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3 CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Good afternoon. 4 Welcome to this meeting of the Subcommittee on 5 Landmarks, Public Siting, and Maritime Uses. I'm 6 Council Member Adrienne Adams, the Chair of the 7 Subcommittee. We will be joined by Council Members 8 today. We-we are joined by Council Member Steve 9 Today, we will be holding hearing and vote 10 [background comments, pause] and a vote on LU 278, a 11 proposed site selection for a new 456-seat school, 12 and votes on three additional items per earlier this 13 month. I'll begin by opening this public hearing on 14 LU 278 and application file by the School 15 Construction Authority pursuant to section 1732 of 16 the Public Authority Law for a proposed site 17 selection to construct a new 556-seat intermediate 18 and high school facility serving District 75 19 students. The proposed site is a 2.34-acre city-20 owned parcel located at 715 Ocean Terrace in Council 21 Member Matteo's District in Staten Island. I now 2.2 recognize 715 Council Member Steve Matteo to speak on 23 the application.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Thank you Chair Adams. Let me first state that I fully support the

2 construction of the new Hungerford School and Petrides Campus. It was 256-seat District 75 new 3 4 schools needed to replace the deteriorating existingexisting school in Clifton, the school designed to 5 ultimately accommodate up to 456 students and will 6 7 provide a much better educational experience for the special needs students who attend. With all this 8 said, this planning process is the only opportunity 9 we have to get this project right both for Hungerford 10 students and for those who are already call the 11 12 Petrides Campus home, and I am committing to ensuring we anticipate and address any foreseeable issues now 13 14 when we have this opportunity. There are too many 15 issues I would like to raise that I believe must be 16 adequately addressed at this stage of the process: 17 Ingress/egress issues and parking issues. First, 18 ambiguities regarding ingress and egress to both schools must be cleared up, and clear traffic flow 19 20 pattern established at both schools for both cars and for buses. Moring drop-off and afternoon dismissal 21 2.2 times are already chaotic at all schools. 23 add in a second school to the mix, it could lead to more chaos unless a plan if firmly put in place prior 24 25 to opening. While I understand it is currently

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contemplated to have ingress and egress take place at different place on the campus for the different schools, we need to ensure the plan works. The effects of a plan on safety on City Boulevard is also a concern as the piers will be heavily utilized to move students to and from the school. In addition I have to turn to both potential impacts on local surrounding residential streets that will be dealing with the effects of more vehicular traffic. Second, the parking situation must be addressed since the school that will be built on part of the campus main parking lot must ensure those valuable parking spots are replaced. So, our challenge is to figure out a way to construct the school finding adequate parking to ensure the campus remains as accessible as it always has been. As this process continues, I need to be comfortable that all aspects of the ingress/egress issue are addressed that parking will be created to replace those spaces that will be lost. I am hopeful SCA will show us hard numbers demonstrating what exists now, and what will exist once construction is completed. As I stated in the beginning, this project is needed, and is necessary and I look forward to its grand opening in September

2 of 2021. Now is the opportunity for us to figure out the traffic plan, how to get this done right, making 3 sure that Petrides campus is as fully as possible for 4 5 now and decades to come. So, I look forward to SCA's 6 testimony. I want to also state I-I appreciate SCA 7 working with my office on this project. I think we 8 are very close to just making sure that we have these two issues addressed. I look forward to your 9 testimony, and then I'll-I'll come back with some 10 questions. 11

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you, Council

Member. I echo the sentiments of my colleague. I

LEGAL COUNSEL: Please raise your right hands. Do you affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth in your testimony before this Subcommittee in response to all Council Member questions?

PANEL MEMBERS: [off mic] I do.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you. You may

25 begin.

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2 KELLY MURPHY: Hello, members. Again, my 3 name is Kelly Murphy and I'm the Director in the Real 4 Estate Strategy Group for SCA and as you know, my 5 colleagues are here. The New York City School Construction Authority has undertaken the site 6 7 selection process for anew intermediate high school on a site on Block 683 on a portion of lot/lawn (sic) 8 and it will be proposed Lot 320 in the future in the 9 Borough of Staten Island. The prosed site consists 10 of approximately 101,948 square foot. It's 11 12 approximately 2.34 acres situated on he Petrides Campus located at 715 Ocean Terrace. 13 The proposed 14 site is owned by the city of New York with 15 jurisdiction assigned to the New York City Department 16 of Education and is located within the Todt Hill section of Staten Island, Community District 2 and 17 18 Community School District 31. Under the proposed project the SCA plans to construct a new ISHS 19 20 facility serving District 75 students across the Borough and will serve as a replacement for the 21 2.2 Richard H. Hungerford School currently located at 155 23 Tompkins Avenue. The Notice of Filing for the site plan was published in the New York Post, The Staten 24 Island Advance and the City Record on October 1, 25

4 | for District 75 and the City Planning Commission were

5 all notified of the site plan. The Citywide Council

6 for District 75 held a hearing on October 18, 2018.

7 The Community Board, the CEC and chose not to hold

8 public hearings. The SCA considered all comments

9 received on the proposed site plan and affirms the

10 | site plan pursuant to Section 1731 of the New York

11 | Public Authorities Law. Pursuant to Section 1731 of

12 | the Public Authorities Law, the SCA submitted the

13 proposed site plan to the Mayor and City Council by

14 | letter dated November 26, 2018. With that, we look

Okay, well it's something we'll address as we're
working for through the process.

KELLY MURPHY: No, I can't answer that.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Okay, and I'm-I'm please that we have a net gain of 14 spots. Certainly we don't want to lose any. So, I'm going to go right into my second issue and that's the-the traffic obviously. You know, as you know, the trees are very traverse on the campus not only during school not only in the morning and afternoon, but holding a lot of events. So, I just want to talk about how we plan on utilizing the second entrance where that's going to be, and how we don't impact the trees at the school now. So, if you could just talk a little bit about the plans for the new entrance, and how we're going to get staff and the students who are using the Hungerford School to-to the school without major impact on Ocean Terrace.

KELLY MURPHY: Well, current Petrides operations will come and go as they do presently. With Hungerford, they will come and go through the

Okay, and the

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COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: 3 same thing for afternoon?

KELLY MURPHY: Yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: And then we have no plans to utilize the existing entrance on Ocean Terrace and those neighborhoods?

> KELLY MURPHY: No.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Okay. So, I mean those are the-those are the main issues. Obviously, we're all on the same page of-of-of making a school a reality and the kids certainly deserve it. So, I know where we are in terms of, you know, the direction where we don't-we have to work together, though, as we move forward to ensure that we don't-we don't have a mix of the vehicular and traffic from the trees at Hungerford. That's-that is extremely important for the safety of the students, for the safety of parents. We-we can make this work. We've just got to make sure that we're with, you know, having constant conversations with-with us, with DOT. We've got to get DOT in the same room to make sure that that these plans are—are—are realized so the school, which is going to be a great school, doesn't have any detriment to the existing-the campus.

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I'm satisfied with where we are now. I appreciate
the effort. I think we still have a little bit more
work to do but that's—that's in the normal of—of the
process of actually getting out there and looking and
working together. So, I ask that you—that you ensure
that we communicate, that we work together, and we
bring in DOT and we make sure that the traffic plan

KELLY MURPHY: Yeah, we've been in ongoing talking with DOT, and we will continue to do so as we go forward and finalize design.

is the right traffic plan, and-and make this work.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Thank you. Thank you, Chair Adams.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you very much

Council Member Matteo. We've been joined by Council

Member Brad Lander and Council Member Inez Barron.

Thank you very much for your testimony today. Are

there any more members or members of the public who

wish to testify on those items? Okay, thank you.

Seeing none, the public hearing LU 278 is now closed.

KELLY MURPHY: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you very much. We are waiting for one more Council Member before we can take our vote. [background comments] Thank you.

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In accordance with effected Council Member's 2 recommendations, we will vote on this item, and three 3 other items for which the Subcommittee conducted 4 5 public hearings earlier this month. We will vote to approve LU 278 for a site selection of a 456-seat 6 7 District 75 school in Member Matteo's district. We will also vote to approve LU 238, the 238 President 8 Street House and I now recognize Council Member Brad 9 Lander.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you very much Chair Adams. I appreciate the opportunity to be here. So, yes, I guess you have three items on the calendar today that are in my district. So, thank you to you and your-your members for your work on them. Two of them are landmarks at 236 and 238 President Street, and these are wonderful projects. I'm sorry that I was not able to be here for the-for the hearing, but they are just lovely buildings. was the first building in Brooklyn to function as a kindergarten, and a lovely building, and then the other is just a gorgeous residential building. functioned together for a while as church. It was actually the first Spanish language Methodist Church in Brooklyn. Joan Baez's father was the minister at

2 the church for a little while. So, this has got a lovely story. The residents—the residential 3 4 buildings have come a co-op, and the residents themselves led the effort and are asking to have 5 their building landmarked and preserved, the 6 7 kindergarten building next door was at actually very real risk of being demolished and sold off, and—and 8 redeveloped. So, this is a great action and I urge a 9 10 yes vote, and I appreciate your support. On the DOT Brooklyn Fleet Service facility, on 14th Street in my 11 12 district, I really appreciate your work and the work of the staff to achieve good modifications to it that 13 will make it function better. That's a big fleet 14 15 maintenance facility. It's moving from somewhere 16 else. We need some place that all the DOT fleet is maintained obviously having lots of trucks coming in 17 18 and out of a big maintenance facility. Not necessarily something folks are jumping up and down 19 20 about, and this is directly across the street from the Sanitation garage and two blocks away from 21 2.2 another Sanitation garage. In my community board, we 23 actually house not only our own garage, but the garage for another community board. So, there's 24 25 meaningful impacts. I appreciate the work that DOT

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did, and I thank the Administration for working with us to try to address some of those impacts especially in the context of the work we are doing for the forth coming Gowanus Rezoning, and so DOT has agreed to move forward toward rooftop solar on the facility, and to address onsite storm water management, to address some of the amount of impacts of this facility and that face Gowanus in general, and then to work with us both with Department of Transportation, but especially Department of Sanitation to make sure that the substantial number of public infrastructure trucks can-don't overwhelm the local playground, parking and other issues. with those new commitments, which they have provided today, I'm pleased to recommend a vote to approve with modifications to modify this application modestly, and then approve it with those modifications, and I thank you for your time, and this committee for its work.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you very much Council Member Lander. We did have a pretty good-very lively hearing on these items, and recognizing that the community was very much in favor of

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2 landmarking. So, we're really excited about this.
3 So, thank you very much--

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: [interposing]
Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: --for your support. We would like to acknowledge Council Member Treyger. Who is also on the committee and has entered the room. I will continue to go on with what we're doing today. We will also vote to approve LU 239 the Hans S. Christian Memorial Kindergarten, two historic landmark designations by the Landmarks Preservation Commission located in the Carroll Gardens neighborhood in Brooklyn as was heard, Represented by Council Member Brad Lander. The Subcommittee heard testimony that the residents of 238 President Street strongly support the designation of that building while the owner of the Hans S. Christian Memorial Garden opposes designation of that building citing alternations to the structure in LPC's prior decision to pursue designation after a 2007 request for evaluation. However, LPC provided persuasive testimony that alternations to the kindergarten are reversible that that structure has significant aesthetic value, and when taken together with the

2	adjacent building at 238 President Street which
3	served as the Brooklyn Deaconess Home of the
4	Methodist Episcopal Church. The structure at 236
5	President has significant historic value both as the
6	first purpose-built kindergarten in the city and as
7	home of the first Spanish Methodist Church,
8	Brooklyn's oldest Spanish language Protestant Church.
9	Based on these findings and the support of Council
10	Member Lander the Subcommittee will therefore vote to
11	approve both designations. Finally, we will vote to
12	approve with modifications LU 256, an application
13	submitted by the Department of Transportation and the
14	Department of Citywide Administrative Services
15	pursuant to Section 197-C of the New York City
16	Charter for the site selection and acquisition of
17	property located at 25 14 <sup>th</sup> Street in Brooklyn for a
18	fleet vehicle maintenance and repair facility. DOT
19	has committed to exploring sustainable energy systems
20	in this building. Accordingly, our modification will
21	clarify and ensure that this site is for a DOT fleet,
22	not another agency fleet. This site is also in
23	Council Member Lander's District. I now call for a
24	vote to approve LUs 278, 238 and 239 and to approve

with modifications LU 256. Counsel, please call the roll.

LEGAL COUNSEL: Adams.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: I vote aye on all.

LEGAL COUNSEL: Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I vote aye on

all.

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LEGAL COUNSEL: Treyger.

COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Aye.

LEGAL COUNSEL: By a vote of 3 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative with 0 abstentions,
LUS 278, 238 and 239 are recommended for approval and
LU 256 is recommended for approval with modifications
by the full Land Use Committee.

CHAIRPERSON ADAMS: Thank you very much.

This vote will be held open for 20 minutes. This concludes today's business, but I would like to thank--[background comments] We will leave this meeting open. I said this—this vote is open for 20 minutes. I would like to thank the members of the public, my colleagues, Council and Land Use staff for attending today.
