CHAIRPERSON LEVIN: Good afternoon,
everybody. I am Council Member Steve Levin, chair of
the Council's Committee on General Welfare. Today we
are voting on 11 bills and one resolution that all
aim to ensure that HRA clients are treated with
respect and that HRA employees have the resources
that they need to do their jobs effectively and
efficiently. Most of us are familiar with the story
of Jazmine Headley starting a December day attempting
to reinstate her childcare subsidy and ending the day
with her child ripped from her arms and her placed in
handcuffs. Regrettably, as Ms. Headley herself has
said in news articles, unfortunate experiences at HRA
centers are not unique to her case. The Urban
Justice Center Safety Net Project published a report
in February highlighting the challenges New Yorkers
face while trying to obtain public assistance SNAP
benefits. Most of the HRA clients surveyed felt like
they had been spoken to inappropriately and may
reported having their paperwork lost by HRA, and the
large majority said that their calls were not
answered. They also found average weight times of
over three hours at job centers, and 2 hours and 45
minutes at SNAP centers. The survey results showed

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2 clear improvements compared to a similar study 3 conducted in 2014. In the five years of Commissioner Banks's leadership, HRA has undergone significant 4 modernization and streamlining efforts by increasing 5 6 self-service options, online applications and 7 recertification, mobile document uploads, and clientinitiated scheduling for interviews on demand. 8 appreciate everything that has been done to make the 9 10 system work better, but clearly more needs to be The abuse Jazmine Headley experienced was 11 12 abhorrent. Jazmine should have never had her child 13 taken from her. She should have never been sent to 14 Riker's Island. In February, in response to what 15 happen to Jazmine, this committee heard 13 pieces of 16 legislation, including Intro 1359, a bill which I am sponsoring, to require DSS to issue a public report 17 18 on instances in which public assistance for a recipient was terminated and the recipient reapplied 19 20 for such public assistance. Transparency is the key to identifying gaps and tracking progress at DSS. 21 2.2 What occurred to Jazmine did not take place in a 23 The incident did, however, bring to light 24 serious gaps in our city's Social Services system

that we can change. This package of bills seeks to

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2 achieve full-scale improvement at HRA centers. also want to thank Jazmine herself for coming to 3 4 testify at that time hearing in February. We greatly 5 appreciate her taking the time and thoughtfulness to 6 present to this committee. At this time I would like 7 to acknowledge my colleagues who are here today. We're joined by Council Member Barry Grodenchik of 8 Queens, Council Member Antonio Reynoso of Brooklyn 9 and Queens, Council Member Ritchie Torres of the 10 Bronx, Council Member Brad Lander of Brooklyn, and 11 12 I'd like to thank the staff of the General Welfare Committee, Amita Kilowan, senior counsel, Krista 13 14 Ponce, senior policy analyst, Julia Hermis, finance 15 analyst, and Agatha Marvopolous, counsel, for their 16 work on this package. I'd also like to thank my chief of staff, Jonathan Bouchet, and legislative 17 18 director, Elizabeth Adams. And I'd like to acknowledge all of the sponsors of legislation as 19 20 part of this package - Council Member Adrienne Adams, Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuels, Council Member 21 2.2 Laurie Cumbo, Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Council 23 Member Helen Rosenthal, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, and Council Member Chaim Deutsch, and I do 24

have statements from both Council Member Gibson and

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Council Member Adams that I will read into the record, but I will first turn it over to my colleague, Council Member Brad Lander. Do you have a

5 statement to make on the legislation?

COUNCIL MEMBER LANCMAN: Thank you, Mr.

I just really, I want to appreciate your leadership. I mean, as you said, the fact that Jazmine herself like found the courage and leadership to say we've got to make systemic change her, after we all saw what happened there. It was very powerful and I just, I really appreciate that you have stuck with this. There's a lot to do here and it would have been easy for this to be kind of a day of headlines, and then, you know, we've all pounded our chest but we don't make real long-term change and this is a really thoughtful package of legislation to try not only to respect and honor Jazmine's experience, but just to use it to do better. I think a lot of times what happens with these bureaucratic systems is we just stop looking at them and even if we could figure out new ways so that people wouldn't have to spend their time coming into appointments that they don't need, we just stop paying attention and I really appreciate that you have stuck with us

2 and I'm honored to be part of today's package of

3 | legislation. Thank you.

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CHAIRPERSON LEVIN: Council Member Lander. Do any other of my colleagues have anything they want to add to this? OK. I will read the statements from Council Members Vanessa Gibson and Adrienne Adams. This is from Council Member Vanessa Gibson. Dear Chair Levin, I want to thank you and my fellow General Welfare Committee members for your consideration of this important bill on today's voting agenda. Intro 1350-A will require HRA to develop and implement a plan based on DSS HRA audit findings on job centers and SNAP centers. We have often heard of various complaints regarding HRA SNAP center wait times, employee professionalism, and overall clientele satisfaction. Included in these stories are alarming instances of clients having to take days off of work just to rectify an issue at an HRA job center or merely obtain verification documents at SNAP centers. Intro 1350-A will report on the current wait times at each job center, including how these wait times are calculated, changes implemented to improve efficiency at each site, changes implemented to improve staff to visitor

2	ratios, changes to improve access to technology and
3	better use of departments' phone lines, and much
4	more. Additionally, DSS HRA would be required to
5	issue three subsequent progress reports over the next
6	six years on such changes, and their overall impact
7	at job centers and SNAP centers. I thank you all for
8	your attention and consideration of this bill. I
9	thank you for your consideration once again and hope
10	you vote in the affirmative. Thank you, Vanessa
11	Gibson, Council Member, 16th District, Bronx County,
12	Deputy Leader Chair of the Subcommittee on Capital
13	Budget. The following statement is from Council
14	Member Adrienne Adams, 28th District, Queens,
15	statement on Introduction 1333. Good afternoon. I'd
16	like to start by thanking Chair Levin for his
17	willingness to deliver these comments on Introduction
18	1333 on my behalf. As you know, over the past year
19	we have received many accounts of poor treatment of
20	people visiting HRA centers in need of assistance.
21	Many of us have seen the video of police officers
22	yanking a 1-year-old from his mother's grasp in a
23	Brooklyn HRA center. It was during an arrest that
24	was completely unnecessary. After the unfortunate
25	escalation in the case of Jazmine Headley and so many

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2 others, we must take steps to ensure that this does not happen again. The daily protocol inside HRA 3 offices is in desperate need of reform. Vulnerable 4 5 New Yorkers that go to HRA for help should not have 6 to second-guess have how they will be treated. 7 proud to join my colleagues in a package of legislation to improve treatment of clients and 8 quality of service at HRA centers. It is time that 9 we address the flaws in our Social Services system. 10 My bill, Intro 1333, would require the Department of 11 12 Social Services/HRA, Human Resources Administration, to report on arrests, summonses, removals, escorts, 13 and the use of force incidents occurring in DSS, HRA 14 15 job centers, and SNAP centers. I encourage my 16 colleagues to support Intro 1333, as it is a 17 necessary step to improve accountability and 18 transparency. We must ensure that this agency improves their policies and protocols to prevent 19 20 future trauma from families in need. And as the chair of this committee, I'd like to specifically 21 2.2 acknowledge Council Member Adam's, Council Member and 23 our Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo, Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Council Member Inez Barron for 24

speaking so forcefully and so compellingly on these

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matters over the last several months. This was a very emotional issue for many of us and I think a lot, a lot of council members, and here's our Majority Leader right now, felt a real responsibility to do what we can on behalf of clients of DSS and HRA, and I think that, ah, this responsibility of this council to act we are achieving in some small measure today. There's still going to be more work that needs to be done. We need to make sure that we are valuing the contribution of all New Yorkers and making sure that city agencies are treating their clients, New Yorkers, with the dignity and respect that they warrant and deserve. I'm going to ask our Majority Leader, Laurie Cumbo, to deliver some remarks as well.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I want to thank
Chair Levin for your leadership and Speaker Corey
Johnson for all that you have done to uplift this
package of legislation that is so critical. Before I
get started, I want to thank Jazmine Headley for her
bravery and love for family and sharing your story
with the world. This has certainly been an eyeopening experience for what so many individuals, lowincome individuals, individuals that have been

primary caregivers it's even harder when the color of

traumatic it would be if I had to come to work today

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and found out that my benefits or the ability to send my child to school had been disrupted or interrupted as a result of some sort of clerical or administrative error. Our families cannot be torn apart. We cannot lose income, we cannot lose our jobs because we have to fight for issues around administrative or clerical upsets or mistakes that have been made, and I hope that my colleagues on the state and assembly levels will also recognize the power of this particular resolution and we will be able to pass it in Albany. I would like to thank our Committee on General Welfare, Steve Levin, and all the council members, and Laura Popa and Jeff Baker that worked together to address this unique situation that we hope will never happen in the city of New York anywhere in the world. This was a deplorable incident and was really, has cast a dark shadow on the City of New York, but this package of legislation will begin to turn us in the right direction. you so much.

You have a small child. 5 6 have small children. Council Member Reynoso has a 7 small child. And the idea, as you said, that somebody can go to an HRA center for reasons that 8 were not her fault, or really should ought to have 9 10 been her responsibility to rectify, but had to take a day off of work, the fact that she was potentially 11 12 going to lose her childcare because she had found a job, and then to have her child ripped out of her 13 14 arms, I don't think that is something that any of us 15 could even imagine, and if we try to imagine it, I 16 imagine that any of us would do anything in our power to hold onto our children. So, you know, we need to 17 18 keep the human story and the human experience front and center as we move forward, as we run a city that 19 20 ought to be more compassionate and ought to be more centered around meeting people where they are and 21 2.2 delivering the services in a compassionate way. 23 with that I will ask William Martin, clerk of the 24 committee, to call the roll. COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you, Mr. I just, I want to briefly draw the connection to the public charge issue which is out there right now, which I think is important for us to see the connections here, like so much of what we're doing, thanks to Jazmine, thanks to your leadership, thanks to the Majority Leader's, just recognizing the fundamental humanity of people who receive public assistance, who just like us want childcare for their kids and enough food to feed their families, and like part of what we're doing here is saying we're not going to accept some like line between people who receive public assistance and everybody else, and obviously what the president is doing with the public charge rule is just trying to draw on the, some sense of stigma around public assistance to also demonize our immigrant families who are also, you know, hundreds of thousands in New York City who want just

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ene same enings, am, you know, a sale place with
their family, that Jazmine couldn't find at that
center. But, boy, the idea that folks will have to
choose between making themselves subject to
deportation and detention and immigration enforcement
and the childcare that Jazmine was seeking or the
food stamps or public benefits that made it possible
to live in the cities, this is galling, and it's the
same spite and racism and I just want to again say
thank you for the package, but also make sure we're
