First of all, I want to acknowledge my

Colleagues who have joined, Council Member Caban,

Council Member Ung, and Council Member Velazquez, and

I'll acknowledge additional Colleagues as they join.

At today's hearing, the Committee will be voting on Intro 699. This bill was previously heard in a joint hearing with the Committee on Immigration and the Committee on Governmental Operations. This bill, which is sponsored by Council Member Ung, would

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strengthen existing protections for small business owners with limited English proficiency. It takes a lot of work to run a small business in New York. Small business owners must adhere to numerous regulations that protect their space, their consumers, and their workers. Owners need to be knowledgeable of opportunities available to them to access funding and other resources, and owners must interact with and respond to inspectors and notices of violations when they are issued. All these tasks require significant attention but, without language accessibility for these rules, regulations, and opportunities, small business owners who communicate in languages other than English can struggle. Small business owners with limited English proficiency have continued to share their difficulties adhering to the City's demands due to language inaccessibility when interacting with inspectors and agencies despite their complete willingness to comply with the law. Language access issues should not be an additional hurdle for small business owners, and it is in the City's best interest to ensure that they communicate effectively with all small business owners. The City has taken steps to provide culturally competent

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services and mitigate language access issues, but more steps are required to create an equitable small business environment. The goal of the bill we are voting on today is to begin to provide those additional steps. Intro 699 will require translation of the Business Owner's Bill of Rights and Food Service Establishment Code of Conduct into each of the designated citywide languages, require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to include additional information around language access in their Food Service Establishment Code of Conduct and Ombuds Office, require city agencies that regularly conduct inspections to report annually on the number of employed inspectors that are fluent in a language other than English and require the City to provide written translations of final OATH decisions to small business owners upon request.

I am looking forward to a vote on this bill today to support language access for our small business owners. I want to thank C.J. Murray, Erica Cohen, and Rebecca Barilla from central staff for their work putting this hearing together as well as my own Chief-of-Staff Jonathan Szott for his assistance.
