CHAIRPERSON LEE: Okay. [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome to this hearing of the City Council's Committee on Mental Health, Disabilities, and Addiction. Today the committee will vote on proposed Introduction Number 609 A, sponsored by Deputy Speaker Ayala, which would establish a needle, syringe, and sharps buyback pilot program as well as Proposed Introduction Number 404 A, which I'm proud to sponsor relating to tracking the funds paid pursuant to the New York Opioid Settlement, which would require the agency designated by the mayor to develop and submit reports tracking the funds paid pursuant to the New York Opioid Settlement Sharing Agreement.

So I just want to say welcome, especially thank
you to all the members who are currently here. We
have Deputy Speaker Ayala, Councilmember Cabán,
Councilmember Abreu, Councilmember Bottcher,
Councilmember Williams, Councilmember Paladino, and
Councilmember Hanif. So, thank you all for being
here. And I love the fact that we have such a strong
attendance on this committee. So thank you all.

As discussed previously, in hearings of this committee, in New York City and nationally, opioid

2 overdose is the leading cause of accidental death.

Opioid use disorder and related deaths was declared a

4 | public health emergency in 2017, mostly due to the

5 mass educational and promotional campaigns of

6 pharmaceutical companies intended to convince medical

7 practitioners and patients that these medications

8 were non-addictive. And as we all know, this

9 campaign was incredibly successful.

By 2004, Oxycontin became the leading drug of abuse in the US, and in 2020, almost 75% of overdose deaths involved an opioid. In New York City, opioids are involved in 80% of all overdose deaths. The 2019 lawsuit filed by New York Attorney General Tish James was intended to hold these various manufacturers and distributors responsible for the opioid epidemic. Many of these lawsuits and settlements are still pending, but thus far more than \$1 billion dollars has been secured to help combat this crisis.

The goal of proposed Intro 404 A is to ensure that the opioid funds allocated to New York City are being used to directly address this massive public health crisis. And for the city to be transparent about how these funds are and will be used to address

the epidemic, especially in the communities hit hardest.

In closing, I'd like to remind everyone of the importance of these funds, by stating that as of June 2022, every three hours... three hours, someone in New York City dies of a drug overdose. That means New Yorkers die of overdose more than homicides, suicides and motor vehicle crashes combined. It is my hope that this legislation will provide New Yorkers with the transparency that they deserve, and the reassurance that the funds are being properly used in a manner that best serves our New York City communities.

At this time, I'd like to turn to my colleague,
Deputy Speaker Ayala to make a statement on her bill
as well.

DEPUTY SPEAKER AYALA: Good morning, everyone. I really want to address the members of the of the body, and thank you all for your support on 609 A.

This bill, you know has received very mixed reviews. And I think that that was the intended outcome. I wanted to make a statement with this bill. I've been in office for five years and for five years, I have been working on combating the

opioid crisis in my district. And I will share with you that in year two, in parts of the South Bronx, that I represent, I had to call in a hazmat team to come in and clean up the thousands and thousands of syringe litter on one residential block that housed a daycare for children with disabilities, a church, and multiple dwellings. And I could not believe that it had just been left that way. And that's what It gets left that way. Right? happens. Because communities of color continuously get, you know, the short end of the stick. And, you know, I... We understand the opioid crisis, and this bill by no way, you know, is going to... is a remedy to the opioid crisis. It is not intended to resolve the opioid crisis. What it is intended to do is to ensure that we do not have needles in public spaces that might... kids, the kids that I represent in my community are not playing in a playground that is littered in syringes. It is a public health crisis, and quite frankly, I'm outraged that we had to get to this point where we had to legislate this. common sense. We know that we have a crisis in the city. We know that the syringe litter is... is... has been problematic for years and yet we have seen

So I do vote aye on all. Thank you very much. COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. By a vote of eight in the affirmative. Zero in the negative and no abstentions. Both items have been adopted by the committee.
