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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. This is a microphone check for the Committee on General Welfare. Today's date is March 2, 2023. Located in the Chambers. Recording done by Pedro Lugo.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning. Quiet, please. Good morning and welcome to the New York City vote on the Committee on General Welfare.

Please silent all electronic devices.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON AYALA: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone, and welcome to today's hearing. My name is Diana Ayala, and I am the Deputy Speaker of the New York City Council and the Chair of the General Welfare Committee.

Today, our Committee will be voting on two bills. The first bill, Proposed Intro 522-A sponsored by Council Member Erik Bottcher. Proposed Intro 522-A would require mental health professionals to be available in each families-with-children shelter to provide on-site or telehealth mental health services. Homeless, in and of itself, is a traumatic experience. When these issues go unaddressed, families find it even more challenging to exit homelessness and move into permanent housing.

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Our shelter system must provide adequate wraparound services to set up New Yorkers up for success, including mental health services.

The second bill we are voting on,

Proposed Intro 436-A is sponsored by Council Member

Stevens who is on her way and would create a Juvenile

Justice Advisory Board to advise and provide

recommendations to the Mayor, the Council, and the

Administration for Children Services on issues

related to juvenile justice. Greater oversight and

input is needed to ensure proper safety and care of

children living in juvenile detention systems. We

know that this board exists and that Intro 436 will

make its work even more effective. I want to thank

the advocates and individuals with lived experience

that informed and helped us to shape this

legislation.

At this time, I'd like to acknowledge my Colleagues who are here with us today, Council Member Riley, Hudson, Lee, Osse, Restler, Ung, and Williams, and we've been joined by Council Member Bottcher.

much, Chair Ayala. I've been in government for like 14 years, and I'm so incredibly proud to be part of this Body and to be here today passing my third piece of legislation which is going to have an incredibly profound effect on the lives of thousands and thousands of New Yorkers because Intro 522 is going to mental healthcare in every family shelter in New York City, and that's over 13,000 families who slept in shelters last night, over 22,000 children who right now have very little access to mental health services, and we're really solving for a couple of problems here. One is that as a society we have

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devalued mental healthcare, and our government treats mental healthcare like something optional, like something superfluous, like something extra, and we've all seen during this pandemic what happens when we neglect mental healthcare. The effects are devastating. Also, in our country, we have a twotiered healthcare system. We have healthcare for people of means, the insured, and then we have a healthcare system for everyone else, and that is particularly true for mental healthcare. I'm someone who benefited from mental healthcare as a young person. I wouldn't be here today if I hadn't received that care. That is not true for most New Yorkers, especially families in our shelter system so Intro 522 that we're passing today would ensure that people living in our shelter systems, families have access to on-site mental healthcare, either through a physical healthcare professional or counselor or via telehealth. We're exploring new technology to make sure that these services are in there so I really want to thank you, Deputy Speaker Ayala, for your co-Sponsorship of this legislation, I want to thank Linda Lee, the Chair of the Mental Health Committee, and I want to thank the Speaker and all the Staff who

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worked on this. I also want to thank Christine Quinn from WIN, the largest family shelter provider for families with children because it was just about a year ago when I attended a panel discussion hosted by WIN where this problem was identified, and we met, we drafted this legislation in response to the concerns that we heard from providers on the ground so this is an example of how the process is supposed to work, co-governance with the providers who are providing these services out in the community. Thank you so much to the Committee and to everyone who made today possible.

CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Thank you, Council
Member Bottcher. Council Member Stevens is not here.
She should be on her way so we will leave the vote
open.

can provide feedback and suggestions based on their

lived experience.
