CHAIRPERSON JOSEPH: [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome, everyone, to today's Committee on Education vote on two very important bills.

First, Introduction number 3, sponsored by Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala. The Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to responding to students in emotional crisis in public schools. As young people throughout the nation are experiencing a high rise in mental health crisis, we must ensure that precinct officers and school safety agents do not employ a law enforcement response that can potentially escalate the situation and compound the trauma of a child in emotional distress. This bill will help ensure the police respond to students in emotional crisis appropriately so that they can feel safe in the school and thrive.

| we will also be voting on introduction               |
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| 542 sponsored by Council Member Mercedes Narcisse, a |
| local law to amend the Administrative Code of the    |
| City of New York in relation to requiring The        |
| Department of Education and Administration for       |
| Children's Services to report on educational         |
| programming for juvenile delinquents, juvenile       |
| offenders, and adolescent offenders. Such a report   |
| would provide valuable data on how the city can      |
| better serve these vulnerable students when they     |
| enter detention and place them on a path towards     |
| academic success when they exit.                     |

The Committee previously heard testimony on Introduction number 3 as part of an October 25th hearing on new safety initiatives in New York City public schools, and Introduction 542 at our October 13th hearing on education programming in detention facilities.

I encourage all of my Colleagues to vote yes on these important bills.

| reiterate that, for me, this is not an anti-NYPD      |
| bill, but rather an acknowledgment that the DOE       |
| continues to utilize and abuse the practice of        |

| brown kids in, communities like mine whose first      |
| interaction with the police is not a positive one,    |
| but rather one that. That really traumatizes young    |
| people unnecessarily, and so I'm hoping that this     |
| bill would, one, prevent the handcuffing of children, |
| but also opens up a conversation with the DOE about   |
| their own internal policies and how detrimental they  |
| are to the emotional health of young people in our    |
| schools.  |
