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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: All right. Once again, if everyone could please find seats. We are ready to start with our vote. Once again, please find a seat. Quiet in the Chambers. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome to the first of two hearings of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure this morning. I am Selvena Brooks-Powers, the Chair of the Committee.

Before we move to our oversight topic on the state of the City's taxi and for-hire vehicle industries, we first convene today to vote on two pieces of legislation to improve our public space.

The first bill on our agenda is Proposed Intro 258-A sponsored by Council Member Rita C.

Joseph in relation to a report on suitable locations for installing public bathrooms. This bill would require that the Mayor designate an agency or office in coordination with the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Transportation to report on feasible locations for public bathroom facilities in each of the city's ZIP code tabulation areas. The report would also identify the number of currently operational public bathroom facilities in

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE each ZIP code tabulation area, accessibility and safety measures necessary for bathroom installation, and any potential barriers to installation and maintenance. Finally, the bill would also require that the agency or office consider public and Community Board input and provide recommendations for overcoming any identified barriers regarding the locations suitable for public bathrooms. Lack of access to public bathrooms is an issue that affects us all but especially older New Yorkers, people with disabilities, delivery workers, and cab drivers. As of December 2021, there were only around 1,100 public restrooms in the city with the majority of those clustered within our parks. In a city that has almost 9 million residents and millions more that come to work or visit, this is simply not enough. Proposed Intro 258-A is the first step in rectifying this critical problem.

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The second bill that the Committee will vote on is Proposed Intro 291-A sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera and myself in relation to a Citywide Greenway Plan. This proposed bill would require the Department of Transportation and the Department of Parks and Recreation to develop a plan

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE for the development of greenways in the city including identifying locations feasible for development into a greenway, opportunities for integrating green infrastructure into the network, and the creation of a map that displays the status of existing and future greenways. The proposed bill would also require the Department of Transportation and the Department of Parks and Recreation to annually report to the Mayor, the Council Speaker, and the public on the implementation and updating of this plan. The bill would also require the Department of Transportation and Parks to engage with local Community Boards both in formulating the greenway plan and following the proposal of greenway projects. Over the last several years, the COVID-19 pandemic has shown us the positive impact that open spaces and greenways have had on our health and mental health. They also play a pivotal role in providing access to safe, low-emission transportation options. The Citywide Greenway Plan required in Proposed Intro 291-A will create a comprehensive vision for a greenway network that links our neighborhoods and encourages the use of green transportation modes.

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At this time, I will read a statement from Council Member Rita Joseph.

"To my Colleagues on the Transportation
Committee. Thank you to Chair Brooks-Powers for the
opportunity to share written testimony about my bill,
Introduction 258. This piece of legislation requires
Parks and DOT to work together to identify locations
for public restrooms across the city using ZIP codes
as a way to ensure that they are distributed equally
throughout the five boroughs. This bill is one
important step to solving our city's severe lack of
restroom access which affects every New Yorker. I
urge my Colleagues to vote aye on Introduction 258."

Now, I will call on Council Member Rivera to make an opening statement on her bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you so much,

Madam Chair, for your leadership and for the

opportunity to speak before the Committee. I'm so

proud to be championing Intro 291-A alongside such an

important ally and leader in this space, Councilwoman
and Majority Whip Selvena Brooks-Powers.

The Citywide Greenway Plan not only creates a vision for the future of greenways in New York City, but it will also emphasize the building of

For far too long, investment in green 4 infrastructure has been reserved for only the wealthiest neighborhoods. This bill seeks to disrupt 5 that pattern and ensure every neighborhood and every 6 borough is involved in the development of a citywide 7 8 plan. I urge my Colleagues to join me in voting to support Intro 291-A, and I thank all of the advocates who were instrumental in this process so that we can 10 11 all deliver safe, connected, and thriving greenways 12 to all New Yorkers. Thank you. 13 CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you, 14 Council Member Rivera, and thank you for your 15 leadership and partnership as always. I will now as the Committee Clerk to 16 17 conduct a roll call vote on the proposed bills and 18 recommend that my Colleagues vote yes on these two

have and the only criticism that I've heard is that

it ends and so I'm happy to hear about possibilities

7 of expanding it as well as seeing more of them built

8 in our sister boroughs.

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With respect to the public bathroom legislation, I'll be voting yes on this, but I wanted to just state for the record that the reason I'm voting yes is because any public sitings of public restrooms outside of our parks would be subject to ULURP and therefore hopefully subject to the convention of Member deference. We don't have a need for public restrooms outside of our parks in Staten Island so I am glad to see that we're also considering siting additional comfort stations in our parks or improving upon the ones that we have, but even if we do have some recommendations for that in this bill I would just like to highlight that the administration still needs to work on the reducing the expense related to comfort stations. Our Borough President and our Council delegation in Staten Island have steadfastly refused to support comfort station

2	developments in our borough because of the expense
3	associated with it and how ridiculous the overheads
4	are so I think that's something that we need to work
5	on and I hope that at the end of this report, maybe
6	the other side of the building is able to make some
7	capital commitments to that end. With that, I vote
8	aye on all. Thank you.
