Good afternoon. Thank you all for being here with us on this Thursday. We have a very busy agenda ahead of us. Before we begin, I want to remember some of those who have passed in the weeks since our last stated meeting. We have lost sadly yet another 9-11 First Responder. Gregory Vincent Sorecy[SP?] to illnesses he developed serving down at ground zero. On behalf of the entire City Council, I want to thank Gregory for his bravery, and I send my deep condolences to Gregory's wife and his three children.

Bob Slade, the iconic radio host, died on Monday after battling kidney disease on his show open line Bob give a voice to many issues facing New York City's African American Community. On behalf of the City Council, I would like to extend my sympathy to Bob's family, friends, and colleagues. We also got some sad news just this morning that former City

Parks Commissioner and former New York City Council

Member Henry Stern passed away yesterday. Henry

lived a life of public service and he loved every

minute of it. The joy he brought to the work of

serving the people of New York was legendary and lets

let Henry's life of unbridled enthusiasm be an

inspiration to all of us. We get to serve the people

in the greatest city in the world.

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On March 19<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Janet Lieberman, an educational pioneer who fought to make education more accessible to New Yorkers passed away. She helped shape and built LaGuardia Community College, where just a few weeks ago I held my first state of the city address. LaGuardia holds a special place in the heart of the city and all New Yorkers are grateful for the life lead by Dr. Janet Lieberman.

We also lost Lu-Duan Zhou, a Lyft driver who took his own life this past weekend. He was 49 years old. Our thoughts are with his family and friends. There has been an upsetting and disturbing pattern, epidemic of for hire vehicle and taxi drivers taking their own lives in our city. This Council is committed to helping drivers of taxis and for hire vehicles deal with the emotional, mental and

financial pain caused by an industry in turmoil and upheaval. Although, these next three individuals are not New Yorkers, it is still important we recognize their loss. In the past week, Jeremy Richman, Sidney Ialo[SP?] and Calvin Dazier[SP?] all took their own lives. Sidney and Calvin were survivors of the Parkland School shooting in Florida and Jeremy lost his daughter in the Sandy Hook shooting in 2012.

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All three of these deaths are tragedies that speak to the ongoing trauma caused by gun violence in our country, which lingers for years and decades and lifetimes after the shootings take place. My heart breaks for the suffering they endured, and I remind every single American that thoughts and prayers alone are not enough and that we must do concrete things to stop gun violence in this country. We must console and we must pray. We also must fight with all of our hearts to make change. And now, if we could all rise and take a moment of silence in memory of Gregory Sorecy, Robert Spenser, Bob Slade, Janet Lieberman, Lu-Duan Zhou, Jeremy Richman, Sidney Ialo and Calvin Dazier.

Thank you all. This stated meeting also falls in the same week as the  $108^{\rm th}$  anniversary of

the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire. The deadliest industrial tragedy in our city's history. This fire took 146 lives and it forever changed our country.

Those who lost their lives, did not die in vain. The tragedy sparked the birth of the American Labor

Movement which has changed lives for the better for countless Americans, almost all of these lives that were lost were young women. We owe it to all of those who lost their lives in the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire to continue to fight for workers rights.

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Today, there is also a cause for a celebration. As it is our last Stated Meeting in Women's Herstory Month. None of us would be the people we are today without the women in our lives. The New York City Council would not be as strong as it is today without the women in it and we must do more to elect more women in all offices especially in this body where we need more women. Thank you to the amazing, inspiring, hard working women of the New York City Council and all of the fantastic women on our staffs here at the Council. You each play a vital role here at the New York City Council and we would not be able to do the work without all of you. So, a big round of applause to all the amazing women.

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I also want to remind everyone that this Saturday, March 30<sup>th</sup>, we kicked off participatory budgeting vote week. This evening I am kicking off an event and so, I am so excited to kick off this process and then lastly, I want us to welcome a Council Member who is joining us from the great City of Seattle, Council Member Theresa Moschetto is here, welcome. [APPLAUSE] Great to have a fellow Council Member from another great city join us today. So, we're glad you are here in New York. Thank you for everything that you do, and I know that you have been working with individual Council Members led by Council Member Lander on working together to see what municipalities can do and learning from each other on progressive policies that can make a difference for the lives of the people that we serve.

Now lets dive into the agenda for today. The Council will vote on the following Land Use

The Council will vote on the following tax exemptions, Cooper Square MAHA Phase 1 in Council Member Rivera's district, which is the renovation of an affordable building and 167 West 133<sup>rd</sup> Street in Council Member Perkin's district for the preservation of units. The Council will vote on the following finance items, the Council will vote on the operating budget as prepared by the Council's administrative services division and the Council will vote on the following two article 11 property tax exemptions 369 East 8<sup>th</sup> Street in Council Member Carlina Rivera's district is going to facilitate the preservation of affordable housing and Glendale apartments. And Council Member Holden's district will provide a partial 40-year exemption to preserve additional affordable units.

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We are going to vote on an expense budget modification and revenue budget modification for the Fiscal 2019 Budget. We reached an agreement for \$1.6 million in emergency allocation to fund the New York

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL Immigrant Family Unity Project. This is an urgent need to increase legal funding to help immigrants facing deportation. I am proud we were able to reach an agreement with Mayor de Blasio to provide additional funding to NYIFUP. This emergency funding will help us provide more attorney's to New Yorkers in need. This is a crucial fight as the ICE deportation machine has ramped up efforts to interfere with the necessary work NYIFUP is doing by pushing people through the system with zero guard for due process. I will continue to fight for these un-American and horrific immigration. I will fight against these un-American and horrific immigration policies. I want to commend the amazing and crucial work provided by the attorney's at NYIFUP. Council Member Menchaca, the Chair of our Immigration Committee and myself visited Immigration Court on Varick's Street in my district last week and it was disturbing to see what was happening there. gone from having three court rooms to increase to five courtrooms for the purposes of avoiding NYIFUP attorney's being able to be in the court room to be able to give access to an attorney to these folks who are facing deportation proceedings and this funding

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will allow NYIFUP and the three legal service organizations to cover all five court rooms immediately after we saw what was happening last week, when we visited. That day we went to the administration and asked them to come up with an agreement for emergency funding to provide immediate services to these folks because of the number of deportations that are happening every single day on Varick's Street and I am really proud that with this infusion of emergency funds the three legal service organizations will be able to cover all five court rooms to help immigrants here in New York City.

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Moving on, the Council will vote on the following legislation. The Council will vote on 11 resolutions relating to the legalization of marijuana, including calling on the state to legalize cannabis for adult use and calling on congress to pass the marijuana justice act which would remove marijuana from the list of federally controlled substances. It is far past time to legalize marijuana and I'm excited that New York City is finally considering this long overdue policy shift.

But as we debate what legalization looks like, it is of paramount importance that we always

remember the harm caused by the war on drugs and the mass incarceration state that we've built particular in communities of color. That is why we are calling for marijuana convictions to be expunged and for those convictions to not be used to terminate someone's public housing. We are also calling for business opportunities that are generated by a legal marijuana industry to be dedicated to those communities that were most harmed, including people with past convictions.

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In order for those business opportunities to be meaningful, we're calling on the state to ban vertical integration so that small businesses aren't drowned out by a large corporate industry. In addition, New York City needs to have more control over how marijuana regulations are put in place.

Because legal marijuana is going to impact the city much differently then other areas throughout the state. We are calling for the authority to decide how to regulate public consumption and because we have been stuck with state-imposed penalties for too long, we need to be able to do something about the racially disparate enforcement of any penalty. We are calling for the authority to decide what rules

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 26 for growing marijuana and home delivery should be in New York City given that those issues are so unique in the context of the most densely populated city in the country.

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And finally, we're calling for some authority to decide how licenses are issued, so we can make sure that legalization will actually benefit Black and Latino communities that have been disproportionately impacted by marijuana criminalization. Introduction 1010, sponsored by Council Member I. Daneek Miller, would create and alternate means of enforcement adjudicated through oath for certain types of commercial vehicles illegally parked overnight on a residential street. These newly created fines would be higher than those in existing law. \$400 for a first offense and \$800 for a second offense within a six-month period. want to thank the staff who worked on this. James Giovanni, Elliot Lynn and Brad Reed.

Introduction 1166-A sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to conduct a yearlong assessment of potential determinants of legionnaires disease in New York City.

Introduction 1164-A sponsored by Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene report annually to the City Council on the results of building cooling tower inspections and make such results available online.

Introduction 1158, sponsored by Council
Member and Health Chair Mark Levine, would require
that the Commissioner of the Department of Health and
Mental Hygiene in consultation with the Department of
Buildings hold information sessions at least twice
annually for building owners regarding maintenance,
cleaning and inspections of cooling towers and to
post that information online.

Introduction 1149 sponsored by Council
Member Ben Kallos, would require the Department of
Health and Mental Hygiene send owners and operators
of cooling towers an electronic reminder prior to the
filing deadline for annual certifications with a link
to where these certifications can be submitted. This
bill would also require cooling tower inspectors to
report to DOHMH in real time when inspections occur
and finally, this bill would require building owners
to make cooling tower inspection results available
for public examination.

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I want to thank the staff who worked on this package of bills, Sarah Liss, Genone Zilca[SP?], Christopher Sartori and Zia Manuel Halu[SP?].

Next, Introduction 1308-A sponsored again by Council Member Mark Levine, who is our Health Committee Chair, would require an individual that request the Department of Mental Hygiene to be able redact the name of a physician from a birth record, when that physician's license has been surrendered or revoked by the New York State office of Professional Medical Conduct. Chair Levine will speak specifically about some amazing folks that are with us today that were really the catalysts behind this bill and making it possible and their advocacy and hard work. I am really proud of the Chair for his work on this bill and I am really glad we are passing this today. And the staff that worked on that is Geisery Genoparthy[SP?], Sarah Liss and Zia Manuel Halu .

Introduction 1064-B sponsored by Council
Member Ben Kallos, will require that restaurants in
New York City only offer water, sparkling water,
flavored water, nonfat or one percent milk, non-dairy
milk, 100 percent fruit or vegetable juice or fruit

or vegetable juice combined with water or carbonated water as the default option including on childrens meals. I want to congratulate Council Member Kallos who has worked on this for years and I want to thank the same staff, Geisery Genoparthy[SP?], Sarah Liss and Zia Manuel Halu. Giving parents a healthier default drink option in their child's fast food is a welcoming and much needed change. This change will hopefully set a precedent for current parents in future generations to make better choices overall in the kinds of beverages they consume when they visit a fast food establishment.

I want to thank Council Member Kallos for again, for his work on this bill and I also want to thank the New York Academy of Medicine, the American Cancer Network, the American Heart Association, NYU School of Medicine and the American Beverage Association for working collaboratively together to come up with a final bill to pass and this is a ground breaking piece of legislation in the entire country. This is about everyone getting together for the good of our children and I am very proud of that end result.

Obesity is an epidemic in New York City with more than half of adults overweight or obese according to Department of Health. The American Heart Association recommends that children limit consumption of one or fewer eight-ounce sugary drink per week, but children are

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While families can still chose a sugary beverage, McDonalds menus are already in compliance and I quote more than half of happy meals served in the United States include water, milk, or juice as the beverage of choice. I want to thank the American Heart Association for their support in a survey that found 94 percent support from New Yorkers. Thank you to Speaker Cory Johnson who secured the endorsement of the American Beverage Association clearing the way for passage today at the New York City Council. Please also consider voting for Introduction 1149-B. A woman in my district died and six got sick from Legionnaires Disease in 2017. Thanks to Local Law 77 of 2015, campion by our former housing health chair, Cory Johnson, we knew where more than 100 cooling towers were so we could test them and clean them before anyone else got sick or died.

In 2018, WNYC reported more than 1,000 towers were not getting inspected every 90 days as required. My own analysis found that number has more than doubled since then to over 2,000. New Yorkers can breath easier as warm weather and cooling season

approaches as cooling towers that are breading grounds for Legionnaires will finally have to report compliance with 90 inspections meant to stop the deadly disease. Thank you to Speaker Cory Johnson, Lora Pope, Jeff Baker, Genone Zocha[SP?] and the Department of Health and their partnership in saving lives.

would establish a costly civil penalty for parking 18-wheel trucks and other overnight vehicles in residential communities. The drivers of these commercial tractor trailers routinely abuse city parking regulations and degrade the quality of life of communities throughout the city. There are parks, homes, schools, churches, that are undermined by the parking of these trucks. They also are leaving pollution and debris in their way.

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We have worked with NYPD to ramp up enforcement efforts, but these offenses have still continued. The current fines imposed on big rigs have not been effective in curbing the abusive practice. Either they have deemed them just the course of doing business. In actuality the greatest expense of the cost of doing business has been to our communities. It has been to the health and the quality of life of our communities. Their brain is still developing right. So, if you overuse the drugs, you may harm them permanently. So, there are a lot of things we don't know about it, so I am voting against these Resolutions.

The other resolution I'm sponsoring 741 calls for inclusive state licensing that prioritizes those who have been wronged by the war on drugs in entrepreneurship and production, sale and distribution of marijuana. To many people have been

1488, a local law to amend the administrative code of the City of New York in relation to requiring the police department to obtain information on a disposition of sex offense cases and requiring the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to report on outcomes of sex offense cases. Currently, the NYPD knows how many sex related complaints are received and how many subsequent arrests are made but they lack information related to the number of convictions that are made in relation to sex crimes.

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In the spirit of transparency, we would like this information shared with both the NYPD and the City Council.

Intro. 1489 Local Law to amend the code requiring high volume for higher services, dispatch service providers and bases to report complaints about drivers concerning passenger safety to the taxi and limousine commission. There is no publicly available data on the number of internal passenger safety complaints received by customers of for hire drivers or for drivers of other ride share companies. This bill will ensure that all complaints given to these companies are reported to the TLC and will be made public. These bills will increase transparency in regards to public safety concerns and will give the Council as a body the opportunity to evaluate trends and possibly address these issues legislatively. Thank you.

much Madam Majority Leader. I want to call my colleagues attention to intros 1483 and 1484. They will make New York City's shelter system more accessible to people who have pets.

These bills join others in a package campion by the Speaker, Cory Johnson to improve animal welfare citywide. Currently people who are homeless and living with pets have limited options.

Shelters are not pet accessible and owners are forced to either give up a cherished

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STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 64 member of their family or decide to not enter the shelter system.

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I have talked with people living on the street who have told me the reason they weren't in shelters is because they couldn't bring their pet with them. For someone who has lost so much else in their life, losing their pet can be unthinkable. The issue is especially pronounced for survivors of domestic violence. Being forced to give up a pet can be a major factor in a person decided to stay in an abusive situation. Few DV Shelters accept pets, yet they provide critical emotional support and can be an important healing tool for people experiencing trauma. We need to strengthen resources to keep people with their animals, animal loved ones and help support their wellbeing stress reduction stability in their lives.

Intro. 1483 and 1484, will help us better understand the scope of the problem and how to increase shelter capacity for people with pets. We know that a one size fits all response is not the answer, creating a citywide plan paired with greater data will allow us to examine where the needs are greatest and what the practical solutions can be

implemented locally. This is about finding solutions that work and that fit into our citywide goals of better serving New York's population who find themselves homeless. Thank you to the Urban Resources Institute, My Dog is My Home, HSU and Human. NYC for their partnership on this and service to New Yorkers facing housing instability and for many people, their pet is their family and where they call home. No one should be forced to leave a member of their family behind. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON CUMBO: Council Member Miller.

Majority Leader. My colleagues, I wish to highlight the fact that today, March 28, 2019, marks the two-year anniversary of our brother and sisters at IBEW Local 3 ongoing struggle against Charter Communications. 738 days ago, 1800 Spectrum members, roughly 10 percent of whom live in Southeast Queens walk the picket line after Charter. The second largest cable provider in the country attempted to push a contract on Local 3 members that eliminated his pension and members health care benefits which

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STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 66 would have forced him to pay unaffordable monthly premiums and high course overheads.

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Last year, Charter raked in roughly \$44 billion in revenue last year while members exhausted their State Unemployment Insurance benefits with supplemented weekly benefits paid to them by the unions emergency fund. A number of local 3 members have become homeless or separated from their families.

Meanwhile, Charter has reportedly built our city out of \$6 million in add revenue agreed to a \$174 million settlement with the states attorney general for fraud last December, had his license to operate revoked by the state public service commission and defaulted on his franchise agreement in the city on two separate occasions.

Charter has established a pattern of deceit against its own workers and consumers. In the name of boosting its profits margin and must be held accountable for its deception. Well-paying middle-class jobs, healthcare, generational security that has been achieved through Union membership are the core principles of this city for which this company has demonstrated contempt and certainly no

appreciation. We will not tolerate Charter

Communication behavior. It must come to the table

and negotiate with Local 3 in good faith on this

impasse. I urge the brother and sisters on this

movement to stand strong and that they are not

forgotten.

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CHAIRPERSON CUMBO: Thank you Council Member Miller. We will now have Council Member Constantinides followed by Council Member Moya.

COUNCIL MEMBER CONSTANTINIDES: Thank you Madam Majority Leader, I ask my colleagues support on Intro. 1480 introduced with Council Member Eric Ulrich that would create the office of Marine debris disposal. Our waterways are littered literally with boats with other debris that have made it unsafe. The propose environmental hazards and we need to be able to get those boats out of the water that have been abandoned and left there to rot that pose a risk. I also want to ask my colleagues to support Resolution 803. I know we have Elisa and some of the young people from the Sunrise Movement who were here marching at City Hall for climate action just a little bit over two weeks ago and this resolution would support the creation of green new deal on a

federal level. The time tact on climate is now. We need to hear the voices of these young people who are courageously stepping up and saying that it is time for us to act. So, thank you Elisa for being here and for shedding a path for us to follow. Thank you.

Majority Leader. 1487 with every neighborhood wide rezoning, thousand and thousand of New Yorkers have their future thrown into uncertainty. Right now, we're seeing long term residence in east Harlem and Inwood or along Jerome Avenue. The very creators of their communities character being forced out of their homes. neighborhoods are becoming prime for new development. More communities are next in line for these massive rezoning's and unfortunately for their residents, when they show up to the zoning committee and they beg me to tell them how a rezoning is going to affect them, I can't. The very best I can do is offer and educated guess. We have absolutely no quantitative data on how a neighborhood rezoning will affect gentrification or secondary displacement. And when

we're talking about massive rezoning's that will directly affect thousands of New Yorkers, that's just not good enough. This bill will require that we study the effects of neighborhood wide rezoning's on secondary displacements so that we no longer leap before we look. Good data inspires good policy and if we are going to dig our way out of the city's housing crisis, we are going to need both. This bill has the potential to have a concrete and positive affect on the working-class New Yorkers most acutely affected by neighborhood rezoning's.

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I want to specifically thank the Legal
Aid Society and Make the Road New York for their
advocacy work and their invaluable perspective on
this bill and fighting for housing justice. Thank
you, Madam Majority Leader.

CHAIRPERSON CUMBO: Thank you and I want to thank all of you for all of your work, particularly for Women's Herstory Month. A great deal was accomplished, but I just want to end with words matter. We are all here, we all exist, it is a struggle many people face every day. The ability to exist in this world. It is our role here in this body to devote our every day to bringing people

together. To empowering people, to providing solutions for people who do not have a voices and cannot find their way. New York is unique in that way. Every day we have to show people all over the world to show people that it can be done. That people of all races and religions and economic back grounds and whatever gender we identify with that we can live together and that it can be done. And this is the important responsibility of living in New York City.

The movement of labeling people has become a dangerous one. Words matter, words matter. Mass shootings don't just start or just begin, they begin with words, they begin with ideas, and they begin with them coming into a chorus. Let us be careful with our words. Let us be mindful of our colleagues. Let's continue to bring our communities together and to show the world that it absolutely can be done. This is the great responsibility of New York City. There is no other city in the world that has the level of diversity that's in this body and it is our responsibility to carry that responsibility with dignity, with honor, and to have every single
