Reverand Dr. Victor A. Brown serves as a senior minister at 6 7 Mt. Sinai United Christian Church, located in the New Brighton/Tompkinsville section of Staten Island, 8 my district. I have had the distinct pleasure of addressing his congregation of amazing islanders. 10 11 Bishop Victor A. Brown is the Suffragan Bishop and founding board member of the Worldwide Fellowship of 12 13 Independent Christian Churches, Incorporated. Bishop 14 Brown is a former Adjunct Professor of Preaching at 15 New York Theological Seminary. Additionally, in special significance to me as the Public Safety 16 17 Chair, Bishop Brown holds the rank of Inspector of 18 the New York City Police Department in the Chaplains 19 Bishop, we thank you for your service and 20 comfort to our men and women. Moreover, Bishop Brown 21 is the Protestant Chaplain of Staten Island 2.2 University Hospital and serves on the foundation 2.3 there. Bishop Brown is also a member of the Mayor's Commission of Religious Leaders. Lastly, Bishop 24 Brown is the founder of the Mt. Sinai Center for 25

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SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you so much, Majority Leader.

And good afternoon, everyone, with the election now over, I want to begin by congratulating all of you on your campaigns, and thanking the millions of New Yorkers who showed up to participate in local democracy. At the same time, though, we do acknowledge the low voter participation rate, it demonstrates that there is significant work to be done to increase civic participation in our city.

Earlier this month, our city lost 46-year-old Francisco Lumbreras. Francisco was a cement truck driver with Teamsters Local 282, and my heart is with his loved ones as they heal from this horrifying tragedy.

This week, 73-year-old Maria Rodriguez was fatally struck by a school bus in Council Member Ariola's district after dropping her grandchildren off at school. She was a beloved mother and grandmother who was known as the matriarch of her family. My prayers are truly with Maria's family and neighbors as they grieve from this tragic loss.

Over the last two weeks we lost several residents to fatal fires that have unfortunately become far too

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common in our communities. We lost a 78-year-old man to a house fire in Council Member Carr's district; a

4 resident in Council Member Moya's district; another

5 resident in Council Member Riley's district; and

6 three members of multiple generations in a single

7 | family to a lithium ion battery fire in Council

8 Member Ossé's district. Fire safety has been one of

9 the Council's top priorities, and we know there is

10 | far more work to be done to achieve the progress and

11 safety that New Yorkers deserve.

November 19th is World Day of Remembrance for road traffic victims when we remember the victims of traffic violence. We lose too many residents to preventable traffic crashes each year, which underscores the importance of the work ahead to make our streets safer for pedestrians, cyclists, drivers, and all road users alike. Today we are passing several bills that advance the shared goal to address traffic violence in our city.

On November 20th our nation will observe will

Trans Day of Remembrance, which honors those we have
lost to anti-trans violence. It also marks the end
of Trans Awareness Week during which we highlighted
the visibility, experiences, and ongoing challenges

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facing our trans communities. As a city, we remain focused on supporting and uplifting all LGBTQIA+ New Yorkers. We will continue to prioritize their health, safety, and well-being.

November 22nd is Lebanese Independence Day, and the 30th is Barbados Independence Day. I wish all New Yorkers who are celebrating a Happy Independence Day.

As we celebrate Thanksgiving next week, I hope everyone has a happy and safe holiday spent with loved ones. I am thankful for all of you and the hard work that you and your teams have done to serve the people of this city.

Don't forget to shop small on Small Business
Saturday and donate to your favorite charities on
Giving Tuesday.

Introduction 348-A, sponsored by Majority Leader Keith Powers, this bill would provide that bank fees and credit card processing fees paid by a campaign for contributions received by the campaign would not

count against the expenditure limitation for that campaign. While this bill is effective immediately, it would apply to expenditures made before the effective date that are in furtherance of an election occurring after the most recent general election. We thank very much our staff member Jayasri Ganapathy.

Introduction 564-A, sponsored by Council Member Tiffany Cabán, bill would require the Department for the Aging (DFTA) to establish a commission focused on identifying ways to improve the quality of life for older adults who identify as LGBTQIA+ or any other diverse sexual orientation or gender identity. The commission's goals are to identify challenges, share best practices, and develop expert recommendations for LGBTQIA+ older adults. The commission would be required to submit two reports: the first report no later than one year after the appointment of all commission members, and an additional report no later than two years after submission of the first report. Thank you to our staff members Christopher Pepe and Sahar Moazami.

Introduction 511-A, sponsored by Council Member Althea Stevens, would require the City Chief Procurement Officer to conduct a study and issue a

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traverse, and have disreputably high rates of

21 report on the timing and duration of the City's procurement process for human services contracts. The report would identify the steps in the procurement process for these contracts and evaluate the time needed to complete each step. It would provide recommendations to the Procurement Policy Board (PPB) for setting procurement timelines as required under the City Charter. The PPB would then review the report and propose rules establishing procurement timelines for human services contracts. The bill would also mandate that the Chief Procurement Officer begin issuing biannual reports starting in October 2026 on agency compliance with the time schedules set by the PPB. Thank you to staff members Alex Paulenoff and Alex Yablon.

Introduction 708-A, sponsored by Council Member Alexa Avilés, this bill would require the Department of Transportation ("DOT") to redesign the city's truck route network to improve safety, increase visibility, reduce traffic congestion, and reduce vehicle miles traveled. The overhaul would also address health equity issues for low income communities of color, which truck routes often

2 respiratory illnesses from exposure to pollutants.

3 In redesigning the network, this bill would require

4 DOT to consult with City agencies, community boards

5 and business improvement districts, and

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6 representatives from businesses, environmental and

7 climate justice organizations, street safety

8 organizations, and the trucking, logistics and last-

9 mile delivery industries. The bill would also require

10 that DOT assess whether daylighting or daylighting

11 | barriers should be implemented at intersections on

12 | the truck route network, and review and replace truck

13 | route signage where necessary. Thank you to staff

14 members Mark Chen, John Basile, and Kevin Kotowski.

Introduction 1012-A, sponsored by Council Member Amanda Farías, would require the Departments of City Planning and Small Business Services, in coordination with the Economic Development Corporation, to develop a citywide industrial development strategic plan. The plan would need to be completed every eight years and include an overview of city policies to support and grow the industrial sector, an analysis of industrial sector economic trends and the role of the sector in achieving key policy objectives such as the

transition to green energy. I first proposed such a

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policy in the State of the City Address, because industrial jobs offer family sustaining wages and often do not require a college degree, making this sector a leading pathway for equitable economic mobility. They are also critical to help our city transition to green energy. However, our city has lacked a cohesive strategy to cultivate industrial business growth, which has hampered their ability to thrive. With the passage of this legislation, our city can properly invest in the industrial sector, unlocking doors of opportunity for New Yorkers and creating pathways for success. Council Member Farías turned the idea into concrete legislation and carries it forward. We thank our staff members Brian Paul, Alex Paulenoff, and William Hongach.

And, finally, we will be voting on Introduction 1031-A, my Fair Housing Framework legislation, that will help in the efforts to address our city's housing crisis through the lens of equity. This bill would require city agencies to create and submit to a fair housing assessment and plan every five years. The assessment would include a citywide fair housing plan that would be coordinated with the requirements of the federal Fair Housing Act. Following this, the

1 2 city would produce an assessment of long-term 3 citywide housing needs, five-year housing production targets for each local community district level, and 4 a strategic equity framework that would report on the progress made towards the housing targets as well as 6 the obstacles and strategies for achieving them. plan would also focus on the production and 8 preservation of affordable housing, anti-displacement resources, and neighborhood investments for 10 11 underserved communities. The City would produce 12 annual reports on its progress. This legislation will help our city's efforts to stem the housing 13 14 crisis by facilitating increased housing production 15 that is equitable and focused on the needs of all New 16 Yorkers by building and preserving more affordable 17 housing and identifying the investments needed to 18 promote opportunity in our neighborhoods. It will 19 serve as an important tool of transparency and 20 accountability that help us address the housing crisis with clarity about the obligations and needs 21 of every community district. 2.2

We need every neighborhood to do its fair share to confront the City's housing crisis. Through our collective efforts we can invest holistically in the

COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you, I am so excited about the passage of Introduction 708-A. too long, outer borough communities of color and low income communities, districts like mine, have not received their fair share of the City's investment and attention towards transportation. That includes addressing the impacts of truck traffic. Our community deals with noise, air pollution, congestion, and illegal parking that turns quiet residential streets into lots for tractor trailers. Moreover, truck traffic persists in communities where high rates of respiratory illnesses, like asthma, are common due to the emission of truck exhaust. New York City's truck route network is supposed to help minimalize the negative affects of truck traffic on communities. But, our truck route network has not been overhauled since the 1970's. It is time for a

redesign. So, I want to congratulate Council Member Avilés on the passage of Introduction 708, to require the Department of Transportation ("DOT") to redesign the city's truck route network to improve safety, increase visibility, reduce traffic congestion, and reduce vehicle miles traveled. The measure also mandates the DOT to center neighborhood environmental and industry voices in developing the new plan. know many truckers live in our neighborhoods, and we seek sustainable solutions that benefit communities and workers alike. I want to thank Gloria Boyce-Charles and Barbara Brown of the Eastern Queens Alliance, William Perkins, and the entire Queens Community Illegal Truck Parking Taskforce, and the entire South East Queens community for their advocacy on this issue. We need to address this problem and ensure that communities are not unduly burdened by truck traffic. And, with that, I encourage my colleagues to vote aye on this important piece of legislation, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now go to Council Member Cabán, followed by Council Member Stevens.

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COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. Our city has always been a leader in the fight for dignity and freedom for queer people. After all, the modern queer liberation movement was born with a riot on Christopher Street. And, sadly, too many from the Stonewall generation are no longer with us. And to honor them, the movement for queer liberation must support our elders before they become our ancestors. Queer elders deserve to live and grow old with dignity, with comfort, with joy, with family, and with love, but with something else as well stewardship of our culture. And we deserve to be in rich community with our elders, so that they are able to pass along their stories and teachings to help us build a society where we are all free to be who we are.

Earlier this year, my LGBTQIA+ Caucus co-chair,

Council Member Crystal Hudson and I, released the

Marsha and Sylvia plan in honor of Marsha P. Johnson

and Sylvia Rivera. In it, we called for a commission

within the Department for the Aging, charged with

helping our city improve the quality of life for

LGBTQIA+ older adults. By passing today's

legislation, we will create that commission, and I

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look forward to remaining involved with the
Administration next session, helping to identify
commissioner appointments and developing requirements
for their report. This legislation would not have
been possible without tireless advocacy from directly
impacted individuals, steadfast organizations like
SAGE, AARP, Callen-Lord, DOROT, LiveOn NY, NYLAG,
Stonewall Community Development Corporation, VNS

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: As chair of the Youth
Services Committee, longtime nonprofit worker, and
advocate, I am honored to pass legislation that is a
small step towards enhancing efficiency,
transparency, and accountability in the procurement
process of the human services sector in the City.
Introduction 511 would require the City Chief
Procurement Officer to conduct a study and issue a
report on the timing and duration of the City's
procurement process for human services contracts

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exceeding the small purchase limit. The report would identify the steps in the procurement process for these contracts and evaluate the time needed to complete each step. It would provide recommendations to the Procurement Policy Board (PPB) for setting procurement timelines as required under the City Charter. It is an in depth examination that will allow us to identify any inefficiencies in this current process, ultimately working to streamline the process and ensure a timely delivery of services and money provided to nonprofit organizations that serve young people and families who need it the most. Our city cannot run without the work of the Human Service Sector, as in most cities, the most vulnerable time we have... As in most places the nonprofit sector shows up time and time again to do the job for our city. I am happy that, together, we are making significant strides and looking forward to partnering with the City to continue to streamline the procurement process for our city. I would like to thank all of my colleagues and staff counsel, Alex Paulenoff, for your tireless work to get this bill to a place that we could live with. Thank you all, and I encourage everyone to vote aye.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now hear from Council Member Farías, followed by Council Member Avilés.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Thank you, Majority

It is what you have all been waiting for, Introduction 1012-A, the industrial sector is critical to our city's economy infrastructure and daily and functioning. Industrial jobs offer pathways to the middleclass for hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers, for the workforce that is over 80% people of color and majority immigrant New Yorkers. However, from zoning and land use policies to economic development programs, efforts to support industrial businesses in New York City have remained siloed and uncoordinated for far too long. There is also a lack of recent comprehensive data and analysis to inform policy making. That is why my legislation Introduction 1012-A, which we will voting on today, is so critical for our city and our economy. bill requires city agencies to not just study current city policies to grow the industrial sector, but actually come up with a plan and coherent strategy to incentivize industrial development and jobs. We are now putting the tools in the City's hands to support,

1 2 with financial incentives, workforce and job training 3 programs and zoning. By taking a coordinated data 4 driven approach to sustaining and growing the City's 5 industrial businesses and jobs, this legislation will offer long overdue support to a vital sector of our 6 7 economy and to the industrial business zones and workers throughout our districts. Thank you to 8 Speaker Adams, for your leadership, and to all the cosponsors of this bill, and especially to my co-10 11 prime sponsor, Council Member Gutiérrez, as the 12 first Bronxites and Latino to chair the Committee on 13 Economic Development, I am proud to get this win for 14 workers in my district and across the city. Finally, 15 thank you to the Economic Development Committee 16 Counsel, Alex Paulenoff, Director Land Use, Perris 17 Straughter, Brian Paul, Julia Urhman (phonetic), and 18 William Vidal, from the Land Use Division, for all of 19 your hard work on this bill. And a huge thank you to 20 our advocates in this sector for their support and 21 their long-fought fight for this to become a reality. 2.2 Thank you so much. I hope that other council members will join us in our growing M Zone Coalition, which is working to protect these districts, thousands of jobs, and this vital industry.

And I am also excited to pass a biometric tax credit today, which underscores the City's commitment to manufacturing. Introduction 1070 enables investors and owners of qualified smaller and emerging biotech companies to claim a tax credit, which will support increased manufacturing, job creation, and innovation with the City. 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team who played a vital role in helping us get to
where we're at. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you, my colleagues. I rise for the importance of the Fair Housing Plan. I think this plan is an important step in the right direction. But, we have to be vigilant in our examination of the City of Yes Plan by the Mayor, which I think is a City of No. It benefits developers more than it does the residents. We also have to be very, very cautious of the inflationary rate of the What you are passing right now for the area median income, which is 60%, we says it's affordable today, but when these buildings and projects are built five years from now, when the AMI climbs by 20 and 30 and 40% -- 60% is not going to be affordable in our neighborhoods. So, when we are passing our development projects for affordable housing, we have to go lower. We have to go to 30 and 40% of the AMI, because 60% is affordable today -- in some communities -- and won't be affordable tomorrow.

The other thing we have to look out for is the

mandatory inclusion housing. We are talking about

Allow me to thank the New York Lawyers for the Public Interest, New York Immigration Coalition, Make the Road New York, co-prime sponsors, Council Member Schulman and Council Member Hanif, and Legislative Counsel, Margaret Lyford (phonetic), for their support and all of the legislative team, thank you, Jeremy [INAUDIBLE], all of you who supported and made sure that we are addressing inequity. all of my colleagues to support this legislation. Together, we can make a commitment [TIMER CHIMES] to
