2 [sound check] [pause] [gavel]

3 CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Good morning. I am  
4 City Council Member Keith Powers and Chair of the  
5 Committee on Criminal Justice. I'm joined here today  
6 by my colleagues, Council Member Rory Lancman,  
7 Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, Council Member  
8 Bob Holden, and we will be joined by a few others  
9 shortly. We are here today to vote on four pieces of  
10 legislation relating to the wellbeing of incarcerated  
11 individuals. Before we move to a vote, I want to  
12 recon-I want to recognize and express my deep  
13 condolences for Layleen Polanco, a transgender woman  
14 of color who passed away in Department of Correction  
15 custody last Friday. We still here at the Council  
16 have a lot of questions about what happened, why she  
17 was in jail for \$500, about her medical condition,  
18 about the status of the investigation, and we're  
19 working tirelessly to get those answers, but before  
20 we move onto our vote today, I just ask that we take  
21 a moment of silence in recognition of her passing.  
22 [moment of silence] Thank you. Moving to today's  
23 vote, we will be voting on three bills aimed at  
24 improving the grievance process. First, we will vote  
25 on Council Member Ayala's bill, Proposed Introduction

2 1340-A, which will require the Department of  
3 Corrections to make the grievance process more  
4 efficient by creating a central system where it can  
5 track all complaints. It will also ensure greater  
6 access to the grievance process by requiring at least  
7 one grievance sot in each facility and by requiring  
8 electronic kiosks. The second is my bill Proposed  
9 Introduction 1370-A, which will require all  
10 complaints made by incarcerated individuals or on  
11 behalf of incarcerated individuals to 311 to be  
12 addressed by the Office of Constituent and Grievance  
13 Services. Additionally, it will ensure the  
14 department informs every incarcerated individual in  
15 writing about the grievance process and about the  
16 sections against retaliation. I just note that in  
17 light of our bill last year to improve access to  
18 telephone calls, the 311--and I would expect the 311  
19 system will be used more often, and I think this bill  
20 goes a long way to help those who will advantage of  
21 that. The third is Council Member Ampry-Samuel's bill  
22 Proposed Introduction 1334-A, which would require the  
23 Board of Correction to issue a report regarding the  
24 correctional system's grievance process. Finally, we  
25 have one bill, which is my bill focused on medical

2 appointments and sick call, Proposed Introduction  
3 1236-A would require the Department of Corrections to  
4 track data pertaining to clinical production in  
5 greater detail, and to share such information with  
6 the Board of Corrections and Correctional Health  
7 Services. The bill will also require Correctional  
8 Health Services to take a more active role in  
9 rescheduling this medical appointment. It will  
10 require the Department of Correction to retain all  
11 records having to do with sick call for the Board of  
12 Correction's review and would codify Board of  
13 Correction requirements to make sick call available  
14 five days a week excluding holidays. I just—I want  
15 to really thank before we get to the vote the staff  
16 here on the Council, my staff as well. We spent a  
17 lot of time on some pieces of this legislation  
18 ensuring that we get them correct, but making sure  
19 that they work for all folks who are incarcerated,  
20 and ensuring that for sick call and medical call for  
21 instance that we have better process today after our  
22 hearing where I think many of us felt there were gaps  
23 in the process for getting and receiving medical and  
24 sick call—medical appointments and sick call. With  
25 that being said, I want to invite sponsors or

2 committee members to make a statement prior to being  
3 able to vote. Council Member Ampry-Samuel, we'll  
4 start with you. Thank you.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: Good  
6 morning and thank you, Chair Powers for the  
7 opportunity to speak on Intro 1334-A. This bill  
8 involves the Department of Correction's grievance and  
9 complaint process, which you mentioned, and many of  
10 my colleagues are here who—who know that our purpose  
11 is to—to do the right thing, and I say that all the  
12 time. We've read the statistics, which prove people  
13 in custody have unequal access to the complain  
14 system, and it depends on the jail that you are  
15 housed in. However, it wasn't until that person  
16 visited Rikers Island and then participated in the  
17 oversight hearings and heard testimony from advocates  
18 where it was realized that transparency and  
19 accountability was clearly missing from our policies.  
20 Bill Intro 11334-A requires the Board of Corrections  
21 to issue a report on the Department of Correction 's  
22 grievance and complaint process, and it will also  
23 require that the Board of Corrections provide  
24 recommendations for improving the procedures and post  
25 it to their website. The bill is actually a direct

2 response to the recommendations from the Board of  
3 Corrections, and again it shows that people in  
4 custody have unequal access to the complaint systems,  
5 and this bill deals with the what happens next  
6 process, and it will hold the Department of  
7 Corrections accountable and will require an actual  
8 report on the grievance policies and recommendations.  
9 So, I'm excited about the passing of 1334-A because  
10 we always talk about transparency and accountability,  
11 and this provides a real systematic change that will  
12 improve the conditions for everyone at the  
13 facilities. So, thanks again. I look forward to the  
14 vote.

15 CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Great. Thank you.  
16 So, I think with that being said, we can open up the  
17 vote. [background comments/pause] Okay, we'll wait  
18 momentarily. Thanks. [pause] Okay, and we will  
19 begin the roll, and then we've also been joined by  
20 Council Member Rivera and Council Member Levine. Go  
21 ahead.

22 CLERK: William Martin, Committee Clerk.  
23 Roll call vote Committee on Criminal Justice. All  
24 items are coupled. Chair Powers.

25 CHAIRPERSON POWERS: I vote aye.

2 CLERK: Lancman.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LANCMAN: Aye.

4 CLERK: Ampry-Samuel.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: Aye.

6 CLERK: Holden.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Aye.

8 CLERK: Rivera.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Aye.

10 CLERK: By a vote of 5 in the affirmative

11 [pause/background comments] Council Member Levine.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER I vote aye. Thank you.

13 CLERK: By a vote of 6 in the  
14 affirmative, 0 in the negative and no abstentions,  
15 all items have been adopted by the committee.
