COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Good Afternoon everyone. I am Laurie Cumbo the Majority Leader of the New York City Council and we are pleased today to have Council Member Inez Barron recognized. Harriet A. Washington. Whoooo. [APPLAUSE]. The Council of the City of New York is proud to honor science

2 writer, editor, teacher, and ethicist Harriet A.

3 Washington for her outstanding activism that has

4 raised public awareness and advanced public discourse

5 | in New York and across the nation. It is a huge

6 honor for us to have you here today to celebrate your

7 | accomplishments, your challenges, and your triumphs

8 here in City Hall on this very auspicious occasion.

9 At this time, I would like to turn it over to Council

10 Member Inez Barron who has made this historical

11 moment possible. Ladies and gentlemen Council Member

12 Inez Barron. [APPLAUSE].

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INEZ BARRON: Thank you Council Member
Laurie Cumbo. We want to talk about the fact that we had a significant victory recently and what happened was that the statue of Dr. J. Marion Sims that was on Fifth Avenue and a hundred and something street,

103rd street is no longer there. [APPLAUSING]. It has been removed, so there has been a coalition of people, men and women who have come together over a period of time to talk about how we would make sure that this would happen, and this is not something that was a reaction to any other recent events in other parts of the country. In 2006 or 2007, Harriet Washington, the guest here wrote a book. She did

2	medical research, research medical journals in the
3	bowels of so many libraries across this country and
4	found first hand material that talked about the
5	atrocities, the horrors that were perpetrated on
6	African American men, women, and children during the
7	time that this country was coming out of its colonial
8	period, during the time that there was enslavement
9	and that these are people who form the basis of
10	experiments that were later translated and refined
11	into more specific techniques used on other people
12	with anesthesia and with their consent. So, she laid
13	out in her book the foundation for the protest that
14	took place and in 2008, Ms. Viola Plummer army of
15	one, or two, or three with her went and started
16	protesting. So, this is not something that just
17	started. It started back in 2008 protesting the
18	community said it was an insult. It was an insult to
19	have an honor and a tribute to this person in the
20	community. So, all of those people who are on that
21	commission, on our committee, raise your hand. We
22	have people here who have worked and met, or they
23	sent representatives and we met weekly and I have to
24	give Indigo[SP?] Washington a big shout out because
25	she coordinated that. She coordinated all of that.

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Yes, happy birthday. Her birthday was yesterday. So, we're so pleased that we have this opportunity as a legislative body of New York City to be able to recognize that. So, we're so pleased and is the clerk going to read the proc? Okay good, thank you. Thank you and we will now have the clerk read the proclamation.

CITY CLERK: Thank you, sorry. Council City of New York Proclamation. The Council of the city of New York is proud to honor science writer, editor, teacher, and ethicist Harriet A. Washington for her outstanding activism that has raised public awareness and advanced public discourse in New York and across the nation and whereas Ms. Washington has been a research fellow in medical ethics at Harvard Medical School. Visiting fellow at Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. A visiting scholar at the DePaul University College of Law and the senior research scholar at the National Center for Bioethics at Tuskegee University. Today, she teaches a Bioethics course at Colombia University. However, as Ms. Washington has written widely for popular and science publications and also authored the awardwinning book, Medical Apartheid the Dark History of

2	Experimentation from Colonial Times to the Present.
3	The research and background outlined in this book
4	prepared the ground work for activism by community
5	members, residents, and elected officials to reassess
6	the permanent statue of Dr. J. Marion Sims and
7	whereas, an addition to being the founder of the New
8	York Women's Hospital, Dr. J. Marion Sims was held as
9	the "father of American gynecology and a medical
10	hero". Although he died in 1883, Sims has been
11	immortalized for decades in medical textbooks and in
12	his towering bronze like this at the corner of 103 <sup>rd</sup>
13	street and fifth avenue, just across the street from
14	the New York Academy of Medicine. And whereas Ms.
	<del>-</del>
15	Washington has spent many months at the New York
16	Academy of Medicine researching her book perusing
17	antebellum medical journals and physician memoirs
18	that documented the enslavement and medical torture
19	of African Americans and the rational colony that
20	scientist of the era used to justify it. She also
21	learned of other statues of Sims and committed to
22	digging for a deeper truth and raise public
23	consciousness about his work. And whereas despite
24	Sim's contributions to the medical profession in both
25	surgery and gynecology, much of his work was made at

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2	the expense of a powerless population. He frequently
3	used and enslaved black women and while anesthesia
4	had recently become available, Sims did not use it
5	with his experimental subjects. And whereas, in the
6	words of Ms. Washington, "confederate generals or
7	physicians whose success was based on the savage
8	abuse of African Americans, we in the United States
9	have chosen to honor the perpetrators. More over the
10	erection of many such status correlates with terror
11	campaigns against African Americans. They are
12	symbols of racial power. Statues are raised to those
13	people a culture wants to honor and Plagues install
14	the commemorate victims have sometimes been placed in
15	less then conspicuous positions down playing past
16	wrongs. This is why the Sims statue must go. "As
17	the statues and portraits of Sims made clear, art can
18	create beautiful lies. To find the truth, me must
19	dig deeper and be willing to confront ugly facts. No
20	scientist, no thinking individual should be content
21	to accept pretty propaganda. And whereas on April
22	17, 2018, by the order of Mayor Bill deBlasio the New
23	York City Parks Department relocated the statue to
24	Greenwood Cemetery in Brooklyn where Sims is buried.
25	Now therefore be it known that the council of the

2 city of New York gratefully honors Harriet A.

3 Washington for her outstanding service which

4 continues to strengthen our city and the nation.

And that goes to speak to the type of man that Michael McSweeney is. The type of service that he has committed to our city for years and decades, and so I am extremely proud that Michael McSweeney is going to be reappointed City Clerk today and I want to turn it over to Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer who is - Mike is a constituent of his, to say a few words about a great public servant and our friend.

2	of life support. But the hospital asked him for
3	proof that they were married and asked for the
4	wedding certificate. They could not find the wedding
5	certificate. Obviously, it was very traumatic time.
6	They called me from the hospital. The only person I
7	could think to call was Mike McSweeney and I said
8	Mike, they need the wedding certificate to prove
9	they're married. I don't know if you can help.
10	Without missing a beat, on a Saturday morning, Mike
11	McSweeney said, Jimmy, I got this. Don't worry about
12	it. He left his home in Woodside, went all the way
13	down to lower Manhattan, made a photocopy and printed
14	out another copy of the wedding certificate and then
15	physically brought it to me in Sunnyside Queens. I
16	was then able to bring it to the hospital. Daniel
17	was able to take Lu off of life support and Lu died
18	shortly thereafter. I will never forget Mike
19	McSweeney's unbelievable act of kindness and
20	compassion. Making sure that the two men he married,
21	could also be at peace with one of their deaths. It

22	50A would authorize the installation of small wind
23	turbines designed to generate electricity along with
24	supporting structures. This would cover design
25	standards, wind speed, brakes and locks, visual

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2	setting the tone for what we should expect from all
3	buildings in New York City being fully powered by
4	renewable sources. Our bills today help us walk the
5	path by fifty and we want people to adopt the
6	technologies as soon as possible but we have to make
7	it easier. Too often when it comes to special
8	permits like currently exist for wind power,
9	residents don't want to deal with them. They see the
10	path and they see it to be to arduous. So, this
11	legislation today INTRO 48A creates a wind of

we know, many residential co-ops have multiple

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buildings on different tax marks and Local Law 87 requires each of them to submit separate reports with separate deadlines. This hazard filing system creates an administrative nightmare where management companies are constantly scrambling to meet deadlines for multiple buildings. Allowing residential co-ops to consolidate the energy efficiency reports. significantly we deal with this administrative burden for those [inaudible 58:27] properties. Looking to comply with Local Law 87. As residential co-ops are leading middle class [inaudible 58:36] for home ownership in many parts of the city. Especially the northeast Queens, this effort was streamline reporting and simplified paperwork for both the city and property owners. Ultimately this will cut the red tape by making it easier for more buildings to come into compliance with the cities sustainability laws which are so important in our modern and more mentally conscious cities. I would like to thank the Speaker, Chair Constantinides and his staff. I would also like to thank Jeff Baker and Ed Atkin, Samara Swanston, Nadia Johnson, John Sosa, Brendon McKinney and Megan Chin. Francisco and Boston created this residential parking system in the 1970's. Let's do it in New York City in 2018. A survey in 2013 conducted by NYU showed that a large majority of New Yorkers would like to see a residential parking system in our city and I hope to be working with my colleagues. The bill protects against discrimination on the bases of a sexual and reproductive health decisions which refer to any decision to receive services which are arranged for or offered while providing to individuals related to the reproductive system. It's not an invitation to grope and it's not an invitation for rape. doesn't matter what you are wearing, where you are, whether its in your workplace, your school campus, a park, a night club, no means no and today we as a City Council continue to elevate that message and through the recent package of legislation that we passed in terms of sexual harassment, we have made sure that we have sent the message loud and clear legislatively as well. So, I thank all of the individuals all across the world who have worn denim Who inspirit wore denim today and we must continue to raise this message and elevate those. Thank you.

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INTRO 3620 which is being sponsored by you, our Public Advocate and I'm happy to cosponsor it regarding onsite childcare for city employee's. too many New Yorkers don't have access to realistic child care options with the majority of families now in duel income households, we are long over due in the meaningful ways to address this issue. As you all know, I Chair the General Welfare Committee and spend a lot of time working with Advocates and the Administration to expand childcare resources for our cities residence, but its not enough. Too many people are caught in the middle and forced to make an impossible choice between caring for their children or their livelihood. In a city as great as New York, I know that we could do better, and we need to do So, as you all also know I am personally better. impacted by this issue. My wife and I have a wonderful daughter Francis and even with two of taking care of her, it's a lot and not everyone has that. So, it takes a village to raise a child. takes family members, love ones, and trusted adults to make sure that children have everything that they need to grow up. On site childcare options would open the door for countless New Yorkers to raise

It is my belief that the information will empower individual members to identify opportunities for the development of affordable housing in their respective districts and remain actively engaged and encouraging such properties to be developed responsibly based on unique needs of their respective districts. second bill I'm introducing today will streamline a submission and review process for alternative automatic fire extinguishing systems, fire alarm systems, and fire protection plans by consolidating these processes under the fire department. money and time for small business owners. consolidation of overlapping review and approval process is now performed by the Department of Buildings and the Fire Department is a part of cities small business first initiative. The purposed amendments to the administrative building mechanical and fire codes further the goal of streamlining the approval process for these systems to save small business owners time and money and enable them to begin operating sooner. The new process will be less burdensome for the business without sacrificing

PUBLIC ADVOCATE LETITIA JAMES: Thank you and our last speaker is Council Member Kallos.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Thank you Public Advocate James for introducing Bill 853. In relation to providing onsite childcare for city employees. I join with my father's caucus, Council Member Levin, and asking colleagues to please sign on. that this is something that is for everyone in this body who is a parent. Would like to be a parent. Who represents parents. In addition, some of you may have read I've been working with Council Member Espinal on the idea of reducing the number of plastic bottles in our waste stream. New York City contributes \$1 billion plastic bottles a year to the waste stream and so one idea would be to limit their sale just from the city. At least the city shouldn't purchase them here in the Council. We don't use plastic bottles. We haven't since Speaker Quin and we shouldn't use them in our parks. We shouldn't sell them in our parks and we figure if we can lead by example and do what San Francisco did I know that when I went there and couldn't buy a water bottle, I got a reusable bottle and kept using it for the rest of my time there and I still use one most of the time to this day. Additionally, we have other items
