people calling the internet a 4 luxury. It is a necessity of everyday life. The 5 digital divide is a structured reality that 6 7 perpetuates social, economic, and political disparities. It is essentially digital redlining, 8 9 excluding the working poor from an essential infrastructure that allows people to function in 10 11 today's society.

My bill, Intro 568, requires the Office of 12 13 Technology Innovation to report on the utilization of 14 the City's discounted internet service programs, and 15 to significantly improve their outreach to eligible households. The bills introduced by Council Member, 16 17 uh, Won, also work toward the goal of ensuring that 18 more New Yorkers know about this program and have the 19 assistance to obtain it. I encourage all of you to 20 sign on. Thank you.

21 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll go to 22 Council Member Schulman followed by Council Member 23 Hanif.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Thank you. I have
25 devoted by personal and professional life to

2 healthcare advocacy which was born out the HIV/AIDS 3 movement, where I witnessed friends and neighbors die 4 because of the indifference of those in power. I 5 sadly had the same feeling of indifference with the 6 sloppy roll out of the Monkeypox vaccine both on the 7 federal and local level.

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8 I have been in constant contact with the DOHMH, 9 the Mayor's Office, advocates, epidemiologists, and 10 others on this issue. I want to thank my colleagues 11 in the LGBTQIA+ Caucus for their support and 12 collaboration and want to thank the Speaker for her 13 leadership and support in planned actions we will be 14 taking in the near future. Please stay tuned.

With regards to the rising COVID rates, I am working with Council staff and colleagues to ensure the Department of Health provides all New Yorkers with the transparent tools and data needed for all of us to make informed decisions on what we need to do as New Yorkers to protect ourselves and stay healthy. Thank you.

22 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll hear now 23 from Council Member Hanif followed by Council Member 24 Rivera.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you. Today I'm
3	introducing two bills focused on empowering our
4	immigrant communities. Intro 569 would create an
5	immigrant workers bill of rights. While many federal,
6	state, and local labor protections apply to workers
7	of all immigrant statuses, man, most immigrants are
8	not aware of this fact, which leaves them vulnerable
9	to various forms of exploitation. This bill of rights
10	would compile all of these protections into a
11	succinct document that employers would be required to
12	distribute to all of their workers annually. The bill
13	of rights would also be required to be conspicuously
14	displayed in physical workplaces and also included in
15	digital workplaces, such as the worker facing side of
16	apps.
17	Equipping immigrant and workers with knowledge of
18	their rights will allow them to exercise them when
19	violations occur. Additionally, we hope that this
20	will dissuade employers from committing the
21	violations in the first place. And I want to thank
22	Council Member Avilés for introducing this bill

23 alongside me.

24 Intro 570 would create an Office of Translation25 and Interpretation within the Mayor's Office of

2	Immigrant Affairs. Currently, our City Agencies
3	outsource most of their language services to out of
4	state companies who produce subpar work at high
5	costs. For budget reasons, some Agencies have failed
6	to comply with local law 30 which requires documents
7	be translated in the City's 10 most spoken languages
8	resulting in essential materials, such as fact sheets
9	about the COVID-19 vaccine, failing to reach
10	immigrant communities. By bringing this work in
11	house, we can ensure compliance with local law 30,
12	improve the quality and cost-effectiveness of
13	services, and provide high quality City jobs for New
14	Yorkers with language skills.
14

culture to our streets and public spaces, making our 2 3 vital cultural institutions more accessible to all 4 New Yorkers. Um, also legislation to ensure proper language access at polling site with Council member 5 Avilés, protecting and enhancing the most sacred of 6 7 our rights, our right to vote, reporting on the medical care and outcomes of incarcerated people, and 8 9 finally a Resolution recognizing animals as sentient beings entitled to respect, consideration, and 10 11 protection from abuse.

In recent years, the Council has done amazing 12 13 work on animal rights. And this Resolution 14 memorializes for our City, what we've all come to 15 know, that animals are worthy of dignity and humane 16 treatment. It also calls on the state to pass 17 legislation as in Oregon which recognizes the state's 18 responsibility to animal welfare. I always say, uh, 19 how we treat animals is a reflection of our society. 20 And I hope my colleagues will support this resolution. 21

The work that we do here in the Council affects not just the eight million New Yorkers in the City, but everyone in the country. And I am so proud of the package of bills we're passing today and of course,

the legislation that I have introduced, um, and that 2 3 my colleagues have introduced. And so, we can continue to be a model for the rest of the nation. I 4 want to, and I, I just want to say thank you to 5 everyone, body, congratulations on this historic and 6 7 landmark legislation we've passed today. And I hope 8 you will join me in signing on to my bills. thank you 9 so much.

10 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear 11 from Council Member Cabán, followed by Council Member 12 Marte, followed by Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. I am proud to be introducing two Resolutions today, Resolution 257, declaring solidarity with workers organizing unions across the City, and Resolution 256, calling upon Washington to pass and enact the COVID-19 Long Haulers Act.

You know, as the price of, of food, fuel, medicine, energy, rent, and other essential purchases continue to soar, the billionaire class is extracting profits hand over fist with their wealth going up by almost \$2 trillion during the pandemic. Workers are standing up and saying they won't take it anymore and the number of filings for union elections are up 56%

this fiscal year, compared to 2021. And the same bosses reaping the most exorbitant windfall profits are employing the dirtiest, most gutter scraping, union busting tactics. And it won't work because we stand with the workers, and, uh, you know, clearly and without apology. And so, you know, this is about saying that New York is a union town.

9 For the Long COVID Resolution, 20% to 30% of all people infected with COVID will develop lasting 10 11 symptoms, some which may be temporary, but others 12 which may be chronic, some which may be mild, others 13 which may be debilitating. So, to understand the 14 enormity of this problem, consider that cases are 15 currently skyrocketing with the most infectious 16 variant yet which provides little to no immunity against reinfection, even for those who are fully 17 18 vaccinated, and we continue to destroy every last 19 shred of public health protections we ever had. This 20 will go down in history as a mass disabling event, 21 and our healthcare system is not currently capable of 2.2 absorbing the crush. So, we need Washington to act, 23 to act now, and to act boldly. Thanks.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go
to Council Member Marte, followed by Council Member
Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Thank you. Storefront 5 vacancies are abundant in Chinatown, Lorry side, 6 7 because of the devastating economic impact of the pandemic, had on low-income communities. Our 8 9 neighborhoods need investment in order to recover. But instead, tech company vultures have swooped in to 10 11 peak at, pick at our wounds. So today, I'm honored to introduce with Council Member Menin a package of 12 13 legislation to regulate 15-minute delivery apps and 14 their micro fulfillment center, commonly known as 15 dark stores.

16 My two bills, Intro 579 and Intro 580, will help 17 protect delivery workers that are exploited by these 18 companies. By setting weight limit, weight limits on 19 orders, we are protecting workers' bodies and health 20 and increasing their chances of survival in case of a 21 traffic incident. But to, but to stop traffic 2.2 accidents, we have to stop the inhumane 15-minute 23 delivery promise.

24 Our second bill will require disclosure of 25 delivery time estimates to take pressure off of

workers to meet this intense time burden demand. Our bodegas, small businesses, and delivery workers have suffered a lot from the pandemic, while companies like Gopuff and Gorillas have used our crisis to launch their platforms.

7 Micro fulfillment center and 15-minute delivery 8 apps are trying to flip our immigrant neighborhoods 9 into storage yards for Silicon Valley. This legislative package is essential crackdown on this 10 11 tech-backed exploitation of our city's storefront vacancy crisis, our delivery workers, and our 12 immigrant-owned bodegas and 99 cent stores. 13 14 Thank you, Asian American Federation, and 15 [SPEAKING IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE] for their advocacy on 16 this issue. And thank you to Council Member Menin for 17 partnering on this important legislation with me. 18 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go 19 to Council member Brooks-Powers and last, we'll go to Council Member Restler to finish us off. 20 21 COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you. I'll try this again. Um, but I just want to speak briefly on 2.2 23 the bill I'm introducing with my colleague, Council Woman Rita Joseph, which will ban the sale of 24

flavored cigarettes. We are all aware of the serious

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2 health impacts that smoking can cause, and these effects are born disproportionately by communities of 3 4 color and especially younger adults who have long been targeted by advertising campaigns and ease of 5 access. This bill will improve health outcomes and 6 7 reduce the risks of smoking among vulnerable New Yorkers. I encourage my colleagues to sign on as co-8 9 sponsors.

I'd also be remiss if I did not thank Council 10 11 Member Williams for, um, submitting Mrs. Renee 12 Bluford to be added to the already, um, implemented 13 street co-name for David Bluford. Um, the two married couples were a staple in the southeast Queens 14 15 community, um, and we treasured and valued them 16 dearly, and they are certainly missed. And so, um, it 17 is definitely appropriate for the honor to now have 18 the Renee and David Bluford, um, street co-naming. 19 And I also extend my condolences to the family of 20 Joe Goldbloom as well, who was a staple in southeast 21 Queens community. He didn't live there, but we should 2.2 have probably a street in southeast Queens 23 resurrected for him, because he has definitely been someone who has, um, dedicated his live and service, 24

2 but especially to the southeast Queens community.3 Thank you.

4 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And last,5 we'll go to Council Member Restler.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Thank you so much, 6 7 Majority Leader. I'll just say very briefly, uh, that it's an honor to be a part of, uh, this institution 8 9 today with this historic and landmark package. And I especially want to congratulate each of the prime 10 11 sponsors on putting together such a compelling 12 package of bills to protect, uh, reproductive rights 13 for people across this country, um, here in New York 14 City.

15 Uh, secondly, I, I just wanted to echo the 16 sentiments of Council Member Barron, uh, that we have 17 work to do to restore the education cuts. And I 18 wanted to thank the Speaker for her leadership on the 19 letter this week and really hope that we can continue 20 to put the utmost pressure on the Mayor to restore 21 these cuts. Uh, today I designated more than \$200,000 in Member-based initiatives to support elementary 2.2 23 schools in District 33 to try to help, um, fill gaps. But we have much, much more work to do there. 24

2	And then lastly, I just wanted to, uh, express my
3	gratitude to a member of my team who we were able to
4	convince to join us on an interim basis, uh, Jesse
5	Tassen (SP?). He was the Chief of Staff to another
6	Member of the Council for the last eight years and he
7	agreed to help transition us into the, into the Body
8	and, and show us the ropes, and myself, my Chief of
9	Staff, Marianne Alexander and our whole team are
10	greatly appreciative of Jesse's services. He's going
11	on to a great job at, at Goddard Riverside. So, he'll
12	be working with you, Gail, to, if she's not here
13	anymore, but he'll be working with the good folks on
14	the Upper West Side. But he's been a tremendous asset
15	to me, and, and to our whole District, and our staff.
16	And I really want to thank him for, you know, helping
17	to, to just get our, our, um, to help show us the
18	ropes. So, thank you Jesse, and best of luck to you
19	in the future.
20	MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Is there
21	anyone else who'd like to speak? Okay. Seeing none,
22	uh, we'll now call on Speaker Adrienne Adams to close
23	today's Stated Meeting.
24	SPEAKER ADAMS: Uh, before we close the meeting, I
25	definitely, too, want to acknowledge and uplift, um,

2	as former Council Member I. Daneek Miller used to
3	call him, the Great Joe Goldbloom. Uh, Joe was an
4	amazing man. He wanted the best for New York and all
5	New Yorkers and especially he loved southeast Queens
6	and loved so many of us that he took under his wings
7	for so many years. Joe is already missed, but he will
8	be sorely missed as we continue on our walk on this
9	journey. I've just been given word that, uh, his
10	services will be this Monday, the 18 th , at 11:00 a.m.
11	We'll send the information to our Council membership.
