CHAIRPERSON SANCHEZ: [GAVEL] Good morning. I am Council Member Pierina Sanchez, Chair of the Committee on Housing and Buildings.

We are here today to vote on a bill targeting lead-based paint hazards in common areas of multiple dwellings. On April 25th of 2023, the Committee on Housing and Buildings held a joint hearing with the Committee on Health to discuss lead-based paint hazards. We heard from the Administration about their continued work in combatting lead-based paint hazards in our homes, but the risks are still there. At the hearing, HPD testified that in Fiscal Year 2022, HPD issued 15,448 lead-based paint hazard violations, an increase of approximately 6,000

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Yes. Thank you so much. Thank you, Madam Chair, good morning. I just want to thank the Chair again for allowing me to deliver brief remarks on Intro. 193 before the Committee today that would create an immediately hazardous violation for the existence of lead-based

paint in any common area of a multiple dwelling where
a child of applicable age resides if such paint is

4 peeling or is on a deteriorated subsurface.

New York City has some of the strongest laws and programs designed to address the ongoing crisis of lead exposure, but without adequate enforcement and comprehensive regulations, our communities are quite literally being left in the dust. Despite decades of significant advances and the fact that childhood lead poisoning is completely preventable, too many children are still exposed to lead and progress has plateaued. It is welldocumented that lead can cause long-term, irreversible negative health impacts and can reduce a child's learning capacity and academic achievement. 88 percent of children with elevated blood lead levels reside in moderate- to high-poverty neighborhoods, and, as of March 2023, 45 percent of all lead-related court cases in New York City were in the Bronx. Getting lead out of our homes is a racial, economic, and environmental justice issue, and city leadership is obligated to do everything they can to end lead poisoning.
