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PARLIAMENTARIAN: You can now begin the Committee of the Whole meeting.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon. Committee of the Whole is now called to order, pursuant to rule 2.30 of the Rules of the City Council. In the Committee of the Whole a simple majority is required to pass any item. Today the Committee of the Whole will consider and vote on the following items. Intro 1854 would make changes to the existing downtown Flushing transit hub BID in Council Member Peter Koo's district. The BID is requesting that the council approve the following changes to the district plan. First, extending existing BID boundaries; second, expanding services to include beautification as well as traffic management and pedestrian safety, and authorizing streetscape improvements to complement these services. And third, increasing the BID annual assessment from \$380,000 to 1 million dollars, funded by the expansion to new properties and by changes in the method of assessment authorized to be calculated on a formula applicable to the class of the property. The City Council has provided all required process under the administrative code. This included a

public hearing with testimony from the administration 2 3 and the BID's district management association and waiting the 30-day period for property owners 4 affected by the proposed changes to formally object. Small business services attested that no property 6 7 owners filed a valid objection with the city clerk. 8 Council members may now vote in favor of Intro 1854 if they can answer the following four questions in the affirmative. First, for all notices of hearing, 10 11 for all hearings required to be held, published, and 12 mailed as so required by law and otherwise 13 sufficient. Second, does all the real property within the district's boundaries benefit from the 14 15 establishment or expansion of the district except as otherwise provided by law. Third, is all real 16 17 property benefitted by the district included within the district. And lastly, is the establishment or 18 expansion of the district in the best interest of the 19 20 public. All council members have been sent a 21 committee report with details about the proposed bid 2.2 changes and the process that has taken place thus 2.3 far. Based on the testimony we heard in support of this action, the written testimony we have received 24 for today's hearing, and the support of Council 25

Member Peter Koo, in whose district the BID, the 2 3 council may proceed with a vote on Introduction 1854. 4 In addition, the council will be voting on the 5 following land use items and Article 11 property tax exemptions. 1898 Harrison Avenue in Council Member 6 7 Cabrera's district would receive a full 40-year 8 Article 11 exemption to preserve 54 units of affordable rental housing. Gray Senior Housing in Council Member Lancman's district would receive a 10 11 full 40-year Article 11 exemption to preserve 80 units of affordable senior rental housing. 12 13 Morningside Heights portfolio in the districts of Council Members Levin and Perkins would receive a 14 15 partial 40-year Article 11 property tax exemption to 16 preserve 502 units of affordable rental housing. 17 Turin House in Council Member Rosenthal's district 18 would receive a full 40-year Article 11 property tax 19 exemption to preserve 189 units of affordable home 20 ownership. Schreiber in Council Member Perkins's district would receive a partial 40-year Article 11 21 property tax exemption to preserve 182 units of 2.2 2.3 affordable rental housing. 757 East 169th Street in Chair Salamanca's district would receive a full 40-24 year Article 11 property tax exemption to preserve 24 25

units of affordable home ownership. Howard Anron 2 3 House in Council Member Kallos's district would 4 receive a partial 40-year Article 11 property tax exemption to preserve 11 units of affordable rental housing. Belmont Daniel in Council Member Rose's 6 7 district would receive a partial 40-year Article 11 property tax exemption to preserve 112 units of 8 affordable rental housing. And the Manhattan Avenue Apartments in Council Member Levine's district would 10 11 receive a partial 40-year Article 11 property tax exemption to preserve 81 units of affordable rental 12 13 housing. Now on land use actions. 90 Sand Street, a 14 project which would deliver 500 units of housing, 15 many of those units for formerly homeless individuals 16 in Council Member Levin's district. 6	restrictive declaration on Gansevoort Street in the

8	will vote to modify two projects and send them to the
9	City Planning Commission for scope determinations,
10	52nd Street in Council Member Van Bramer's district
11	and the Grand and Pacific Street rezoning in Majority

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Yes, I'm happy to do that. We're happy to suspend the roll call and open it up for debate. So if there are members besides you who would like to have a discussion about the bills that we're voting on today people can raise their hands and we can have that debate.

Speaker. And to the extent that members had already voted they should be permitted to rescind their votes, if necessary, or to restart the roll from the beginning. Mr. Speaker, the, the motion that's in front of us, the question to vote on Intro 1854, is, ah, with respect to, ah, hearings that we held in February of this year and hearings that were held by the community board in 2019, ah, as my colleague stated, long before the outbreak. Just to be clear of what it is that we're voting, ah, there are currently 1100 businesses in this BID. This bill would expand the boundaries of that BID, ah, and to encompass an additional 900 new taxpayers.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: 30 seconds.

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Speaker, as, as we discussed this is not explaining a vote, this is, ah, a debate on the original question, so I would ask that the time be extended accordingly. Um, Mr. Speaker, the, the 900 new businesses that are being added into the BID are now going to receive a tax bill. Many of them are closed. They have been closed for the last several weeks. They may never even reopen. Um, my suggestion is instead of voting on this question today...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

Speaker, we have an opportunity to, ah, continue the question [inaudible] particular bill by simply postponing its question to a date later as allowed by our rules [inaudible], ah, and in that regard I would move right now, ah, to postpone to a date later, ah, specifically, ah, to hear this in the first Stated of November to give us some time to actually see if the atmosphere is correct and right to impose a new tax on businesses in Queens. Um, and under Rule 9.7 of the Council rules, ah, this motion is not debatable. It's not required, but it does superseded the debate

3 actually be heard first. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Now the minimum wage is \$15. So as you can see the current budget is not sustainable. This [inaudible] to expand the BID area to include more businesses in the consideration. After this crisis is over we will need entity like BID to coordinate, ah, how to revitalize the local businesses. Helping private partnership is very important. That's why BID is really, really important and so I ask all my colleagues to support these. They have been doing research for this expansion for the last two years. This is not something just came on now. And the local businesses will understand the importance of

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2	having a collective leadership by BID, because BID
3	can help the business to do promotions, to apply for
4	grants, to do all the, all the things that
5	individual, individual business owners cannot do. So
6	I want to tell all my colleagues to support this
7	bill. [inaudible] understandable
8	SERGEANT AT ARMS: 30 seconds.

10	bill and I want then Council Member Dromm and all my
11	colleagues, this is a very important bill. This is
12	the time to support it, not afterwards. Thank you.
