SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to today's New York City Council vote for the Committee on Housing and Buildings.

At this time, please silence all electronic devices.

Chair Sanchez, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON SANCHEZ: [GAVEL] Good morning. I am Council Member Pierina Sanchez, Chair of the Committee on Housing and Buildings. We are here today to vote on the Speaker's Fair Housing Plan, Proposed Introduction 1031-A.

New York City is in the midst of an ongoing, uneven housing crisis. Half of all New Yorkers are rent-burdened, contributing more than 30 percent of their income to housing, but the pain is concentrated in working-class communities, communities of color, and felt most by persons living with disabilities, sexual and gender minorities, and other vulnerable groups. In Districts like mine with a median worker income of 24,000 dollars, a home

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health aide worker that may have one or two children, she is housing cost burdened, and 90 percent of the people like her are paying more than they can afford in rent. In response, our City is neither building nor preserving enough housing to keep up with the demand nor distributing production fairly across the city. From 2010 to 2020, New York City built only about 200,000 new units of housing while gaining nearly 630,000 new people and nearly 1 million jobs. This rate of production lags far behind most other large growing cities. Furthermore, the housing, and particularly affordable housing that we have produced, has been unevenly distributed. With neighborhoods that are rich in infrastructure and amenities not contributing as much to the City's housing needs while few communities, particularly in the Bronx where I represent, have taken on the lion's share of affordable housing production. Don't get me wrong. I will continue to welcome affordable housing developments in my community, but even with all that is being done, it is not enough, and we need more communities to step up in our city and do more.

The housing crisis also exists in the context of ongoing deep segregation. Over 80 percent

Community District's access to opportunity,

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2 displacement risk, infrastructure capacity, and 3 vulnerability to climate change. The framework also 4 requires the development of equity goals and 5 strategies to overcome the obstacles to the housing 6 production targets set. It will also expand 7 preservation and anti-displacement resources and 8 deepen neighborhood investments in underserved communities. We know that our housing policies are far from meeting the needs of our lowest-income New 10 11 Yorkers, but requiring targets for income-restricted

and supportive housing at the Community District

level can get us closer to the goal.
