Thank you, and good morning, and welcome to the New York City Hybrid Vote on the Committee for Education. Please silence all electronic devices. Chair, we are ready to begin. Good morning, and welcome, everyone, to today's Committee on Education vote on Resolution 422, sponsored by, Council Member Vickie Paladino, which calls upon the New York City Department of Education to expand career-connected learning programs and opportunities at all public high schools. The Committee previously heard testimony on this resolution as part of a June 21st hearing on several pieces of legislation. The goal of a Resolution 422

is to expand access to career-connected learning programs and opportunities to all interested high school students attending New York City public schools. This is especially important considering that in recent years fewer students are enrolling in college and are going directly into the workforce instead.

Currently, the New York City Public Schools only offers career technical education programming in approximately one-quarter of New York City public schools. These programs provide high school students with academic and technical instruction, as well as work-based learning experiences and an opportunity to obtain industry recognized certifications. I encourage all of my colleagues to vote yes on this important resolution that calls on New York City Public Schools to expand such programs to all public schools in New York City.

Council Member Paladino, if you would like to make a statement?

I would like to thank my staff, committee, and I will now turn to the clerk... Council Member?

Our first panel will be Danielle Beam, Dr.

Danielle Beam, please make your way to the front. You
may begin your testimony.

DR. DANIELLE BEAM: Thank you.

Good Morning, my name is Dr. Danielle Beam and I am the Executive Director of the Food Education Fund. FEF was founded 15 years ago in conjunction with the Charter for Food and Finance High School, a CTE culinary school in Hell's Kitchen. FEF along with Food and Finance High School serves students, 98 percent of students identifying as ethnically diverse and 85 percent qualifying as Title 1, most of whom

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travel more than an hour and a half each way to attend this school.

FEF provides experiential learning and industry access to students throughout their high school career. Now we support over a dozen schools in a variety of ways across New York City. We offer a suite of year-long programming leading up to our workforce development training and career placement. High School seniors are enrolled in a 6-week course of intensive workforce development prior to FEF assessing and pairing these students with our industry partners - made up of more than 60 restaurant and hospitality groups across New York City. These students are paid interns. Four out of five interns are then offered an opportunity to extend their role at the conclusion of their internship.

We firmly believe that students should be prepared to make informed postsecondary decisions that are the right fit for them. The emphasis Food and Finance has placed on the access to the holistic development of their students through experiential learning, specifically outsourcing access through FEF to enhance the curriculum in place, has been crucial

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to the overall success of their student population.

Ninety-eight percent of Food and Finance high school students graduate within 4 years with nearly 200 paid hours of meaningful internship experiences and up to 500 hours of total FEF programming throughout their high school career.

It takes a village to support student success which is why partnerships like Food and Finance and Food Education Fund are essential. The school system can provide ample enrichment during the school day, and the added benefit of immersive after-school programs, tied into the classroom curriculum, provides a stronger student support network and improves like likelihood of student success, especially as students consider how to navigate postsecondary decisions.

Food Education Fund endorses Resolution 422, because we have seen firsthand how access to industry leaders and intentional programming in schools and after school better prepares students for college and career readiness, amplifying their leadership potential and increasing their social and economic mobility. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON JOSEPH: What kind of certification is there once the student has finished with the program?

DR. DANIELLE BEAM: So, in addition to the paid internship exposure, students also graduate with their food handlers license. And this provides them access to entry level positions across Hospitality.

CHAIRPERSON JOSEPH: Nice. Could you give us examples of some of their career paths? Where do some of these students end up?

DR. DANIELLE BEAM: For sure. So, uh, we actually celebrated the 15th year of the FEF most recently at our gala. And one of the students in attendance is Romeo Melpaca (phonetic). Romeo was a first generation college student at Food and Finance High School who did an internship at Lilia and Misi, which is part of Grovehouse Hospitality. And at 21 years old, he is now the sous chef at Lilia making \$75,000 a year.

CHAIRPERSON JOSEPH: Nice! There you go. So, that's proof in the pudding that this works.

DR. DANIELLE BEAM: The proof is in the pudding.
