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SERGEANT HOPE: Good morning. Welcome to the Committee on Immigration. All members and staff, please turn on your video and place your electronic devices to silence. Chair, whenever you're ready to begin. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON CARLOS MENCHACA: Thank you, Sergeant Hope, and Buenos dias everyone. My name is Carlos Menchaca and the Chair of the New York City's Council Committee on Immigration. Welcome to today's Committee vote on Proposed Introduction No. 1836-A sponsored by Council Member and Immigration Committee member Francisco Moya from Queens relation to replacing the term immigrant alien with non-citizen. I want to thank the members of the committee who are here today Council Member Chin, Council Member Dromm, Council Member Eugene and Council Member Moya. New York City is a city of immigrants. More that 3.2 million of our residents hail from all over the globe, and they call this city our great city of New York home. As the Immigration Committee, we understand that the wellbeing of immigrant New Yorkers is interwoven with the wellbeing of all New Yorkers. With this in mind we are committed to the flourishing and the thriving of that wellbeing.

Today, the Committee will be voting on a bill that
would make us the first city in the nation to remove
hateful anti-immigrant language from our city laws,
rules, documents and materials, and that makes me
feel so proud to be a New Yorker. The term alien is
dehumanizing and reinforces discriminary attitudes-
discriminatory attitudes toward immigrants. The fact
that this term remains in many city laws and rules
and other materials conflicts with the values that we
seek to uphold. As the City Council we have sought
to pass legislation that promotes immigrant inclusion
and integration so that all our families can thrive
and we work hand-in-hand with the Administration to
implement all of these policies. I hope other
jurisdictions learn from our example and that even in
the midst of a crisis like the one that we're in
right now you can continue to shape a better future
for everyone. I want to thank the staff who have
helped prepare this vote in the committee, Committee
Counsel Herboni Aruza (sp?), Committee Counsel/Policy
Analyst Elizabeth Cronk, Finance Analyst Florentine
Cabor, and my staff—Chief of Staff Lorena Lucero;
Legislative Director Cesar Vargas, and Communications

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Director Tony Cherito. I'd like to call on Council

Member Moya and prime sponsor of this bill to speak.

COUNCIL MEMBER MOYA: Thank you so much Chair Menchaca, and thank you to my colleagues. I know Chair, you have been truly a leader in this fight, and I'm just very grateful that I have the opportunity to be here with all of you today to really talk about an issue that is going to have great impact on our most vulnerable community right now and that is the undocumented community. The word illegal immigrant and alien have no place in our city-in our city's guiding documents or social discourse today. An undocumented immigrant is no more illegal than a J-walker. Both violated a misdemeanor, but only one carries the infraction around. Their bated and their loaded words used to dehumanize the people that they describe. It's time to retire them, and this bill Intro 1836 would replaced the term 'alien' with non-citizen wherever it refers to non-citizens in the City Charter and Administrative Code, and would bar the city from using the term 'alien' 'illegal alien' or 'illegal immigrant in laws, documents or materials unless referencing a federal law or program. Word matter and

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the language we choose to use has power and it has
consequences. It's time as we as a city use our
language to acknowledge people as people rather than
to dehumanize them and divide us. I'm very grateful
for the support from our Chair, gut I also want to
thank his staff who worked incredibly hard to make
this happen. I also want to thank my staff Megan
Chadio (sic) and Ryan Sit and, too, the Speaker and
Jason Goldman. Thank you for this opportunity. Thank

you, Chair, and I turn it back to you.

CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: Thank...thank you,

Council Member Moya for just the work that you did on
this...on this bill, and your bill is going to create a
really great opportunity for us to take this
nationwide, and it came from...from you and the
community that you serve, and I know that your
community is incredibly impacted right now, and so I
want to say thank you to all the work that you and
your staff are doing on the ground to support our
community especially our immigrant community.

COUNCIL MEMBER MOYA: Thank you, Chair.

CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: Thank you. So, I
