I am honored to rise today on behalf of our colleague

Councilman Jim Gennaro, who is not able to join us in

person, uh, and to speak on behalf of the Rabbi.

A Bronx Native, Rabbi Hayim Schwartz, is a rabbi and the Rabbinical Seminary of America, Yeshiva Chofetz Chaim of Queens. Founded in Brooklyn, as all great things are, more than eight decades ago, the seminary is one of the oldest in the United States. It is presently located in Councilman Gennaro's district in the Kew Gardens neighborhood.

The seminary's beginnings were not on these shores. The seminary was originally founded in Radin

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Poland under the leadership of Chofetz Chaim in the late 1800's. The Chofetz Chaim, after whom,

Rabbinical Seminary of America is named, was a

5 renowned and revered Torah giant.

During the Holocaust, some of the students of the Yeshiva were among the fortunate few who made their way through Poland, Lithuania, into Russia over the Trans-Siberian Railroad to Vladivostok off the Russian shore with the Sea of Japan. They were then able to set sail for Tsuruga Japan and ultimately Kobe Japan, before their final destination of Shanghai China where they... Some of these students were able to live out the war and ultimately be saved. My grandfather was one of these fortunate few. Students at RSA are carefully trained for Jewish communal service. More than 95% of RSA graduates ultimately engage in communal work. dedicate their lives to the City and to this nation. RSA is one of the many stellar examples of New York's Yeshivas. And Rabbi Schwartz is himself immersed in communal work, in addition to his service to the community and to his Yeshiva, and to his religious community, he also serves on the Executive Board of

his local civic association and participates in countless other causes.

On behalf of our colleague, Councilman Gennaro, I am honored to rise to introduce Rabbi Hayim Schwartz today, and I ask unanimous consent that the Invocation be spread upon the record of these proceedings.

23	September 11, 2001. This past Sunday, we joined
24	families at The World Trade Center to grieve the loss

of loved ones, up lift their memories, and reflect on

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how the events of that day continue to impact our city and country. None of us will ever forget where we were or what we were doing when we witnessed or learned of the attacks on 9/11 -- the emotions we felt that day, and the rebuilding of our city in the subsequent months and years. It is critical that we continue to honor the memories of those lost.

Equally important is supporting the survivors including the families who lost mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers, friends, and neighbors to this tragedy.

Twenty-one years later, and it is still not any easier to think about what happened on that fateful day. We must also always remember the brave first responders, who risked their lives to save their fellow New Yorkers in official capacity and those who sacrificed to serve simply because of their heroic humanity.

We had first responders coming from all over this country to help New Yorkers as well. So, today and every day, we stand with you and your families to honor your sacrifice and service to this city. We must ensure that everyone impacted by 9/11 and its

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2 aftermath gets the healthcare that they need and they 3 deserve.

This past weekend our city celebrated the labor movements and leaders that fought for so many of the benefits we enjoy in the workplace today. During the Annual New York City Labor Day Parade. As the daughter of two long time union workers, I was raised at a home and community that understands the importance of organized labor. From the 40-hour work week, to workers compensation and paid sick leave, we gained so much as a result of our nation's labor movements and struggles. As we honor this history, it is important that recognize the ongoing fights today for fair wages, safer workplaces, improved benefits, and the right of all workers to organize without fear of retaliation. These are essential protections that workers deserve. There is still much more work to do, but we are proud to stand alongside workers each and every day.

Next week we will also mark five years since

Hurricane Maria devastated the Caribbean,

particularly the islands of Dominica, Saint Croix,

and Puerto Rico. We remember the victims and the

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people on the beautiful islands that are still being
affected by this tragedy.

September is a month when we celebrate so many of our city's diverse cultural communities. On September 5th, we march down Eastern Parkway for the 55th Annual West Indian Da Parade for the first time in three years.

Now, let's move on to our stated agenda. Today we are voting on several legislative Land Use, Finance, and Rules items.

We will be voting on the following Land Use Items:

1859 (*1959) Strang Avenue will facilitate the construction of a new single-story commercial retail development and include 12 accessory parking spaces in Council Member Riley's district.

Halletts North rezoning will facilitate and significant new mixed-use development on the

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waterfront of the Halletts Point Peninsula in

Northwest Queens. It will include a projected 1,340

housing units, 335 permanently affordable housing

units, 525 parking spaces, 525 bicycle spaces, 1,800

square feet of commercial use, 21,500 square feet of

community facility space, and approximately 1 acre of

open space, including a waterfront esplanade.

The Council is modifying the application to map
MIH option 3, which is the deep affordability option,
and to amend the site plan to restore the pedestrian
walkway to its regulation width of 10 feet in Council
Member Cabán's district and Council Member Cabán, you
did the darn thing! Just sayin'.

[APPLAUSE IN CHAMBERS]

A Preconsidered Resolution comes up also for vote on the Finance items. This Resolution approves an exemption from real property taxes for property located at 3300 Palmer Avenue in the Bronx in Council Member Riley's district.

The project consists of two buildings with 135 units. The tax exemption will replace a soon-to-expire 421-A Exemption and will keep all units rent restricted for 40 years. The AMIs will range from 75% to 100%.

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A Preconsidered Resolution that approves an exemption from real property taxes for property located at 1700 Harrison Avenue in The Bronx in Council Member Sanchez's district. The project consists of one building with 79 units. Currently less than half the units are rent restricted, and with this tax exemption, all of them will be. The AMIs will range from 50% to 80%.

And another Preconsidered Resolution that approves an exemption from real property taxes for an affiliated property located at 1730 Harrison Avenue in The Bronx in Council Member Sanchez's district.

The project consists of one building with 77 units.

Less than half the units in this building are currently rent restricted, and with this tax exemption all of them will be. The AMIs will similarly range from 50% to 80%.

We are also voting on the Rules items. Sarah

Commission; Anthony Crowell for appointment as a

Milton Williams for appointment as a member of the

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Conflicts of Interest Board, Elisa Velazquez for appointment as a member of the New York City Taxi and Limousine Commission, and a technical correction related to Rasmia Kirmani-Frye's appointment as a member of the New York City Planning Commissary.

Lastly, The Council will vote on the following pieces of legislation:

First of all I'm so proud to sponsor Introduction 458-A which would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) to create and maintain information and resources - available in all designated citywide languages - for a potential patient of an abortion provider, such as information outlining methods used to provide an abortion, attendant health risks, and recovery from an abortion. Additionally, this bill would require DOHMH to conduct a language access service needs assessment, which would survey abortion providers in the City to assess the availability of language access services for abortion, the demand for such services, any funding available, preferred methods of delivery of language access, and any challenges for implementation. DOHMH would be required report its findings to the Speaker and the Mayor with

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recommendations and any role the City can play in assisting abortion providers with language access services, including the feasibility of providing a City grant program.

Thank you to staff Brenda McKinney, Anastassia Zimina, Sara Liss, and Shweta Deshmukh (sp?).

Next we are voting on Introduction 56-A, sponsored by Council Member Chi Ossé, which would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) to create the Nightlife Opioid Antagonist Program to help prevent opioid overdoses in nightlife establishments. The program would permit nightlife establishments in the City to request and retain opioid antagonist kits at a time, free of charge, to keep on premises for administration to patrons, staff or individuals on the premises experiencing an opioid overdose. This bill would also require DOHMH to offer free resources and training to staff of participating nightlife establishments on the administration of opioid antagonists. Thank you, Sara Liss.

Additionally, Introduction 518-A, sponsored by

Council Member Shaun Abreu, would require the Mayor's

Office of Criminal Justice to coordinate with the New

York City Police Department to conduct a study on

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reducing the flow of illegal firearms in to the City and issue an annual report to the Mayor and City Council Speaker. This report will include information regarding each illegal firearm seized in New York City.

And, finally, we are voting on my bill, Introduction 602-A, which defines the geographical boundaries of the Time Square Area, where licensed, firearm owners will be restricted from carrying concealed weapons. The New York State Legislator recently amended statewide fireman regulations to establish such sensitive locations as schools, government buildings, places or vehicles used for public transport, and religious institutions, and designates Time Square as determined and identified by the City as one such location. This law became necessary after the United States Supreme Court struck down the New York State law that placed strict restrictions on who could carry concealed firearms. The boundaries as defined by the bill, largely follow the area identified as Time Square by the official New York City Tourism Website. It covers the area abutted by West 40th Street to West 53rd Street and 6th Avenue to 8th Avenue and parts of 9th Avenue and

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2 the Port Authority Bus Terminal, which includes
3 several well-known restaurants, hotels, and theaters.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Speaker Adams.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Uh, thank you very much. My colleagues, I find it interesting that the least amount of shooting occurs in Time Square. But, when it comes to our neighborhoods, we don't see any special legislation for the neighborhoods where a lot of the shootings are taking place. But, capitalism needs Time Square to be safe, so they can make some money.

But, be that as it may, I also want to bring your attention the tax breaks for three projects. I am supportive of the projects 100% in The Bronx, because they are affordable. But the 421-A program needs to be scrapped. We tried hard in the State, that's 80%

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2 affordably... or 80% market and 20% affordability. 3 Often times the 20% isn't even affordable.

So, since the Mayor doesn't have money for our children and Education, and since he has to do another 3% cut from all the agencies, well, don't give any more tax breaks to those who can afford to pay for it. And don't let them tell you, "If we don't get the tax breaks, then we can't do affordability." So, that puts you in a bind. And I am 100% for unions. And we want the union jobs, and I support union jobs, but after they finish their work, we have to live with the facility that they build in our neighborhoods. And, if those facilities gentrify our neighborhoods, we should say no.

So, I just wanted to bring some of that to your attention. I often vote for projects that have tax breaks for affordability, but I just want to make a point on this one. At some point, they shouldn't get their welfare. It's interesting when the corporations get free money -- it's "subsidies", when we get it, it's welfare. Either we're all on welfare, or we're all on subsidies. So, I just wanted to bring that to your attention. Thank you.

It would be great if we spoke with truth and clarity about a real effort to curtail crime in our city -the unlawful possession and use of firearms in our city. We are not doing any of that today. Today, as we are wont to do, we legislate for the press release -- for the Twitter. And we are not doing a single real effort to end gun violence in our city in the neighborhoods of New York where people are getting shot and killed virtually every day certainly, frequently and more frequently than we have seen in the past. And there is no legislation here today to deal with any of that. Instead, the most heavily vetted, investigated double checked, triple checked,

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quadruple checked, people who are getting licenses, who have a lawful right to carry a gun, are being legislated against. I don't want anybody to have This is not what this is about. Not looking to go around and make sure every New Yorker has a gun. But the people who are doing the crime in the city, the people who are killing each other, are not the guys with licenses. They're not the people who have to go to 1 Police Plaza, get fingerprinted, get checked, have their books checked, their records That's not them. That's who we are checked. legislating about today. I'm not voting to put more guns on the streets today when I vote no on this bill. But we need to do something real about where the crime is in this city and what we're going to do about it. So, with that, I vote age on all, with the exception of Introductions 602 and 458.

COUNCIL MEMBER BORELLI: Rare is it when in alignment of planetary celestial bodies lines up to produce a force that's more remarkable than me having to say, I agree with our colleague, Mr. Barron, as to why we have... As to why we've singled out Time Square, uh, in terms of making this a gun free zone when this is not an area ordinarily prone to gun violence. I won't regurgitate what Council Member Yeger had said about the constitutionality and the fight against illegal guns owners. And I won't do the Twitter argument of whether criminals are actually going to pay attention to what a sign has to say while they're committing a crime. I want to talk about whether prosecutors will actually pay attention to what a sign has to say. So, as of August 1st, 2,386 individuals in this city were arrested with an illegal firearm -- a gun they were not supposed to have -- a gun they may have used in the commission of a crime. Of those, 1,921 were released the very next day. The very next day. So, before we create a new felony that we know, thanks to come ideological beliefs by many of my colleagues and friends that we

should end the carceral system, let people out of
jail, not have bail, people who get arrested already
with felonies, for felonies, already get out the very
next day. And then what happens to them down the
road? The overwhelming majority of cases in 2021
ended in a misdemeanor plea deal Attempted
Possession of a Firearm. So, if someone who even
gets convicted gets a slap on the wrist. So, I would
encourage, with all of the enthusiasm now to go after
guns, we also have some enthusiasm in going after
people who have already been arrested with guns, call
on prosecutors to take more cases to trial. Don't
give too many plea deals. To call on prosecutors to
essentially throw the book at people who are the most
likely to commit the most violence in our city.

So, with that, I will register my votes as aye on all, except for Intros 602-A, 458-A, and 518-A, and I wish you all a good afternoon.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you.

Council Member Powers?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, I just want to take a second to explain my vote and maybe offer a little bit of rebuttal to some of the comments that were just made.

I don't think that the fight against guns in our
city is an either or proposition that I think that
individuals are often making it. And I don't
disagree for a second that an individual who carries
an illegal gun in this city they're should be
consequences for that person and we need to go
after all illegal guns out in the city. And, at the
same time, as representative for Time Square, we have
a duty and a right, as the law has changed in this
year, to also protect people against a potential
For someone to pull out a legal gun and potentially
cause lots of harm to New Yorkers. That can be a
legal and permitted gun, which can also cause harm
whether they have been vetted or have gone through a
background check, and also legal guns don't come from
nowhere. They are legal guns that make it to that
also make it onto the streets into the hands of
people who will use them illegally. So, I ask
everybody to stop thinking about this as an either or
proposition no matter what party you are. We have to
fight illegal guns. If you fight the NRA, you have
fight against people who are carrying any illegal
guns in this city, and I think it goes the other way
as well. I think as New Yorkers we have a duty, and

I know whether you are a Republican or a Democrat,
you can share in that to keep people safe. And I
think that the folks who are coming through Time
Square, we have to keep safe every, single day
whether it's from guns or from anything else, because
we have a duty in this city to keep especially in
our essential business district people safe. And
guns are the most unsafe part of that equation. So I
very proudly vote for the I vote age on all
including the bill, including Council Member Abreu's
bill, including the Speaker's bill, to tackle the gur
crisis. And I do share the feeling that some have
represented, that we have to do more when it comes to
the individuals and the people and the trafficking of
illegal guns in to the city.

With that, I vote aye on all.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KAGAN: Thank you, Majority Leader for the opportunity to speak.

As many of you know, in the early morning hours of Monday, a horrible tragedy occurred on the beaches of Coney Island. A young mother with a history of mental health issues drowned her own three children. Three month old Oliver, 4-year-old Liliana, and 7-year-old Zachery. I would like to extend my deepest to condolences to the entire Coney Island community.

This was a preventable tragedy. I would like to point out the failures of our mental health system, which basically failed to notify Child Protective Services and The Administration for Children's Services of the declining mental health of the mother. She was clearly rough shape for a very long time.

The failure of the Children's Administration for Children Services is outrageous. I will just quote the father of Zachery from the New York Times Story. "It didn't matter how many times I called Child Protective Services, they would tell me, "Oh, you don't have any real evidence," but they did not do a real investigation." Such indifference to our children's livelihoods is total unacceptable. We

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2 need to do better in our city to help people in these 3 situations.

Thank you to the officers of the 60th precinct who helped in the search for her children. May these innocent children rest in peace.

Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now hear from Council Member Barron, followed by Council Member Menin.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you, I just want to bring your attention to an Intro that I am introducing today on contracting with not for profits, and particularly Black and Brown neighborhoods. We are dying from this reimbursement process. A lot of our programs don't have the money like a Good Shepherd has -- \$30 - \$40 million, so if you give Good Shepherd a million dollars, they can easily spend a million dollars. For our organizations, if we wanted to give them a \$100,000, they have a problem. So, my bill say when they are awarded the money, their contract should be expedited, should be done expeditiously, and they should get every penny that we award them. And they have to count forth through receipts and every other

process not "if you have the money, then you can
spend the money." And, then they have to get bridge
loans, and they have to make decisions whether to pay
taxes or pay salaries. And for struggling
communities like ours, we need all of the money
upfront. And they have to account for all of it,
just like every other agency has program money that
they give out, you have to account for it. So, if
you support this bill, 654, we will be able to say to
groups like Man Up! Inc. and other groups that are
doing great work in our communities that you won't
have to struggle every year. Fifty percent of the
money sometimes comes back, because they don't have
the money to spend. So, I am hoping that you could
sign on to this. They have a press conference out
there now. A lot of the groups are out there in
support of this. But, let's sign on to this bill,
because some of these groups have done great work in
our communities in spite of the fact that they are
struggling financially.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now go to Council Member Menin, followed Council Member Schulman.

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COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you so much, Majority
Leader. Today I am proud to introduce two bills,
Intros 685 which would create an Office of
Digitalization for small businesses. It is co-
sponsored by Council Members Gutiérrez, Hanks,
Dinowitz, Stevens, Feliz, Schulman, Marte, Salamanca,
Lee, Ossé, Ung, and The Public Advocate. And Intro
686 with Council Member Stevens, it will expand
summer youth employment.

The first bill, Intro 685, would create The Office of Small Business Digitalization to address the digital divide for so many small businesses. The 2021 survey found that one in four small businesses in the US do not even have a website. It's critical for our small businesses to have the ability to utilize digital tools, and to be able to maximize their business potential. We have the opportunity to address this digital divide in a very straight forward and simple way through this bill.

The second bill, Intro 686, introduced with our incomparable Youth Services Chair, Council Member Stevens, expands our Summer Youth Employment program by requiring the City to create a year-long mentorship program for participants and expand summer

youth employment by mandating that every City agency bring on summer youth proportional to their respective headcount. The bill also requires DYCD to create a mentorship program in the private sector which would connect young people to jobs in fields like media, entertainment, hospitality, and much more. It was a pleasure and honor working with my colleague together to craft this bill. And, I ask my colleagues to join me signing on to these two bills.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will hear from Council Member Schulman, followed by Council Member Joseph.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Thank you, Majority

Leader. Today is both a sad and proud day for me.

My Chief of Staff, Facia Class, is leaving and Friday
is her last day. I am sad to see her go, but proud
that she is pursuing her passion. She singlehandedly
put my office together, built an amazing team, and
laid the foundation for my success as a member of The
City Council. I am someone who believes we are only
as good as the people who work for us. I am a better
member because of Facia. I cannot thank her enough
for her guidance and wisdom, and want her to know

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that even though she is physically leaving, she will always be a member of Team Lynn, and a member of the council family. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear from Council Member Joseph followed by Council Member Feliz.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I am introducing two bills, Introduction 677 and Introduction 678. When I was transitioning from UFT to City Council there were weeks where my health insurance lapsed because of administrative delays. I shuddered at the thought of what would have happened if I had gotten into an accident or if my child needed medical attention during the time while I lost coverage because of lack of oversight. This bill would ensure agencies to expedite all processes related to providing continuing health insurance for City employees who transfer employment from agency to another.

The second bill I am introducing is 678. I am introducing this bill on behalf of President Reynoso. The bill would require notification to appropriate community board and council members within in 10 days

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after receiving an application to alter or demolish certain rent regulated buildings or housing accommodations. This will provide council members with advance notice to assist tenants with transition housing or in an instance of wrongful eviction and free legal services. Thank you.

STATED MEETING

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will go to Council Member Feliz followed by Council Member Cabán.

COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Today I have the honor and the privilege of joining colleagues, including Council Member Brewer, Council Member Abreu, Council Member Salamanca, Council Member Williams, Council Member Ariola, and Council Member Joseph and introduce legislation that will help promote fire safety in the City of New York -- legislation regulating the sale of e-Bike batteries. Not all e-Bike batteries, but specifically the unsafe, uncertified e-Bike batteries that don't have the tools which prevent overheating and other malfunctions that have led to fires.

This year, we have seen so many fires caused by e-Bikes, fires that have been destructive and fires that have been scary. These e-Bike batteries have

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fluids that create powerful and difficult to
extinguish fires -- fires which destroy our homes and
also fires that put the lives of all New Yorkers in
danger. We cannot allow another tragedy to happen.

This year we have seen over 100 fires caused by eBike batteries. Last month, we lost an innocent 5year-old in Harlem in an apartment fire caused by eBike batteries. And even last week, an e-Bike
battery literally exploded while a person was using
it. We are in a crisis, uh, a crisis being caused -again, not by all e-Bike batteries, but specifically
the unsafe, uncertified e-Bike batteries. And I am
proud to join all my colleagues to take action and
help resolve that fire safety crisis.

And, I want to thank all of my colleagues who have joined in this bill. And I am looking very forward to working this bill with all of my colleagues and everyone who is affected, especially all of the delivery workers.

And, I see I have 23 seconds left, so I want to make a few additional points. I want to congratulate my colleague, my brother, Shaun Abreu, on the very important bill. You know, I literally have no words to describe the gun violence crisis affecting the

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City of New York, and especially the borough of The Bronx. The gun violence crisis and also how open it has become -- you know, if we don't have -- and if I could use 15 more seconds --...

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: I'll give you five.

COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: If we don't have safety, we don't have much. And that reminds me of a park in my district, \$15 million renovation, and people could only see it from a distance -- people can't play with it. We need to take every single, step possible, and I want to congratulate my colleague, Shaun Abreu, for taking one of those steps. Thank you so much... (CROSS-TALK)

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will not go to Council Member Cabán, followed by Council Member Hudson.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you.

I would like to talk about the two pieces of legislation I am introducing; one is a resolution supporting the PromPT Stability Act. Thank you to Council Member Avilés, Council Member Gutiérrez, and Council Member Hanif. And I'd ask those to learn the name Shamika Crawford. In 2019, she was arrested based on a vaguely worded misdemeanor assault

complaint, lifed by her some-time boylliend, and the
judge issued a full TOP, otherwise known as a pre-
trial "stay-away order", separating her from her
children, forcing her out of her own NYCHA apartment,
and rendering her homeless for nearly three months.
Now, Miss Crawford is far from alone. From my time
as a public defender, I know full well that NYPD
protocol will frequently result in arresting both
people involved in a domestic dispute. Whoever has
the luck of getting in front of the judge first in
arraignments, gets the first order of protection
issued, and is allowed to go home first, while the
other is shutout. And unsurprisingly, even though
rates of domestic violence are similar across
socioeconomic status and ethnicity, it's poor and
working class Black and Brown New Yorkers who tend to
come before the court. And so let's honor Shamika
Crawford and so many more like her and past this
resolution in support of Promoting Pre-Trial (PromPT)
Stability Act, which just calls for a hearing to
determine whether that issue should be actually
be in place.

The other is Intro 657, Asset Seizure

Transparency Law. Thank you, Council Member Stevens,

Council Member Gutlerrez, and Council Member Hanii.
District Attorneys seize money and property left and
right. There's no due process that is afforded when
those assets are being seized. They do not get their
property back even if a case is dismissed. They
might not even be the target of a search warrant or
investigation, but their property is liable to seized
just because they live there. Transparency and
accountability here are sorely needed. And during
budget hearings, I want to remind folks, that the
DA's came in and told us that they don't have the
funds necessary to implement vital criminal legal
reforms, and they were pleading for ever-more money
from us on The Council. And we can't assess the
merits of these claims and pleas if we don't know the
status of the potentially hundreds of millions of
dollars of seized assets that they're sitting on
that they're free to use. So, if DA's want more
money from us come budget time, they're at least
going to have to be open and transparent about what
they're doing with these funds.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

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We will go to Council Member Hudson, followed by Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER HUDSON: Thank you.

Today I am introducing Age in Place NYC package aimed at making New York City a place where all older adults can age in place with dignity. The 10-bill package, six of which are being introduced today, includes legislation aimed at combatting some of the most pressing issues facing older adults including housing insecurity, healthcare access, culturally competency, and accessibility.

What is always most concerning about discussions on aging, is that our city is woefully behind in preparing for the rising influx of older adults in our city. And this has happened under the leadership of older adults. If you can believe it, our last seven mayors, from Abraham Beame to Eric Adams, were elected at age 50 or older. Our city's older adult population, which currently represents 20% of our city's entire population, will only grow as Baby Boomer generation ages.

At 2021 CUNY Graduate Center Study reports that the population of adults ages 65 and older, in New York will soar 25% between 2021 and 2040, compared to

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just 3% growth in the general population. Simply put, we should have prepared for an ageing New York decades ago. We have failed time and again, but it's not too late to turn the tide and make New York City a place that actually prioritizes older adults and ensures every older adult can age in place with dignity. This package does just that.

I will be circulating an email next week with the list of bills and urging you all to co-sponsor this package. Because, if you're lucky, you too will one day be an older adult. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

Uh, we will go to Council Member Brewer, followed by Council Member Stevens.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: I made the older adult. I just want to let you know. I am doing just fine!

[LAUGHTER]

A few things, number one, the issue of asylum seekers. So, to make a long story short, we have all been -- many of us -- to the meeting with them on different locations. To me, the main issue is the working paper problem. And, I know the City, some may disagree, but I do think the City agencies and the nonprofits are doing everything they can to

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support these amazing families. However, the federal government is taking way too long on working papers — everybody's eligible to work, coming through the asylum seekers locations and families. So, we have to go get this straight. So, there's a resolution 307 and a letter that we are circulating, thank you, uh, Madam Speaker for agreeing to sign it, to tell the federal government, you must help us get these working papers.

Number two, I know that many of us are concerned about the helicopters. I know we are tired of dealing with it. The only way to really, really deal with it is to get the federal legislation Safe and Quiet Skies Act of 2021, which many of our congressional delegations are supporting. So, this is just saying, please pass it.

I also want to thank Council Member Feliz and others, we are all trying to figure out what to do about these batteries. Intro 656 would simply tell the Fire Department, please do a much better job of educating everybody on the challenges. And we will be working on other bills that could hopefully also address these issues. To you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

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We are going to go to Council Member Stevens, followed by Council Member Gutiérrez.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Good afternoon, everyone. As we continue to reimagine youth workforce development across the City, and coming off of a historical summer for the largest allocation of SYEPs, I am excited to be introducing, alongside with Council Member Menin, Intro 686, which would create a public/private sector partnership and help to expand SYEP. I just really, really would like for everyone to please sign on this bill. This is about really encouraging our young people and helping them with career pathways as we continue to reimagine... I have to say something, because you know how much I love kids, but that's it.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will go to Council Member Gutiérrez, who I believe is celebrating a birthday, and we will go to Council Member Linda Lee after that.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: I am, thank you!

Uh, North Brooklyn has been treated as a sacrificial zone by the fossil fuel industry for decades. And it's a key example of environmental racism in our city. Resolution 312 calls on New York

State and any other entities involved to protect
environmental justice communities, including Cooper
Park, a NYCHA development in my district, and all of
those living near National Grid's fracked gas storage
depot on Newtown Creek, by denying a permit to build
two new fracked gas vaporizers at this facility.
This is yet another phase of a much larger project
that has pushed its way through majority resistance
in our community, building a pipeline that will carry
fracked gas through Black and Brown communities.
Construction of the pipeline runs through the
neighborhoods of Brownsville, Bed-Stuy, Bushwick,
Williamsburg, and Greenpoint. The pipeline would
affect a 153,000 residents who live along the
construction path and within the evacuation zone. It
is unconscionable to build more infrastructure in
these communities, raise rates for consumers for
harmful projects that literally violate the
environmental justice provisions of The Climate
Leadership and Community Protection Act.

We are calling for a just and equitable transition away from decades of environmental racism that has plagued our neighborhoods. I want to thank all of my colleagues who have co-primed, Council

Mayor's Office for Persons with Disabilities to collect five-year accessibly plans from each New York City department office and agency.

And the second bill, Intro 681, would create a workforce development program within The Mayor's Office for persons with disabilities.

As a social worker and now Chair of the Committee on Mental Health, Disabilities, and Addiction, I have seen how the pandemic has disproportionally affected the nearly 1 million New Yorkers with disabilities.

This legislation is about making good on the promise of equal access while helping the City on its road to recovery. I hope you can all join me in that fight.

And, lastly, I want to thank The Speaker for her leadership on this issue. In her State of the City Address, she mentioned how persons with disabilities have been left behind and committed herself to making them a greater priority. The Speaker had a vison of making our economic recovery and landscape more inclusive, and we have arrived at this legislation today because of her team's tireless followup and consultation with advocates and stakeholders. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will go to Council Member Holden, followed by Council Member Avilés.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority Leader.

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2 Today I introduce several bills to address issues affecting everyone in the City. However, I must 3 first address the flooding in my district yesterday.

A brief rainstorm was too much for the sewer The status quo of our infrastructure is not system. acceptable. Intro 444, which I introduced in May of this year, would require the DEP to post the inspection, cleaning and maintenance schedules of catch basins and sewers. While this bill will certainly not solve all of our flooding issues, it will improve transparency and allow the public and elected officials with oversite responsibilities to identify problems before flooding occurs. I urge my colleagues to sign on as co-sponsors to this bill.

The bills I introduced today will improve how we manage the homelessness crisis, improve parking enforcement with the use of technology, tackle the problems of vehicles registered out of state, map all methane leaks throughout our city, and close a loophole in our construction permit process. I urge my colleagues to review these good government bills, quality of life legislation proposals that will benefit all New Yorkers.

Thank you very much.

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2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will go to Council Member Avilés, followed by Council Member Mealy.

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: Hello, today I am introducing a package of legislation designed to address some of the challenges faced by our public housing residents who suffer most from the lack of oversight underfunding of the New York City Housing Authority.

Starting with Resolution 304, I am calling upon my state level colleagues to advance assembly bill 9414 and senate bill 5807, put simply, this legislation would grant the City oversight power over NYCHA. Currently, all oversight has fallen squarely on HUD, and we have seen the disastrous effects of relying on our federal government to conduct proper oversight of the Authority. The definition of insanity is doing the same over and over again and expecting different results. The Resolution I am introducing today calls upon our state colleagues to make a change. With the passage of this legislation, NYCHA, which has been... has had an abysmal track record, by nearly all measures would be accountable to the New York City Council.

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Intro 648 would require NYCHA to report on the number of vacant units within their portfolio and distinguish between habitable and unhabitable units. At a time when so many New Yorkers are struggling to find affordable housing, and so many have waited years for public housing apartments, it is unacceptable for any unit to remain vacant. Reporting this information in a transparent manner will give us insight in to how NYCHA is or is not filling vacancies or prioritizing repairs.

Through collaboration with Assembly Member Harvey Epstein, who first introduced this idea at the state level, I am also putting forward Into 649, which would prohibit the Department of Sanitation from charging NYCHA fees for sanitation services our residents are entitled to already as tax payers. It defies commonsense to ask an Authority that is deeply in the red, to continue to pay for something as basic as sanitization services again.

My final piece of legislation is Intro 464 [TIMER CHIMES] Whoops! Wow, that went quick... around responding to fundamental questions around the Rental Assistance and Demonstration Project. I would love to talk to my colleagues more.

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And just a last note, the situation of e-Bikes is
indeed complicated. And, many of us are deeply
concerned and impacted. We are working on getting
together a briefing where we can really, as a
council, explore a well balanced approach to
addressing the e-Bikes rather than kneejerk policies
that actually will harm the very people who
(CROSS-TALK)

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member... (CROSS-TALK)

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: seek to support. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will not go to Council Member Mealy, followed by Council Member Krishnan, followed by Council Member Dinowitz, and last, but not least, Council Member Marte.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Thank you.

Today I am introducing a bill with Council Member Joseph, Intro 679, implementing additional vehicle safety measures for seniors that calls for the installation of traffic calming devices adjacent to senior centers. This bill requires DOT to annually install at least one traffic calming on no less than

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2	50 blocks that are adjacent to senior centers or
3	naturally occurring retirement communities NORCS.
4	DOT must also report to the council by August 1, 2023
5	and annually thereafter on the locations where the
6	traffic calming devices have been installed. This
7	purpose of traffic calming is to lower vehicle speeds
8	on neighborhood streets without restricting access.
9	To think back, only on August 11th, I had Miss
10	Eleanor, who turned 107, who was hit by a car.
11	Whoever hit her, picked her up and put her back on
12	the curb, and now she's in rehabilitation.

As we know senior centers are the epicenters for gathering of the older adult community. Traffic calming devices will slow vehicles, traffic, and decrease potential accidents. One of the differences of this mechanism from speedbumps is it doesn't require emergency vehicles to be impacted when responding to emergencies.

I ask my colleagues to sign on to Intro 679, thank you.

22 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

And now we will hear from Council Member

Krishnan, followed by Council Member Dinowitz, and

Council Member Marte.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: Good afternoon,
3	everyone. Today I will introducing Intro 680, which
4	calls on The Parks Department to determine the
5	Take surveys and determine the feasibility of
6	creating Micro-Parks and green spaces on vacant City
7	owned land near dead ends and highway entrance and
8	exit ramps. This was a priority in legislation; a
9	policy proposal mentioned by Speaker Adams in her
10	State of the City address, and reflects the
11	commitment of The Council to expand green space in
12	every way that we can in this city. We have seen how
13	crucial it is, especially after the pandemic, to have
14	green space in all of our communities especially ones
15	that have some of the least amount of it in the city,
16	and how urgent it is for our city to look at all
17	possible ways to create such green spaces.

So, I urge all of my colleagues to join on and sign on with me in support of Intro 680, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will hear from Council Member Dinowitz and Council Member Marte.

COUNCIL MEMBER DINOWITZ: Thank you, Majority Leader.

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Today I am introducing three bills, uh, 659, 660, and 661. They're all great. But I want to speak specifically about 660. As many of you know, I was a Special Education Teacher before I came here The Council. And, in the public schools, we attempt to provide our students with disabilities as much support as possible. And then when they graduate, when our students graduate, all of the supports are gone, and many of them transition to college and struggle to find their place in college, struggle to get the same support in college that they got all throughout their school career. This bill would require The Mayor's Office of People with Disabilities to establish a program to help those high school students with disabilities transition to their colleges, uh, to CUNY and continue to get their accommodations. This is especially important if we want to support our students with disabilities, make sure that they have their continuum of services, make sure the DOE actually speaks to CUNY, that they work together to support the most, uh, the students who have the most needs.

I encourage all of you to sign on this bill to support our students with disabilities, thank you.

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2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear, finally, from Council Member Marte.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Hi, everyone. I am here to talk about Intro 683, which would definitely help all of us, and it's simple thing that will require The Department of Buildings to have on their PW1 Application, the PW1 Application is the first application any developer fills out, uh, for The Department of Buildings, and it will require them to ask the number of affordable units in the building, and also the income eligibility for each affordable unit in the building.

Why is this important? Many of us, when developers come, are guessing what they're going to propose to us. This gives us a floor to start off the bat. We know what the developer's going to build, we're going to know how many affordable units, and the income levels of those units. This would save us a lot of time, and save our community members a lot of stress, and it's just simple questions that would be on the application.

So, hopefully everyone can support this bill and we can move quickly on this. Thank you all.
