That is the real progress, the real win, when it comes to what they've done, and he's very proud of his team, so [speaking in Spanish] Rodriguez.

UNIDENTIFIED: Thank you, Council Member It is great to be here surrounded by the great colleagues here, not only Daneek Miller, who is a co-chair of the Black, Latino and Asian Caucus, but also Councilwoman [inaudible] Rivera and Danny also, who are the chairmen of Finance, and the rest of the team who are here, Council Member Diaz and sorry if I missed anybody else, and Salamanca is here with us, too. Let me put it in this way, guys. [inaudible] that I was cofounder in 1993, and [inaudible] High School that worked with new coming students from Latin American, it doesn't have a big baseball field as George Washington High School. They don't have 2500 students from where the school can recruit. They are only like less than, like 600 students, 526, [inaudible] like their English can be better than me, but I can tell you that we share one things in 99%

with them, new coming, new arrive from Latin
American. Now as the DOE describe it, two years been
here, many of them being weeks before they
[inaudible]. So while we celebrate that first of all
not only people think about baseball, say yeah,
Dominicano [inaudible], no, no, no. This is about
hardworking people and this is about Council Member
Reynoso led a bill that we passed mandating DOE to
put together the data when it comes to sports,
because if we want to talk about the city of
[inaudible] sports is one of those. If they will go
and live in the community, that the school has all
the resources, then we have a private coach, then we
have all the support that they needed. They didn't
have none of those things. But they defeat, with all
my respect, Monroe. They defeat George Washington
and they played the last game at Yankee Stadium,
played against Beacon, and they won, and they won the
high school baseball division [applause]. [speaking
in Spanish], so I took the lead of putting together
this proclamation together with my colleagues to be
sure that the City of New York recognize today, you
know, the great contribution that they have made, so

This was the first time that both teams made it to the PSAL Triple A Baseball finals, the first time a school of less than 600 students won the title, and the longest game played in the PSAL in more than 100 years. And whereas the Gregorio Luperon High School's baseball team has made it to the playoffs every year since the baseball program instituted in 2006. In 2010 the Generals first made it to the finals at MCU Park in Brooklyn, the Gregorio Luperon High School's baseball program also holds the honor of having sent two of its baseball players to the professional leagues. And whereas the

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students and their coaches have truly distinguished themselves throughout their phenomenal season, with 16 outstanding wins and zero losses, and whereas the Generals are comprised of 19 student athletes of Dominican descent and new arrivals in the USA, throughout this championship season they have demonstrated what hard work, talent, and discipline can achieve when individuals are given opportunities. The players owe their achievements to the leadership and encouragement of their tireless coaches and their families who together instilled in them the value of teamwork, imparted in them a desire for success, and help them develop a sense of fair play and competition. And whereas all of these players have exemplified the strength of character and commitment to excellence needed as they continue to pursue their highest ambitions in the years ahead. Now therefore be it known that the New York City Council is proud to honor the Generals, the Gregorio Luperon High School baseball team, for their outstanding work that led them to become the 2019 PSAL Triple A Baseball champions and wishes them continued success both and off the field. So I want to thank you and welcome you to the chambers and [inaudible] viva Puerto Rico. [applause] Council Member Salamanca. COUNCIL MEMBER SALAMANCA: Yeah, I want to echo, I want to echo the words of my colleagues. I really want to thank you for helping out our family members, brothers and sisters in the motherland of Puerto Rico. You know, when Maria hit, the federal

government turned its back, but the City of New York

did not turn its back. The State of New York did not

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turn its back. And we put together this, this group to help out our Puerto Rican brothers and sisters, to get them services that they need, and that's exactly what you did. So we want to acknowledge you here, on the steps of City Hall, inside the chambers. Thank you. Gracias. [applause]

COUNCIL MEMBER AYALA: Council Member Miller.

COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: I want to thank you so much on behalf of the council. I know you were here early, ah, immediately. We were back and forth with the negotiations and then some of which traveled over after the Maria, ah, to the island to help out in whatever way we can. But you guys were here on the ground, making sure that people that had been displaced had homes, had all the resources that they need. On behalf of my family that's left back there and I'd say that I have an uncle that is just, that his roof put on his home in Rio Grande last week after two years. Thank you, thank you for the work that you continue to do 'cause there's a lot of work that needs to be done and I'm sure that you will continue to do it, and it has [inaudible] the administration, the work just gets done and I want to

COUNCIL MEMBER AYALA: Before I hand it over Peter to say a few words, I also wanted to recognize Leila Meja, manager of evacuee services, Julian Panelli, co-chair of the NYCPRLTRG and director of special projects for Catholic Charities Community Services, Zachary Hobson, director of New York Emergency Services, Salvation Army, Major Kevin Stoops, Salvation Army, Martin Medina, founder and executive director of Why Not Care, Michael Andrew, Vietta, member of Why Not Care, and Jonathan Sokol of Project Refugee. And with that I turn it over to Peter.

UNIDENTIFIED: We're all extraordinarily grateful for this recognition. Everyone you see up here has been working literally since the day Maria hit Puerto Rico. Both to travel to the island, to offer years of long-term recovery support there, but also with the over 3000 Puerto Rico evacuee families that are still here in New York City, hundreds of them in the New York City shelter system, thousands doubled up with family. Well, less than 300 have been able to secure housing and jobs. So we have a

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lot more to do to continue to support evacuees that are living here and trying to make a home in New York City, but also to continue to walk alongside the people of Puerto Rico on the island, Vieques, Culebra, to make sure that they have safe and secure housing for years to come. What has happened is a travesty, a failure of failure leadership, ah, all these agencies up here were left to raise money and struggle on their own, mostly with volunteers to do this work. There was not federal assistance to operate those programs. The Salvation Army has put extraordinary resources into this. Catholic Charities in partnership with the governor's office funding case management services. And most of the rest of us raising money through our donor networks, and we've really appreciated the support, particularly, ah, where's Walter? Walter Alvaren, who has really stood alongside us since the first day. [applause] You really delivered for us, Walter, and we really appreciate it. We'll never forget it. And I also want to thank the council members for taking the opportunity to recognize this work. hard work and volunteers, obviously, work from the soul, rather than for the reward of money. So we

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want to congratulate all of them, too. So, thank
you. [applause]

CLERK: Council City of New York Proclamation. The New York City Council is proud to honor New York City Puerto Rico Long-Term Recovery Group for helping thousands of Puerto Rico evacuees following Hurricane Maria. And whereas on March 18, 2018, the New York City was founded by eight dedicated organizations to comprehensively respond to the needs of thousands of Puerto Rico evacuees victimized by Hurricane Maria. Its membership includes Catholic Charities Community Services, Archioses of New York, New York Disaster Interfaith Services, New York State and New York City Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster, Project Refuge, Greater New York Division, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, and the Latino Carpenters Union, VIP Humanitarian and Why Not Care. And whereas following Hurricane Maria these organizations mobilized instantaneously to provide

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crucia services to displaced Puerto Ricans, both on the island and in New York City. Prior to joining forces and establishing the New York City Puerto Rico Long-Term Recovery Group, they were working diligently to provide disaster case management services, collect and distribute food and clothing donations, raise and distribute emergency cash assistance, and identify nationwide services for displaced populations. And whereas recognizing the strength in collective efforts, these organizations moved to establish the Long-Term Recovery Group to better serve Puerto Rican climate refugees. Chaired by New York Disaster Interfaith services and New York State and New York City Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster, the recovery group provides leadership and knowledge of best practices in disaster response in recovery. Since its founding they have provided recovery services to thousands of displaced Puerto Rican households and continue to support grassroots recovery organizations in Puerto Rico with donations, volunteers, logistical support, and outreach. And whereas the New York City and Puerto Rico Long-Term Recovery Group played an instrumental role in advocating for Puerto Rico

evacuees when their FEMA vouchers expired in June
2018 members of the recovery group applied pressure
on officials at every level of government to secure
more resources for Puerto Rico climate refugees
including the New York State Hurricane Evacuee
Legislative Initiative which supports disaster case
management for climate refugees. And whereas the New
York City Council commends the profound past and
continuing efforts of New York City and Puerto Rico
Long-Term Recovery Group helped thousands of families
regain stability after Hurricane Maria. Now
therefore be it known that the New York City Council
gratefully honors the New York City and Puerto Rico
Long-Term Recovery Group for its enduring advocacy or
behalf of Puerto Rico, its residents, and those
climate refugees seeking harbor in our great city.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader, for the opportunity to welcome the Reverend Jose Vargas from Iglesia de Dios on East 7th Street. Many in my community affectionately know him as Pastor Cheo. Reverend Vargas moved to the Lower East Side at the age of 17 from Aguadilla, Puerto Rico, an area from which many in my community and my own family are from. This was also one of the areas severely impacted by the 2017 hurricane. The Reverend has lived on East 10th Street ever since he

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came to New York City. He has spent decades developing a network of neighbors that provide support to members of the community and need. After pursuing his ministerial calling informally for many year, he sought his accreditation and ordination beginning in 2013 by the bishops of the Iglesias de Dios, a coalition of faith-based Latino clergy. is currently based in the heart of [loisida], where so many of us and those from the greater New York area seek spiritual guidance and refuge. He works to expand connections with an opportunities for young people especially and provides care, food, and activities to area seniors. He's also the chaplain of PSA-4 precinct in my district. In his invocation, Cheo mentions public service being a commitment that must be inclusive and I'm thankful to all of you, my colleagues and the people in this chamber, for recognizing that Spanish is one of the many beautiful languages of this city. He is a pastor of all people, offering blessings and good wishes to so many, whether at his church, the local block party, or when you bump into him in the street, which I have from Avenue B to Union Square Park. In connection with the proclamations presented today to

With the budget successfully behind us, we have an agenda full of legislative items to get through, but before we get started I would like to remember FDNY Lieutenant John Moran, who passed away last week from cancer. He served the city, our city, his city, for more than 20 years, including through rescue and recovery efforts at Ground Zero. I also would like all of us to

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please keep retired NYPD Detective Luis Alvarez, who recently testified in front of Congress, in your thoughts. He joined other First Responders to advocate on behalf of the 9/11 Victims' Compensation Fund earlier this month, despite having gone through nearly 70 rounds of chemotherapy, and he is now sadly entered hospice care. Following his incredibly moving testimony, we've heard just this week that there may finally be some agreement to reauthorize the Victims' Compensation Fund soon. All of us urge the Congress to act. Lou and other heroes of 9/11 deserve this and they deserve so much more. Let's do the right thing. Let's take care of these heroes. Let's make sure they don't have to be re-traumatized every time this conversation has to happen. Let's authorize this bill for perpetuity so that these heroes and their families are able to get the proper medical care and treatment that they need after they've given so much to us on one of the darkest days in American history. I now ask all of us to rise and take a moment of silence for FDNY Lieutenant John Moran and to keep NYPD Detective Luis Alvarez in our thoughts and prayers. [moment of silence] I also want to take a moment for a few staff

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announcements. We are very sadly, I'm actually very sad, to say goodbye to two incredibly important members of our City Council team. The first is someone who I just, is he here? He's here. who I just have the deepest affection for. Kevin Grow has been with me since my campaign in 2017 and he joined our press department and communications team as the City Council's digital director. Everything you see on Twitter and on Instagram and on Facebook promoting the work of the members here and the hearings and the work we do every single day, highlighting the bills, Kevin has done that work for the last year and a half. He is an amazing, amazing I am going to miss his talent and digital know-how, but I'm really happy for him because he is just such a special person and he is moving to Iowa to work for Mayor Pete on a presidential campaign. He is going to be the field director, the organizing director for the entire state of Iowa in a presidential race, which is a big deal. I am very sad to lose him, but I am very, very happy for him. He is just someone who was there for me every single day when I was running for speaker and I'm really sad that he's going. I tried to convince him to stay,

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but I was unsuccessful, but I'm really, really happy for him. So I want to say Kevin, I love you, thank you very much for everything. Thank you so much.

[applause] And next is someone who we all know, and we had a fabulous retirement party for her yesterday, someone who is a friend and a constituent, someone who I knew long before I ran for City Council.

[people start shouting in background] [pause] So I want to, shhh.

goodbye to someone and I would love just a moment to recognize an individual's many years to the City Council, so if we could not have an interruption while we honor someone who has given so much to this institution and to our city I would appreciate that, and if we have another interruption I don't want to have to clear the balcony, but we're going to have to because we have a lot of work to get through today. So, again, we had a great retirement party yesterday for an incredible, incredible person, someone who has served this council for 17 years. She has served under four speakers. She has orchestrated hundreds, if not thousands, of events. Christine McLaughlin,

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the amazing director of events and correspondence services [applause], someone whom we all love so much, where is she? We love Christine McLaughlin [applause continues]. Thank you, Christine, for everything. OK, now let's dive into our agenda, starting with land use items. Today we're going to vote on the Bay Street neighborhood rezoning on the North Shore of Staten Island. In addition to securing 1800 affordable housing units, Council Member Debbie Rose engaged in tough negotiations with the administration to secure two new schools, the reconstruction of the Cromwell Center, upgrades to several parks, funding from the Department of Environmental Protection, I know she has worked very hard on this one, so I want to congratulate her, and I know that she will have more to say later on this rezoning. We're going to vote on 2 Howard Avenue in Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuels' district, Brook 156, in LU Chair Rafael Salamanca's district, the Court Square text amendment in Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer's district, Haven Green Senior Housing, in Council Member Margaret Chin's district, and I know this was a tough one, but I understand we made significant progress on the open space concerns that

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were raised throughout the process. I know how much the Elizabeth Street Garden means to the community and I know how hard Council Member Chin has worked on We have been working with the [Domatis] organization and we have a letter of intent from the adjacent building owner to the south to work to combine their existing 14,000 square feet of courtyard space with new space on the site with the senior affordable housing, and I want to congratulate Council Member Chin. I know she has spent a long time on this. Together the two open spaces would be over 20,000 square feet. They also agreed to work with HPD to keep their building as affordable housing, and I want to thank them for this commitment and for being good neighbors in the community, and I look forward to continuing to work together with them and with Margaret on this. A big thanks to our land use team, who worked with both Margaret and Debbie and all the other applications, John Douglas, Arthur Ha, Rosa Kelly, Chelsea Kelly, Amy Levitan, and of course Raju Mann. Moving on, the council will be voting on the following pieces of legislation. First, we have two bills from Minority Leader Steven Matteo related to AEDs. Introduction 109-A will

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2	require the Department of Parks and Recreation to
3	provide an automated external defibrillator at every
4	large swimming pool facility under its jurisdiction
5	and require that at least one Parks employee be
6	trained to use an AED, that they be present during
7	all hours of pool operation. Next is Introduction
8	1042-A, again by Minority Leader, and it will permit
9	the Department of Citywide Administrative Services
10	and the Department of Parks and Recreation to
11	distribute any extra automated external
12	defibrillators they have to additional youth sports
13	leagues after they have first fulfilled their
14	obligation to provide AEDs to youth baseball and
15	softball leagues. I want to thank the staff that
16	worked on this, Chris Artori and Patrick Mulvehill.
17	Next, we have two important pieces related to climate
18	and the environment. Council Member and chair of our
19	Environmental Protection Committee, Costa
20	Constantinides, has put forth Introduction 1619,
21	which would make several technical and clarifying
22	amendments to Local Law 97 of 2019. That was our
23	historic Climate Mobilization Act, which Chair
24	Constantinides had worked on for years and this is a
25	clean-up hill and I want to thank Nicele Ren for her

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work on that. Next is Resolution 864-A, sponsored by Ben Kallos, which would declare an emergency, a climate emergency, and it calls for accelerated actions to address the full range of ecological threats we are facing. San Francisco and other cities around the world have already issued climate emergency declarations and New York City joins those cities today. I want to thank the staff that worked on this, Nadia Johnson, Ricky Chala, and Samara Swanson. Next is Introduction 5-B, by Council Member Inez Barron, which would require that restaurants in New York City display information messaging on healthy eating for individuals with diet-related, including, but not limited to, diabetes, heart disease, and hypertension, and I want to thank the staff, Sarah Liss, Zeamanuel Halu, Emily Balking, and Smita Deshmu. Introduction 1331-B, by Council Member Ritchie Torres, who is the chair of our oversight and investigations committee, will require the Department of Investigation to issue an annual report to the City Council on the total overtime hours record and the total overtime paid to NYCHA employees for the prior calendar year. The bill would also direct DOI to issue an annual report to the City Council on any

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small procurement contracts as defined by NYCHA procurement rules awarded during the prior year, including an analysis regarding whether any housing may have been awarded small procurement contracts to avoid compliance with NYCHA procurement rules. want to thank and congratulate Council Member Torres on this and thank the staff, Daniel Collins. Next, we have Introduction 1549 by Council Member Francisco Moya, which will rename 126th Street between Northern Boulevard and Roosevelt Avenue in Queens Seaver Way and amend the official city map accordingly. Seaver was a Hall of Fame baseball pitcher who played 20 seasons in major league baseball, 12 for the Mets. He was one of only two pitchers in the history of baseball to have 300 wins, 3000 strike-outs, and a career ERA of under 3.0. He was an instrumental member of the Mets victory over the Orioles in the 1969 World Series, where he pitched a one-run, 10inning complete game to put the Mets up 3 to 1 in the series. Tom Seaver embodies the spirit of the amazing 69 Mets, which is a team that means so much to our city and I'm proud we are doing this today. want to congratulate Francisco on this, even though he is a soccer fan. We love soccer, too. And I want

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to congratulate the staff, Chris Artori and Patrick Mulvihill. Lastly, we have a package of bills related to protections and services for transgender, gender nonconfirming, nonbinary, and intersexed individuals who are involved in the justice system. I would be happy to advance this package, of course, at any time, but it is particularly meaningful to do this during Pride Month and the lead-up to the parade in March this Sunday. Transgender, gender nonconforming, nonbinary, and intersexed individuals face some of the greatest challenges when involved in the criminal justice system and these bills seek to address the greatest challenges when involved in the criminal justice system and these bills seek to address some of these systemic problems. I would be remiss if we did not mention Layleen Polanco, who as you heard from some of the folks who are here today, tragically, sadly, passed away earlier this month in Riker's. Layleen never should have been on Riker's to begin with. Her story is one which shows the deep flaws of our criminal justice system. She never should have been in Riker's Island. She should not have been in solitary confinement. This never should have happened, and this is a huge tragedy. I want to

2 thank Rosa Goldensohn from The City for her amazing covering and reporting on this, and this is why I 3 support closing Riker's Island and moving away from 4 5 Riker's Island. We lost Layleen, but we are trying, 6 attempting to take serious steps to protect members 7 of the trans community as well as other gender nonconforming, nonbinary, and intersexed individuals. 8 Introduction 1535-A is sponsored by Council Member 9 Helen Rosenthal and will require that the Board of 10 Corrections convene a task force composed of 11 12 representatives of the Department of Corrections, the Mayor's Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based 13 Violence, NYC Unity, Correctional Health Services, 14 15 formerly incarcerated individuals, local service 16 providers, local and national experts on transgender, gender nonconforming, nonbinary, and intersexed 17 18 policy, and people who were formerly incarcerated in the transgender housing unit at Riker's, to the 19 extent practicable. The task force would be 20 responsible for publishing yearly reports containing 21 2.2 recommendations on DOC policies, regarding TGNC, NB, 23 and intersexed individuals. Council Member Diana Ayala has put forward two related bills, Introduction 24 1513-A will ensure that individuals in the 25

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transgender housing unit not only have the same access to mental health treatment as do individuals housed elsewhere, but also that all professionals treating individuals who are transgender or nonbinary or intersex have specialized training in transgender and gender-affirming care. Introduction 1514-A will require that those housed in the transgender housing unit be afforded the same access to substance use treatment that those housed outside the unit receive. Passage of these bills will ensure that transgender individuals don't have to choose between receiving appropriate substance use treatment and living in the transgender housing unit. Finally, Introduction 1530-A, sponsored by Council Member Francisco Moya, will require the Department of Corrections to issue incident-level reports to the City Council and to the Board of Corrections on housing requests made related to gender identity on a biannual basis and to issue an aggregate report to the public on an annual basis. This legislation will bring greater transparency into the application and appeals process for those who seek housing within the DOC, to ensure that DOC is responsive to those who are seeking this housing and responsive to their gender identity. I want to thank

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the staff for all these DOC bills. I want to thank
Alana Civen and Max Camfer-Williams. That concludes
our agenda for today's Stated Meeting and I look
forward to proceeding with today's votes. Thank you,
Madam Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Majority Thank you, Speaker Johnson, for providing me Leader. with this opportunity to talk about an application known as Haven Green, to create over 100 units, more than 100 units, of senior housing. The path to this final vote has been a long one. For decade this site in Little Italy has been promised as the future home for affordable housing. With this vote our city is finally delivering on that promise. This project will create over 100 units of deeply affordable housing for elderly New Yorkers, including members of our city's LGBTQ community and the homeless seniors. Recognizing the community's need for open space, more than 6000 square feet of publicly accessible space was included in the plan. Today I am proud of our

1 2 effort to secure even more open space, which the 3 speaker talk about, which include an agreement with 4 the adjacent building owner to add thousands more 5 square feet to this project and as part of this agreement 150 units of Section 8 affordable apartment 6 7 at this neighboring building will remain affordable. Taken together, these gains add even more benefit to 8 an already-strong application that address both the 9 urgent need for affordable housing and open space for 10 the neighborhood. You know, this project has 11 12 inflamed passion on both side. However, I believe 13 that no matter where you stand on this particular application all of us want what's best for our 14 15 neighborhood. Our city will need the passion and 16 commitment shown by both side of this issue if we are 17 to address the affordability crisis that is leaving too many New Yorkers behind. This collective effort 18 is what we mean when we talk about housing justice 19 20 for all. This is what we need when we talk about building communities that welcome all New Yorkers 21 2.2 regardless of their socioeconomic status, background, 23 or identity. This is what we mean when we talk about

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doing what's the right thing for those most in need. That include homeless seniors...

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MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Council Member Chin.

seniors of the Stonewall generation who fought for civil rights that we are celebrating Pride this month. I wanted to thank Land Use chair, Chair Salamanca, Chair Adams, for, you know, for chairing that long hearing and, ah, the land use staff, especially Roger Mann helping with this negotiation and all the supporters, all the seniors who are here, Coalition of Supporters for Affordable Housing.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: This has been, you know, a long fight, and I ask my colleague to really think about the affordable crisis. Do the right thing and vote in support. Thank you.

MINORITY LEADER MATTEO: Thank you.

Today we are voting on two bills that in my view are capstones to a multiyear effort to expand access to automated external defibrillators, or AEDs, Intros

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1099-A and 1042-A. Building on the successes of our predecessors, Speaker Quinn and Borough President Oddo, the speaker and I during his tenure as Health Committee chair passed landmark legislation that brought AEDs to the most at-risk users of our city's field, youth baseball players. We have since expanded that mandate to youth softball and are now through Intro 1042-A given Parks the ability to use this proven AED distribution program for all youth sports as resources may allow. Additionally, during our hearings last year we learned that our city-owned pools are also vulnerable spaces. While many city pools have AEDs on site, they are often located where they cannot be accessed immediately, this bill will remedy that. Intro 1009-A closes the loop on having AEDs in our city's recreational and will undoubtedly save lives in the future. I want to thank the speaker for his partnership when he was the chair of the health committee and since being elected speaker has been really, a real fighter in bringing AEDs to more and more New Yorkers and we've been doing that since the beginning. We've passed multiple legislation. Today's legislation will bring that to a close. Parks will now have the ability to expand

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that program and it will expand in our Beating Heart sounds program, which I thank my council colleagues for supporting. After this fiscal year we will have handed out over a thousand AEDs to more and more New Yorkers. So I want to thank again Speaker Johnson. I want to thank Jason Goldman, Jeff Baker, Chris Santori. I want to thank my own staff, David Karinpedis Spencer, and I hope my colleagues vote in favor of these two pieces of legislation. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: We'll now have

Good afternoon, colleagues. I'm excited to bring to you for a vote LU 420, 421, 422, 423, with accompanying resos 986, 987, 988, and 989, and I want to thank Speaker Johnson for helping us get to this point. After four long years of community engagement and planning, and planning, and then more planning, the Bay Street rezoning is finally before us for a vote. This long-term plan for Stapleton and Tomkinsville will transform them into neighborhoods that residents have been asking for, vibrant, diverse, walkable, and well-planned, with housing for

a range of income levels with all the infrastructure

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that residents deserve. This has not been an easy process, but I pursued it willingly to address the pressing need for housing and to secure the public investments that are long deserved. Too many people are fearful that rising housing costs across the city will someday force them out of their long-time neighborhoods. These fears are real and this plan address them. This project will allow for the construction of approximately 1800 new apartments in the Bay Street rezoning area, with more than 450 permanently affordable units through mandatory inclusionary housing using MIH options 1 and the deep affordability option to ensure the local residents that face the most severe rent burdens are able to remain in the community. I have always said that we have to have the necessary infrastructure commitments before we move forward with any new development. am happy to report that I have secured a package that is unprecedented for Staten Island. Again, I've been around long enough to tell you this is unprecedented and will benefit all residents of the borough. package includes a commitment to build fully affordable housing on publicly owned because my

Without their expertise and dedication to this project and answering all my myriad texts and emails at all hours of the day and night we would not be here this afternoon. I want to thank Chair Salamanca and Chair Moya, and on my own staff side I'd like to thank Christine Johnson, Esa Rogers, and Vince Graniani for their dedication to

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you so I want to speak to my colleagues today about Intro 5-B. I'm pleased and excited to have this before us today. Now, if you can recall your biology and your physiology lessons that you had, you know our body needs carbs for the fuel to get us the energy to do all the things that we're going to do, and if you continue to reflect on those lessons you know that those carbs are processed and turned into sugars. And the problem comes when we have the excess sugars beyond what our body can process, which can lead to diabetes. And diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in the United States, and it is especially high among African Americans and Latinx. 29 million Americans have diabetes and in addition to that 86 million are prediabetes, or on the cusp of developing diabetes, and without

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intervention 15% to 30% of them will develop diabetes in five years. The American Diabetes Association says that "The balance between how much insulin is in your body and the carbohydrates that you eat makes the difference in your blood glucose level." We know that a number of New York City residents have these chronic diseases that they struggle with and the intent behind Intro 5 is to assist New York City residents by providing them with information that reminds them to be mindful of the carbs that they're taking in so that they don't exacerbate the situations that they may have. We know it's a very personal matter and we know that it's different for each person, but we do want to make sure that they are mindful of that. We've taken precautions so that business owners will have a full year once they're notified that this is a requirement, that they will have a full year to be able to comply with the signage that will go up so that they are not penalized, and I want to thank my legislative director, Indigo Washington, because this was her idea to introduce this bill, she's very healthconscious, and I want to thank the speaker for working with us on this and as well as the Mayor's

Junior was then dragged from the bodega and viciously butchered with knives and machetes, just minutes from his home. This bill would create a pilot program to reimburse small

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businesses for the purchasing and installation of panic buttons. The panic buttons would instantly notify the police department of emergencies and alert pedestrians when activated. The significance is this bill will create safe havens in our communities and throughout our neighborhoods. Panic buttons will allow store owners to immediately alert the police and community of a crime or potential of a crime, which will reduce crime and possibly save lives. will allow small store owners the ability to install security systems to protect themselves, their customers, and our communities. It will help give justice to victims such as Junior and prevent victims in the future. We will never know if this panic button system could have prevented the murder of Junior, but we must all do what we can to prevent anything from this happening again, and I encourage all of my colleagues to be supportive of this initiative. groundbreaking historic climate mobilization act.

Thank you to a bunch of staff and all the advocates.
