CHAIRPERSON HUDSON: [GAVEL] Good morning, everyone. I'm Council Member Crystal Hudson, Chair of the Committee on Aging and Co-Chair of the Council's LGBTQIA+ Caucus.

Thank you to the Members of the Committee for being here today to vote on Proposed Introduction 564-A, and thank you to my Caucus Co-Chair, Council Member Tiffany Cabán, for being here.

Department for the Aging, also known as NYC Aging, to

establish a commission for LGBTQIA+ older adults or

older adults of any other diverse sexual orientation

or gender identity within the Department. The

commission's goals would be to identify challenges, share best practices, and issue expert recommendations on ways to improve the quality of life for LGBTQIA+ older adults in New York City. The commission would be composed of a diverse set of experts including from LGBTQIA+ advocacy and services spaces, the community-based healthcare sector, labor, and organizations that serve black, Asian American, Pacific Islander, Indigenous, and LatinX LGBTQIA+ people ensuring that the commission's findings reflect the lived experiences of our most

As Co-Chair of the Council's LGBTQIA+
Caucus, I believe that we must be doing more as a
Council and as a City for our LGBTQIA+ older adults.
Earlier this year, our Caucus released the Marsha and
Sylvia plan, which advances a bold vision to lift up
LGBTQIA+ New Yorkers including older adults. I'm
proud that we are advancing a critical piece of this
plan today. LGBTQIA+ older adults have been ignored
and mistreated for decades, and we must ensure that
DFTA programming and services are sufficiently
inclusive and that staff are trained in addressing
the diverse and specific needs of these individuals.

I look forward to the passage of this legislation and to supporting the work of this commission in any way that I can.

I will now turn it over to Council Member Cabán to deliver a statement on the legislation we are voting on today.

I want to acknowledge, just before I do that, that we've been joined by Council Members Dinowitz, Lee, Schulman, Cabán, and Marte.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. Good morning.

Our city has always been a leader in the fight for dignity and freedom for queer people. After all, the modern queer liberation movement was born

with a riot on Christopher Street, and, sadly, too many from the Stonewall generation are no longer with us. To honor them, the movement for queer liberation must support our elders before they become our ancestors. Queer elders deserve to live and grow old with dignity, with comfort, with joy, and with family and with love but with something else as well, stewardship of our culture, and we deserve to be in rich community with our elders so that they are able to pass along their stories and teachings to help us build a society where we are all free to be who we are.

Earlier this year, my LGBTQIA+ Caucus Co-Chair, Council Member Crystal Hudson, and I released the Marsha and Sylvia plan in honor of Marsha P.

Johnson and Sylvia Rivera. In it, we called for a commission within the Department for the Aging charged with helping our City improve the quality of life of LGBTQIA+ older adults, and hopefully by passing this legislation later today, we will create that commission, and I look forward to remaining involved with the Administration next session helping to identify commissioner appointments and developing requirements for their report.
