3	CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Good morning
4	everybody, anybody and welcome to the meeting on the
5	Subcommittee on Zoning and Franchises as I am Council
6	Member Barry Grodenchik and I will pinch hitting
7	today for Chair Moya who could not be here today. At
8	this time, we are joined by my colleague, Chair of
9	the Public Safety Committee, Donovan Richards. Today
10	we will be holding a hearing on the New York City
11	Police Department's 116 th precinct site selection
12	application, LU 61 and 62. This application for site
13	selection in acquisition of a police precinct station
14	house is accompanied by an application for a zoning
15	change map to map a C1-3 commercial overlay into an
16	existing R-32 district. The property is located at
17	242-20 North Conduit Avenue in Council Member
18	Richard's district in Queens. The proposed actions
19	would allow for the construction of a new 116 th
20	police precinct on an existing parking lot that is
21	currently accessory to the existing facility. At this
22	time, I would like to ask Councilman Richards if he
23	has any remarks he would like to make?

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Yes, sir. Thank you Chair Grodenchik and what a historic day for all

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CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Eastern Queens.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: In Eastern Queens, I always say Northern but Eastern Queens and this precinct has been discussed and lobbied for, for the past 40 to 50 years so five decades, I wasn't even born when the lobbying started for this precinct but today I'm, I'm overjoyed to really see this particular step being taken to really start to address many of the public safety concerns that the communities of Laurelton, Rosedale and Springfield Gardens have endured for a very long time, we have some of the longest response times and this precinct is going to, to work to ensure that we can improve those response times. And more importantly in this day and age where we're talking about community and police relations really ensuring that the community will have adequate resources and adequate staffing right in their community is going to really ensure that we combine the community together with the police department in a way that we haven't seen in the 105 precinct for a very long time, not to say that the 105 doesn't try but with limited resources

1 2 and the particular lane mileage that the precinct 3 covers it almost makes it impossible for the officers to really come out and build a, a real relationship 4 5 with the community. So, there are lot of people to thank, first obviously Council Member Grodenchik 6 7 who's really been a steadfast partner, all of the elected officials from Southeast Oueens who've been 8 fighting for this for 40 years, to the community, 9 community board 13 to some of the leaders from 10 Laurelton, Bess DeBetham who could not be here today, 11 12 the civic associations, whether it's the Federated 13 Blocks of Laurelton, concerned citizens of Laurelton, 14 the Rosedale civic association led by Marcia O'Brien 15 these are all of the individuals who really played a 16 huge roll in, in getting this precinct over the line. So, I want to thank the NYPD, I want to thank the 17 18 police commissioner and I also have to thank the Mayor, you know the Mayor who... I mean we had so many 19 20 Mayors who've come to Southeast Queens over the last 40 years making promises and did not keep the 21 2.2 promises and spoke of how important it was to make 23 sure a public safety was happening in our community but this Mayor really delivered and really he's to be 24

commended for this so I want to thank you Chair, I'm

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going to turn it back over to you, I want to thank my staff who've worked on this and all of the Land Use staff who also has played a, a roll in this. So, I look forward to the start of our conversation and, and certainly passing this eventually so thank you.

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK:

Councilman Richards and just before I open the public hearing I want to thank somebody who hasn't been thanked and that's Councilman Richards who since he has gotten into the council has been the leading proponent for a new station house in Southeast Queens. We're going to hear later from former Chair of Community Board 13, Richard Hellenbrecht who's here with us this morning. I want to thank the community board for their steadfast... I was in Jamaica High School when they started so I'm a little older than you, but I want to thank them for their steadfast support for this project and their advocacy. We've had a number of Chairs over the years, Richard being one of them, the late Sona Rica [sp?] being another, Bryan Block and now we have our current Chair Clive Davidson, they have fought as have... all the civics up and down Eastern Queens from North Shore Towers this, this precinct, the 105

Shore Towers all the way down to the little community of Meadowmere which is tucked in underneath JFK

Airport and surrounded by Nassau County on just about every side and so it's a long run for the 105, the

Cross Island Parkway especially at rush hour, it's almost always jammed and there aren't many ways to get up and down the spine of eastern Queens. So, I am delighted, I also of course have to thank Mayor De

Blasio, he put his money where his mouth is, 70

million dollars to get us off the ground here so we look forward to a discussion this morning but at this time I am going to open up the public hearing on Land Use Number 61 and 62 and I am going to call the first panel which is Mr. Philip Heller who is Director of

precinct, the current precinct stretches from North

Capital Construction for the New York City Police

Department. I'm going to ask the counsel to... she'll

do what she has to do, she's going to swear you in.

PHILIP HELLER: My name is Philip Heller.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Do you swear or affirm that the testimony you're about to give will be the

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truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth and that you will answer all questions truthfully?

PHILIP HELLER: Yes. Good morning Chair Grodenchik and members of the council. I am Philip Heller, Director of NYPD's Capital Construction Unit. On behalf of Police Commissioner James P. O'Neill I am pleased to testify before your subcommittee today to discuss the NYPD's new 116th precinct. During the course of NYPD's long and rich history the department has been a pioneering leader in creating, identifying and implementing the best and most successful training and policing practices. When we have new facilities constructed they are built to the state of the art at that time designed to meet the needs of the department, it's brave officers and the communities we serve. The same can be said for our delineation of, of precinct boundaries, this does not mean that we should remain static. The evolution of technology, policing methods and community needs as well as population growth, population concentrations and general development of the city to name a few necessitates a regular re-examination of the department's approach, existing facilities, staffing, resources and policing methods. What was once state

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of the art becomes dated, what was once sufficient becomes less so and what was once effective must give way to a fresh approach. Under this administration this department has been diligent in examining the way we police in the 21st century, our philosophy, our staffing needs, our equipment and our facilities. When it comes to the department's physical infrastructure we improve it where we can and replace it where we must. The new 116th precinct will be the... will be the latest example of an innovative approach to building police facilities by including nearly 1,000 square feet of space dedicated for community use, this is a physical expansion of our neighborhood policing model where police can be more fully integrated into the community. Neighborhood policing is the cornerstone of today's NYPD. The foundation of this philosophy is building relationships, increasing communication and creating partnerships with members of the community. It is a joint effort to decrease crime, a partnership with the community we proudly serve. By sharing space our officers will be more in touch with what is happening in the community and will be able to work more effectively with our community partners. Furthermore the 116th precinct is

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 a necessary step in streamlining the NYPD's 2 3 operations in Southeast Queens. As the population has grown and shifted the burden of the 105th precinct 4 has increased, it is one of the city's largest 5 precincts requiring officers to cover 12.43 square 6 7 miles of land and 354 miles or roadway, as a result response times in the 105th precinct are 8 approximately two minutes longer than the city 9 average. The new 116th precinct will cover a little 10 more than half of the 105th precinct's current 11 12 territory which we believe will not only help lower response times but will also enable our officers to 13 14 more effectively respond to community needs and build 15 the necessary relationships that neighborhood policing calls for. I'll now go through the 16 17 presentation and welcome any questions from Council 18 Members at the conclusion of this presentation. Here we go. So, first just a little bit about the 19 20 location, the site is in far Southeast Queens, you see the, the image on the right shows the actual site 21 2.2 adjacent to the Rosedale Long Island railroad 23 station, I see the Belt Parkway very close by. So, we're building as Council Member Grodenchik said, 24

we're, we're building on a parking lot which is

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 adjacent to our existing building, we're calling 3 this... the existing building is the 105th precinct annex. Currently officers serving the Southern 4 sectors of the 105 turn out of this building what that means is that there's essentially just a locker 6 7 room in that building, the officers report to work here. This does not have the full functions of a 8 police precinct station. So, by having the, the 9 parking lot adjacent to this existing building it 10 gave us an opportunity to build. This is just some 11 12 scenes of the surrounding neighborhood, it's a very 13 small-scale neighborhood; one, two story homes, 14 single family homes. This is a diagram that the 15 architects put together. Just talking a little bit 16 about the, the nature of the neighborhood and also 17 the relationships. Again, that relation... that 18 combination of bringing the police and the community together via a mediator and civic connector so this 19 20 is manifested in the design of the building as well as in our programs. The overall diagram of the 21 2.2 building is such that we have the police functions 23 which are essentially the blue bar in this diagram and then the community functions which is the, the 24

sort of yellow bar, these both face a public plaza

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 which will be designed in between the existing 105 3 annex building and our new building provides again that civic public space for that connection between 4 the NYPD and the ... and the community. There's a 5 6 community room you'll note at the corner directly 7 facing this plaza and we'll see a little bit more about that in the design. So, the design of the ... of 8 the precinct is, is the, the blue shape in this 9 diagram, we... when we placed the building here we 10 obviously needed to relocate some of the existing 11 12 parking, so we are in an arrangement with the 13 Department of Transportation to utilize a portion of 14 their parking lot which is to the West across Francis 15 Lewis Boulevard. This is a monthly commuter lot which 16 is underutilized, so we have an arrangement with them 17 to use this for off street parking. We are also 18 increasing our off-street parking by providing a parking lot directly in front of the existing 105 19 20 annex building and we have surface parking directly behind and actually underneath our new building so 21 2.2 there's actually two rows of parking directly behind 23 our building and then you also see the new public open space and plaza. Important to note is that 24

directly adjacent to our existing building is the

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Long Island Railroad entrance to the Rosedale Station, this is the only accessible entrance to that train station, we will maintain that entrance as an extension of our public plaza. In terms of the floor plans we... our, our current NYPD standard program for a new precinct is about 45,000 square feet, this is when many of our buildings are in the 20,000 square foot range so this really does provide a model for modern policing. We... we're locating the main entrance directly off the, the public plaza, we also have the community room directly adjacent to the public plaza, so this is really a physical manifestation of neighborhood policing the fact that the community room is directly adjacent to the exterior and has its own dedicated entrance which is on the, the top side of this plan. So, entrances are available from the lobby of the police station but also from the ... directly from the outside. Otherwise this, this contains the community itself, the muster community room and all of the police functions. The second floor of the building, the... is essentially offices and mechanical space, the more public offices which would be community affairs, the NCOs and precinct planning are directly at the front of the building

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 again adjacent to that public plaza. The detectives, 3 detective suite is at the North side in that shaded area. Mechanical rooms are provided on the South side 4 as a buffer partly for the community but also for the 5 building itself, a buffer really to the Long Island 6 7 railroad. And finally, in the... in the basement, the locker rooms and incoming utility services. So, I'll 8 emphasize that the, the renderings that we're seeing 9 are, are about three months old, this is part of our 10 ULURP presentation, the, the design has actually 11 12 advanced guite a bit beyond this, but this gives an 13 overall idea as a diagram of the importance of the 14 community room and the importance of openness for the 15 police station. It's a two-story building, we 16 anticipate that it will be a rhythm of pre-cast panels, pre-cast concrete panels and glass 17 18 emphasizing that need for privacy and security but also openness to the community. Finally, a, a rough 19 20 idea of what the building will start to look like from the plaza, community room is on the left side 21 2.2 and the NYPD entrance is directly in front of you in 23 this diagram and this will be developed to offer their interims of the actual design. And finally, if 24

we're on the, the train platform of the Rosedale

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CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Just a, a couple of questions. Of course, the... I announced this at the 105-precinct community council, I took one question after everybody cheered and they wanted to know how long it would take so that's really at the top of our minds.

PHILIP HELLER: Yes, how long it will take. So, we're currently in design right now, we're in design development which means essentially, we're really working on the, the overall interior layout, the mechanicals etcetera. We... design will be complete February of next year, February of 2019, we... following that we... there's a bid period so we anticipate award of a construction contract about November of next year, November 2019. We currently show a construction completion in roughly April of 2022, we're keen on trying to shorten that as much as possible to get it within the calendar year of 2021.

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: That would be wonderful. The glass of course that you have will be bullet proof and as proof as can be?

2	PHILIP HELLER: Yes, so our, our
3	requirements for new police stations is that at the
4	first-floor level we require bullet resistance on, on
5	all surfaces so for example the community room itself
6	will be bullet resistant, all the… all the main
7	entrances and the community rooms. We there are
8	blast requirements we have as well which means no
9	operable windows on the first floor, we do… we are
10	thinking about operable windows on the second floor
11	just in terms of mechanical balancing it kind of
12	works but bullet resistance is, is required of the
13	first floor
14	CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Thank you very
15	much, Mr. Richards.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Alrighty, I'm
17	ready. Thank you Chair Grodenchik. Alrighty, so I'll
18	start and very obviously pleased to see the lactation
19	room added too and I think that [cross-talk]
20	PHILIP HELLER: Yes, that's [cross-talk]
21	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:that's, that's
22	great… [cross-talk]

PHILIP HELLER: ...that's... yes.

[cross-talk] 5 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...most 6 7 communities have when it comes to any precincts coming in is, is how parking will work... [cross-talk] 8 PHILIP HELLER: Absolutely... [cross-talk] 9 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...so how many 10 parking spots on and off street... [cross-talk] 11 12 PHILIP HELLER: Right... [cross-talk] 13 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...parking 14 spaces? 15 PHILIP HELLER: So, currently what we're 16 looking at is 163 off street parking spaces, this is 17 a combination of the parking that's actually on site 18 so there's parking directly below and behind our building, the parking that's directly in front of the 19 20 105 annex, there's an existing surface parking lot which you see on the left hand of the slide... [cross-21 2.2 talk 23 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Uh-huh... [cross-24 talkl

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2	PHILIP HELLER: It's actually a DOT
3	controlled lot, there's about 25 spaces there as well
4	as the, the parking that I mentioned on the West side
5	of Francis Lewis Boulevard so that's roughly 40-ish
6	spaces in that location.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: And that's
8	[cross-talk]
9	PHILIP HELLER: Total 163.
10	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: And you have a
11	formal agreement with DOT?
12	PHILIP HELLER: We're we are finalizing
13	that formal agreement, we have every documentation
14	about the, the agreement we just need to finalize
15	exactly what format it takes.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay. Let's
17	talk about jobs and MWBE goals, will there be local
18	hiring opportunities through this process and, and
19	what's your organization, is it Hire NYC or who
20	[cross-talk]
21	PHILIP HELLER: Right [cross-talk]
22	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:will be
23	handling… [cross-talk]

PHILIP HELLER: So, I, I would defer to Department of Design and Construction for the

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1	COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS
2	specifics of that, but I do know they, they do have
3	MB MWBE requirements, I, I don't know the specific
4	numbers for that, Department of Design and
5	Construction administers the contracts for those, but
6	they could provide the information [cross-talk]
7	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: So, if they
8	could you could have them reach out so [cross-talk]
9	PHILIP HELLER: Sure… [cross-talk]
10	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:we can have a
11	deeper conversation about that. Wanted to know
12	obviously there's going to be plaza space, so this
13	space will be open to the community?
14	PHILIP HELLER: Yes.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Alrighty and
16	can you go through maintenance and programing so if
17	the community wanted to utilize the plaza space for
18	community events and, and who's going to obviously
19	maintain so we don't end up with a plaza that's
20	[cross-talk]
21	PHILIP HELLER: Right [cross-talk]
22	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:unkempt.
23	PHILIP HELLER: Absolutely, so the, the
24	entire facility is an NYPD facility that includes

the, the public plaza so we will be responsible for

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 maintenance of everything in that plaza. In terms of ... in... the plaza and the community room. In terms of 3 programming we really anticipate that the local 4 command and community members jointly work out the 5 6 programing requirements. We... what we... what we've done 7 is to build into the infrastructure opportunities for security and openness essentially so there are doors 8 which can be locked, you know after hours if the... if, 9 if the decision is that the community room is not 10 accessible which we would probably anticipate, you 11 12 know that's, that's possible, we'll have cameras at the exterior as well but it's really up to the, the 13 14 local command and the community to figure out exactly 15 how it's programed. I will say that the ... what we're 16 really providing is a smaller room than the muster 17 room so typically the muster room is about 2,000 square feet... [cross-talk] 18 19 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay... [cross-20 talk] PHILIP HELLER: ...this is often where we 21 2.2 hold precinct community council meetings... [cross-23 talk 24 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Uh-huh... [cross-

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talkl

PHILIP HELLER: ...the community room is smaller, 800 to 900 almost 1,000 square feet so we don't anticipate that level of activity in that room, but it can be formal meetings, it can be very informal activities as well so we're really leave... it's, it's an open floor, there's no fixed furniture in that so the possibilities are kind of open and endless.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Can you speak to the boundary so which areas... [cross-talk]

PHILIP HELLER: Right... [cross-talk]

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...will the 116th

14 cover?

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PHILIP HELLER: So, the, the planning for this precinct is that it will cover, cover in general the Southern sectors of the 105, the exact precinct boundaries haven't been determined yet they will be determined as we get closer to actually opening but that is the general premise is the Southern portion of the 105.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: So, Laurelton, Rosedale, Springfield Garden...

PHILIP HELLER: Certainly, those neighborhoods, yes.

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay... 3 PHILIP HELLER: The actual Northern 4 boundary we have discussed up to... there's the 5 cemetery, Montefoire cemetery I think... [cross-talk] 6 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay... [cross-7 talk PHILIP HELLER: ...up in that vicinity is... 8 [cross-talk] 9 10 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay, got it ... [cross-talk] 11 PHILIP HELLER: ...kind of where we saw... 12 13 [cross-talk] 14 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Of course... 15 [cross-talk] 16 PHILIP HELLER: ...just based on current 17 sector boundaries so... but that's to be finalized. 18 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Right and what impacts on the 105 and, and can you speak to sort of 19 20 what, what benefit ... can you speak to the benefits of bringing this local precinct like what... you know 21 2.2 straight benefits? 23 PHILIP HELLER: So, so one is just 24 response times very clearly while, while we do have 105 officers who turn out here who begin their tour 25

that particular area need curbing and repaving so

[cross-talk] 4 5 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...so, so has DOT shown a commitment to addressing some of the 6 7 underlying issues in this... [cross-talk] PHILIP HELLER: Right... [cross-talk] 8 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...part of the 9 10 community? 11 PHILIP HELLER: Right, so there have been 12 conversations with the Department of Transportation 13 about, about fixing a lot of streets, curbs, etcetera 14 in the neighborhood, we... we're not directly involved 15 in that, we, we fully endorse any repairs that 16 can be made in these... in, in the surrounding neighborhood, we, we're in conversation with them 17 18 about utilization of their lots which we're appreciative of, we really would not be able to do 19 20 this if that was not possible... COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Uh-huh, uh-huh... 21 2.2 [cross-talk] 23 PHILIP HELLER: We, we conducted a site search via... through DCAS for a city owned and 24

privately-owned sites and nothing was sufficient and

2	available so really DOT made this happen for us. The,
3	the existing DOT lot which is directly to the East of
4	our parking lot I know that there are there have
5	been discussed utilization plans by Department of
6	Transportation for safety city, I can't I can't
7	speak directly to the status of that project.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Okay, so before
9	we obviously pass this, you know we certainly want to
10	hear more concrete plans from DOT on [cross-talk]
11	PHILIP HELLER: Certainly [cross-talk]
12	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:the repaving,
13	the curbing and also some transportation studies for
14	that particular area, it is a, a [cross-talk]
15	PHILIP HELLER: Yes [cross-talk]
16	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:gateway to
17	Green Acres Mall so we get a… [cross-talk]
18	PHILIP HELLER: Yes [cross-talk]
19	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:a lot of
20	[cross-talk]
21	PHILIP HELLER: Yeah, we understand the
22	safety concerns [cross-talk]
23	COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS:a lot of
24	traffic there obviously consistently so we want to

make sure it's safe for officers as well.

Lastly, 5 I'll touch to any benefits for officers in this 6 7 precinct; is there a gym or any other amenities... [cross-talk] 8 PHILIP HELLER: Yes, so... [cross-talk] 9 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...for them... 10 [cross-talk] 11 12 PHILIP HELLER: Yes, so one is it's a 13 modern facility that's actually large enough to, to 14 suit their needs which is saying something for those 15 of you that have been to our facilities. So, the main 16 thing would be just openness and daylight, the first 17 thing, right so the ability to see outside from your 18 offices. Among other amenities, suitable... I'll just go to the cellar, suitable locker space... [cross-talk] 19 20 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Uh-huh... [cross-21 talk] 2.2 PHILIP HELLER: So, our locker 23 requirements are that they're, they're pretty large, we have a tactical bag which is very large so it's a 24

two foot by two-foot locker with a little bench

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 1 2 attached, also currently all officers have smart phones, so we provide power outlets in those lockers, 3 so the smart phones can be located there. about 45 years, been a member of Community Board 13
for 30 years just last year and been a Land Use Chair
for a, a good part of that and I'm very pleased to,
to be here today, this is a very happy occasion. I
know I speak for all of the civic associations both
North and South, we have all been for the whole 30
years that I've been involved this has always been
number one priority on the capital budget area and
everybody has been totally supportive of having a new
precinct in the South and we're very happy to see the
116 finally moving forward. I thank the, the Council
Members and I certainly thank the Mayor for stepping
up and, and moving with this. We've, we've had a lot
of tangles over the years with various people and,
and this, this is tremendous to move forward. My only
concern is the and it has been brought up before is
the parking and I was concerned when I saw the plans
and the layouts of the parking spaces and whatnot.
Knowing at the 105 parking is up on the sidewalk for
the most part if you go there which is [cross-talk]

2 CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Yes, it is...
3 [cross-talk]

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RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: ...not very attractive to the community and it's not very good use of the, you know public sidewalk.

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: It seems to be a common issue around precincts throughout the city of New York.

RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: I'm afraid it is... [cross-talk]

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Even... and, and the 105 is a low-density community as you know as is the site for the 116 but I was just near the $5^{\rm th}$ precinct and oh my god, much worse.

RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: Yeah, well... I'm hoping the 163 spaces that they've provided are going to be enough. I'm a little concerned that one of the parking spots... parking lots is pretty far removed across the street from the precinct and this might encourage police not to park there and park on the street instead, but I hope that, that we can police that and, and watch it very carefully. I was very pleased years ago to be at the groundbreaking of the satellite with Congressman Meeks and many, many other

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people and that has been a tremendous help to, to, to the North and the South, particularly the South and ... but it has not been the full answer so the only real answer is, is this full precinct so we look forward to that. As the Councilman, Chairman stated the 105th precinct, the Community Board 13 it's about 12 or 13 miles long and it's only about one to two miles wide in most places so it makes it very difficult. The precinct itself currently the 105 is located way at the North so to get from the North to the South with the Cross Island Parkway which is jammed most of the time it's, it's really almost impossible and takes a lot of time. When we first started this our statistics for response to, to crimes were the worst in the city, they may still be I haven't looked recently but I think this will go a long way towards fixing that. I think this will also help out the NCO program which is being implemented at the end of this month as a matter of fact in the 105 and I think that planning is going very well and, and will, will help everybody in the precinct. Again, I appreciate the cooperation of all of the civics, I was involved early on in the selection process as it moved forward I was not involved but, but certainly very happy and,

and worked with Bess DeBetham that was mentioned before, I know she's been a real lead on this. So, again I thank... I thank the Council Members, I look forward to seeing the design, the next level of the design that's coming up on May 7th and I look forward to being part of this process as it goes forward for the award of the contract and breaking ground and moving forward.

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CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Well we want to thank you for your advocacy this really has been a team effort all the way from North Shore Towers down to Meadowmere and every civic in between and some day if you're in my office I'll show you the responses I got from the civic leaders after I sent them an email and... at least in my community, I got like close to a dozen responses which were just, you know jaw dropping... [cross-talk]

RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: Yep... [cross-talk]

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: ...disbelief which

is how I reacted when I got the call from the

administration. I certainly... the points you brought

up we will certainly follow up on; parking of course

is a tremendous concern no matter where you are even

in... even in the, the less dense areas of Eastern

Mr. Richards, anything? 3 COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: 4 Thank you Richard and I want to thank the community board for 5 6 their partnership in getting this done. Once again 7 just pointing back to many years ago even before I was elected I remember this being the number one 8 priority for Community Board 13 so we look forward to 9 getting this done and, and obviously around the 10 issues of parking, I don't think they'll have a 11 12 choice but to park in that particular lot, lot so I'm 13 not really concerned about if they will, I don't 14 think they will really have a choice when they... when, 15 when these... the blocks are very narrow over there and 16 there's only so many spots to, to, to go by so... but 17 we hope that it'll be enough and hope is a... is a 18 strong word. So, thank you, thank you for your partnership and... [cross-talk] 19

RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: Thank you and... [cross-talk]

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...thank you for coming today... [cross-talk]

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RICHARD HELLENBRECHT:I think we've
probably set a record for passing under ULURP
[cross-talk]

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CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: It's gone quickly, yes... [cross-talk]

RICHARD HELLENBRECHT: ...it's gone very quickly and... [cross-talk]

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: ...shockingly so and... [cross-talk]

CHAIRPERSON GRODENCHIK: Also, we sit now know when city planning wants to really devote resources to things how quickly they can move so I think there's ups and downs in this but... but thank you.
