Today, we'll be voting on Intro. 54
sponsored by Council Member Farah Louis. This bill
will require the Department of Youth and Community
Development, DYCD, to include financial empowerment
components to their youth employment and their
runaway homeless youth programs.

Such training would include instructions on banking, budgeting, credit, debit, savings, investments, and taxes. DYCD would be required to issue an annual report on how many participants received financial empowerment training, the methods and manner in which the topics were covered, and the amount of time spent covering such topics.

In April, members of New York City Youth Action Board attended our hearing on the needs of runaway and homeless youth and spoke in support of Intro. 54 based on their lived experience and sustainable housing young adults. Zaganah Stevens spoke passionately about how she still feels the effects of financial mistakes she made as an unstable housed teen a decade later, and Mr. Walker underscored the importance of teaching young people about taxes, credit building, and budgeting in order to reach a place of stability. Mr. Walker said it best when he testified "in the city where the cost of living is the highest on earth, why wouldn't financial literacy resources be a priority?" Financial literacy is a crucial skill that helps young people make informed choices to reach selfsufficiency. Whether you are a full-time student or
