3 CHAIRPERSON POWERS: Good morning. 4 City Council Member Keith Powers and Chair of the 5 Committee on Criminal Justice. I'm joined here today 6 by my colleagues, Council Member Rory Lancman, 7 Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, Council Member 8 Bob Holden, and we will be joined by a few others shortly. We are here today to vote on four pieces of 10 legislation relating to the wellbeing of incarcerated 11 individuals. Before we move to a vote, I want to 12 recon-I want to recognize and express my deep 13 condolences for Layleen Polanco, a transgender woman 14 of color who passed away in Department of Correction 15 custody last Friday. We still here at the Council 16 have a lot of questions about what happened, why she 17 was in jail for \$500, about her medical condition, 18 about the status of the investigation, and we're 19 working tirelessly to get those answers, but before 20 we move onto our vote today, I just ask that we take 21 a moment of silence in recognition of her passing. 22 [moment of silence] Thank you. Moving to today's 23 vote, we will be voting on three bills aimed at 24 improving the grievance process. First, we will vote 25 on Council Member Ayala's bill, Proposed Introduction

2 1340-A, which will require the Department of Corrections to make the grievance process more 3 efficient by creating a central system where it can 4 5 track all complaints. It will also ensure greater 6 access to the grievance process by requiring at least 7 one grievance sot in each facility and by requiring electronic kiosks. The second is my bill Proposed 8 Introduction 1370-A, which will require all 9 complaints made by incarcerated individuals or on 10 behalf of incarcerated individuals to 311 to be 11 12 addressed by the Office of Constituent and Grievance 13 Services. Additionally, it will ensure the department informs every incarcerated individual in 14 15 writing about the grievance process and about the 16 sections against retaliation. I just note that in light of our bill last year to improve access to 17 18 telephone calls, the 311--and I would expect the 311 system will be used more often, and I think this bill 19 goes a long way to help those who will advantage of 20 that. The third is Council Member Ampry-Samuel's bill 21 2.2 Proposed Introduction 1334-A, which would require the 23 Board of Correction to issue a report regarding the correctional system's grievance process. Finally, we 24 have one bill, which is my bill focused on medical 25

appointments and sick call, Proposed Introduction 1236-A would require the Department of Corrections to track data pertaining to clinical production in greater detail, and to share such information with the Board of Corrections and Correctional Health Services. The bill will also require Correctional Health Services to take a more active role in rescheduling this medical appointment. It will require the Department of Correction to retain all records having to do with sick call for the Board of Correction's review and would codify Board of Correction requirements to make sick call available five days a week excluding holidays. I just-I want to really thank before we get to the vote the staff here on the Council, my staff as well. We spent a lot of time on some pieces of this legislation ensuring that we get them correct, but making sure that they work for all folks who are incarcerated, and ensuring that for sick call and medical call for instance that we have better process today after our hearing where I think many of us felt there were gaps in the process for getting and receiving medical and sick call-medical appointments and sick call. With that being said, I want to invite sponsors or

COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: morning and thank you, Chair Powers for the opportunity to speak on Intro 1334-A. This bill involves the Department of Correction's grievance and complaint process, which you mentioned, and many of my colleagues are here who-who know that our purpose is to-to do the right thing, and I say that all the We've read the statistics, which prove people in custody have unequal access to the complain system, and it depends on the jail that you are housed in. However, it wasn't until that person visited Rikers Island and then participated in the oversight hearings and heard testimony from advocates where it was realized that transparency and accountability was clearly missing from our policies. Bill Intro 11334-A requires the Board of Corrections to issue a report on the Department of Correction 's grievance and complaint process, and it will also require that the Board of Corrections provide recommendations for improving the procedures and post it to their website. The bill is actually a direct

8	report on the grievance policies and recommendations
9	So, I'm excited about the passing of 1334-A because
10	we always talk about transparency and accountability,
11	and this provides a real systematic change that will
12	improve the conditions for everyone at the
13	facilities. So, thanks again. I look forward to the
14	vote.

16	So, I think with that being said, we can open up the
17	vote. [background comments/pause] Okay, we'll wait
18	momentarily. Thanks. [pause] Okay, and we will
19	begin the roll, and then we've also been joined by
