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Semitism is intolerable, and as we know, it is happening too frequently around the world, around the country and even here in New York City in all five boroughs. We must always, always, always speak out against the evils of anti-Semitism. Tomorrow, December 20th, also marks the five-year anniversary of the deaths of Detective Wenjian Liu a seven-year veteran of the NYPD and Detective Rafael Ramos, a two-year veteran of the Department. They were murdered in the line of duty, assassinated and targeted because they were police officers. hearts remain with their families as they continue to grieve, even these many years later, and we are forever grateful for the service of detectives Liu and Ramos and for the members of the Department who continue to serve our city every single day. If everyone could please stand for a moment of silence as we remember the four victims in Jersey City and detectives Wenjian Liu and Rafael Ramos.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you. As we gear up for a new year, I want to acknowledge a few changes that are going to be happening here at the Council. Sadly, very sadly, two of our most valuable

2 voices here at the Council, Lilian Pascone and 3 Camille Chin Kee Fatt are leaving for new adventures. 4 Lillian has been a steady and trusted advisor in some 5 of our most important work, including the closure of Rikers Island. She put in long, long, long hours and 6 7 poured over thousands of pages of documents to make 8 sure that we got it right. She is one of my favorite I am going to be very sad to not see her when I come into City Hall every single day, and she 10 11 is leaving us for New Orleans and love, but not in that order, and I am just so grateful for everything 12 that she has done for me and for all of us this past 13 14 year and a half. This city will be forever grateful 15 for her hard work. And I want to say that Camille 16 Chin Kee Fatt has helped make sure things run 17 smoothly for everyone at the Council. Her work has 18 touched everyone here and we are so, so grateful for 19 her service. She's going on to-- where is she? 20 Where's Camille? She's going on to-- I don't know if I'm allowed to announce it, but she's going-- I'm 21 2.2 allowed to announce it? Okay. So she's going on to 2.3 be the Chief of Staff for the new District Attorney Melinda Katz in the Borough of Queens. And so the 24 people of Queens are lucky to have her and her 25

service, and I really, really just am deeply grateful for everything that Camille has done for the previous Speaker of the Council, for myself. She has been just an invaluable, wonderful member of the senior staff here and we're going to miss her very, very much, but we know that her service continues here in city government. We're also bidding farewell to one of our Transportation Counsels, James DiGiovanni who has done a fabulous, fabulous job in being counsel for the Transportation Committee. He was instrumental and key person in working on the State of the City address and the master street plan, and all the bills that went through the committee he worked on, and he was recently honored as an emerging leader in transportation by the NYU Rudin Center for his work, but it turns out that James is not going too far, as he will be the Assistant General Counsel at the Taxi and Limousine Commission, and so we are happy that his service continues for the City of New York. my best to James. I want to thank him. Can we get a big rousing round of applause for Lilian, Camille and James and everything they have done for this city?

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2 SPEAKER JOHNSON: As I mentioned, this is 3 our last Stated and the Council has had a year to be proud of together. We are closing Rikers Island and 4 5 creating a more humane criminal justice system. created the Office of Hate Crimes which unfortunately 6 7 has been so sorely needed. We created a streets 8 masterplan to make our streets safer and more pedestrian-friendly. We cracked down on placard [sic] abuse. We passed the Climate Mobilization Act. 10 11 We overhauled commercial waste zones, and in one of 12 our most important acts for New York families, we 13 significantly toughened our lead laws to protect our 14 children, and held the City accountable for 15 inexcusable lapses in ensuring that apartments are 16 truly free of lead. We have accomplished so much 17 together and I look forward to working alongside all 18 of you next year to do even more for the city we all 19 I want to wish everyone a very merry 20 Christmas. Happy Chanukah which is starting up in a 21 few days. Happy Kwanza. It is a special time of year for all of us and for our families and our loved 2.2 2.3 Merry Christmas, Mom. I love you. better afford to provide the vital services on which

our constituents rely every day on. We rely on these

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nonprofits to help New Yorkers get the services they need to thrive, and they should not have to scramble to pay their bills. This mod also shows the funding for the pay parity agreement for critical public sector workers, including 29 million dollars for Early Childhood Education providers and 7.4 million dollars for legal service providers so that these workers are paid fairly. We'll also be voting on five Article XI property tax exemptions for affordable housing developments including William R. Anderson in Council Member Levine's district, 1632 Hutchison River Parkway East in Council Member Gjonaj's district, 1414 Walton Avenue in Council Member Cabrera's district, 254 East 184th Street in Council Member Torres' district, Evergreen and Tiebout Pillars in Council Member Torres' district. And moving on, the Council will be voting on the following piece of legislation: First, the Council will be voting on a street co-naming bill up for vote today. Pre-considered introduction would co-name 55 thoroughfares in public places based on the requests of Council Members in whose district the street sign is being located. And I want to thank the staff who worked on this: Christopher Sartori [sp?], Patrick

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Mulvahill [sp?], Cheema Obicheri [sp?], and Monica Bujac [sp?]. Next, we have a civil service and labor package of bills. Resolution Number 40A sponsored by Council Member Robert Cornegy would call on the New York City Employee's Retirement System, NYCERS, to determine that members are disabled for purposes of receiving city disability pensions if first the state Workers' Compensation Board determines that the member has a permanent partial disability, and also second, the US Social Security Administration determines that the member is disabled for substantial work activity and approved for Social Security Disability benefits. And I want to thank the staff that worked on that bill: Nushaad Chowdry [sp?], and Kevin Katowsky [sp?]. Next, Introduction Number 1604B, sponsored by Council Member I. Daneek Miller, our Chair of the Civil Service and Labor Committee, would require the collection of workers' compensation data about occupational diseases to help keep our workers safer and healthier. This bill also requires each agency to develop and implement an annual accident and illness program designed to reduce workplace injuries and illnesses identified in the report, and the Mayor to submit a report on steps

special education services they are entitle to.

It's

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unacceptable, and it's heartbreaking. These bills will help keep the Department of Education accountable to providing required special education services. These are not options, and the DOE must help these families and students. Proposed Introduction Number 900A, sponsored by Council Member Ben Kallos, would amend Local Law 27 of 2015 to require the Department of Education to report triannually rather than annually on its provision of special education services in compliance with a student's IEPs. The bill would also add assistive technology services and special transportation services to the enumerated list of services that students with disabilities are entitled to on which the DOE is required to report. Next, proposed Introduction Number 1406A, sponsored by Council Member Danny Dromm, would require that the New York City Department of Education to annually report on several indicators regarding its evaluation of preschool aged children for special education services and the provision of such services. The bill also requires the Department of Education, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene rather, to annually

report on the provision of early intervention

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services to eligible infants and toddlers with 2 3 disabilities. And proposed Introduction Number 4 1380A, sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal, 5 would require the New York Department of Education to annually report on special education claim by parents 6 for reimbursement for tuition or services for the 8 preceding academic year. The bill will report on the timeframe for that process, from initial submission of the claim by a parent to the DOE paying out that 10 11 claim. The bill would also require the Department to 12 report on a number of impartial hearing officers 13 certified by the state to cover New York City, how 14 many of those hearing officers had their 15 certifications revoked by the state, and how many 16 cases hearing officers recuse themselves from. 17 proposed Introduction -- we have a proposed 18 introduction and we have a resolution by our 19 Education Chair Mark Treyger who did a magnificent 20 job working on this package of bills, hearing these bills and getting them to the finish line. His first 21 bill would amend Local Law 27 of 2015 to require the 2.2 2.3 Department of Education to disaggregate by school its report on individualized education program compliance 24

rates and provide the number and percentage of

targeted inspections of buildings on that list every

bill, and he has not just worked on this bill.

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his own district he has worked on every project that's gone through ULURP to ensure there was a significant set-aside for homeless families [sic] and individuals, and that in his partnership with the House Our Future New York Coalition led to this bill being drafted and the advocacy that has happened on it over the last year. So, he's going to talk in a few minutes, but I'm really grateful for the Coalition of the Homeless, for Vocal New York, for Giselle from the House Our New York Coalition Campaign. I'm really grateful to Ms. Flowers who I see sitting up there who is a wonderful and great New Yorkers, and everyone who has made this day a reality. Everyone who lives, works, and visits our city knows we are grappling with an unprecedented homelessness crisis, and today, the Council is taking steps to tackle this issue head-on. So, proposed Introduction 1211A, sponsored by Council Member Salamanca, would require developers who receive city financial assistance for new construction of housing development projects to set aside at least 15 percent of dwelling units offered for rent in each housing development project for homeless individuals and their families. The Department of Housing,

Preservation and Development would be required to
report annually to the Mayor and the Speaker of the
Council the number of units set aside for homeless
individuals and families in each city finance housing
development project and housing preservation project.
And I want to thank the staff who worked tirelessly
on this: Michelle Lee, Andrea Vasquez [sp?], Raju
Mann [sp?], Jason Goldman, and there were many, many
others. I am grateful to everyone's hard work on this
important bill, and Madam Majority Leader, before I
give it back to you, I want to allow Council Member
Salamanca some additional time from Speaker time to
speak on this historic occasion on this historic
bill, and I want to give him the time necessary, and
I also want to make the offer to Chair Treyger if he
wants to speak on this package of bills on special
education. I want to set aside time for him as well
to talk about how important this package of bill is
for children who are getting special education in
their families and their city. So, first, Madam
Majority Leader, I want to turn it over to Council
Member Salamanca.

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 38 2 COUNCIL MEMBER SALAMANCA: Thank you. 3 Thank you, Speaker Johnson. Last October, I introduced Intro 1211, which would require 4 5 residential development projects receiving city subsidies to set aside 50 percent of units for 6 7 homeless individuals and families. At the time of 8 introduction, the City was on the verge of setting records for all the wrong reasons. Nearly 63,000 New Yorkers facing a combination of changing communities, 10 11 rising rents, stagnant wages, domestic violence or 12 adversities in their personal life woke up and went 13 to sleep each day in a New York City shelter. 14 Thousands more feeling unsafe in shelters chose a 15 life on the streets. Listening to stories from 16 advocates like Ms. Flowers, a fierce advocate for 17 increased set-asides, and a homeless New Yorker 18 herself resonated for many just how much more we had 19 to do as a city to address this crisis. The numbers 20 were startling. At its peak, 63,839 New Yorkers 21 resided in a city shelter. Most upsetting, as a parent to a five-year-old, over 22,000 children, 2.2 2.3 22,000 children, a majority of them under the age of

six spent their formative years bouncing from shelter

to shelter. Despite the critical juncture, the

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city's housing policy has failed to produce a fraction of the new units needed to match the scale of the homeless crisis. Homelessness in New York City per report from the Coalition for the Homeless has reflected a bleak reality that has not been since the Great Depression. Working with partners from the House our Future Campaign, we took our message to City Hall, and across the city to rally the importance of a citywide policy requiring a 15 percent set-aside as a project by project basis. message was clear, until more permanent housing for the homeless was built, the problem will only get To show that this was a policy that could worse. work, I began instituting a 15 percent set-aside in projects in my district. Over the course of a year and a half I am proud to have secured 121 units of housing for homeless individuals and families in eight projects in my district. While a small return in the grand scheme of things, it showed the impact citywide legislation could have if implemented across the five boroughs. Homelessness is not an issue limited just to the South Bronx. Homelessness affects all of us, and it is felt in each one of our council districts. As developments grow taller and

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rents rise at a frantic pace, the reality is many of our constituents are one paycheck away from being homeless. The homelessness crisis and the affordable housing crisis are a very much a reality, and if we're going to address the two, we need to implement old measures. We have the opportunity to change the landscape of our housing and homelessness policy for Today's vote on Intro 1211 is about the better. giving hope to thousands of men, women, and children who are looking for a place to call home rather than seeking band-aid solutions. Intro 1211 sets us on a path to create what we need most to address the issue at hand, thousands of units of new permanent housing for homeless. At moments like this we will be judged on how we respond to one of the greatest challenges of our times. I urge my colleagues to stand with homeless advocates and the 63,000 people who call a New York City shelter home, and vote in favor of Intro 1211. The push to pass Intro 1211 was far from an individual effort. First and foremost I would like to thank Speaker Johnson for his leadership and commitment to ensuring that the most vulnerable New Yorkers are not forgotten. 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559A, will require the DOE to expand its current reporting on IEP compliance rates to include reporting on a school level. This will provide a more holistic picture of what is happening in more than 1,800 schools. Most importantly, this bill highlights what services students are not receiving in that school, which will help ensure more transparency and accountability. Look, we just passed and got a PTA fundraising reporting bill which gives us a clearer picture of the depths of inequity across zip codes in our school system. We deserve to know which neighborhoods, which zip codes are not seeing the resources to meet the needs of our kids. Also, Resolution 749A encourages the DOE to create a Special Education Chief Compliance Officer position to ensure and to proactively ensure that students with IEPs are a priority and that the DOE is in compliance with federal Individuals and Disabilities Education Act, IDEA. The idea was to create a space where every major city agency that serves immigrant New Yorkers to come together and share information. With the 2 3 introduction of 1835 I am asking for requirement at least one quarterly meeting and allow the Speaker of 4 5 the City Council to appoint a Co-chair of the taskforce to the taskforce who can call meetings as 6 7 well. We need every city agency to take seriously the fact that immigrants are not a special subset of 8 the city's population, but a main constituency they serve every single day. And with that, I want to say 10 11 thank you again. Feliz Navidad. Happy new year, and 12 see you in 2020. COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Thank you so much, 13 Council Member Menchaca.
