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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to today's New York City Council hearing for the Committee on Transportation.

At this time, we ask that you silence all cell phones and electronic devices to minimize disruptions throughout the hearing. We thank you for your cooperation.

Chairperson, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome to this hearing of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. I am Selvena Brooks-Powers, the Chair of the Committee.

Today, we will be voting on three bills and one resolution. Proposed Intro. 679A sponsored by Council Member Joseph in relation to the installation of traffic-calming devices in senior pedestrian zones, Proposed Intro. 805A sponsored by the Public Advocate in relation to pedestrian safety reporting, Proposed Intro. 854A sponsored by myself in relation to new daylighting measures, and Resolution 460

sponsored by Council Member Farias calls on the New York State Legislature and Governor to fully fund the Metropolitan Transportation Authority, also known as MTA, in the State's upcoming Fiscal Year 2024 budget in an effort to ensure that public transit riders have effective, affordable public transportation, the MTA maintains fiscal stability in the face of a looming fiscal cliff, and the MTA operate more bus and train services statewide.

This Committee prioritizes making our streets safe for all. It has been the subject of several Committee hearings so far this year and the subject of three bills we are voting on today. As this Administration continues to implement Vision Zero throughout the City, it is our job to constantly check and ensure that what is being done is working and to legislate where more work needs to be done. This is why I have called for a vote today on legislation that would improve street safety in New York City while working towards a safer, more equitable city. This legislation represents a first step, and we expect to continue having hearings and legislating on these issues in the coming months.

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2 As my Colleagues will be speaking on 3 their legislation, I want to highlight Proposed Intro. 854A, sponsored by myself, which would require 4 the Department of Transportation to implement daylighting at no less than 100 intersections per 6 7 year beginning in 2025. Daylighting involves preventing vehicles from occupying certain areas near 8 an intersection in order to expand sightlines for those approaching the intersection. The purpose of 10 11 daylighting is to increase visibility for pedestrians 12 and drivers to oncoming traffic and ultimately reduced injuries or deaths due to obstructed 13 14 visibility. In addition to implementing daylighting 15 at a minimum of 100 intersections per year, the Department of Transportation will also be required 16 17 whenever certain criteria are met to install 18 daylighting barriers such as bollards, bike racks, or 19 any other physical infrastructure. Finally, the 20 proposed bill requires the Department of 21 Transportation annually report on the locations at which daylighting has been implemented and those 2.2 2.3 where it has been discontinued. I believe daylighting is an efficient safety measure that can prevent 24 injuries and deaths in our cities, and that is why I 25

committee on transportation and infrastructure 5 am proud to have sponsored this bill. I look forward to voting on this proposed bill and the two other proposed bills and one resolution.

I will now allow my fellow co-sponsors on the other pieces of legislation that are being voted on today to provide an opening statement. I will start with Council Member Joseph on Proposed Intro. 679A.

GOUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, Chair.

Good morning, Colleagues and advocates. Today I stand before you with honor and pride in asking you to vote favorably on my proposed bill, Intro. 679A, a local law to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to installation of traffic-calming devices in senior pedestrian zones. This bill is about protecting our seniors. It is about safety. Transportation safety is real in our communities. Our constituents, primarily our seniors, have been calling continuously for better laws to help keep them safe in the streets within their communities. This bill is doing just that. By voting yes to my bill, Intro. 679A, you're contributing to keeping our seniors safe.

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As was mentioned, my name is Jumaane

14 | Williams. I'm the Public Advocate of the City of New

15 York. I want to thank Chair Brooks-Powers and the

16 | Members of the Committee on Transportation and

18 One of the bills being voted on today is

19 Introduction 805. My bill would require the

20 | Department of Transportation to conduct comprehensive

21 studies of traffic crashes involving pedestrian

22 | fatalities or serious injuries every four years. DOT

23 | would analyze the conditions and factors behind

crashes and develop strategies to improve pedestrian

25 safety. Strategies may include the installation of

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE audible pedestrian signals and devices to support those with sight, hearing, and mobility impairments and modifying citywide traffic operation policy. This bill would also require DOT to make publicly available reports on crash investigations from the preceding three-month period. Each report shall include the total number of investigations completed, all evidence and data collected per investigation, any potential criminal wrongdoing, factors that may have contributed to each crash, and whether changes to street design or improvements to infrastructure could reduce the risk of subsequent serious vehicle crashes and recommendations. This bill would be a starting point in the larger movement to address the ongoing silent epidemic of traffic violence which is taking so many lives every year. New Yorkers deserve to walk their streets, ride their bikes and micromobility vehicles and be on the road safely and out of harm's way. We know that every traffic death is preventable if we make improvements and changes to street infrastructure and pedestrian safety. To meet the critical moment in our street safety landscape, we must invest in our communities, especially those in traffic corridors that for years have seen

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COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE incalculable loss and pass policy administration addressing traffic violence in order to achieve collective safety.

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Thank you to all my Colleagues who are supporting me on this bill and the Council who has sponsored, and I look forward to the passage and implementation of this bill and look forward to making changes around the two biggest things that we can prevent which is gun violence and traffic crashes and violence. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you. Finally, to Council Member Farias on Resolution 460.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARIAS: Thank you so much, Chair. Good morning, everyone. It has now been 27 days and counting since the State's budget deadline. While we're still waiting for the State's finalized budget, the Council is making our commitment to transit equity known. Today, we will be voting on my bill, Reso. 460 which calls on Governor Kathy Hochul to fully fund the MTA and make six-minute service a reality for New Yorkers citywide. Six-minute service would create a faster, safer, and more accessible system for our outer borough communities like mine who rely on our trains to get us to and from work,

school, and citywide recreation. This is something
all New Yorkers need right now and, while we still
have time to make lifesaving choices for New Yorkers
this needs to be included in our State budget. While
this is a resolution calling on the State, Reso. 460
is about the City, and, as a City Council Member who
is dedicated to transit equity and justice, I am
proud to see that the Council is in full support of
six-minute service and Reso. 460.

Thank you to all the co-sponsors and supporters of this bill. Thank you, Chair, for giving me time and bringing this up for vote. I'm really excited about it today.
