At this time, can everyone please silence your cell phones? Thank you for your cooperation.

Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON DINOWITZ: [GAVEL] Good morning. I'm Council Member Eric Dinowitz, Chair of the Committee on Higher Education.

Proposed Resolution 237-A, a resolution calling on the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign the Fair College Admissions Act which would prohibit legacy admission preferences at undergraduate institutions in New York State. This legislation was previously heard by the Committee on Higher Education on June 30, 2022. This resolution, which I introduced well before the recent Supreme Court ruling that eviscerated affirmative action on U.S. college campuses, now seeks to help level the playing field in a different way for New York City's

first-generation college students and for many of our
lower-income students, students of color,
undocumented students, and students from immigrant

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The New York State legislation that this resolution supports refocuses colleges on fighting for educational, economic, and social equity for all New Yorkers who seek access to college education. The Fair College Admissions Act would actually prevent colleges both from including a question on their own application about where an applicant's parents went to college and even from looking at the answer to such a question on the Common App which is used by over 1,000 colleges in the admission process. The Act also includes a substantial financial penalty for colleges that break the rules. Legacy admissions will be in the news for some time to come as more and more public and private colleges voluntarily agree to end legacy preferences and as more and more elected representatives join those forces. Now, after receiving a complaint, the federal government has launched a civil rights investigation into Harvard's legacy admissions process. All of that signals that a big change could be coming. It is indeed time for New

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York State to pass the Fair College Admissions Act and for the New York City Council to make clear our support for it and for the future New York City college students it champions.

I want to acknowledge the Council Members who are present, Council Member Vernikov, Council Member Feliz, and virtually joining us Council Member Barron.

I would like to thank my Staff, we have a number of them here today, as well as the Committee Staff and others who worked on preparing this resolution including Adam Staropoli, my Legislative Director, Jenna Klaus, my Chief-of-Staff, Christina Yellamaty, the Committee's Counsel, Regina Paul, the Committee's Policy Analyst, Chloe Rivera, the Committee's former Senior Policy Analyst, and Nia Hyatt, the Committee's Senior Finance Analyst.
