CHAIRPERSON WON: Good morning and welcome to New York City Council's Committee on Contracts. Today is Wednesday, November 15, 2023. My name is Julie Won, and I am the Chair of this Committee.

The purpose of today's hearing is to vote on an important piece of legislation pertaining to procurement reform and accountability in our city.

I would like to extend my thanks to Council Member Althea Stevens for her leadership on this issue and sponsoring legislation before Committee today.

The City Council has long advocated for reforms to the City' contracting process, especially when it comes to those contracts in human services

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sector that are lifeblood of the City's non-profits to provide critical services to the most vulnerable New Yorkers. Through various procurement reform initiatives, the Council has worked to increase accountability, transparency, and efficiency in a process that has historically been opaque and burdensome for providers for the people they served.

Intro. 511 continues this Council's efforts by requiring a comprehensive study and establishment of enforceable timelines for procurement of human service contracts. The bill requires the City's Chief Procurement Officer to analyze each step of contracting process for every contracting agency, evaluate the time required to complete those steps, and provide recommendations for standard procurement schedules to the Procurement Policy Board. The study and the result schedules created by the Procurement Policy Board will bring much needed clarity and structure to what sadly remains a cumbersome and convoluted contracting system. By also requiring regular reporting on agency compliance with those schedules, Proposed Intro 511-A promotes ongoing accountability. Shortening procurement timelines will reduce delays and strains

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- for human service providers that disrupt their programming. This bill will shed light on delays, where bills originate and how long each step should reasonably take.

As Chair of the Youth Services Committee and long-time non-profit worker and advocate, I'm beyond honored to be passing legislation that will bring out ground-breaking moves towards enhancing efficiency, transparency, and accountability in the procurement process for the human service sector. This is an in-depth examination that will allow us to identify any inefficiencies in current processes, ultimately working to streamline the process and ensuring timely deliverance of services provided by

4	the work of the human service sector as in the City's
5	most vulnerable times they have time and time again
6	showed up to do the job and get the work done.

I would like to thank Committee Staff,

Alex, who worked so hard with me on this bill to

ensuring that we got it to the place that we need it

to be. Although I am not 100 percent happy, we have

made moves in the right direction to make the

procurement process a little bit more transparent.

Thank you, Speaker Adams, and everyone who signed

onto this bill, and I hope everyone votes aye.
