and inputs. We can achieve the shared goals of the city and local communities, and we have accomplished that. For me, the priority has been and will always be building for our local community and giving my constituents more opportunities for good paying, family sustaining jobs, as well as affordable housing. It has always been about meeting the needs of the residents in my district.

Thankfully, we have gotten there with this project. I listened to the concerns and assess the needs of my constituents and brought that into this Through our negotiations, numerous process. commitments were secured to benefit the residents of my district, affordable housing, good jobs, and most importantly, support for our seniors and veterans. This project will create 348 units of housing, 193 of which are affordable, 99 of those affordable units are for seniors in a 100% affordable housing building that will help our older adults comfortably age, also providing a 13,000 square foot Senior Center. 25 of the affordable units provide permanent affordability for veterans with supportive social services. deepened the affordability levels for 35% of the MIH units to be at 40% of AMI. We came to an agreement

with the carpenters union to work with the senior building, which is 100% affordable for our seniors along with labor agreements with 32 VJ and Laborers Local 79. We also secured local and MWBE hiring goals for this project.

There are many benefits and I'm proud to have secured in this project, overall meeting the important needs within...

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Today's land use call ups are adopted by a vote of 48 in the affirmative and zero in the negative.

We will now have communication from Speaker Adrienne Adams.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you Majority Leader. Good afternoon, everyone. I'd like to begin today by discussing the thousands of people who have fled their home countries for asylum in ours and have arrived here in our city. As we continue to count the increasing number of people arriving here and how to respond, I think it's important that we ground ourselves in a foundation of humanity. There are indications that the human faces and lives behind this crisis are being lost in the discussion, and we cannot allow that to occur. These are individuals and families, mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, daughters and sons. Let us not lose sight of the people and the impact all of this has on them.

Consistent with our values, New York City has accepted and welcomed those seeking asylum with open arms in response to inhumane conditions and acts before they ever got here. As a council, we fully understand the gravity of this crisis facing our city

and the families who have already suffered so much in their journeys here. We also understand this is a challenging moment and there are no easy solutions.

In a crisis, we don't expect to get everything right, and we know that mistakes will be made.

What's important, however, is how we respond, and that we treat people with the compassion and human decency they deserve. Several of us in the council raised concerns with the administration's plans to build a Humanitarian Emergency Relief and Recovery Center or HERRC, first at Orchard Beach, and now on Randalls Island because of the environmental and health risks, it would pose outdoors.

We sought to be constructive and solution oriented partners and offering indoor alternatives for the administration to consider for the purposes of intake and relief services, as well as important policy changes to remove barriers that prevent people from expeditiously moving out of the shelter system into permanent housing. A major factor in our city's homeless shelter system being stressed or the counterproductive city policies that slow people's departure from it. By addressing these we could release some of the pressure on our shelter system

benefiting both New Yorkers who have long been in shelters and people seeking asylum. These policies are completely within the city's control to change and enacting them swiftly would allow more people to begin transitioning out of the shelter system and into permanent housing.

Whether it is eliminating the requirement that people remain in the shelter system for 90 days before becoming eligible for the city FEPS rental voucher program, hiring the agency staff in the areas to expedite opportunities for people to leave shelter, or addressing the bureaucratic inefficiencies in the processes, there are steps the city can and must take to help address the slow rate at which people can access permanent housing opportunities to leave shelters. The council's only interest is in improving the conditions for New Yorkers and asylum seekers and we cannot leave solutions on the table. We know that more support is needed from the federal and state governments, and we have echoed those calls with action. Yet, it is important for us to acknowledge the challenges that arise within our control as well and to take steps to alleviate them.

Councilmembers continue to welcome people seeking
asylum and except emergency shelters for them in
their districts. Other key support services from the
city at the community level for these new residents
is what's been lacking and must be increased. That
is the biggest complaint heard from Councilmembers,
schools, and advocates alike, and it has also been
the subject of news reports. It is counterproductive
to dismiss the gaps that exist and potential ideas
that can close them. Instead, what our city needs is
a constructive and honest approach where we
collaboratively and transparently identify emerging
challenges and solutions to them. We hope this can
be the approach moving forward because this crisis
requires all of us to work together for our city.

Part of the reason our city is faced with such high rates of homelessness and a shelter system that is over capacity is that we're also in a dire housing crisis. Our city is not building enough homes, especially affordable and supportive housing for New Yorkers, and that will continue to be a problem unless we confront these housing gaps. It will require the leadership of this body as well as the other side of City Hall.

Today, the council will be voting on the Bruckner
Boulevard rezoning application which will produce
348, units of housing 193 of which are affordable,
including 99 units for seniors, and 25 units set
aside for veterans. That means over half the
apartments in this project are affordable. This
application improved tremendously from the time it
reached the council. The affordability levels of
this project were deepened to offer 35% of the
affordable MIH units at the 40% AMI level, roughly
\$48,000 for a family of three. Additionally, the
veterans' housing in this project will be permanently
affordable and will be accompanied by social
services. There are significant labor agreements
with 32 BJ SEIU, laborers, local 79 and the
carpenters union. This project also establishes
local end MWBE hiring goals. And as part of the 100%
affordable building for older adults, there will be a
13,000 square foot senior center instead of office
space.

This Council is committed to being part of the solution to the housing crisis by approving sound projects that benefit communities and our entire city. As a former Community Board Chair, I can let

you know I understand the importance of prioritizing the concerns of local residents and community input. This can often lead to much better projects. We must confront the housing crisis facing our neighborhoods and city with every district contributing to the production of affordable housing. I'm glad that the Bruckner Boulevard rezoning achieves this goal while advancing benefits for local residents as well. And I want to thank Councilmember Velázquez for her hard work on this project.

I also want to thank our Zoning and Land Use Chairs, Councilmembers Riley and Salamanca for their contributions to support councilmember Velazquez, and the constructive public process they facilitated in this body on this important project.

under MIH, 67 parking spaces a community facility and retail space. The council is modifying the application to remove the site south of Avenue S from the rezoning area in Councilmember Yeger's district.

Bruckner sites rezoning as previously mentioned will facilitate the development of four new mixed use buildings. It will include a total of 349 housing units, 98 permanently affordable under MIH, 99 income restricted units for seniors including 30 of the permanently affordable units under MIH, and 25 units for veterans, 309 parking spaces a grocery store Senior Center, Youth Community Center, retail, and veteran services in Councilmember Velázquez's district.

705 10th Avenue DEP site, a UDAP and tax exemption application to facilitate the development of a new 8-story mixed use building with approximately 157 affordable housing units, a ground floor community facility, and an open space area to be operated by the parks department in Councilmember Bottcher's district.

Cambria Heights 222nd and 227th streets historic districts, Councilmember Williams. A Landmarks

Preservation Commission's designation of a remarkably

cohesive and distinctive group of row houses built with storybook style features. Yes, in councilmember Nantasha Williams's district.

78-46 Metropolitan Avenue rezoning will facilitate the enlargement of an existing one-story building with two additional stories, two housing units, and a veterinary medicine office located on the ground floor in Councilmember Holden's district.

79-18 164th Street rezoning will facilitate a commercial overlay that will legalize an existing medical laboratory in councilmember Gennaro's district.

Finally, 40-25 Crescent street rezoning will facilitate a new 7-story mixed use building to include 233 housing units, including approximately 60 affordable apartments under MIH, as well as ground floor commercial and industrial space. The council is modifying the application to strike MIH option two and add the deep affordability option in Councilmember Won's district.

Additionally, we will also be voting on the following finance item: Proposed Introduction 655-A sponsored by Councilmembers Justin Brannan and Lincoln Restler would authorize an increase in annual

expenditures by three Business Improvement Districts:
The Fifth Avenue Association, the Columbus Amsterdam
BID, and the Court-Livingston-Schermerhorn BID.

Lastly, the council will vote on the following pieces of legislation: Introduction 179-A sponsored by councilmember Francisco Moya would require the city to publish online a report about the role of women and gender-non-binary, non-conforming, and intersex workers in nontraditional careers and submit that report to the council no later than July 1, 2023.

Finally we will vote on a package of legislation making childcare more accessible in New York City.

From day one, childcare has been a priority for this council. We want to pursue it on a universal basis for working families across our city in partnership with the mayor and other stakeholders. I am a mother and grandmother with experiences as a working parent of young children, and many of our members share the same experiences. Affordable high quality childcare benefits parents, children and our city overall.

Childcare is one of the biggest challenges for

working women, and our country is facing a childcare crisis exacerbated by the pandemic and its economic consequences. Women experienced some of the greatest job losses from COVID and the cost of care has only been increasing. There are approximately 225,000 more men in the labor force than before the pandemic but 427,000 fewer women. There's been a decline in the childcare workforce. That remains a challenge. Childcare must be a priority to help ensure an equitable recovery. Through this package of legislation, this historic women-majority city council is once again taking action to lead, demonstrating the difference for our city, when our legislature accurately reflects our city. continue to prioritize inclusive solutions that address the issues of greatest importance to all New Yorkers.

Introduction 242A, sponsored by councilmember

Jennifer Gutierrez would require the creation of a

Marshall Plan for moms, a task force to study and

develop recommendations on how to support working

mothers and caregivers. The taskforce would be

required to submit a report with recommendations

within one year of the task force's convening.

Introduction 477A sponsored by councilmember

Crystal Hudson would establish a childcare task force
to examine how to make childcare more affordable and
accessible for families in the city, and how to
provide additional support and funding to child care
providers and workers. The task force would be
required to submit a report that includes
recommendations for making child care in the city
more affordable and accessible.

We will also vote on the following resolution and bill sponsored by councilmember Julie Menin,
Introduction 485A, would require the Department of
Health and Mental Hygiene to coordinate with the
Department of Information Technology and
Telecommunications, to create a directory of
childcare programs in the city, including a link to
information about child daycares run by the state
that are located in the city. The directory would be
available in the designated citywide languages.

Introduction 486A would establish a childcare advisory board which would be responsible for conducting studies and issuing reports related to childcare in the city, including providing an annual assessment of the needs of childcare programs in the

2 city, and the city's progress toward providing
3 universal childcare.

Introduction 487A would require the administration to create an online portal that provides information on childcare subsidies. The Portal would allow a user to access information about subsidies, including eligibility requirements and instructions on how to apply based on information provided by the user. The portal would also include the forms needed to apply for each subsidy, including any electronic forms available that may be submitted online through the portal. The portal would be available in the designated city wide languages.

Introduction 488A would require the administration to create a child care grant pilot program for child care programs in the city in need of assistance. To be eligible, a childcare program would need to be at significant risk of closure or displacement and meet application and other requirements established by the administering agency. The administration would be required to submit an annual report to the mayor and the Speaker of the Council on grants awarded pursuant to the program and recommendations for expansion.

Introduction 489A would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to develop guidance for owners of real property regarding the facility requirements for a child care program and make such guidance available on its website. The guidance would also be required to indicate that property owners may be eligible for a tax abatement if they meet certain requirements pursuant to state law.

Resolution 69 would call upon New York State legislature to pass, and the governor to sign legislation supporting the provision of financial assistance to families and childcare providers to make childcare more accessible and affordable. And we thank our staff Brenda McKinney, Jesse Foong and Anastasia Ximena.

We will now go to General Orders and we'll hear from... First we'll hear from Councilman Menin.

COUNCILMEMBER MENIN: Thank you so much Majority Leader. Childcare is truly in a state of crisis. It's costing on average over \$18,000 a year for many parents in the city to afford child care. During the COVID pandemic, it's estimated that over 375,000 parents in the city have either left the workforce or downsize their jobs because of high childcare costs and the lack of affordable options and this is in fact costing the city over \$2 billion a year in lost economic revenue. Moreover, there simply are not enough childcare providers, creating childcare deserts all over the city, as over 1400 facilities have closed in recent years. Childcare is both unaffordable and inaccessible for the vast majority of New Yorkers. As a mother of four, this is a deeply personal issue to me.

In the face of this crisis today is a momentous day. The City Council today with this vote will make New York City the first city in the country to enact

2	a comprehensive legislative package to adopt
3	universal childcare. Our city council is sending a
4	very strong message to end this crisis. My five
5	bills would, as the Speaker said, mandate that a
6	permanent childcare advisory board would implement
7	universal childcare. We would get there within five
8	years. The other bills would provide grants to
9	struggling providers, so we get to the supply issue,
10	would make it easier to open new childcare centers
11	and create a childcare directory and subsidy
12	database.

This taskforce and the other task force and advisory board in this package of bills from Councilmembers Hudson and Councilmember Menin are signals that it is time to join forces to think through how we can revolutionize the economy of care, supporting not just the half a million of children under the age of five in our city, but the providers of that care as well, which is a workforce that is predominantly made up of women, women of color, and immigrant women.

As we know all too well, the pandemic turned back the clock for many women in the workforce. Many women saw their jobs among the 1 million erased by the pandemic, but they still had to find a way to pay their bills and take care of their children. Even before the pandemic many recent parents tried to reenter the workforce but found their wages too low to pay for adequate childcare,

and decided instead to stay at home. A recent

Federal Reserve report found that mothers continue to

work less than other women despite a prevalence of jobs. Moreover, the gender wage gap exists in part because many women drop out of the workforce during their peak earning years to care for their families, or because they cannot find a job at their previous salary when they take temporary leave to start or grow a family.

Universal childcare will help narrow this persistent gap while ensuring parents do not have to choose between their families and their careers. As part of my Black Agenda for New York City, I called for universal childcare system in New York City, and I'm proud to have delivered on that promise by sponsoring this package and introducing a bill to create a task force that will study how to make childcare more affordable through free or low-cost childcare.

And this package is just the start. We need to raise wages and training for childcare workers to create a pipeline of good paying jobs to care for these children. And we need to continue working to ensure women, femmes, and nonbinary folks earn \$1 For every dollar a man earns, I vote Aye.

These women deserve to be seen to be recognized and to know that they are valued wherever their workplace may be. They deserve to have rights as an employee and not to be treated as a burden on the basis of gender. They deserve reasonable accommodations and basic safety and privacy measures. And we must strive to be a place that values diversity and inclusion, not as a concept but in real, measurable actions.

COUNCILMEMBER HANIF: Thanks so much. Thank you to our Speaker on this council for stepping up in our oversight role in relation to the asylum seeker crisis.

Despite cold weather flood risks and lack of transportation options, this administration has continued forward in constructing a tent city on Randalls Island to temporarily house our new arrivals. At the immigration hearing I chaired two Fridays ago, the administration confirmed the conditions of the Humanitarian Emergency Relief and Recovery Centers, or HERRCS, will not meet the bare minimum standards set out by our city's right to shelter mandate. This is simply unacceptable. We're

well aware that the city has been put in a challenging position by conservative governors who are using people exercising their legal right to seek asylum as political pawns. We know that many civil servants are working around the clock and doing their absolute best to set these new New Yorkers up for success. However, we as a city need to be doing more to provide a dignified welcome.

Last week, the Speaker put forward a thoughtful and comprehensive proposal for housing people inside in proper brick and mortar accommodations that I was proud to support alongside our Deputy Speaker Ayala, and members of the committee on immigration. The proposal included a number of closed hotels that could be utilized for temporary shelter that could better meet the needs of the asylum seekers while also having the dual benefit of getting our unionized hotel workforce back on the job.

The proposal also included policies that could... that would improve the city FEPS process so that we can move people into permanent housing and ease the shelter bed shortage. We've recently gotten word that the administration will be using the Row Hotel in Midtown to function as a HERRC which is an

important step in the right direction. However, they still plan to open the Randalls Island HERRC imminently. I'm proud to be in solidarity with members of this body and calling the administration to abandon this plan, and commit to providing asylum seekers with a proper roof over their heads. I want to emphasize that I'm eager to be a collaborative partner with city hall and addressing this difficult situation, and that as an as emergency shelter siting decisions are being made my district the 39th would love to welcome asylum seekers. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Councilmember Palladino, followed by Councilmember Barron.

COUNCILMEMBER PALLADINO: Good afternoon,
everybody. I'm so proud to present my anti-mandate
legislative package consisting of four pieces of
legislation Reso 341, a resolution calling upon New
York state legislation to pass legislation that would
prohibit the alteration of terms and conditions of
employment for all employees during a state disaster
emergency. I'm working with the state legislature to
ensure that emergency powers are disallowed from
fundamentally and arbitrarily changing terms of

employment, contracts, particularly union contracts. The government should not be able to terminate hard working New Yorkers due to a personal medical decision, such as a vaccine mandate. Reso 343, a resolution calling upon New York State legislature to pass S7545, A9342. To make extension... make the extension of certain local emergency orders subject to the approval of the local governing body. One of the reasons that so many of our frontline workers were laid off is that local emergency orders were extended without regulation or oversight. Passing this bill would ensure that the city council is part of the process of extending emergency orders in New York City. Reso 342: A resolution calling upon the mayor and the New York City Department of Education to establish rigorous scientific criteria including an emphasis on mental health repercussions that must be met before masking is mandated upon our school children. And Intro 772: This is a local law that would require the Department of Education to issue monthly reports on the implementation of mask mandates. I am a member of the Mental Health Committee. And this is important to me because the mental health of our children has been ignored when

mandating masks. That is unacceptable. We need to
know why we are mandating masks and how that is
affecting our children socially, mentally, and
developmentally, so that we may be better equipped to

6 help them deal with the repercussions. These four

7 pieces of legislation would create systemic change

8 and ensure that New York City workers and school

at the age of 96, Helen Katz, the great-grandmother of my boys passed away. She was more affectionately known to us as Nanny, and she was a survivor of the Holocaust. She was born in 1926 in Eastern Europe, and at the age of 13. When she was a kid, she was taken from her mother by the Nazis. Her mother was killed, and she was sent to a couple of different forced labor camps, where she was forced to make bombs for the Nazis. She eventually... She survived, of course... eventually moved to the Bronx where she and her husband opened a laundromat.

The passing of nanny is not just a loss for my family. With her death, we lose one of the few remaining survivors of the Holocaust, one of the last firsthand witnesses of the horrors many of us only know from books and video. And as more survivors leave this world, with fewer and fewer first-hand accounts, fewer and fewer people know about the Holocaust, or frighteningly even believe it happened. And as I reflect on her experiences and who she was, I'm reminded that the Holocaust did not begin with children being taken from their parents and being forced to work for the Nazis. Fear and anger and hate were fomented, accepted, and embraced.

There are inspiring stories of individuals who risked their lives to save children and families during the Holocaust. People put themselves in danger, but overwhelmingly other... otherwise good people stayed silent, turned away those in need and accepted what was going on around them. And when I look around today, I see frightening echoes of what we learned about from survivors and their stories. It is very easy to write off hateful words as the rantings of an unwell celebrity, or bigoted violence as the effect of an individual's mental health. But

it's... it's more than that. Every time we do and say nothing, or excuse words and actions or try to see both sides of hate, it's providing a safe space for that hate and bigotry and it becomes normalized.

So I hope that today we remember not just the life of Helen Katz, but remember what she represents. And remember her through deed, that we invest our voices, time, and budget to build community and common understanding and we never sit idly by as others express hatred toward anyone simply for who they are. May her memory be for a blessing.

So today I'm introducing two pieces of
legislation Intro 0755 and Intro 0756. This intro
would require first responders to receive training on
how to handle sensitive images. In particular, this
law will ensure that sensitive images including still
or video images depicting the crime, the crime
against the victim, physical injury, death or
suffered by a victim of crime or accident are not
disseminated unlawfully. This legislation comes as a
result of a careless and callous act that happened in
my community, which is now in state law, in Staten
Island just several years ago when an EMT worker
irresponsibly shared the images of her deceased
daughter on social media leaving her family shocked
and angered during the worst time of their lives.

More recently, our city witnessed a similar incident with video footage of EMS Lieutenant Alison Russo, which is also shared online. These actions are unacceptable and it is imperative that our first responders are properly trained on how to handle these sensitive issues.

Next is Intro 756 which would require the Mayor's Office of criminal justice to provide training and operational support to not-for-profit service

providers participating in the City's crisis
management system.

The city's crisis management system helps mediate conflicts on the street, connect high risk individuals to services that can reduce long term risk of violence. This legislation will ensure that those not-for-profits seeking to help mediate conflicts within our community are provided the support required to help them keep our cities and New Yorkers safe. I hope my colleagues will join me in supporting these bills. Thank you.

October as mentioned already is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an annual reminder to promote screening and prevention of disease which affects 1 in 8 women in the United States every year. I want to highlight that the Women's Caucus is doing a citywide free mammogram screening service throughout our five boroughs with our women's caucus members, and today we hosted with the American Italian Cancer Foundation a mammogram bus this entire day outside of 253 Broadway and had many residents and city workers screened, and so if you know of a woman over 40 that needs to get a reminder, give her that reminder. also just want to highlight a bill that was introduced today by myself and Councilmember Sanchez, Intro 783, being introduced on the floor today that hopes to mitigate an issue that affects all 51 of our council districts: Poorly monitored water testing of cooling towers. Neglecting to test the water in a

timely fashion creates diseases like Legionnaires 2 3 that have already taken lives of Bronxites in a lot of our council districts, and several of my community 4 members have fallen ill, and residents throughout the Bronx and throughout the city just this year, and we 6 see hundreds of cases a year, every single year, in a 7 lot of our NYCHA campuses and buildings.

There's a gentleman who has 4 a truck, he brings the shower and the truck around 5 and that's one way to handle... you do need a shower. 6 7 The city has got to step up and pay for some of this 8 work. Some cases people will spend the night. Sometime we have to find other ways to do that. people leave, I call it the tent, they need a place 10 11 to go. And it's no joke that there isn't enough. 12 And I don't think it's so great to be in a large 13 area, like a hotel that is not conducive to support from the neighborhood, and particularly in a place 14 15 it's far from community. I have one church, they got seven people. Everybody's being taken care of. 16 17 mean, they got airline tickets, if they want, they 18 got clothes, they got food, they got schools, we need 19 to take care of folks and we need to do it in our 20 communities. So if you have a church, synagogue or 21 mosque, please let us know. Thank you very much. 2.2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll hear 23 for Councilmember Lee, followed by Councilmember

COUNCILMEMBER LEE: Thank you, Majority Leader and Madame Speaker.

Today I'm proud to be introducing legislation alongside Councilmembers Holden, Hanks, Velasquez, and Majority Whip Brooks Powers to combat catalytic converter theft. Thefts of these devices have nearly quadrupled in the city this year, and victims are left on average with \$5,000 to \$10,000 in damages to their cars. This happened to one of my staff as well. In an already difficult economy, a New Yorker should not have to live with that burden. would establish a catalytic converter etching program to distribute VIN etching kits to not only use in new car dealers, but also the general public. This bill would invest in expanding the good but overstretched work that NYPD has already been doing on this issue. Thank you, and I hope my colleagues will support in this effort.

Intro 782 would require the Department of

Education to distribute to all children information

regarding after school programming. We know we have

gaps in in care, child care, but also after school

care. And so part of that gap is information. And

this Intro 782 aims to tackle that. Reso 344 and 345

I already mentioned, that are about the housing

crisis, so calling on the state to do their part to

do more by establishing a statewide housing voucher access program as well as expanding right to council statewide.

And lastly, Intro 785: We've all been promised everything and the moon when we go through rezonings in our communities, and when we were staffers and in the lives before we were Councilmembers. And yet there isn't a formal mechanism for the city to track these mitigations that are promised. So in addition to the rezoning tracker that did pass a few years ago, this bill would add the mitigations to be tracked by the department... sorry, the Office of Environmental Coordination. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Seeing no one else signed up, I'll now call on Speaker Adrienne Adams to close today's Stated Meeting.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Before we close I just want to commend the Women's Caucus of the New York City

Council for having the mammogram screening bus outside of city hall today. This is another unprecedented move of the women-majority-led City

Council, first ever, so I want to commend my colleagues for doing this.
