

Testimony of Loree Sutton, MD (BG, USA, Ret.) Commissioner for the New York City Department of Veterans' Services (DVS)

New York City Council Committee on Veterans 14th Floor Committee Room, 250 Broadway October 29, 2018

Good morning Chair Deutsch and esteemed members of the New York City Committee on Veterans. My name is Loree Sutton and, as always, I am honored to serve as the founding Commissioner of The New York City Department of Veterans' Services (DVS). I am joined today by Deputy Commissioner Jeff Roth and Eric Henry, Director of Intergovernmental Affairs.

As Veterans Day approaches next month, including the myriad events occurring throughout the City of New York in November, DVS is excited to work together with our city partners to celebrate and honor the service of veterans, service members of all components and family members, locally and beyond. In particular, we invite everyone to participate in the annual New York City Veterans Day Parade, now known as America's Parade, organized by the United War Veterans Council (UWVC), on Sunday November 11th, 2018. I look forward to seeing many of you on this special day and throughout the month.

Today, I welcome the opportunity to discuss Local Law 23-2015, as well as the proposed Intro. 1118-2018. Before doing so, I would like to briefly highlight some of the ways DVS, since its transition from mayoral office to citywide department in 2016, has put tremendous effort into implementing best practices for connecting with NYC veterans, service members and families, including active engagement and assistance activities to improve the lives of our community.

DVS is proud to continue its City-wide presence, with satellite sites in each of the five boroughs featuring posted office hours to participation in events occurring at a variety of venues throughout the city. Through the agency's newly organized Engagement and Community Services (ECS) unit, Engagement Coordinators are trained to connect veterans and their families to trusted resources available through City, State, and Federal governments as well as community-based organizations drawing from the private, philanthropic and social sectors. In addition, DVS is committed to connecting Veterans and their families to City careers, services and resources through the DVS website for direct access to City job opportunities; collaborating with DCAS City-wide Recruitment/WorkForce1 and all sectors to identify HR best practices; and developing public-private partnerships aimed at enhancing business, educational, entrepreneurial and employment opportunities.

DVS also connects veterans and their families with opportunities to heal, to grow, and to thrive. As part of the First Lady of New York City's pioneering *ThriveNYC* mental health initiative, DVS has developed the *VetsThriveNYC* Core4 Whole Health Model™, which uses arts and education, peer-to-peer support, holistic services and clinical treatment to address the full impact war on the mind, body and spirit of veterans. DVS continues to administer the provisions of Local Law 42/2013 by providing trainings to City Agency Veteran Liaisons, such as Veteran Mental First Aid, also available to agencies, non-profits and veteran service organizations.

Working in collaboration with our city agency, federal government and community partners, DVS remains dedicated to effectively ending veteran homelessness in New York City. DVS's housing team continues to develop new housing resources and, using our peer to peer model, works directly with veterans in shelter to help navigate the housing search process in the City. This effort is supported by our in-house Aftercare Coordinator and constituent team that work day in and day out to prevent evictions and provide overall housing stability to formerly homeless and at-risk-veterans. I am delighted to share with you today that we have recently been approved to add another Veteran Peer Coordinator to the team. This will increase the number of veterans we move into permanent housing by an estimated 20%.

Another important partnership is DVS's strong working relationship with the City's Veterans Advisory Board (VAB), whose membership is currently in transition. We look forward to welcoming the upcoming round of Mayoral and Council appointments, soon to be announced. Appointed by the Mayor and Speaker, the VAB membership is carefully chosen to sustain a diverse range of service backgrounds, community engagement interests, borough representation and professional expertise to help facilitate dialogue with the New York City veterans' community.

Moving forward to the topics of today's hearing, I am pleased to discuss Local Law 23-2015, as well as the proposed Intro. 1118-2018.

Local Law 23 was introduced by Councilmember Paul Vallone, passed by the City Council and subsequently signed by the Mayor in 2015. This law annually requires the Mayor's Office of Operations to compile various information regarding veterans utilizing housing assistance through the Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD) and the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA), applying for civil service through the Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS), and applying for and receiving licensing permits through the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA) and the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH).

This information is useful in evaluating how many veterans are accessing our City government through these specific agencies, and DVS appreciates the work performed by our sister agencies in documenting this data. In reviewing this data from the past three calendar years (2014-2017), positive trend lines are noteworthy in two specific areas: 1) the number of veterans who have applied for employment with the City of New York through self-identification via their veterans' civil service credit; and 2) the number of veterans who have applied for and accessed our City's public housing stock. DVS is proud to work in collaboration with NYCHA, HPD and HRA to connect veterans with eligible subsidies with all applicable housing resources.

We look forward to working with our fellow agencies involved to evaluate all data presented through the most recent report and determining how the City of New York can best continue to gromote enhanced access to care, services and resources for its veteran community.

would also like to mention that DVS has partnered with the Mayor's Office of Operations to provide an opportunity for veterans to self-identify through Local Law 127-2016, which requires city agencies such as the Department of Social Services, the Administration for Children's Services, the Department of Homeless Services, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Department for the Aging, the Department of Youth and Community Development, and the Department of Education to provide to all persons served through these agencies with a demographic information survey that contains an option for multiracial ancestry or ethnic origin. This form is available now and we look forward to new insights we will learn concerning our City's veteran population.

Regarding Intro 1118-2018, this proposal would require Department of Veterans' Services to submit an annual report to the Council on agency personnel numbers; titles and job functions; the number of veterans who received services from DVS; the methods by which veterans and their families learned about seeking assistance through the agency; and the numbers of veterans engaged and assisted.

Currently, City budget documents and the MMR include most of the information sought through Intro. 1118. Furthermore, these documents are released during the same timeframe identified in this proposal. While DVS looks forward to continued collaboration with the City Council concerning DVS personnel and performance metrics, we are confident that these aims can be best achieved through existing reporting mechanisms.

LETTER TO STUDENT VETERANS ON GI BILL DELAYS

We are aware that many student veterans have not yet received their federal GI Bill housing allowances. We've been informed by the federal government that this is due to delays in processing of claims at the US Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) while the VA is implementing new legislation known as the Forever GI Bill. It appears to be a nationwide problem, affecting hundreds of thousands of student veterans across the country.

To assist NYC student veterans who are most in need, NYC's Department of Veterans' Services (DVS) and Department of Social Services (DSS) are collaborating to identify supports and resources for students who might be adversely impacted by these delays.

We encourage any NYC student veteran who is the primary resident in a private apartment, has fallen behind in making rent payments and needs immediate assistance to visit the NYC Department of Social Services (DSS) Michael J. Handy Veterans Service Center located at 25 Chapel Street, 6th Fl, Room 606, Brooklyn, NY 11201 to have their case evaluated for emergency rent arrears funds and other benefits.

Details on what documents to bring can be found on the attached pdf document. More information on emergency rent arrears assistance is available at 718-557-1399 or on the DSS website at https://on.nyc.gov/2yzFFtr. As required by law, student veterans who are deemed eligible for an emergency rent arrears payment will also need to sign a repayment agreement to pay back the amount provided within twelve months of issuance, during which time the VA should be able to provide the GI Bill housing allowances that veteran students need. For any other benefits questions, student veterans should contact DVS at 212-416-5250 or info@veterans.nyc.gov.

Our city is home to approximately 12,000 student veterans, many of whom rely on the GI Bill housing allowance as their sole means to pay rent. The GI Bill is backed by the federal government and considered lawful income. It is illegal to deny housing to veterans using the GI Bill in accordance with Local Law 119/2017.

We recognize that the payment delays cause financial hardship for both student veterans who find themselves without necessary funds to pay rent as well as for landlords who have yet to receive expected rent. We urge landlords and housing managers to exercise patience with their student veteran tenants.

The City of New York stands behind our student veterans, who have served our nation and to whom we all owe a debt of gratitude.

LEGAL

As of 2017, service members and veterans are a protected class in New York City's Human Rights Law. If you feel you've been discriminated against based on your military status, you can file a complaint with the Commission on Human Rights.

For other legal services, from discharge status upgrades to other legal issues, DVS can connect you to the resources you need through the <u>City Bar Justice Center's Veterans Assistance Project</u>. The Project is designed to meet the needs of veterans living in New York City by providing low income veterans with probono assistance with disability benefits claims before the New York City Regional Office of Veterans Affairs. Oversight: Ensuring Veteran Access to City-Administered Services Intro. 1118

October 29, 2018

Good morning and thank you to Chair Deutsch and the Committee for the opportunity to testify today. My name is Kristen Rouse and I am an Army veteran with more than 24 years in service, including three tours of duty in Afghanistan. I am President and Founding Director of the NYC Veterans Alliance, a member-driven, grassroots policy advocacy and community-building organization that advances veterans and families as civic leaders.

On behalf of our members and supporters, we state our strong support for this committee providing oversight of the services provided to veterans and their families by DVS and other city agencies, programs, and funding. We are, however, uncertain of whether Intro. 1118 or other recent bill proposals will effectively accomplish the oversight and accountability that our community has called for and deserves.

In February 2015, I stood beside members of this committee—including Council Members Vallone and Eugene—in a City Hall press conference to laud passage of Local Law 23-2015,¹ which mandated annual reporting on the number of veterans receiving services from city agencies, including NYC Housing Authority (NYCHA); NYC Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD); NYC Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA); NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH); and the NYC Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS). These agencies were tasked with tracking veterans involved in Mitchell Lama housing applications, vending licenses, housing vouchers, city procurement, and city employees. Local Law 23 was a vital step toward making veterans more visible in how our city tracks and quantifies city services. It wasn't perfect, in that veterans receiving help from HRA and other agencies were omitted from this bill—but it nevertheless ensured that data on veterans would be captured and reported by some of our largest city agencies.

Later in 2015, we advocated for the creation of an independent city agency overseeing veterans' services, stating the need that our community saw for this new agency to play a vital coordinating role in how the city delivers and accounts for services to veterans and their families at taxpayer expense. The establishment and growth of DVS has been a tremendous benefit to our veterans community, but an agency limited in size must be empowered in its scope to synchronize and manage the city's efforts to reach, serve, and be accountable to veterans and their families.

The intent behind bills heard today and last June—to bring accountability for DVS in the veterans and family members it is serving—is good. But even better would be for this committee to examine ways it can empower DVS to accomplish its mission.

To this end, we pose the following questions to this committee:

- 1) Will you make public the reports of NYCHA, HPD, DCA, DOHMH, and DCAS on the number of veterans it has served since Local Law 23-2015 was implemented? And will this reporting be made visible in the Mayor's Management Report (MMR) and/or other essential citywide reporting?
- Will new legislation ensure that the city's contracting and management of VetConnectNYC² will effectively track services, referrals and referral methods, followup metrics, and other key access and accountability data for veterans and family members seeking resources from DVS and other government and community-based organizations?
- 3) Will legislation include a provision for a dedicated Agency Chief Contracting Officer (ACCO) to manage the city's contracts for veterans' services—to include not only VetConnectNYC, but also the \$2.3 million in discretionary funds granted by the city to community-based organizations for the purpose of serving veterans and their families?
- 4) Will new legislation ensure that DVS would not need to duplicate reporting already included in the MMR,³ budget documents, other existing public information and open data on its activities, staff, and salaries⁴?
- 5) Also related to prior legislation—is this committee still overseeing the Veterans Advisory Board? As the city's only chartered body of veterans advising city government, the VAB currently has eleven members serving on terms that expired last year and early this year. The VAB did not meet its mandated five meetings last year, and it has held three public meetings without quorum or current appointments.

There is much work ahead for DVS as it continues building programs and growing in its performance and accountability to the veterans and family members it serves. There also is much, much work ahead for the Veterans Committee.

On behalf of the NYC Veterans Alliance, I thank you for the opportunity to testify today. Pending your questions, this concludes my testimony.

- 2. When HRA personnel made a change on 2/18/16 to information about an apartment number associated with me, what was the specific address that corresponded to the change that it made after it made that change?
- Who directed HRA personnel to make this change on 2/18/16?
- What sources of information did HRA use to make this change on 2/18/16?
- 5. Have the following members of HRA been aware of this change that was made on 2/18/16 and, if so, on which dates did they become aware of this change? HRA Commissioner Steven Banks, Jeffrey Mosczyc, Ann Marie Scalia, Marin Gerber, Martha Calhoun, and Jordan Dressler.

The Department of Social Services/Human Resources Administration ("DSS/HRA") is hereby denying your request. Please be advised that FOIL does not require an agency to prepare or create a record in response to a request for information. See Public Officers Law §89(3)(a). FOIL does not require an agency to supply information in response to questions.

However, as your questions pertain to records provided as part of your Fair Hearing evidence packet, your questions have been forwarded to the Fair Hearing Unit for review.

WARNING: You or your child may have been treated with a sedative or pain medicine to provide comfort during your Emergency Department visit. Even though most of the effects will be gone by the time you leave for home, some effects may linger for up to 24 hours. These include: sleepiness, confused thinking, dizziness, nausea, and difficulty walking. If you or your child received this medication, it is very important that activities should be limited or supervised for at least the next 24 hours:

- · Do not drive a car or operate machinery and be very careful around stairs.
- · Avoid alcohol or any other sedating medicines
- · Children should not ride bikes, use a skateboard, go swimming, or play on swings or monkeybars.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR PAPER PRESCRIPTION

As of 3/27/16, New York State Department of Health now requires computer-generated (electronic) prescriptions for all medications be sent directly to your pharmacy. However, Mount Sinai Beth Israel providers have been granted a temporary waiver from the ePrescribing requirement and may write paper prescriptions. By law, once a provider has been granted a waiver, the pharmacy must fill your prescription.

What if my pharmacy refuses to fill my paper prescription?

- Tell the pharmacist to call the New York State Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement (BNE) directly at 866-811-7957 (8.45 am to 4.45 pm), wait for assistance, and the operator will confirm that paper prescription can be filled.
- Tell your provider that your pharmacy refused to fill your prescription. Be sure to give your provider the name, address, and phone number of the pharmacy.



Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans Of America before the

New York City Council Committee on Veterans

October 29, 2018

Chairman Deutsch and distinguished members of the Committee, on behalf of Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA) and our more than 425,000 members, I would like to thank you for the opportunity to testify here today on the pending legislation. My name is Vadim Panasyuk. I am a New Yorker, a Ukrainian expatriate and a naturalized citizen, an Iraq war veteran having served two tours with the 3rd Infantry Division, and Masters level social worker working as a Senior Veteran Transition Manager (VTM), VA Benefits Lead with IAVA's Rapid Response Referral Program, or "RRRP" for short. RRRP is IAVA's high-tech, high-touch referral service for veterans and their families with a complete and comprehensive case management component. We assist veterans of all eras, with any discharge status, worldwide in confronting significant challenges like unemployment, financial or legal struggles, homelessness and mental health related issues. To date, RRRP has served almost 9,000 veterans and family members nationwide, and over 1,000 in New York City alone, providing critical support and resources to ensure that this city's veteran's needs are effectively met.

After fourteen years, IAVA has become the preferred empowerment organization for post-9/11 veterans. While our members are spread throughout the nation, we are proud to say that our national headquarters is located in New York City. Since its beginning, IAVA has fought for and has been successful in advocating for policies that are able to meet the needs of our newest generation of veterans, which includes our advocacy towards the creation, proper funding and oversight of the Department of Veterans Services (DVS).

DVS has enormous potential and its establishment nearly two years ago was a historic moment for veterans of this city. DVS can significantly streamline access and improve service delivery to many of the most critical veteran-specific programs and resources already available here. Today we voice our concern to the Veterans Committee that Additional Reporting Requirements for the Department in their current form do not do enough to measure effectiveness and to ensure proper oversight of DVS and its programs, to include VetConnect NYC.



IAVA supports the intent behind this bill. However, it appears that it is somewhat redundant as some of the data is already widely available, and does not require the reporting of necessary metrics to accurately evaluate this Department's performance and many of its various initiatives. IAVA is a data-driven organization, and as such our view is that when appropriate metrics are applied for measuring program performance and veteran outcomes, services delivered can continue to improve and become more accessible and effective for the target population. This approach also empowers us to identify positive and negative trends, and to better document accomplishments to be studied and replicated elsewhere. This bill does not require the reporting of organizational and programmatic metrics necessary to accurately assess DVS' performance or its impact on this city's veterans.

IAVA has applied metrics as a service standard to various components of our RRRP Team. RRRP is staffed by a dedicated team of masters-level Veteran Transition Managers. For example: our clients receive a survey every time we make a referral. The client is able to provide feedback and rank the Quality, Timeliness, Effectiveness, and Customer service of every organization we refer to. We also provide the same opportunity to the client to grade RRRP, as well as the VTM they were working with once the case is closed providing us with a gauge of our own performance. Using qualitative data in tandem with quantitative metrics has helped us better understand the needs of the population we serve and to continue to make targeted improvements to the services we provide.

As a Senior VTM, I've also had the pleasure to work with many at VetConnect NYC and we have found them to be very responsive and easy to work with, but we have had challenges in seamlessly receiving referrals. One of the challenges is a burdensome increase in the amount of digital paperwork needed to sync the work of our case management team and VetConnect NYC. Another clear deficit we can see is a lack of a comprehensive case management component. We also view the requirement to use the VetConnect software to participate in the network as a barrier limiting the number and types of programs available through VetConnect NYC. As VetConnect NYC continues to find its footing as a platform, we encourage this committee to provide them with the oversight and tools they need to be successful.

Members of the Committee, thank you again for the opportunity to share IAVA's views on these issues today. I look forward to answering any questions you may have.



Good afternoon members of the Committee on Veterans. My name is Coco Culhane and I am the director of the Veteran Advocacy Project. We provide free legal services to low-income veterans and their families, with a focus on those living with post-traumatic stress, traumatic brain injury, and substance use disorders.

The creation of a well-funded Department of Veterans Services was a success celebrated by everyone. A couple of years later the department has had a chance to explore its role in the city and settle in, and the community has had a chance to size them up. Some advocates wonder about what the agency should be doing and have talked about benefits appeals, behavioral health care, and other services. It may be that DVS faces a similar dilemma as the VA: a public perception that the agency is supposed to take care of all of veterans' needs. A look at the New York City Charter reveals that, in fact, the mandate of the Department of Veterans' Services is *to inform*.

Given that the department was formed to act as a hub, they have gone above and beyond. Their instrumental role in reducing homelessness among veterans is part of a nationally lauded model of collaboration with the Department of Homeless Services, the VA, and local nonprofits. They provided more than information to the vets that now have a place to call home. The community sees that concrete work and asks: what's next? (Which is not to say that homelessness is no longer a challenge.) "What next?" is the right question but it needs to be asked within a framework of efficiency and a framework that aligns with the agency's mandate. Before expanding to more direct services, let's ensure our city's agency has been able to fulfill its mission when it comes to connecting veterans and military families to the resources they need.

VAP supports the introduction of Local Law 1118 and believes that DVS reporting on even more figures than they already do will benefit the entire community. In a city where the resources seem endless and are quickly overwhelming in a simple search, the agency must fulfill its duty to inform. While NYServes NYC works behind the scenes to sort through the details of eligibility and capacity of providers, DVS must be the center of communication, not provision, for the needs of all servicemembers and veterans in New York. For that reason, we support Local Law 1118 and encourage the Council to define the word "services". Requiring more detail on "services" will reveal meaningful information about the achievements of DVS and may even highlight further needs in the city.

VAP can say "we engaged 1,000 veterans this year" but, without knowing what "engaged" means, you have no idea what we accomplished. Outcomes are what matter. This law asks for the number of services and the *method* that veterans find the services of the department, but isn't it the service itself that is important? What was it? If the mission is to inform, we should be asking what kind of "informing" is happening and if it is happening effectively. Number-served does not shed light on what was achieved.

Tying the language of subsection (a) to the substantive requirements in the Charter (the topical areas that servicemembers and veterans are supposed to be able to learn about at DVS) will provide the community with better data on what is being accomplished by the department. In contrast, as the law proposes now: a report includes that a DVS outreach specialist met a veteran at a community event—we get number: 1; method: event—that is really all we know. Requesting that DVS report on what kind of information is being given and in what manner or format will provide insight on what veterans and their families are seeking; it would potentially reveal trends in the needs of our community.

Testimony to the Veterans Committee of the New York City Council

Delivered in person on October 29, 2018 by Ashton Stewart, SAGEVets Program Coordinator

Thank you for holding this Veterans' Committee hearing. My name is Ashton Stewart and I'm the coordinator of the SAGEVets program at SAGE.

SAGE is the country's first and largest organization dedicated to improving the lives of LGBT older adults. Founded in New York City in 1978, SAGE has provided comprehensive social services and programs to LGBT older people for nearly four decades. SAGE Vets is one of our program offerings and is the only program in all of New York City designed for older LGBT adults. In fact, SAGEVets is a statewide program engaging older LGBT veterans across New York State.

New York State and New York City are among the top ten states and cities with the highest concentrations of gay and lesbian veterans, both in number and per capita. And, the needs are deep among LGBT older veterans.

According to a recent statewide survey by the LGBT Health and Human Services Network, 56% of LGBT veterans were over the age of 50. Many LGBT older veterans in New York State are struggling and yet, are not accessing the services they need. Also according to the New York State LGBT Health and Human Services Network:

- 43% of lesbian, gay and bisexual vets live at or under 200% of the Federal Poverty line;
 that number is even higher for transgender veterans with 60% earning less than \$31,000 per year.
- 30% of lesbian, gay and bisexual veterans were homeless; 46% of transgender vets were homeless.
- 34% of lesbian, gay and bisexual veterans were food insecure; over 61% of transgender vets struggle with food insecurity.
 - 30% of lesbian, gay and bisexual veterans and 48% of transgender vets fear discrimination from providers.

Staggeringly, 1/3 of our state's LGBT veterans who answered the survey identified as transgender. This mirrors national data. Across the country, 163,000 veterans identify as transgender. Of the 163,000, more than 51,000 are age 65+. In other words, 31.8% of transgender veterans are age 65+. In fact, The Veterans Health Administration indicates the prevalence of diagnosed "gender dysphoria" among former U.S. service members is five times

that of prevalence estimates in the general population. Psychiatry.org defines gender dysphoria as someone who is "uncomfortable with their body...or with or the expected roles of their assigned gender."

According to a 2016 article in The Gerontologist, due to the rapidly increasing aging population and the high proportion of veterans among older Americans, the number of transgender older adults with a history of military service will continue to increase substantially.

And, with respect to employment, our State's transgender and LGB veterans are having a hard time finding and keeping a job:

- 46% of transgender veterans report being unfairly fired that's nearly half; similarly,
 28% of lesbian, gay and bisexual veterans report the same.
- 47.5% of transgender veterans report being unfairly not hired; among lesbian, gay, and bisexual veterans that number is over 1/3, at 34.8%.

LGBT older people struggle more with financial security in their later years. *Out & Visible,* SAGE's market study on the attitudes of LGBT people ages 45-75, found that far more LGBT older people are worried that they haven't saved enough money to retire. In fact, 42% of LGBT older people are very or extremely concerned that they will outlive the money they have saved for retirement, as compared to 25% of non-LGBT older people. Forty-four percent of LGBT older people are very or extremely concerned that they will have to work well beyond retirement age just to have enough money to live, as compared to 26% of non-LGBT older people. And, transgender older people experience even more extreme levels of financial insecurity, especially when you consider the high levels of unemployment and underemployment throughout their adult lives.

Consider that older LGBT veterans served in the military at a time when discrimination against LGBT people was rampant and a matter of official government policy. And, the current Administration is trying to ban transgender people from serving in the military. Add that to their financial insecurity and un/underemployment and it's no wonder why our LGBT veterans are struggling and not accessing their federal VA and related benefits. Instead, many rely on state public assistance programs, shifting what should be a Federal expense to New York State.

SAGE created SAGEVets, with support from the New York State Assembly, to respond to the swelling need among LGBT vets and to improve access to care among LGBT older veterans across the state. Veterans are former federal employees who have earned the right to access veteran programs and services that are designed to improve their overall health and wellbeing. SAGE Vets saves both the state and the city significant amounts of money by ensuring veterans access the federal benefits entitled to them.


