CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: Good morning everyone. Welcome to this meeting of the New York City Council Health Committee. I'm Mark Levine, Chair. I'm pleased that we are joined by fellow Health Committee Members Council Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, Keith Powers, and Bob Holden. Today we're going to be considering Intro 1362-A, which will ensure that our city finally, belatedly address a health crisis which this country has been ignoring over more than four years since this epidemic started to mount. This country did nothing when electronic cigarettes that looked like really cool flash drives started to emerge on stores in the city and around the country. This country and the city did nothing when flavors like mango and mints and cotton candy and berry crush vaping products and all sorts of minty candy, fruity sounding flavors began to appear on the shelves of the city. We did nothing when the estimated number of young people vaping reached 3.5 million last year or when it reached close to 5 million earlier this year. This is a failing at every level of government including and especially at the federal level the most grotesque recent example

2 being when the Trump Administration after some grand 3 promises did a total 180, and as recently as last 4 week has made it clear they are taking no action. Most sources cite the intense lobbying pressure of the vaping industry as the reason for their 6 7 turnaround. So, in that context I am just incredibly proud that in New York City we are taking action. 8 We're taking action against the flavored E-product, E-cigarette products, which are hooking kids by 10 enacting this law. I want to make it clear that we 11 have listened intensely, attentively to adult smokers 12 13 who have told us that they rely on e-cigarettes, and it's partly for that reason that we are going to 14 15 continue to allow the sale of vaping devices of tobacco flavored e-cigarettes, but ultimately I'm not 16 17 shy about saying that our priority is the health of 18 kids, and while the estimated percent of adults who 19 vape is about three percent, one quarter of high 20 schoolers in the past year have vaped, one quarter, one tenth of middle schoolers have vaped. So, there's 21 just no doubt that this is predominantly a phenomena 2.2 2.3 of young people who have been ensnared in addiction a whole generation of young people who are now in the 24 grips of nicotine addiction because we waited four 25

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- years to reign this in, and I'm proud that we are
  doing so today in the New York City Council, and I
  want to encourage all my colleagues to vote in favor
  of this—of this intro 1362—A, and, um, unless there

On Friday in my district office one of my community association presidents came to see me to pick up turkeys, and, um, she said that she was late because she was at is at Mairmonides Hospital with her nephew who, um, who's a very young man and his lungs collapsed, and they collapsed because of vaping, and he, um, the entire family is, um, you know, right now just trying to come to grips of what's happening.

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He's on a ventilator, and, um, you know, these are
stories that you hear about them, of course, in the
media, but you, um, sometimes folks don't really
recognize how close to home it hits with families and
friends. Um, and constituents, and so, um, again
congratulations. This is very serious across the
entire country, and I'm glad that we're doing
something in the city and, um, so my-my vote today
is, um, is with my colleagues, and also just thinking
about, um, Ms. Scarborough and her family today and
praying for her nephew who is at Mairmonides. So with
that, I vote aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you, um, thank you. While I-I join Council Member Ampry-Samuel in both well wishes towards Ms. Scarborough and, um, and also in terms of the seriousness of this issue, but I'll say it is very rare and it's not often we get to vote on legislation that will

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directly impact somebody's life today, and also be preventative to saving people's lives in the future or at the minimum minimizing risks of exposure the many individuals have either by vaping or smoking, um, or similar activities. This is a vote where we get to actually do that. We get to actually prevent folks from vaping or taking up similar activity today, and we get to save somebody's life I think both now and in the future. I want to congratulate Council Member Levine. I know he's been working at this for a year and plus and I know myself and colleagues have heard from a number of folks and groups and invested those-invested in industry as well about concerns about this bill. That to me just tells you how much and how important it actually is, is that we are up against some Goliaths here. we're doing today is actually, um, helping out young New Yorkers, but actually adult New Yorkers as well, and I think that with the emergence of e-cigarettes and vaping it has—we have—we have appropriately stigmatized smoking in this country, but I think vaping is still a new industry that people are treating with-with, um, without the similar harms or risks of smoking, and I think, uh, uh, we

3	ahead. I think today is a for against that by
4	preventing, um, individuals from some very dangerous
5	behavior or potentially dangerous behavior. So,
6	congratulations to Council Member Levine, and thank
7	you to my colleagues for sponsoring this, and I
8	proudly vote aye.

11	fellow committee member Council Member Cohen.
