CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Good morning everyone. Welcome to this hearing of the City Council's Transportation Committee. I'm Ydanis Rodriguez, the Cahir of the committee. First, let me recognize my colleagues who are here with us today Council Members Holder, Deutsch, Cohen, Cabrera, Koo, Menchaca, Reynoso and Espinal. This bill that we will be voting today will address the many safety and traffic concerns that rise when a vehicle is left on the sidewalk near fire hydrant, bike lanes or bus lanes. These designated areas are not for cars, and this bill will ensure that the city is enforcing that. Anyone from the media would say advising of the law today, and the answer is no. The law today in those areas empower the men and women of the NYPD or the Traffic Enforcement to give a ticket. What we are adding today is to empower-empowering the city to remove those vehicles if they park in those areas. One important matter to point is that across the city many of our bus stops, fire hydrants areas are not marked, and you live---it create a confusion where the city in my case in many occasions is that

confusion to give tickets and to raise revenue. the city must pain the bus stops as well as the fire hydrants now because I myself and I know many taxi drivers and many others when you are parking near a fire hydrant and you know that you will not be obeying the law, you mark yourself what no one know what is the distance. Is that 12 feet or is that 15 feet, the distance for the-a-a driver to park the vehicle from the far drive (sic). So, the same thing with the bus stop. I have an area in my community in Inwood at 201 and 10th Avenue that the drivers they don't know what is the distance that they should not get into the bus stop area. So, as someone that we know that we need to raise the revenue because we need money, but also we need to improve safety. We are ready to support the bills of this kind. I will be adding my name, too, but I also want to ask the City of New York to paint, to mark the distance where drivers should not park the vehicle close to the fire drive as the same for the bus stop. As I said, you know, today we will be voting on Proposed Intro 1412-A sponsored by Council Member Holden. This bill will provide the Police Department's tow trucks may remove unattended vehicles that are obstructing the

sidewalk, crosswalk, fire hydrants, bicycle lane or bus lane if the vehicle present—presents a threat to safety or would inhibit the safe and expeditious passage of the MTA buses. This bill will also require the Police Department to issue a report on January of 2021 that include for each month in 2020 the number of vehicles towed, disaggregated—disaggregated by police presence. [Speaking Spanish] I will now like to invite the sponsor of the bill Council Member Holden to deliver his opening statement, and then we move on on voting on this

Rodriguez. This is a very important bill, um, that we're voting on today. Right now, the Police can tow any vehicle. However, they'll tow vehicles that are parked 10 minutes over on muni meter. They'll—they'll tow vehicles at their discretion, but safety is not really the main concern, and I think we should make a priority for safety. I think everybody would agree that we're seeing a lot of cars parked at hydrants, crosswalks, bike lanes, bus lanes, and it gets to the point where people can't walk. They have to walk in the street especially around precincts. I

think we've all noticed that that this placard abuse. This—this bill was originally part of the placard abuse package and it is still except we had to work out some details with towing, and this had-and the fact that—and I—and I appreciate that Speaker Johnson actually, you know, adding important, um, parts to this bill. The reporting is very, very important that we get reports every months, and make sure the police are towing, um, you know, crosswalks that are blocked, and I see it-I think everybody sees this in the City of New York now. In fact, I walked into a number of firehouses, and they were pleading with me to do something about people that are parking at hydrants. In fact, they go to fires in my district and they can't find the fire hydrant. It delays several minutes in fighting the fires because they can't find the hydrant because somebody is parked in front of it. So, my-I'm actually introducing additional legislation today at the Stated that will require DOT to mark the hydrant with a stencil in the middle of the street like I-like I saw the symbol of a fire hydrant possibly red that would tell the firefighters where the fire hydrant is located.

That's how bad it's gotten, but you also see people

parking in crosswalks, which is very, very dangerous because people have to walk in the street to get around, but in my district and I think many other districts with driveways in the front of people's homes, they are now parking like tandem parking and blocking the sidewalk so you have to go around especially in the snow storms you have to go into the street to get around. The sidewalk is blocked andand in the past the police would not handle this and this-this bill would actually make it and option. It's still at police discretion, but this will make it, um, more safe I think in the City of New York, but we have to actually check monthly and that's where we all come in. We have to make sure that there—the police are enforcing safety regulations, and-and making our sidewalks and streets much safer. So many tragedies we've had around New York City. We've had a number of bicyclists that have been killed because somebody was blocking the bike lane and they out into the main traffic area and get struck, and, um, that is such a serious issue. So, we have to start making it civilized out there in New York City that we enforce our regulations, but with a priority for safety. So, I just want to-I want to

thank the Committee. I hope, um, we have support on this bill. It's-it's been a thing I've been working on for over a year because I first discovered when I moved into my new office in Middle Village back in March of 2018, we have a fire hydrant right outside that was blocked the whole week, and I-of course I had it ticketed everyday, but I-I said to the police: When are you going to tow this? And they said: don't do that. I said, What do you mean you don't-you don't tow from a hydrant? That's very dangerous if there's a fire, and this guy was actually blocking dead center of the hydrant for-and he left his car there a week. I finally got it towed, but then that's was the motivation for this bill, and that started it, and then I just started to discover people blocking and especially in sections of my district, and in Antonio Reynoso's district they're blocking crosswalks. They're parked on the sidewalks, and some blocks-three or four blocks in a row I would see blocking they hydrants, and I said enough is enough. So, um, I did, you know, push this bill and I hope everyone will support it, but I think it's a very, very important component to the placard abuse package. Thank you very much, Chair.

COUNCIL MEMBER DEUTSCH: Yeah, so, for six years it's-it was like pulling teeth, um, when you need to have the Traffic Department enforce dangerous conditions, uh, whether you're parked at a hydrant or at a bus stop, and also when it comes to trailer, um, parked on the streets over night, um, you know, NYPD only has two heavy duty tow trucks that tow these trailers for the entire city, and each time I need to get a tow truck, um, I have to make like an appointment like going to the dentist or a I get that trailer like two or three weeks later, and, um, it's very unfortunate that we have to pass a bill to make sure that these dangerous conditions are enforced by the New York City Police Department. So, with that, I'd like to thank my colleague Council Member Bob Holden for putting this important bill for a vote and, um, I'm-I'm proud of this bill, and we need to make sure and enforce and

2	especially in my district we had, um, two-two major
3	fires where in one case, um, seven-seven young people
4	died in that—in that fire, and another it was three

It's not that more people are parking in front of hydrants because they want to or more people are parking in crosswalks because they want to. We have too many cars in the city of New York. It's the same infrastructure that will continue increasing car ownership. We are not going to have new streets, we're not going to create new streets, unfortunately, so that means that we have to do something about the amount of cars that we have. So, I congratulate Council Member Robert Holden for the great piece of legislation that we did here, and hopefully we just start addressing the issue of the over proliferation of cars in the city of New York, which is the root problem of-of most of these issues. So, I vote aye.

CLERK: By a vote of 9 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative and no abstentions, the item has been adopted by the committee.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Thank you and before we finish I would like to-I know that I speak

in the name of members of this committee our prayer	
to the family who their three-years old boy yesterday	
killing in the Barrio, Council Member, if you don't	
mind, as you know, yesterday a three-years old boy	
lost his life in the intersection of 116 and First	
Avenue. So, as the Committee of Transportation we	
would like to send a prayer to the family. At the	
same time, I continue asking the city of New York ,	
the State Department, the New York City Department of	
Transportation to redesign intersections, separating	
the time for drivers to turn and so and for	
pedestrians to cross by in those intersections.	
Unfortunately, we lost another person yesterday and	
that's how we are coming today in this year and that	
shouldn't happen. With that, this hearing is	
adjourned.
