3 CHAIRPERSON CABRERA: Alright. (gavel) 4 Good morning and welcome to this second hearing and 5 vote of the City Council's Committee on Governmental 6 [coughs] Excuse me, Operations. I am Chair Fernando 7 Today the committee will vote on two bills Cabrera. 8 sponsored by myself. First Proposed Intro 1249-B 9 will streamline two overlapping TLC programs to make 10 them more effective and transparent as vital Vision 11 Zero enforcement tools. Second, Intro 1095 will 12 require a notification of expired special permits 13 granted by the Board of Standards and Appeals. TLC 14 maintains two enforcement programs that result in 15 points on drivers' licenses. In 19-in the 1990's, the TLC created the Persistent Violators Program, 16 17 which assigned points for various TLC rules, um, 18 violations. Drivers who accumulate between 6 and 19 19 points with in a 15-month period face license 20 suspension and revocation if they accumulate 10 or 21 more points. The Critical Drivers' Program operates 2.2 exactly the same way, but it only counts points 23 assigned by the State Department of Motor Vehicles. 24 These programs were separated-separate into Local Law 25 30 of 201 as part of Vision Zero, allowed TLC to

However, 3 according to the testimony from the TLC, this caused 4 confusion for some drivers and many-many thought that they were being penalized twice for the same offense, 5 and drivers don't understand why they are being 6 penalized. The penalty is not an effective 7 8 deterrent. Proposed Intro 1249-B will repeal the 9 Critical Driver Program, and consolidate its only non-duplicate-duplicate provision. The ability for 10 11 drivers to reduce points after taking a DMV approved 12 accident prevention course under a single Unified 13 Persistent Violators Program. Let me be clear. The intent of this legislation is not to reduce safety or 14 15 roll back Vision Zero measures. All elements of both programs remain. The bill is simply intended to 16 17 eliminate driver confusion and thus increase the effectiveness of the TLC crucial efforts to ensure 18 19 safe driving. The second bill to be voted on today 20 is Intro 1095. This bill amends Local Law 84 of 21 2017, which currently requires the Board of Standards and Appeals to provide a notification to the owner of 2.2 23 record when a variance is about to expire to now also require the DAC-DSA provide a notification to the 24 owner of record when a special permit is about to 25

2	expire. Special permits allows certain use in a
3	zoning district where the use might not otherwise be
4	allowed such as out-of-service-service station in a
5	commercial district or an electric or gas utility
6	substation or residential district. Use of the
7	property after the Special Permits expiration would
8	be a violation of its certificate of occupancy. The
9	BSA will be required to inform the owner that the
10	Special Permit cannot be extended into penalties for
11	such a violation are paid. The bill will also
12	require the notification for both variances and the
13	Special Permits to be sent to the Community Board in
14	which the property is located. The notification will
15	be required to go out six months before the Special
16	Permit expires. I want to thank our committee staff:
