We will also vote to approve LUs 167,
170, 171, and Preconsidered LUs for application
number N 230177 HKK for a package of designations by
the Landmarks Preservation Commission including the
Lesbian Herstory Archives in Council Member Hanif's
District, the Samuel Gompers Industrial High School
in Deputy Speaker Ayala's District, and Julius' Bar
Building in Council Member Bottcher's District, and
the Melrose Parkside Historic District in Council
Member Joseph's District.

We will also vote to disapprove LUS 165 and 166 for two parking special permit applications related to property in Council Member Bottcher's District in Manhattan. In its review of the Land Use matters, the Council may consider issues related to the public welfare in determining whether to grant or deny special permits. The Council need not approve a special permit simply because the CPC has determined that the findings have been met. Considering the specific neighborhood qualities here, the applicants' plan for the additional requested parking spaces, the policy goals of the Zoning Resolution, and the

critical need to address climate change concerns in the city, and following the recommendations of our Subcommittee, the Committee today will vote to disapprove these two related applications. As Chair Riley previously explained in greater detail, the proposed project site is extremely well-served by the public transit with the vast majority of area residents foregoing car ownership and relying on the wide range of available transit options. The proposal for additional parking spaces does not serve the need for a neighborhood commuting option nor the area economic viability and thus does not advance the objectives of the Zoning Resolution. Given these set of facts, we in the Council must do our part to reduce the City's greenhouse gas emissions to address the far-reaching consequences of climate change. Vehicle traffic accounts for 21 percent of the city's greenhouse gas emissions, and our vote today is one step among many that we can take in order to achieve our emissions reductions targets. While the applicant has testified that the additional space would potentially be used by electric vehicles, the proposal does not legally mandate that the spaces only be used in that manner. After having considered
