3 CHAIRPERSON RICHARDS: Alrighty, good 4 afternoon. I am Council Member Donovan Richards of the 31st District in Queens, and the Chair of the 5 6 Committee on Public Safety. I want to thank the 7 members of the Public Safety Committee who are hear, 8 and you're going to make sure I don't forget anybody, 9 Council Members Brannan, Gibson, Lancman, Cabrera, 10 Powers, Menchaca, Vallone, Rodriguez. [background] 11 comments] Oh, Rosenthal [background comment] 12 Cohen, [laughter] You're going to have to write these 13 things down. [laughter] I get brain freeze fast. I 14 also want to thank the sponsor of the bills that we 15 are going to pass today staring with Majority Leader 16 Cumbo, and I want to give major kudos to Council 17 Member Rosenthal who really took a big leadership role here as well in working with the Committee. 18 19 Council Member Rivera and also Council Member Rose. 20 We are doing something very important today. As a 21 result of the Me, Too movement, more victims of 22 sexual assault are coming forward and we want to 23 encourage them to continue to do so. These victims 24 deserve to feel respected and supported by the people 25 who are responsible for-for preventing crime in New

2 York City. These bills that we're going to pass today increase transparency in the way the NYPD 3 diverts resources to the investigation of sexual 4 5 assaults. They guarantee the privacy of victims once 6 they come forward, and they deserved this a long time 7 ago, and they make sure that the law enforcement officers that handle these cases in response to these 8 victims are appropriately trained. I don't think 9 that's too much to ask for, and it's actually sad we 10 have to legislate this. Together, this package shows 11 12 that we in this Council, we in this Council and the NYPD take sexual assaults very seriously, and we are 13 14 committed to doing everything we can to support 15 survivors. So, I'm going to call for a vote on this, 16 but this is, you know, when I reflect back to the-the 17 hearing we had a few months ago, where there was a 18 lot of passion around this table amongst my colleagues, especially, this is what we will put here 19 20 to do: To make sure we take that passion, and we turn it in viable legislation that will help future 21 2.2 generations to ensure that even as the Police 23 Commissioner apologized-apologizes for past issues that the NYPD had when dealing with victims, that we 24 25 actually put legislation to work that will ensure

2	that there are safeguards in place that will ensure
3	that victims gets justice. So, these are some big
4	bills today and—and it's honestly an honor to chair
5	this committee today. We're getting something done
6	on a major scale. So, with that being said, I will
7	turn to my colleagues for comments or statements.
8	Any comments or statements? Alright, if not, I'll
9	ask the sergeant to call the roll.

14	CHAIRPERSON RICHARDS: I vote aye.

16	COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Permission to
17	explain my vote?

19	COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Thank you so
20	much, Chair Richards, and good afternoon colleagues
21	and I, too, want to echo your sentiments in really
22	giving a lot of credit to my phenomenal colleagues in
23	the Women's Caucus, our Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo,
24	Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Carlina Rivera, and
25	Debi Rose, and I, too, remember that hearing, and
I	I

2 certainly over the years looking at a lot of the work the NYPD has done around being very sensitive to 3 those victims of sexual assault and sexual violence, 4 5 and really in the climate that we are working in today and certainly in this country we have to do 6 7 everything possible to make sure that victims become victors that they are not a victim of their 8 circumstance, but rather they are a victor of their 9 circumstance. And as someone who is dealing with an 10 unfortunate situation that has hit my district a 11 12 couple of days ago, an 11-year-old girl was assaulted by a teen-ager in my district, and, you know, the 13 victim sometimes we don't know their names. We may 14 15 not know their faces, but they are our children. 16 They are our young people, and we really have to do more not just working with the NYPD in terms of 17 18 sensitivity and cultural understanding and really the awareness. But we also have to make sure that we are 19 20 increasing opportunities for healthy relationships, and that's why this Council is so support of DOVE and 21 2.2 other programs that work with many of our local CVOs 23 and our providers on the ground, working within our schools, working with clergy, working with faith-24 based leaders. So, I appreciate the incredible 25

2 amount of work done by this committee and thank you to our sponsors and the Women's Caucus and really all 3 of my colleagues in the City Council for recognizing 4 5 this is not just a woman's issue, but this is really 6 a human rights issue. It affects children, it 7 affects women, it affects parents, it affects everyone every single day whether it's a Me, Too 8 movement or any other hashtag, it's really a reality 9 10 of life for far too many New Yorkers, and the more we do this work, the more we pass legislation such as 11 12 this on the agenda today, the more we break down that 13 cycle the more we take more victims out of the 14 darkness and into the light where they can have an 15 opportunity at a successful future healing from the 16 trauma that many of them have experienced. So, with 17 that said, thank you to all of my colleagues. I**′**m 18 very proud to be a part of this Council for such a time as this, and I proud aye on today's agenda. 19 20 Thank you. 21 CHAIRPERSON RICHARDS: Thank you. 2.2 CLERK: Cabrera. 23 COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: A big aye. 24 CLERK: Cohen. 25 COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Aye.

Before we do that, I want 17 to go to my colleague, as I said earlier, who has 18 been a driving force behind the scenes on passing thig package of bills, Council Member, Councilwoman 19 20 Helen Rosenthal who is also the Chair of the Woman's 21 Caucus. 2.2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you so 23 much, Council Member Richards. I wanted to thank you, but in particular the lawyers on the legislative 24 staff Brian Crowe and our new lawyer whose name I am 25

2 just about to mess up. So, say it again out loud. 3 Dan.

[off mic] Daniel Addis. 4 DANIEL ADDIS: 5 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Yeah, Daniel is new to the Council, but he jumped right in 6 7 understanding what the important things we had to achieve in the legislation. I'm only going to talk 8 about mine for a moment. So when we talk about 9 education-making sure that the Special Victims 10 Division officers are trained in how to talk to 11 12 people who come forward. We know from the hearing 13 that the first three questions are usually what were 14 you wearing, how much did you have to drink, and do 15 you have a boyfriend? And-and Daniel really helped us make us make sure that in this bill what we're 16 17 legislating is that the detectives learned that the 18 first questions are to be focused on the victim and helping that person along the journey of becoming a 19 20 survivor. Taking victim-centric, trauma-centric approach making sure that we-that the Police 21 2.2 Department report on not only how many detectives are 23 taking the training, but how many fail. They're actually going to have to be tested on this. So, 24 we're going to know many fail. In their first round 25

2 of taking some of the training, we've specified 10 or 11 specific types of training, but they're going to 3 have to take and-and we're going to get the 4 5 transparency by having the department report on that 6 training, and we also going to know we're-again 7 through the reporting, which outside experts the PD turn to in order to learn and make sure that our 8 police department is getting cutting edge training. 9 The advocates in this area are very sophisticated and 10 nuanced. They'll be looking at those reports, and 11 12 they will certainly be on the front lines of calling out the department should they see that the training 13 that's necessary isn't show up in those reports. So, 14 15 I'm very grateful to the Council's-our City Council 16 Legislative staff for all of their work, and Chair 17 Richards, I'm just eternally grateful to working on 18 this issue with you. You've been a tremendous partner, and, you know, looking forward to do more. 19 20 So thank you very much. CHAIRPERSON RICHARDS: Thank on that. 21 2.2 CLERK: Continuation roll call, Council 23 Member Menchaca. 24 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: With deep
