CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: Buenos Tardes. name is Carlos Menchaca, Chair of the New York City Council's Committee on Immigration. Today, the Committee will be voting on two resolutions related to a proposed federal rule change concerning public charge. The Trump Administration's newly proposed rule would dramatically expand the standard of public charge including a list of public benefits that the federal government would treat as negative factors in Visa and Green Card applications. Among the public benefits included in the expanded rules are SNAP, Housing Assistance, Medicaid and Medicare Part D. Thursday, November 15, 2018, the Committee on Immigration was joined by the Speaker and the Committees on Health and General Welfare to hear from the Mayor Administration, the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs advocate and the community members about the impact that this proposed change would have not just on our city but on our country. As Council Members of the city of New York, it is our responsibility to protect the rights and welfare of all our residents including the 3.1 million immigrants who call this city home. Our immigrant

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community is an essential part of the city's fabric, of our history, and this-and New York City would not be what it is today without its immigrant heritage. At its core, this proposed rule is an assault on immigrant communities including our city's own immigrant very vibrant community, and part of the federal government's patchwork of anti-immigrant policies. So much of what we discussed at that hearing really reminded me that this is an opportunity for us as New Yorkers to rise up and speak out. This patchwork of anti-immigrant policies is not only draconian, but when we spoke to people from our communities, we knew that this was also an assault on the values of the city. It effectively penalizes immigrants and immigrant families when they are poor forcing immigrants to choose between their wellbeing and being able to stay in this country lawfully. The two resolutions that the committee will be voting on today are Resolution 608 sponsored by the Speaker, authorizing the Speaker to submit a public comment on behalf of the Council to the Federal Register concerning the proposed change to public charge rule, and Resolution 609 sponsored by the Speaker opposing the newly proposed Public Charge

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2 rules, and urging the federal government not to move forward with its adoption. By targeting benefits 3 that help families with food, housing and healthcare, 5 this proposed rule will deeply harm our communities. According to the preliminary estimates by the Mayor's 6 7 Office of Immigrant Affairs, an estimated 475,000 New Yorkers could be harmed by this public charge 8 proposals. This is not including the hundred 9 thousands more New Yorkers who may withdraw, and who 10 are already withdrawing or foregoing public benefits 11 12 due to fear and confusion-confusion surrounding the proposal, and at the hearing that we had, we did see 13 14 and hear from members of our community who are 15 representing those members who have already withdrewwithdrawn from public benefits, and are either afraid 16 17 to come out and connect to other benefits that they 18 are entitled to. However, this rule is not yet final, and until it is, we will continue to fight it. 19 20 As part of the rule making process, members of the public may submit comments to the federal government 21 2.2 about how this rule will impact them, their families 23 and the communities. Resolution 608 authorizes the Speaker to submit a comment on behalf of the City 24 Council body. I will be submitting a comment myself. 25

I encourage the members of this committee to submit
their comments. My colleagues in the Council each of
you represent so many New Yorkers in your district
who are not only immigrants but are impacted directly
by this charge, but this public charge change. And
so make your voices heard and submit a comment in
opposition of this proposed rule. The comment period
ends on December $10^{th}$ , and there are over 83,000
comments already that have been posted to the Federal
Registry. Let's get to 100,000 and let's ensure that
New York's voice is core to that 100,000 national cry
against this bill-against this proposal. Now, you
can submit a comment by going to ouramericanstory.us,
ouramericanstory.us where you can submit your comment
against this proposed change. I want to thank the
whole committee staff who helped prepare this vote,
my Counsel Arbania Hausa (sp?), Policy Analyst
Elizabeth Cronk; Finance Analyst Jim Lee and as well
as my staff Senior Advisory Cesar Vargas; Chief of
Staff Socheatta Meng and Communications Director
Anthony Chiarito, and with that, I want to open up
the vote for both of these resolutions.

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CLERK: William Martin, Committee Clerk, roll call vote Committee on Immigration, Resolutions 608 and 609, Chair Menchaca.

CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: I vote aye.

9	happening and ensure that our-our laws are-are
