Quiet down, please. Good morning and welcome to the

New York City Council vote of the Committee on Higher

Education.

At this time, could everyone please silence your cell phones? Thank you for your cooperation.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON DINOWITZ: [GAVEL] Good morning. I'm Council Member Eric Dinowitz, Chair of the Committee on Higher Education. Today, the Committee will vote on Proposed Introduction 660-A, a Local Law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to establishing a program to provide transition services for students with disabilities entering higher education.

This legislation was previously heard by the Committee on Higher Education and the Committee on Mental Health, Disabilities, and Addiction Chaired by Council Member Linda Lee at a joint hearing on

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November 2, 2022. The topic of that oversight hearing
was Accommodations for College Students with

Disabilities. At that time, we heard testimony from
administrators, from the City University of New York,
the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities,

MOPD, current and former CUNY students, and other

interested stakeholders.

If you're a student with a disability in New York City, you may have an IEP, supports, accommodations and then you graduate, and everything that helped you thrive is taken away from you as soon as you graduate so this bill, which I introduced, calls for the MOPD or any other agency or office designated by the Mayor in consultation with the Department of Education and relevant stakeholders to develop and manage a program to help advise students with disabilities who are graduating from high school about how to obtain accommodations at institutions of higher education. Among other provisions and, very importantly, the bill calls for the development and implementation of a system to facilitate the electronic sharing of information about the student's special education services between the Department of Education and institutions of higher education, of

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course after obtaining necessary consents. Further, the bill calls for the availability of student advocates to assist those graduating from high school. While we believe that many of the students will be headed for post-secondary education will attend CUNY, the bill will apply to students attending other higher education institutions as well. As many of you know, the bill is based on my experience as a high school teacher of students with disabilities for 14 years right here in New York City and from my concern for them as they enter the world of higher education. This bill puts in place the assistance that many of my students needed to transition smoothly into institutions of higher education and will now help future students get the accommodation and support services they need to excel in college courses and college life. Making the transition from high school to college is hard enough, and I want to make sure that all high school seniors with disabilities in New York City have some help in doing that from now on so that they have every opportunity to succeed.

I want to acknowledge the Committee Members who are present, Council Members Feliz,

into legislation is why we are elected so I want to
congratulate him on many levels and obviously it's a
great bill, and it also means that hopefully the
offices of people with disabilities at CUNY which are
sometimes underfunded and not used in a way that is
appropriate for the students will now get boosted and
be fully staffed as they should be. Thank you very
much.
