

**Testimony of Executive Vice Chancellor and University Provost José Luis Cruz
New York City Council Committee on Higher Education
The City University of New York**

June 10, 2020

Good afternoon.

Chairperson Barron, and members of the Higher Education Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify before you on the impact COVID-19 has had on The City University of New York.

My name is José Luis Cruz and I have the privilege of serving as the executive vice chancellor and University provost of The City University of New York — the largest urban university in the world.

As you can imagine, over the past few months, I've had the occasion to reflect, act upon, and communicate about the impact this most insidious of pandemics has had on our University and the communities we serve and represent. And so, in my remarks today, I borrow heavily from previous statements — because I believe that the rawness and candidness with which I approach your questions cannot be modulated simply because of the setting in which we currently find ourselves and the audience to whom it's being delivered.

The uncertainty that has been brought about by the pandemic weighs heavily on my mind, as it does on the minds of others. But, it has also given me an opportunity to reflect on how the hundreds of thousands of students, faculty, and staff that comprise the CUNY system, came together to embrace distance learning and working as a means of protecting themselves, their families, and our communities, and also as a means to ensure that CUNY will continue to deliver on its promise of opportunity and social mobility. This steadfastness remains, even as we face these dire circumstances.

Our students, certainly but not exclusively, we know many of our faculty and staff as well, have faced an unprecedented disruption to their learning and in their daily lives. While negotiating distance learning, many are also under stress as parents, essential workers, and caretakers. Many have lost their jobs. Many have had to negotiate the use of a family computer with partners who may also be telecommuting, and perhaps children who are trying to learn remotely — all for perhaps for the first time. The aspirations to meet their full potential and chart a new path for their lives and those of their loved ones and their communities have been challenged from many directions. Their stories are too numerous, too deep, and too symbolic of the economic inequities that characterize these times for me to single any one of them out. Still, they are poignant enough to remind all of us at CUNY that our mission is as straightforward as it is important: to serve as a vehicle of upward mobility for those historically underserved.

Through it all, Chancellor Félix V. Matos Rodríguez has been steadfast in advancing the idea that the recovery of New York runs through CUNY, because CUNY is the quintessential anchor institution in New York City. CUNY serves to transform the lives not just of our 500,000 enrolled students, but also serves the city as a whole to provide an essential workforce, revenue, and services that are indispensable to the city's vitality. The fact is that CUNY, a system comprised of 25 highly diverse campus communities spread across the five New York boroughs, has made our COVID-19 situational awareness sharper relative to other systems. Being on the frontlines, we answered the call to action. For example, CUNY quickly worked with New York City and State to hire contact tracers to track and contain the spread of COVID-19. We have teams of students and faculty at six of our colleges that have adapted their 3-D printers to make protective face shields for local hospitals. CUNY's School of Public Health has ongoing research on public opinion related to the pandemic — the survey results have been frequently cited in media outlets. Some of our colleges have served as COVID-19 testing sites, including Medgar Evers College and Lehman College, and we have graduated front-line essential personnel early so they could help flatten the curve whose curvature stands in the way of our City's health and prosperity

Along with all of these community-based initiatives, we're doubling down on the creation of conditions for optimal online learning and investing in the professional development of hundreds of CUNY faculty. These initiatives will have a far-reaching and positive impact on our students' learning and advancement. There's also the creation of the Chancellor's Emergency Fund and our developing an equitable allocation model for emergency aid received through the CARES Act that have and will continue to benefit tens of thousands of students, among many other University-wide and college-specific initiatives.

Indeed, as an anchor institution with an obligation to a city of nearly 9 million people, CUNY understood that the decisions we made in the crucial hours of the outbreak would have sweeping ramifications, not only for our campuses and their communities, but for the city as a whole. It was and is clear that we need to align the scope and timing of our decisions with public policy objectives articulated by our city and our state. There were difficult decisions to make, which were challenging to implement, including the cancelation of all of our study abroad programs and the evacuation of our dormitories to make space for possible hospital beds. There were also easier decisions to make which were still challenging to implement, such as the adoption of a flexible credit/no credit grading policy, the distributions of thousands of tablets and laptops to students who needed them to continue their learning, and securing early graduation to students in accredited medical and allied health fields so they could join the fight against COVID-19.

As we look to the days ahead, we must be guided by the understanding that to fully meet the needs of our students and communities — to truly be engaged in the recovery of New York City and New York State — we must invest in our students, and also in the institutions that serve them, because it is crucial that access and affordability be paired with the rigor and value that our students, City, and State require (or deserve). Institutions in New York State must work hand in hand because there is no one single agency or institution that predominantly and disproportionately shoulders the responsibility of increasing educational attainment as a means

to narrowing gaps in opportunity; there is no one single agency or institution that predominantly and disproportionately paves the way for a more just and equitable society. We must work together to recover from the challenges brought about by the pandemic, and to be better positioned to adjust to the future disruptions to our ways of life.

That is why we greatly value the support that you, Chair Barron, and this committee have historically provided to The City University of New York — both by influencing direct investments to our mission and by holding us accountable to achieving our highest principles.

Since the pandemic forced the conversion of over 95% of our course offerings to distance education in mid-March of this momentous year, you have asked about our efforts in several important fronts, including: 1) The Conversion to Distance Education; 2) Food, Housing, and Financial Insecurity Among CUNY Students; and 3) Enrollment and Graduation Projections.

To this end, let me take them each, in part.

First, the conversion to distance education mid-semester was a massive undertaking. At the time, I wrote to my colleagues that the conversion, in hindsight would mark the start of a new chapter in CUNY's storied history. A chapter that will recount the narrative of how the hundreds of thousands of students, faculty, and staff that comprise the world's greatest urban University came together, over five business days, to embrace distance learning and distance working as mechanisms to protect themselves, their families, and the communities they represent during these unprecedented times, and to ensure that our University would continue, during these unprecedented times, to deliver on its mission and promise of opportunity and social mobility. Our goal at the time, a goal that I am proud to say that we have met, was to safeguard the health of our campus communities while preserving the ability of our students to sustain their academic momentum and achievements, even under the most dire of circumstances.

Let me illustrate how we met this goal. At the beginning of the spring term, we had nearly 275,000 degree-seeking students enrolled in almost 50,000 course sections — only 22% of those sections were coded as including some form of distance learning. Strikingly, after only a 5-business day instructional recess, 95% of our University's courses were offered via distance learning and approximately 95% of our OAA staff moved to distance working. As of this writing, we note that grade distributions — aided by our CR/NC flexible grading policy and the extraordinary efforts of our students and faculty — are not dramatically different than they were last spring. Compared to this time last year, the percentage of students with a Withdrawal, Incomplete, D, or F grade are down (from 18% in Spring 2019 to 15% this Spring) in part due to the CR/NC policy.

Second, food, housing, and financial insecurity among our students has inarguably increased at a time when the challenges the University faces in tending to them have — financially and logistically — soared. This should not be news to anyone who knows how structural oppression and systemic racism work against the students CUNY was legislated to combat. The reality is that

recent internal polling suggests that nearly 40% of our students have lost their jobs, as of May 15, 2020 18% have reported going hungry at least once in the two weeks previous, and 55% have faced housing insecurity since March 2019. These are unfortunate increases over the appalling conditions we were already facing in the pre-pandemic era. During the pandemic, we have reacted swiftly and forcefully to turn things around — we have the courage to not avert our gaze from the suffering, but continue to work steadfastly to measure it and address it head on.

My colleague Matt Sapienza will describe in detail the distribution of over \$100M of Cares Act Emergency funding to eligible students using a progressive allocation formula that considers students financial need and whether or not they have dependents to care for, coupled with a nimble distribution process. Furthermore, he will also report on the Chancellor's Emergency Relief Fund which has distributed much needed grants to CUNY students who are coping with the severe economic fallout of the extraordinary public health emergency.

Finally, we are also happy to report that we distributed the full \$1 million of the Food Insecurity Pilot Program sponsored by City Council Speaker Corey Johnson. Our seven community colleges participated in the program that provided 441 students \$400 for food expenses in both the Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 semesters. Another 1154 students received \$400 in April 2020 as we modified the program to respond to the needs of our students caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. We also provided our seven community colleges with \$6,000 each for food pantry purchases.

In consolidating our dorms to make them available for the State to help with potential upsurges in the need for hospital beds, we made sure that students who did not have safe places to go had the option to stay at one of our college's dormitory facilities — something we have now extended through the month of June as we get more clarity on what the future holds for us both in terms of public health policies as well as fiscal conditions.

Of course, the question remains: What more can CUNY do to tend to the holistic needs of our student body and what investments and partnerships can we secure to deliver them? It is easy to comprehend that the needs of CUNY's students, on average, far exceed those of other New York City and New York State institutions. While the needs are great, they are overshadowed by the potential and passion our students and their drive for bettering their lives through education, and bettering the communities they represent and the families they will guide through generations far into the future.

Third, I am pleased to present an optimistic picture about our enrollment projections and graduation projections. Regarding enrollment, we recently announced a 17% increase in our projected summer enrollments, even as to date these courses are scheduled to be delivered online. While our Fall 2020 projections need to be taken with caution, we currently see much better numbers than are being reported by other institutions of higher education across the country. As of this writing, we are projecting an overall reduction of approximately 4.4% for the Fall, with the caveat that not all of our colleges have started enrolling for the Fall 2020 semester

and we have yet to make an announcement as to the balance of in-person vs online classes and services.

In terms of graduation projections — I am so pleased to state that we expect an estimated 55,000 CUNY graduates to complete their degree requirements this academic year. As we celebrate their accomplishments, many of those online, we continue to turn our attention on the many ways we can best support them as they enter into what is perhaps one of the most difficult job markets in decades. Examples of our work in this area include preparing students for contact tracing and contract tracing supervisor opportunities with New York City and New York State; working with the City to hire resource navigators to help COVID-19- positive patients with the supports they need in self-quarantine; creating partnerships in technology, advertising, engineering, real estate, and public policy for over 700 students for summer internship experiences. We are working with our campus partners to offer additional professional development, job search assistance, and events for recent graduates as the economy reopens and students and companies resume their job searches. Lastly, we are planning ahead for Fall 2020 to ensure that students have access to training, internships, and mentoring to increase access to the social capital and work experiences that are critical for finding full time work. We plan to work closely with CUNY alumni to promote hiring campaigns and stronger CUNY pipelines to jobs and experiences by tapping into former CUNY students who understand and appreciate the grit, motivation, and excellent work ethic that CUNY students provide in the workplace.

For these and so many other reasons, my outlook today is one of great optimism about what lies ahead. My optimism is motivated by a clear understanding that our quest to **make CUNY bigger, better, and bolder** is **now** more important than ever.

By virtue of its mission, The City University of New York will forever be here to fuel the drive and determination that characterize those who entrust their educational futures to us and strive to make their lives here, in the world's greatest city, The City of New York.

The fact is that we have a special role in meeting this mission as we work to expand access, enhance teaching and learning, increase retention and graduation rates, reduce time to degree, push the frontiers of knowledge, discovery, and innovation, and better serve our communities to cultivate more civic-minded, workforce-ready lifelong learners who will bring the change we need in this world.

Now is the time — to double down on and accelerate the advancement of this mission. We must take heed of the lesson before us. The lesson of the inequities with which COVID-19 has wreaked its havoc upon the underserved communities we seek to better serve, and the systemic oppression that took the life of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and too many others, is that the stakes are too high and the time to fully deliver is becoming uncomfortably tight.

Finally, let us remember that CUNY is not just an institution of higher education. Our mission is driven by an engine of opportunity, a vehicle of upward mobility, on a pathway of transformative change. There is simply no better investment we can make than to fuel the University's mission and take its long legacy of success amidst political upheaval, social unrest, and financial uncertainty as a reason to bet on its future. And bet big.

Testimony of Senior Vice Chancellor Matthew Sapienza

The Impact of Coronavirus (COVID-19) on the City University of New York

Good morning, Chairperson Barron and members of the Higher Education Committee. I am Matthew Sapienza, CUNY's senior vice chancellor and chief financial officer. I very much appreciate the opportunity to speak with you about the impact of COVID-19 on the City University of New York. I will focus my testimony on the financial impact on our campuses and our students.

With New York City being at the epicenter of the coronavirus outbreak in the United States, CUNY's campuses were among the first in the nation to be challenged by COVID-19. Early in the Spring 2020 semester, as students and staff began to be individually impacted by the virus, several campuses invested resources to deep-clean and disinfect potentially affected facilities. Once the decision was made that the remainder of the semester would be conducted in a remote modality, the University and its colleges quickly pivoted to allocating funds that would ensure that our students would have as much of a seamless transition as possible to distance learning. In addition to the time investment by CUNY's dedicated faculty to moving their syllabi, learning materials and exams to electronic modes, our campuses also incurred expenses to purchase the technological equipment needed by students and faculty and staff to move to a remote environment.

The CUNY Board of Trustees also approved the waiver of a portion of student activity fees for the remainder of the Spring 2020, and authorized refunds and credits to those students who had to be displaced from their dormitory residences.

Since the majority of CUNY students come from backgrounds of limited financial needs, it became immediately obvious that many of our students would not be able to successfully complete the Spring semester without having a dedicated device for which they can use for their academic work. The University, therefore, utilized \$15 million from its capital budget to purchase over 33,000 devices, comprised of both laptops and i-Pads. We are very

appreciative of our funding partners at both the State and City levels who assisted in ensuring that these purchases could be made as quickly as possible. The devices were delivered to students, both through pickup at their local campuses as well as shipment to their homes.

Although the instructional activities moved to a virtual environment, our campuses have remained open and we are extremely thankful to our essential workers, mainly those who are employed in public safety and those who maintain our facilities. Our colleges have invested current year resources to purchase personal protective equipment, such as masks and gloves, and other supplies like hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes, to ensure the safety of these campus workers. The University has also completed bulk purchases of these items to deliver to campuses in need, and to begin to create a stockpile that will be available once our campuses are back to a more traditional learning mode.

While the issuance of laptops and i-Pads was extremely helpful, we realized that the financial impact of the coronavirus deeply affected a vast majority of our students and their families. Nearly half of CUNY's 275,000 degree-seeking students work while in school, and many found their jobs and incomes eliminated, drastically reduced, or otherwise imperiled. In addition, many students unfortunately had to deal with themselves or family members contracting the virus. To help with this financial and emotional hardship, Chancellor Felix Matos Rodriguez announced the creation of the Chancellor's Emergency Relief Fund. The Fund provides one-time \$500 grants to qualifying CUNY students. In April, students received grants based on the highest financial aid need, proximity to graduation, and being a student-parent. The May distribution focused primarily on undocumented students and other who were not eligible for Federal CARES Act funds. To date, four thousand students have received grants totaling \$2 million. The Fund has been supported by the Carroll & Milton Petrie Foundation, the James and Judith K. Dimon Foundation, the Robin Hood Foundation, and the Jeffrey and Shari Aronson Family Foundation as well as several other corporate, philanthropic, and individual donors. We are very grateful to our philanthropic partners, and are proud of our ability to get these funds into the hands of our students so quickly.

CUNY students have also received benefits from the Federal CARES Act. This federal stimulus legislation, formally known as the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, provides emergency grants from the U.S. Department of Education to eligible students to help cover education-related expenses caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The CARES Act directs recipients to use the funds they receive for unexpected expenses, unmet financial need, or expenses related to the disruption of campus operations resulting from the coronavirus. These include expenses for food, housing, course materials, technology, health care or childcare. In order to be eligible, students must meet basic eligibility for federal Title IV financial aid. These eligibility criteria include having a demonstrated financial need certified by the family-income information provided on the student's Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA); being a U.S. citizen or national, permanent resident, or other eligible noncitizen; and being enrolled in a degree or certificate program and making satisfactory academic progress.

CUNY's total allocation from the program is \$118 million. About 190,000 undergraduate and graduate students are potentially eligible to receive grants. We are very pleased to report that about \$107 million of the total allocation has already been disbursed to students. The average award is over \$600, with some students receiving well over \$900. Our allocation formula considers students financial need and whether or not they have dependents to care for.

The second half of the CARES Act funding, which also totals \$118 million, is the institutional aid that will be allocated to the campuses to help cover any costs associated with significant changes to the delivery of instruction due to the coronavirus. These funds can be used to expand remote learning programs, build IT capacity to support such programs, and train faculty and staff to operate effectively in a remote learning environment. In addition, these funds can be used to provide more financial grants to students. CUNY campuses have also received \$14 million from the Minority-Serving Institution (MSI) component of the CARES Act. We have developed a plan for the use of the total \$132 million that is available, and hope to have approval to allocate these funds to the campuses as quickly as possible.

While we are grateful for this allocation, we are also preparing for an extremely challenging fiscal environment in the upcoming academic year. While we are pleased that our summer session enrollment numbers are very strong, it is still unknown what the impact of the coronavirus will have on our students, and thus on our enrollment for the Fall 2020 semester. Our funding partners at the State and City are also facing severe funding shortfalls for Fiscal Year 2021, which will have a direct negative impact on CUNY's operating budget. The City's Executive Plan included \$31.6 million in reductions for CUNY as well as proposed cuts to the awarding-winning ASAP program, and the State has projected a \$13.3 billion deficit in FY21. The University is taking steps to meet this challenge, one of which was to implement a freeze on all personnel actions, including all hires and discretionary salary increases. Per State and City regulations, the University paused all active campus construction projects, with the exception of those that are COVID-19 related or clear health and safety issues. We also directed colleges to refrain from any new one-time or recurring expenditures, with the exception of those that are related to COVID-19 or distance learning instruction, and mandated that they not be entering into any new long-term contractual obligations. We are planning on presenting a budget plan for Fiscal Year 2021 to the Board of Trustees at its meeting later this month, on June 29th. That plan will take all of the above into consideration as we craft a budget that will protect our core values as much as possible.

Chairperson Barron, all of us at the University very much appreciate your leadership, and this Committee's strong and continuing advocacy for our students.

**TESTIMONY OF PUBLIC ADVOCATE JUMAANE D. WILLIAMS

Good morning,

My name is Jumaane D. Williams, Public Advocate for the City of New York. I would like to thank Chairwoman Inez Barron and the members of the Committee on Higher Education for holding an oversight hearing on the Coronavirus' impact on the City University of New York. As an alum of CUNY, I can tell you that this university system directly impacts our ability to prosper as a City. Knowledge is wealth, and CUNY students have traditionally received the opportunity to access this wealth without going into debt, and subsequently graduate with greater career prospects and also a higher degree of self-awareness.

Unfortunately, too many students will not have access to this wealth because CUNY has suffered extensive budget cuts. Systemic underfunding along with massive increase in enrollment limits CUNY's ability to maintain educational and operational success while alleviating financial burdens for thousands of students, the majority of whom come from low-income backgrounds, are people of more color, and graduated from our City's public school system. Over the past 10 years, per-student funding from New York State has decreased by 18 percent, adjusted for inflation and enrollment growth. Yet, the State's funding for the Tuition Assistance Program has increased by 11 percent, which means more students attended CUNY using tuition assistance grants that may not have covered the full tuition.

These changes in funding have put CUNY students at risk of acquiring debt just to attend college. Though CUNY students typically graduate with limited student loan debt, costs that are not related to tuition, such as housing and food, can leave students with tens of thousands of dollars in debt a year. A large number of CUNY students are food insecure or homeless, and 60 percent come from homes with incomes under \$30,000. Moreover, a significant portion of students work a part-time job to cut down on their expenses, which can have a negative impact on their academic performance. So what we are seeing is that the lack of funding for CUNY is not causing an increase in tuition, but rather a scarcity of grants for students, leaving them with no choice but to take on a part-time job or borrow additional loans to ensure food security and pay their rent and other expenses.

As laid out in the report that my Office released late last year, there are a number of ways we can address the shortfalls of the CUNY system that have been caused by underfunding. My first recommendation is for the State and the City to increase funding for CUNY, which would also include more City contributions to CUNY's senior colleges. Second - close the Tuition Assistance Program gap by calling on the State to add a provision to the annual budget to cover the gap between the maximum TAP grant and the in-state tuition rate for public colleges. We also need to increase the number of full-time faculty, raise the salaries of adjunct faculty, and strengthen the Pell Grant program.

I am eager to hear CUNY's plan to address the underfunding shortfalls, especially in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. CUNY needs to have a plan to ensure that the virtual learning system implemented during this pandemic does not set students back who are set to graduate next year, as well as address the frustrations that adjunct professors have shared regarding remote learning. Should remote learning continue in the fall, the university system should issue adequate guidance and develop additional resources for adjunct faculty, as well as reassess the cost of attendance fees. Another element that CUNY has to focus on is expanding the services that are available to students with disabilities.

The City University of New York has become a staple in New York City, not just for its 25 campuses and its affordability, but for the quality of education it has been known to provide. I want to ensure that current CUNY students have a fair chance at the same quality education I received when I was a student, without crippling student loans in their future. I look forward to hearing from CUNY's administration today on how they plan to protect the quality of their students' education, while ensuring that they will be financially stable once they graduate.

Good morning, Honorable Chair Barron and Members of the Committee on Higher Education of the NYC Council,

Thank you for this opportunity to speak to you about the issue of how the Coronavirus has impacted CUNY. I am a professor of criminal justice, ethics and leadership at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I have been a dedicated professor at the City University of New York (CUNY) since 2003. I have been a member of the CUNY University Faculty Senate (UFS) since 2011. I was just re-elected this May, 2020, to a third term of the Executive Committee (EC) of the City University of New York (CUNY). I have been asked by the Chair of the University Faculty Senate (UFS), Professor Martin Burke, to speak about this important issue.

There is no question that the Coronavirus has impacted CUNY in ways we never could have expected.

Despite the fact that CUNY Chancellor Felix V. Matos Rodriguez mandated distance learning in March, 2020, to ameliorate the Coronavirus, many students and faculty were not prepared for the transition from in-classroom learning to distance learning in a manner of a few short weeks. However, we all rose to the challenge and we have completed the spring semester at CUNY. Now, over the summer, many professors are engaged in online workshops across CUNY to become even better prepared for the fall semester and beyond. As of June 10, 2020, we still do not know if we will be teaching entirely remotely for the fall, 2020 semester.

We are also waiting to hear about the CUNY budget at the end of June, 2020. We do not know if we will have adequate funding for our colleges during this time.

The Coronavirus has caused undue hardship for many in our CUNY community. I know of many students, faculty and staff who have received the terrible news that their loved ones, peers, or faculty members have died from the virus. Many students have lost jobs during this time due to the impact of the virus. Many CUNY adjunct professors have not been given classes to teach this summer and/or fall since

projections by some CUNY administrators is that enrollment will fall dramatically. (At the time of this writing, some colleges are THRIVING with high enrollments over the summer. Of course, data is not available yet regarding fall enrollments.) Some research has been stalled at CUNY since, for example, we cannot contact our subjects in person. Many in the CUNY community are suffering from isolation and mental distress due to the ramifications of the Coronavirus. We are living in a chaotic, unsure world just as you are at this time.

Despite all this despair, I would hasten to mention that our CUNY community is very resilient and optimistic as we look to the future. CUNY administrators, professors, and student leaders are discussing how to best ensure that students, faculty and staff get the resources they need moving forward to provide the kind of quality education our students have come to expect from the City University of New York.

Let me be clear. We at CUNY realize that this is a very serious virus. In the succinct words of Dr. Michael T. Osterholm, an American infectious disease epidemiologist, Regents Professor, and director of the Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy at the University of Minnesota, "...a second wave (of COVID-19) in late summer or early fall that lasts three or four months could make everything we've experienced so far seem mild."

I ask that you stay in touch with me during this trying time. I, along with my colleagues, can provide you with information that you will need to help us ensure that CUNY survives and THRIVES during the Coronavirus pandemic. I know that all of you on the New York City Council firmly believe that CUNY, the largest urban university in the United States, needs to be cherished as it serves a diverse student body and offers high-quality education at an affordable price.

The Impact of Coronavirus (COVID-19) on the City University of New York

Good morning. My name is Melanie Kruvelis, and I am the Senior Manager of Policy and Advocacy at Young Invincibles. Young Invincibles is a non-profit dedicated to elevating young adults in the political process. I want to thank the New York City Council and the Committee on Higher Education for the opportunity to testify at today's hearing on how COVID-19 has impacted the City University of New York and its students.

CUNY faced serious challenges when the COVID-19 pandemic took hold in New York. Transitioning from a system of 25 physical campuses to distance learning and virtual support services was daunting — and in conversations with CUNY students, many recognized the challenges their campuses faced in this transition. As one City College student told us this spring, *“Although I am grateful that the universities throughout New York are doing what they can to prevent the spread of COVID-19, I also realize that it adds on another layer of uncertainty and stress that I will have to actively deal with. How will I attend online classes when my Internet connection isn’t always stable?”* We recognize that CUNY did respond to these issues, publishing campus-level points of contact on CUNY Central’s website who can connect students with laptops. Still, even as CUNY adapted to this digital environment, we know that many students ended the semester without adequate Internet access. This includes students who are most vulnerable to the pandemic, including the 14 percent of CUNY students experiencing homelessness. We spoke with a Lehman College student living in one of the city’s homeless shelters, who was prohibited from using her laptop in the shelter or accessing its WiFi. We heard from students living in crowded housing conditions, impacting their ability to access internet. Recent surveys fielded by Healthy CUNY also show further challenges of distance learning — from the caretaking responsibilities of CUNY’s student parents, to unaddressed issues among students with different learning abilities. In short, the issues that emerged as CUNY went online go beyond simply ensuring laptops and Internet access. These are intersectional issues that



underscore which students are able to easily access higher education, and those who are left behind to figure it out for themselves.

Now, as more New Yorkers emerge from this pandemic on the brink of eviction and homelessness, with rising food insecurity, and serious mental health challenges, CUNY must step up its communication and collaboration with services, on and off campus, that can help students address these challenges. In March 2020, YI hosted a roundtable with CUNY students, asking about the impact COVID-19 had on their semester. When asked about communication they received from their campuses, students said they received a lot of information about their campuses' transition into online learning; however, few reported receiving communication on food pantries, Single Stop services, or information on accessing their college's emergency aid. It's time to step up coordination and communication with these services. We need to see digital, CUNY-wide platforms that connect students to basic-needs assistance. We need CUNY-wide campaigns aimed at enrolling eligible students in SNAP, Medicaid, and other services as we brace for semesters of unprecedented instability. We particularly call on CUNY to keep an eye on the rising housing insecurity its students face. Students are frustrated by the lack of support they receive when it comes to securing affordable housing. CUNY must strengthen its communication and collaboration with the city's housing system, including the shelter system, housing providers, and philanthropic partners who all have a role in making sure students have a safe, stable place to study and sleep at night. And when our systems fail and leave students without housing, we cannot turn our backs on these students — we must do everything we can to ensure they are safe and housed. In other states, such as California, Maine, and Louisiana, colleges created on-campus liaisons for students experiencing homelessness, who can manage these relationships with housing systems, and understand how students experiencing homelessness are being served by them. As we move forward, we urge CUNY to create these, particularly as housing insecurity increases among students.

To help address some of these pressing needs students face during COVID, we saw increased investment in campus emergency aid programs. As folks on the Council know, the March 27th passage of the federal CARES Act guaranteed funding for colleges and universities, including \$236 million for the CUNY system. Under the federal law, at least half of that allocation must go directly to students in the form of emergency aid. The current federal administration has made

every effort to block emergency aid from some of the students who need it the most — from undocumented students, to international students, to those who cannot apply for and access FAFSA aid, to veterans using military benefits in college. On that point, we urge the Council to work with their city and state colleagues, and call on U.S. Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand to ensure the next federal COVID-19 package provides additional student aid to make sure students are not continuously left behind in relief efforts. While we continue to monitor federal activity, we urge CUNY to disclose information about the aid provided via the CARES Act, including how many students have received emergency aid through CARES to date, the average amount of emergency aid awarded to students, and how much emergency aid funding remains available for summer and fall 2020 semesters. We also applaud the CUNY system and its philanthropic partners for establishing the Chancellor's Emergency Relief Grant Program, another funding stream for emergency aid that includes some of the students blocked from CARES emergency aid, including undocumented students. We also urge CUNY to share information about student use of the Chancellor's Emergency Relief Grant Program, including how many students have received aid so far in total; what share of the aid has gone to a) undocumented students, b) international students, and c) undergraduates with an EFC of \$0; and how much funding has been raised beyond the initial \$3.5 million, to ensure students in the summer and fall semesters will have ongoing access to aid. And as we look ahead to future semesters, we must ensure that students are able to apply and access aid, regardless of whether they've applied for emergency aid in the past. One Lehman College student told us she was denied an emergency grant this spring because she had applied in previous semesters. The COVID-19 pandemic didn't create student hardship out of thin air — rather, it exacerbated the challenges faced by students who already lacked the resources they needed to persist in college. Moving forward, we call on CUNY to make emergency funding available to each student more than once. If aid is no longer available, students should be notified that funding has run out, and be provided with resources that can help fill in the gap. Knowing that funding is limited, we also encourage CUNY to continue to collect applications, even when funds run out. This information can be used to document student need, and inform fundraising efforts for these grants. Last, we urge CUNY to monitor the persistence of emergency aid applicants and recipients, and to use that information to help connect students with resources and assistance to stay on track for graduation.



Last, I would be remiss if I did not address the funding challenges long faced by CUNY, and how that connects to the global movement happening right now. New York's leaders often tout the great promise of our public colleges and universities, and point to research showing how CUNY campuses bring more low-income folks into economic security than all the Ivy Leagues combined. But this recognition has not come with sustainable support for our colleges. If our last recession is a roadmap for New York's commitment to students and higher education, then we know what the future holds: tuition hikes, cuts to adjunct faculty that actually look like the students they serve, and rolling back programs that actually work for students, such as CUNY ASAP. That all adds up to worse academic outcomes, lower completion rates, and a higher education system that only serves white and well-resourced New Yorkers. Now, as we face proposed cuts on the City level, and with the looming threat of State cuts, we must be clear: cutting funding for the programs and institutions that can provide economic stability to the communities most harmed by this crisis is not the path forward. As tens of thousands of New Yorkers push for defunding the NYPD, and putting those resources towards education and social services, we must consider: in an economic downturn, what does our commitment to Black and brown New Yorkers look like? We stand in support of the thousands of New Yorkers demanding a new commitment to young Black and brown New Yorkers, including defunding NYPD by at least \$1 billion and reallocating funding to education and social services. If the Council has been paying attention to what is happening in the streets of our city, it is clear — young people will hold our institutions accountable, and that includes our commitment to their education. Thank you for the opportunity to testify, and I look forward to your questions.



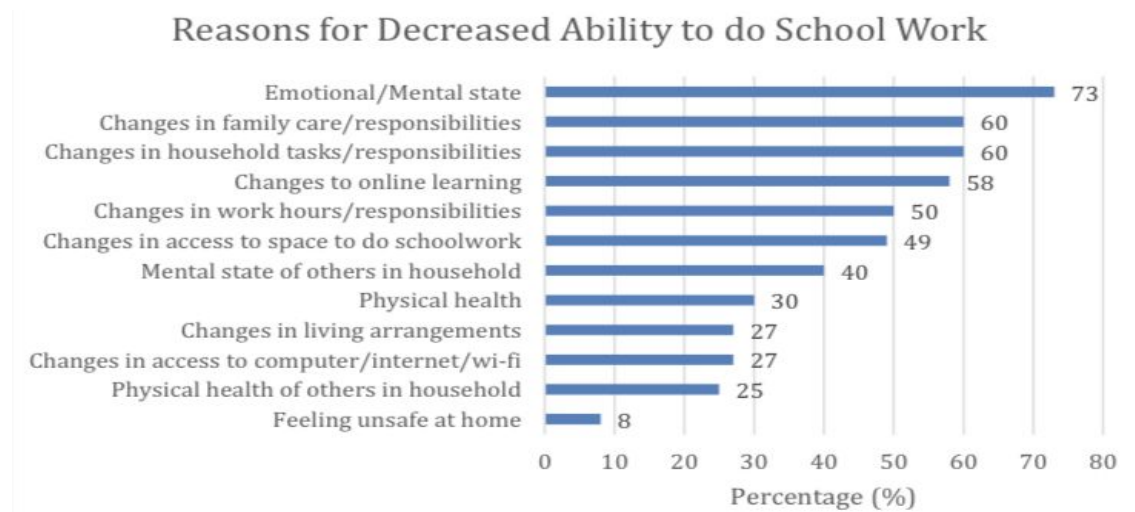

Good afternoon, my name is Timothy Hunter. I am the Chairperson of the CUNY University Student Senate (USS) and the Student Trustee on the City University's Board of Trustees. Founded in 1972 with the mission of preserving the accessibility, affordability, and excellence of higher education within the CUNY, the organization is charged with protecting the rights of the student body and promoting the general welfare of its student constituents and the University. As New York City is the epicenter of the global coronavirus pandemic, we must ensure the needs of students attending the City University of New York are centered in policymaking.

ACADEMIC CHALLENGES DURING COVID-19

The coronavirus pandemic has disrupted the lives of countless students across the university system. According to a recent CUNY student experience survey during COVID-19 conducted by Healthy CUNY, a university-wide initiative based at the CUNY School of Public Health, more than half of respondents (57%) reported that their ability to do school work decreased due to the coronavirus pandemic. Out of those who reported decreased ability to do school work, 73% said it was due to their emotional/mental state, 60% said it was due to changes in family responsibilities and household tasks, and 58% said it was due to changes to online learning (see graph below).¹



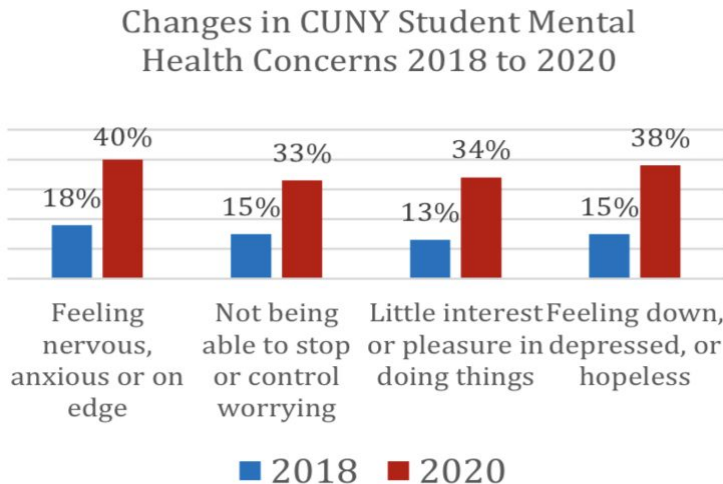

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MENTAL HEALTH CHALLENGES DURING COVID-19

It is clear that mental health-related issues have surged within CUNY in recent years, however, because of coronavirus, those issues have only been exacerbated, affecting the retention rates and graduation rates of students. According to the 2020 Healthy CUNY Survey, on more than half of the days in the two weeks prior to the survey, over one-third of students reported the following:



- Feeling nervous, anxious or on edge (40%)
- Little pleasure or interest in doing things (38%)
- Unable to stop worrying (33%)
- Feeling down, depressed, or helpless (33%)²

It's clear, based on the 2018 Healthy CUNY Student Survey, the rates of these negative feelings within the CUNY student population have more than doubled, likely due to the pandemic.³

FOOD INSECURITY DURING COVID-19

According to the Healthy CUNY Survey on the impact of COVID-19 on CUNY students, levels of worry about running out of food because of lack of money were more than three times higher in 2020 than in 2018. In addition, students also cut or skipped meals due to lack of money at higher rates than they did in 2018. Lastly, students reported having gone hungry often or sometimes more frequently in 2020 than they did in 2018. **At the same time, 70% reported a decrease in income for other members of their households and 54% a decrease in their own income due to coronavirus.**⁴

THE RISING COST OF CUNY

Due to continued state disinvestment (and even more potential cuts coming from the Governor), CUNY will vote at their final board meeting on June 29th to raise tuition at both senior and community colleges

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(despite tuition remaining frozen for the last 4 years). The increase would annually be \$320; \$200 towards tuition and \$120 towards a new 'health and wellness fee'. This is problematic for various reasons, including but not limited to the fact that NYC already has one of the highest community college tuition rates in the nation. The national average for tuition at community colleges is \$4,816, however, at CUNY, tuition is \$5,194.⁵ This increase of \$200 at community colleges will negatively affect students, especially those paying out of pocket. Imagine families budgeting for a tuition increase while also suffering economically from what may be the worst financial crisis since the Great Depression. Public colleges like CUNY are meant to be a gateway to the middle class. CUNY students should not have to pay for tuition with their salaries, savings or loans- until they are at their breaking point.

But the council may rectify this issue. The University Student Senate calls for the New York Police Department's budget, which was virtually unchanged in the mayor's first post-COVID financial agenda, to be slashed. The \$6 billion NYPD budget is larger than Homeless services, Youth and Community Development, Housing Preservation and Development, and Health budgets combined. It's simply not enough to just cut the NYPD's budget- the Student Senate demands that a portion of their budget (\$16 million) gets redirected to the City University of New York to offset the tuition hike community colleges will face if the Board of Trustees vote for it on June 29th.

Statement for Saving our Adjunct Professorship Jobs and Health Benefits

Dr. Alison Pratt, Adjunct Assistant Professor, Queensborough Community College

(CUNY Ph.D., 1990)

I began teaching at QCC in 2011. Since that time, I have taught 20 sections of Introduction to Psychology. The nine years at QCC have been both challenging and fulfilling. The difference between community college students and 4-year college students is stark. It is a big leap for many of them for the challenges that go beyond the classroom: time management, language barriers, cultural barriers, educational preparedness, educational expectations from high school, and so on. For example, one student told me that this was her third time taking intro psych, but until my class, she did not understand the necessity to become actively engaged in her own education. Clearly this is a lesson that applied to my class, to all classes, and to life itself. She finished with an A. Other students have had similar conversations with me. Being a community college professor goes beyond delivering lessons in a classroom (or now, online). Professors who are responsive to the students' daily obstacles inspire them to do their best work.

Pivoting to distance education this past semester was difficult for all of us. Students faced COVID-19 themselves, deaths and illness of family members, childcare issues, financial issues, and technology issues. Yet, for any student who was determined to complete the semester, I was determined to help them achieve that.

I am also a clinical psychologist in private practice. I started adjunct teaching not just for the income, but to have a balance of professional activities. Teaching is a really nice counterpoint to private practice. Being self-employed, I have had to provide my own health insurance. For many years, this was not an issue because I was a dependent on my husband's health insurance through his job. However, he retired a few years ago and is now on Medicare.

I have been very grateful that the PSC union provided the option for health insurance for adjuncts as well as dental, vision, and prescription coverage. I arranged to take advantage of these benefits by increasing my teaching load in the fall semester of 2017.

I am now 63 years old. If I lose classes, it will definitely impact my life. I have structured my career so that teaching is an integral part of how I earn my living and supply my health benefits, drug coverage, and so on. I am the primary wage-earner of our family. In addition to all the normal bills of living, I am contributing my son's graduate education tuition and trying to prepare for my retirement a few years from now. Yes, I could (and would) buy COBRA. But having to buy COBRA would have a ripple effect of not being able to meet other current bills, increase my personal debt, and delay my retirement.

As an adjunct, I know that my job is not necessarily guaranteed. Since the semester ended, I have taken online Blackboard training classes to prepare for fall distance learning, even though I have not yet been assigned a class. I would be sorry to lose teaching as I continue to grow as a professor and am an asset to my students. I would be very grateful for the continuance of my teaching assignments for both the financial aspect and just as importantly, the health insurance.

Collective testimonies of students, faculty and alumni

My name is Camelot Pham. I am a freshman at Brooklyn College. I do not receive financial aid and pay for tuition out of pocket.

Like all CUNY students, the coronavirus pandemic has negatively affected me. Learning is now much harder because I have no in-person lectures. I learn much better in a physical environment and quite frankly I didn't pay for online classes. I haven't been working since the schools have closed and have had 0 income for 3 months.

I don't feel like the raised tuition has made my semester any better during the spring when it was raised. And now it's going to be raised again. This is ridiculous. I personally pay tuition 100% out of pocket without any financial aid simply because my parents make more than the threshold yet they're not the ones paying. I've lost 3 months of work which is crucial as now paying for tuition will be harder. Thank you.

My name is Sanket Saha. I am a graduate student attending Baruch College. I do not receive financial aid and pay for school out of pocket.

The coronavirus has impacted me mostly economically; I do not have a salary anymore.

I ask the Board of Trustees to freeze tuition because if not, the money going towards tuition hikes will have to be taken out of my food budget. This is unsettling considering my family is already taking in less money. Thank you.

My name is Patrycja Golinska. I am a graduate student attending the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I do not receive financial aid and pay for school out of pocket.

Working in the hospital setting in pulmonary and critical care, my division is particularly affected by the pandemic and I have been dedicating less time to my studies for personal reasons and due to the overwhelming workload at work.

Raising tuition by \$320 will put a strain on finances due to job loss or furlough which has affected many students I know, would make paying tuition much more difficult.

My name is Enmanuel Arias. I am a senior at New York City College of Technology. I received FAFSA and TAP for the majority time but I paid out of pocket for a few semesters as well.

The coronavirus pandemic has made it a lot more difficult for me to get through each day because I am unable to have access to certain resources that my campus provided like the cafeteria or the library. Yes, I'm aware that some resources are still available online, but the experience is not the same. Having classes that involve coding and not having professors readily available has been challenging. Professors who aren't used to teaching online have these unrealistic expectations of us and continually bombard us with multiple assignments, discussions, and videos.

If the BOT agrees to raise tuition by \$320, I will be receiving less from my FAFSA+TAP refund; money that I use to support myself throughout the semester by purchasing textbooks, supplies, food, MetroCards, etc. will be directed towards tuition instead. There was a period of time in my academic career where I had to pay my tuition out of pocket and couldn't afford to pay it all at once. I would have to wait until a few days before enrollment for the following semester would close to register for classes because I was saving up to pay off my outstanding balance and lift the hold on my account; this is an issue many students face.

My name is Carolina Penagos. I am a senior attending the City College of New York. I receive financial aid and Pell to pay for school.

The coronavirus has impacted my ability to have face to face interaction, Online classes are not my strength and I have a baby at home which now requires me to watch her and the daycare services on campus are no longer available.

The board of Trustees shouldn't raise tuition because I have lost my job due to COVID19. This tuition raise will affect so many students who are now facing many other problems due to the COVID crisis.

My name is Jack. I am a senior attending the City College of New York. I receive financial aid and Pell, and take out loans to pay out of pocket.

The corona virus has impacted my CUNY experience for the better. This is mainly because my total commute was at least 4 hours each day that I had to go to school. On top of working almost full time and the classes themselves, I was left with very little time to properly study. With much more time available to study, I feel as though I have greatly benefited. Many in person course programs are not designed to be compatible with people who have outside responsibilities. Yes,

part time classes are an option, and I've had to resort to this for about half of my College Career, but there is a drawback in that it can greatly affect your financial aid, resulting in large debt in light of grants and out of pocket expenses.

The board of trustees shouldnt raise our tuition because many of our resources are already spread thin. For example, even when financial aid covered tuition, I still had to take out loans to cover minimum living expenses. Raising tuition even further would only force me to take out more loans and become further indebted because of an education at a university system that prides itself on-and advertises itself-as having a majority of students graduating with little to no debt.

My name is Soo Min KIm. I am a senior attending John Jay College of Criminal justice. I paid out of pocket until this year's TAP assistance through the NYC Dream Act.

The corona virus has impacted my mental wellness and caused emotional distress. The deprivation of my on-campus experience and memories make it difficult to remain motivated and well. Especially since I am supposed to graduate this semester, I am all the more negatively impacted at how my last memory of the campus is going to be.

The board of trustees shouldnt raise our tuition because we are all living a collective tragedy. We are affected emotionally, physically, societally, economically, and all the more. Families are losing their health, loved ones and jobs. For the tuition to rise so much at this time is plain unjust and inconsiderate of the current situation.

My name is Falak Ali. I am a senior attending Brooklyn College. I pay for my tuition out of pocket.

The Corona virus has affected my CUNY experience because it has left me in a financial crisis and has also ll'mited access to services for me and students.

The board of trustees should raise tuition becuase students are barely making the basic needs for themselves ,and therefore an increase in tuition would be l'mpossible for students and myself.

My name is Steven Zhang. I am a junior attending Queens College. I pay for my tuition with loans and also out of pocket.

The corona virus has impacted my CUNY experience for the future. This has given me anxiety about the current state of this country and the world ,therefore affecting my ability to focus on my education. I have worries about my economic stability and opportunities after I graduate.

The board of trustees shouldnt raise my tuition because I have to start paying out of pocket soon and I can't afford to do so. I didn't get a stl'mulus check because I was claImed as a dependent. I have over 1k in dental bills I have to pay and no means of income at the moment. I may have to consider putting school on hold for the time being which would only delay my graduation.

My name is Mercy Chuquitarco. I am a freshman attending Queens College. I pay for my tuition with SEEK, Tap, and Pell.

The corona has affected my CUNY experience as a freshman. I'm not able to experience the College experience and communicate with other people.

The Board shouldn't raise our tuition by 320 because there are students who have to work jobs to pay out of pocket to pay for their education which ain't fair. Since ,we are working long hours. It

will affect me personally because I'll have to live with uncertainty; if Fafsa doesn't cover my tuition my parents are going to have to pay, they have a lot more things on their plate and I'll have to look for a job which might distract me from my school work. Raising the tuition for students would cause problems when it comes to their education .Students won't be able to concentrate on their schoolwork since they are worried about making ends meet.

The coronavirus pandemic has impacted my experience because I'm paying for classes that I am now taking online.

The board of trustees should not raise my tuition 320\$ because my source of income has been cut due to the pandemic and that is not something I can afford at the moment.

My name is Brianna Jungra. I'm a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for my tuition out of pocket.

The Corona Virus has affected my CUNY experience by making classes become more stressful as a result of the workload increase.

My name is Joseline Cuzco. I am a freshman attending Queen's College . I pay for my tuition with SEEK, TAP, and PELL.

Everyday I get new assignments to do and I can't finish them for lack of understanding. Stress has been my greatest enemy in this critical time and my health has worsened.

The Board of Trustees should not raise our tuition by \$320 because It would affect me. My economic status is low and I'm limited so I would have to find another job that pays me better to be able to pay for my education and my personal expenses. Every penny that CUNY gives us is a great help. Thanks to the aid that CUNY offers us, many students graduate and fulfill their dreams, and the US each time obtains a great professional. Profesionales that allow our county to prosper.

It doesn't make sense that we aren't in classrooms, using the facilities in school and yet the tuition is being increased. Tuition money should sl'mply be reallocated to fit the learight knowing we are having now. The tuition we had accounted for the learning experience we had before and it is sl'mply not the same anymore. Therefore, to have people pay even more makes no sense. We have to help support students especially in a time like this and not give them more things to worry about. This won't directly Impact me next semester because I am graduating, but

as an alumni it is super Important that those who still go to Queens aren't forced to pay for something that is nowhere near the true College and learning experience.

My name Kaitlyn Aldorando. I am a Graduated student attending Hunter College. The Macaulay Scholarship pays for my tuition.

The closure of CUNY campuses and dormitories during this pandemic has left me without a safe place to live. I am staying with my partner's family for the short term and trying to work out a living situation separate from my abusive family. Trying to figure this out and secure steady employment makes handling my classes nearly impossible as is. I also have been cut off from many of my support systems, including the food pantry and the Queer Student Union, because of the closure and the fact that I had to relocate to a different part of the state following the closures.

I think that CUNY students are among the most vulnerable populations affected by the coronavirus — economically, professionally, and healthwise. Many are being laid-off, and many of those who are working are risking their lives and the health of their loved ones every time they get on the train or go to work. Personally, I am fortunate that my scholarship would spare me from the effects of this tuition hike, but I am not blind to the fact that it would be another hardship in this already hard time for my friends and fellow classmates. Pushing these expenses onto students in what is supposed to be an institution that promotes diversity and social mobility is completely antithetical to CUNY's stated mission. Each time we raise tuition, we move further away from that dream, making it harder and harder for our students to focus on being students and effectively denying access to education for the very students who are the backbone of CUNY.

My name is Erika Velecela. I am a senior at Queen's College and TAP, FAFSA is what helps me pay for tuition.

Online courses have been difficult because I relied on school to get electronic resources. The library is also closed so books are not accessible either. This was my first semester of student teaching and all my EECE courses are now online. It is very difficult to keep up with work.

Tuition will affect me because I will attend graduate school in 2021 and if the tuition goes up it will be hard for me to pay because we no longer get aid. Right now During this pandemic

everyone is relying on whatever savings they have, so I may not have the money to pay for my tuition. I will have to juggle two or more jobs to pay and it's not fair considering that now we have a new normal where everyone is affected.

My name is Edwin Terrero. I am a freshman attending Queens College. I pay for school through TAP and Loans.

It has affected how my schooling works as well as my personal relationships. I miss being in the classroom and being around people.

People are going through hardships. Adding more money would add on to the stress we experience. It would make it greater and not many will be able to handle that and some may even just drop school all together.

My name is Melanie Tavarez. I am in my first year at Queens College. Pay my tuition off by using loans.

I had to heavily rely on loans to afford my tuition after me and members of my family were laid off. As a result of this pandemic it's now super hard to get a job.

Increasing the tuition in general will not only make it more difficult to find more money to cover the tuition increase due to COVID-19 and the lack of work within my family, but seems unnecessary due to the lack of use of resources on campus and classes moving to online this semester.

My name is Seedia Noor. I am a freshman attending Queens College. I pay for tuition through TAP; Pell, and SEEK.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected my CUNY experience in more ways than one. I am someone who is aspiring to be a teacher and before social distancing went into effect, I was gaining so much experience as a student teacher at the public school I was placed in. However, now I am not getting that experience and my student teaching class is now limited to Zoom

meetings with my supervisor. Furthermore, my other professors during this pandemic have been quite unreasonable as well. I do understand and actually do not mind doing more remote work for my classes, however what I do have a problem is still being graded harshly. Furthermore, doing more work DOES NOT mean that I am learning.. Remote learning noq has tremendously affected the way I learight now and it has taken away a huge chunk of experiences that one can only get in real life, not virtually. The truth is I am getting work done for my classes before the deadlines and that's all that matters right now. Submitting work before deadlines.

This pandemic has already skyrocketed stress levels in each and everyone of us. A close friend of mine has lost her father to COVID and it aches my heart knowing I cannot be there for her right now physically.

I believe that the Board of Trustees should not raise our tuition by \$320 because students should not take the hit for something that was not their fault. Students specifically are the ones being heavily affected by this pandemic and you expect them to pay an additional \$320? A good chunk of students are struggling to make ends meet. Many are coping with the reality that they must face every day now. If anything you should be lightening the burdens that students bear on their backs but instead you have chosen to increase that burden.

My name is Berita Lutolli. I am a senior transition in Graduated school and currently attending Queens College. I pay for tuition out of pocket with 4 jobs ; not eligible for state or federal aid.

I had to take a year off between senior year and Graduated school at Queen College to repay my student loan and become financially stable before paying for grad school and the pandemic put me out of 3 jobs, making me unable to pay for food, let alone grad school.

As a Queen's College alumnus, and soon-to-be Graduated student, a hike in tuition always means weaker performance and emotional and physical drainage. Adding \$320 means adding more hours of work and for students already working several jobs, it means more time spent in class half asleep because the very concept of a full night's sleep no longer exists.

My name is Leslie sanchez . I am a student attending Queensborough Community College. I pay for school through TAP, SEEK, FAFSA and College discovery.

No classes in person. Lots of homework. Have to learn subjects on my own right now. Grades went down.

Why should you guys raise more money for students to pay when they don't have a job right now to pay that off? People are struggling to even buy themselves food with the bit of money they have left. Parents won't be able to afford that either since they aren't working either. Also, why should a student have to pay MORE MONEY, when they aren't even getting the full College experience? It makes no sense to raise the tuition and it's very unfair when everyone is suffering from this pandemic.

We need every cent we have. We are facing another government shutdown because of this respiratory virus. Making people pay who can't have a job doesn't make much sense to me. Most people are in really bad situations and won't be able to pay.

My name is Jesseca Sutherland. I'm a sophomore at Queen's College and I use TAP and Excelsior.

I am not able to process my financial aid.

If we can barely pay now, how can we pay a higher price? Things are going into the toilet and they still want people to pay and for what? How will this be beneficial?

My name is Pavitri Dhanpaul. I go to York College and I am now a senior in College. I pay for school out of pocket.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected my CUNY experience by interrupting my physical learning. Due to this unprecedented time, it has been difficult for me to focus on my online classes

I believe that the Board of Trustees should not raise our tuition by \$320 because we are already experiencing a lot of difficulties financially. Times are hard and as a student paying for textbooks, rent, food, and taking care of family responsibilities all requires money. An additional \$320 increase will leave some of us deciding if we want to have a healthy and nutritious meal or a tertiary level education.

My name is Christianna Jaglal. I go to Queen College and how I pay for my tuition is by using ASAP, Pell, and out of pocket.

It's hard for me to focus in class while watching a screen and I'm worried when I have to take a difficult class without getting help one on one for something like statistics.

The board should not raise our tuition because we are already paying a significant amount of money and most of us out of pocket. Personally, I suffer with anxiety and depression every day and knowing how much money I owe for my classes does not help. With all of the money that I need to spend, I also work part time to help with tuition, but working and going to school is very difficult.

My name is Nathaniel Campos. I go to Queen's College and I am now in my junior year of College. I pay for school out of pocket.

The stress of getting a good grade does not help. Staying inside hasn't made things better either. I want to get good grades but it's super challenging as this virus spreads.

CUNY is known for being an affordable College that is also good education as well and this is ruining that.

My name is Andreas. I go to Queen's College and I am now in my senior year of College. I pay for school out of pocket.

Literally has had no effect on me whatsoever. If anything it's become more convenient for me because I wake up 5 mins before class. Go to class and do my homework. If anything my GPA has gone up.

I guess I would feel bad for my parents who have to pay that \$320 dollars but considering I am graduating it really won't affect me. However, some students can't afford that extra \$320 therefore I am against that increase in the price.

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My name is Jonathan Hollander .I go to Brooklyn College and I'm a sophomore. I pay for school out of pocket and a small scholarship.

The coronavirus pandemic affected my CUNY experience in two main areas, in regards to classes and in regards to clubs. First, I'm now taking a public speaking class online. Second, I live at home with my family who routinely interrupt my classes. Their thought process is, "Now that I'm home I could do more." I'm usually in class during these times. In regards to clubs I'm part of several such as Dialogue Across Difference, Orthodox Club, Accounting Society etc. These clubs often used event money for food, there were many days this was the only reason I had lunch.

Where is this extra money going? You got a \$17million grant from the goveright nowment to be used for students which could at least for the time being be used in place of a tuition raise? Why is NYPIRG part of our tuition, yet considered a club? However unlike every other club NYPIRG is not audited, why? Your 12:1 staff to student ratio is mostly non-teaching faculty, a lot of money is wasted by paying the salary of these staff, for example, I have personal experience with an advisor who lied to my face, why should my money go to staff like bad advisors? CUNY spent money on advertisements saying something along the lines of, "9/10 students go to CUNY tuition free" many students get the money from TAP, a goveright nowment program, CUNY workers are employees of that goveright nowment so it's essentially the goveright nowment paying themselves? It is especially a bad idea during this time of the pandemic because many people lost their jobs, and will not be able to afford tuition even with the emergency grants and other student aid, many students will have to drop out because they're not eligible for TAP or

I cannot borrow hard copy books from the libraries, I cannot use any free printing at CUNY, and online classes are just not as good as the regular classes!!

I don't see any progress in the service of the CUNY systems, but I did see the harm caused by the forced distance learning. We students did not receive any monetary compensation for our loss, so how should CUNY raise our tuition right after the difficult times?

My name is Amanda Reynoso. I'm a Junior at Queen College and I pay out of pocket.

Yes, I relied on campus facilities to complete my work. I don't have the same and now that I am forced to stay at home, I don't have the same resources and work is harder.

It makes no sense to raise tuition if we will not have access to campus facilities any more. You guys will make us pay more while we struggle even more because we aren't allowed on campus. We are still getting the same education as before just with less resources.

My name is Matthew Garces. I'm a Junior at Queen College and the way I pay for College is out of pocket.

The pandemic has affected me horribly. Many classes have assignments that I cannot probably understand or hand in. Harder to contact classmates since I cannot see them in person.

Since I pay out of pocket it will affect my income flow and my parents income because we pay it together. I believe it shouldn't be necessary to increase tuition because it has recently increased while I've been a student before.

My name is Ester Choi. I am a senior at Queen's College who pays tuition FAFSA and TAP.

The classes are online so I don't want to pay more for something that they are not offering. I am not getting my money's worth of classes. I have no money.

Because the classes are online right now. People have no money. They should ask themselves why they have the right to increase tuition when we aren't even meeting our professors in class.

My name is Akela Islam. I am currently in Queen's College and I am a freshman. I pay out of pocket for my school tuition.

It really did take a big toll in one of my major classes cause there's a lot of pressure in the class ever since online class started, and teachers overload you with work expecting to be done when there are some people working. It's very inefficient to pay for full tuition when a part of our tuition is for using campus resources when we now don't even set a foot on campus so why can't we get a refund for that portion. I lost my work study and lecture at home at less Impact as actual lecture, the professors are uploading videos instead of actual lectures now to avoid having to deal with multiple classes.

Raising our tuition in a time of a pandemic is unjust as is charging for student activity and technology fee. As one of the reasons I chose CUNY was that it was affordable and I didn't have to pay dorm fee, but CUNY gives no aid compared to other institutions thus having my PELL grant removed this year due to verification process error made by the financial office and me being unable to appeal due to the appeal period ending before I entered the university, being a freshman.

My name is Andrea. I am a senior attending Brooklyn College. I pay for school out of pocket and in addition to TAP; Pell.

It has made my experience difficult and one I would never forget. Soon when this is over i will appreciate the things that are offered that are not offered during quarantine.

A tuition increase at this time is unjust. We are in the midst of uncertain times. Many people are unemployed and are unsure how they will take care of their families. Increasing the tuition at this time enables fear and doubt about individuals further their education because they do not have the money or resources to do so.

In the beginning of the pandemic, I lost my job. I was expecting to pay my tuition THROUGHOUT the semester while also getting paid. As we continued to be in quarantine, I was staying home doing my part of social distancing, and one of my family members who is an Essential Worker, ended up contracting COVID. We are isolating her still at the moment and are trying our best to stay supportive of her and still take care of yourself. I stayed clear from her, and continued to go about my distancing. It wasn't until a few days ago, I received an email stating I still owe money for Tuition, (\$2,705 to be exact and that includes late fees as well since they are still applying that), and also still have to pay for movie rentals for one of my classes, still aside from the fact that I am already out of money. Unemployment was almost impossible to fill out, I'm not sure if I am even getting the Stimulus Check, and as of today (4/10/2020) I received news of now being COVID Positive. I'm drained of everything. Bills outside of school, tuition, the insanely dense school work that we are still expected to finish (which I had emailed my professor about and he said he can't do anything about it. Same class that is making us rent movies and my ass is still out of a job) and tbh, I just don't even know what to do anymore. I personally believe tuition should have been reduced or SOMETHING in this damn pandemic. Especially given that almost 30% of Americans are now unemployed. I have never felt such a lack of support from Hunter, and I always carry such pride to state that I go to Hunter College ...

I can't even afford tuition for this semester without struggling. Another \$320 isn't much to them, but that's two months of a phone bill for me, half my credit line which I still also have to pay, and I have not noticed any changes in Hunter in my 3 years of being there. Only difference is an increase in tuition and none of it being trickled down to the students and staff.

My name is Ryan Mitchell. I am a first year grad student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college with the help of loans.

Major disruption in class schedule and in class learning. Although I work full time, I specifically chose this school and this program because I learn better in a traditional classroom format. Now six weeks into the semester I am basically taking two online courses.

I work full time but am the breadwinner in my family. In addition to the time commitment of working full time and going to school, I also have to make an out of pocket financial commitment to my education. I have taken out a loan for this semester, but a tuition hike at a time when many students are unemployed, underemployed or have competing financial obligations is simply unjust and will affect many people's ability to continue their education.

My name is Euclid Zhang. I am a first year grad student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

I have no access to most school resources due to this pandemic.

Two people in my family already lost their job. We have to pay rent and other costs of living. We can not afford an increase in expenses especially if that increase is \$320.

My name is Robin Marshall. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with the help of Scholarship and the remainder out of pocket.

This pandemic made it incredibly difficult to get anything from my classes and do more than simple task completion (as opposed to learning).

If tuition increases by \$320, I'll have to work more hours I will have to work during the academic year, which already was too much.

My name is Jessica Rosario. I am a junior at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I pay for college with the help of pell and TAP.

My mom is a single mother who works as a CNA taking care of the elderly in their homes. The coronavirus threatens the life of my younger sister who has bad asthma. My sister is 12 years old and is at great risk. To avoid being exposed to this virus my mom has stopped working. We're now living off of the little savings we have and my part time paycheck. While a full-time student I work part-time at the Queens Library. Our landlord is still expecting the rent even after I have explained our situation. In addition to struggling to keep up with my courses as a full-time student and working, I now worry whether or not we are able to pay bills.

I am not even living paycheck to paycheck. My family and I are living off of savings. CUNY is severely underfunded by the state of New York therefore I don't believe the burden should fall on students to pay for basic needs.

My name is Jesse. I am a junior student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

The transition from in person to online was an adjustment I am still figuring out.

I am already in a debt and wouldn't like that debt to increase more if I have to pay \$320 more for tuition.

My name is Michelle Cruz. I am a senior student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

Personally, I work in healthcare and these are extremely trying times for my family and I.

If there's a tuition increase, I won't be able to afford to attend next semester.

My name is Alexsis Grant. I am a junior at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket and with the help of TAP.

I have less time to focus on schoolwork because I am an essential worker. Other individuals in my household are out of work because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

A lot of students already cannot afford to pay the price of classes. It is harder to qualify for Federal Aid as well. I may not be able to graduate on time if I have to pay more for classes. I will not be able to afford a semester.

My name is Rashree R. Pirtam. I am a junior at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

Due to this pandemic, I have lost my job and I am unable to find one at the moment.

Tuition should not be increased since a lot of students must be in situations where they need to provide for themselves or families if they've lost their jobs.

My name is Daniela Huerfano. I am a sophomore at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

I lost one of my jobs and lost hours on the second job. I can't really focus on my homework at the moment.

We are going through a tough time right now. An increase in tuition will make it far more than worst for students who are unemployed.

My name is Kamara Cypien. I am a senior at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

COVID19 has impacted my CUNY experience. Clinicals are converted to home activities, long shifts as a Nurse in the hospitals caused me to not concentrate as well.

Raising tuition is a bad call. Affordability, during the time when the economy is being challenged, this is not an appropriate action.

My name is Alisha. I am a senior attending the New York City College of Technology. I pay for college out of pocket.

COVID19 has impacted me. I am unsure if online classes are the best option for certain classes. I'm not getting the full potential of the class I'm currently taking.

I'm already paying out of pocket. The \$320 raise isn't helping me in any way when the classes I'm taking I'm being limited to the resources I should be using / get which would be provided by the school. Me getting the full potential is out of the question. \$320 is money that won't be able to use for essential resources to stay at home. Because I'm not getting paid due to the fact my job is closed until further notice.

My name is Lika. I am a sophomore attending the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket and with some help from Pell.

Due to this pandemic, it is harder to focus on homeworks.

I do not have loans but I do have to pay for part of my tuition as well as my sisters tuition, it is already hard to cover them so I cannot imagine how hard it would be for me to deal if tuition was increasing.

My name is Briana. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college with the help of Pell, and by taking loans.

Due to this pandemic, it has been moving to online classes a bit more difficult as opposed to in person.

Tuition should not be increased by \$320 as we, the students can't afford it. CUNY should be free.

My name is Julia Schonberg. I am a first year grad attending the CUNY School of Professional Studies where I pay for my tuition out of pocket.

I am in the Applied Theatre graduate program, a program that survives on community and in person connection in the classroom. All of my classes are now online and studying theatre online is an incredible challenge. Furthermore, the financial strain and anxiety of losing all of my income while in graduate school is something I could never have imagined. Not being able to work or to leave my house while studying theatre online, has been an immense challenge.

After losing all of my income due to COVID-19, I am already worried about paying for next semester and earning my degree. Not to mention all of my classes are now online and all of my practical assignments have been cancelled. Realizing that this may continue into next semester, I cannot imagine having to pay more tuition for courses that are not even in their full expression of what they would normally be. I cannot pay my rent, bills or train tickets, let alone having to pay more money for tuition. The financial assistance CUNY is providing during this time is incredible and I have felt so supported by this community. Please do not reverse this feeling and

raise tuition. This would be an injustice to all CUNY students during this time of immense need. We are making an investment in our future and will not be able to do so if we are forced to juggle the anxiety of higher tuition.

My name is Sharin Sultana Arna. I am a senior at Brooklyn College. I received a Pell which helps to pay for my college.

Coronavirus has reduced my earning capacity and I am going through with financial difficulties.

It will affect my financial situation and I might have to pay the tuition from my pocket.

I used to work on campus but because of the coronavirus pandemic, I lost my job. This greatly impacts my ability to pay for tuition as well as other personal expenses. It's harder to focus on school work when you're constantly thinking of how you will pay for classes.

I have never been so financially insecure in my entire college career. I am already struggling to afford the tuition right now. By authorizing a \$320 increase, the Board of Trustees are contributing to the struggle that students like me are facing.

My name is Magdalena Butenhoff. I am a first year grad attending the CUNY School of Professional Studies where I pay for college with the help of FAFSA and student loans.

I have had major changes to my work life, which has caused me to take time away from my school work.

The world is going to continue to see major economic shifts that will likely have negative effects on many lives. Raising tuition fees during a world wide crisis will push eager students away from CUNY, either by choice or because they are forced to to be able to survive financially. If tuition is raised, I will have to work more hours so I can be able to pay for the increase out of

York College is already underfunded as is. CUNY wants to take more from us & not improve on anything around campus? The more tuition we pay, the lesser the experience and the conditions get on campus.

My name is Ockacia Bigby. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college with the help of TAP.

My mom is the only one working right now and everything outside is extremely expensive. She also has to take on the responsibility of my aunt's kids because she is quarantined in New Jersey.

Personally, I don't receive much from Pell. I don't receive much TAP and my SEEK money that I receive all go towards my books. It's hard when the students have to pay out of pocket. Saving my lunch money to pay a monthly payment of \$300 and change. Yes my mom may make a lot of money for the year. Let's break down that money, school fee, rent, food, transportation, emergency fund, taking care of her parents back home, her husband. It's not that my mom makes a lot of money, she works over time. Taking a night shift although she worked during the day. I hardly see her at times. She hardly has time to sit down and rest. It is extremely unfair to raise

tuition especially with the pandemic that we are facing now. Students like myself who only have one supporter at home are difficult for us.

My name is Antonio Mattis. I am a senior attending New York City College of Technology. I pay for college out of pocket.

Students are struggling so much right now to even make ends meet and keep their families safe. How can you further burden families when we are going through a crisis and so many of us are

out of work? They should take a cut from their compensation as a trustee if they are so pressed for the money.

My name is Saaif Alam. I am a senior at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I get help from SEEK to pay for my college.

If the Board of Trustees increase tuition by \$320, this can affect my ability to pay tuition during Graduate School.

We already live paycheck to paycheck. \$320 is money we literally don't have. This tuition hike will take food out of the mouths of my children.

My name is Musharrat Chowdhury. I am a senior at the New York City College of Technology. I pay for college by TAP, loans and out of pocket.

Devastated by this pandemic as I lost my internship and the money I pay for tuition, bills .

As I'm doing my second Bachelor I only get TAP. After TAP I've to pay from my pocket like spring 2020 still has to pay \$1939 . That is a heartbroken stage. I don't have any fixed income. I've to pay mobile internet bills, metro card , food, clothes etc. from any internship if I get one.

After this war it's taken a long time to get back to regular life and job. Please I'm begging you don't increase \$320 . Hard for no income students and families .

My name is Patrick Maloney. I am a first year grad student at CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

Due to this pandemic, there is added stress.

There is so much uncertainty right now. They should look to use this time to explore places where overhead can be cut as we all use technology to be productive.

My name is Hira Khan. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with the help of SEEK.

Hard to focus on calls and overload of work. Have issues with my internet so it is hard to attend class as well.

I come from a lower class family. I can not afford my tuition without outside help. This would put more financial burden in me during this time when people can't work. This is truly gross to do to students that can't afford it.

My name is Hema Muni. I am a freshman at Queens College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I don't learn as much as I would in a physical class and it seems like a waste of time

I already pay out of pocket, my parents lost both of their jobs. We can't afford it and it's not fair to pay extra money. We did nothing wrong.

My name is Jamala Hunte. I am a senior at CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college TAP, Scholarship and Out of pocket.

As a scholarship recipient, I would come on campus for various events to network and get to know my professors and fellow classmates and staff of the campus in person. Now, I am unable to do so. I wanted to get more involved this semester by going to campus more often. With this pandemic, I am unable to do so. I know most of my classes are online, but to know that I am able to go to campus when needed made me have a sense of community.

I think during these times tuition should not be raised because many of the students that attend school may be paying out of pocket. Many of those students may have had to file for unemployment which would not bring in as much money as they would had they been working.

I haven't been able to learn from my classes at all. Some of my professors were unable to provide weekly lectures which has affected my ability to learn visually and virtually. If the Board of Trustees raise our tuition by \$320 it will only benefit them and put more money into our education in college. But it will bring us back to a point where we were unable to pay the previous amount anyways and now adding more to it would be a burden. It is not easy for most of us New Yorkers to pay such amounts already and then increasing them by another 300. We receive FAFSA at times and at times we don't, either way we pay around 3,700 per semester if my FAFSA doesn't go through. I highly encourage the Board of Trustees to take a look at where we are in the crisis at the moment where most of us don't even have jobs and we have no clue what's coming next and how bad things might get. If we increase the tuition by \$320 it's only going to make things harder for those who take education seriously and will have more stress to pay the tuition. Majority of college students graduate with student debt and they have enough to worry about. Increasing even by just 1% or a few hundreds are not going to change the fact that we will be adding onto our debts. We understand due to the circumstances we are going

through now, will make them take this decision but it is not for the well-being of all. Instead tuition should be decreased and not increased because with the rate that it's increasing yearly from the time my parents were born, it has done nothing but put more and more students into debt. I highly encourage the Board of Trustees to consider our request and think about how it will affect all of us in the long term. My name is Aaron Greyser. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with the help of Janovic Scholarship and Athena Honors.

The pandemic has affected my CUNY experience as such. The education quality worsened due to the lack of a physical element which is very vital for human communication. I have no access to a majority of college resources due to the stay at home order and campuses being closed. What I'm receiving through online learning is only a meager part of the experience I expect and is paid for. This is even more so the case for all the students that pay their tuition from out of their own pockets, many acquiring debt to do so.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition by \$320 because many college students, especially within this CUNY, and during such times of economic hardship, are very much low on funds and are under financial pressure. Many will suffer, even if \$320 seems insignificant, to many is the last of their savings.

It is already a lot (almost 10,000 dollars) for international students.

Aida Eloumri is a Sophomore at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice. She uses TAP & Excelsior money to pay for college.

Classes have been moved online. Lack of communication from some professors. Not a lot of info on Fall classes, club statuses are up in the air.

During this pandemic, the last thing that students should worry about is how they're going to pay for their education in the fall. A lot of students work on campus and are not getting paid anyway and work outside of school has been laid off. Students should not be penalized with a tuition hike that is not going to benefit the CUNY community. Of classes were going to be online in the fall, where would all of that money go due to the campus not being open. With the tuition hike and if classes are going to be online before a lot of the monies are going to be sitting there especially with the student activity fee that goes towards it's clubs in the student technology fee, printing, and student activities.

My name is Yenni Galan. I am a Junior student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies.

I pay college with TAP and Out of pocket money.

I'm a pharmacy technician and it's made keeping up with normal activities difficult. I'm having to run errands for most of my family members that live nearby because they cannot leave their homes. It takes up a huge chunk of my time during the day. Moreover, my hours at work have been irregular, making everything a struggle.

Being able to afford tuition is already a challenge. As working adults, TAP does not cover all of our educational expenses so we end up paying out of pocket. I am sometimes forced to postpone my education because I cannot afford to pay tuition.

My name is John Gallagher. I am a graduated student from The City College of New York.

I paid college mostly with out of pocket money.

I'm not a current student but a CCNY graduate (class of 84) and a person who works at BMCC. The pandemic has had a terrible impact on our students. They lost part time jobs and their parents full time ones. They are already food and housing insecure and this just made it even more difficult..

If you and your family lost your income this year the tuition increase is equal to your food budget that already is depleted. It adds significant risk to an already challenged student body that is at risk of homelessness and is already doing without meals. It also increases the TAP Gap, hurting the colleges.

My name is Sadiya Hussain. I am aFreshman student at The City College of New York.

I receive Excelsior and use out of pocket money to pay for college.

Being a freshman, coronavirus has taken away from me experiencing spring semester for the first time. Additionally, I am a type of student where I have to learn in person with the professor being in front of me. Having to learn material through zoom is difficult because of all the distractions I have at home and not being in a traditional classroom environment.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't increase tuition because it isn't fair. Even though these are horrible times, We're paying tuition but using our own devices, WiFi and having to teach ourselves through online classes. Even though I do receive excelsior, it doesn't cover my full tuition. Having to pay an additional \$320 is going to be hard as I will probably have to take up extra shifts to pay it back but currently I am unemployed from my job.

My name is Sarah Russo. I am a Senior student at Hunter College.

I received Merit scholarships, a little bit of fafsa aid, and out of pocket money to pay for college.

It is so difficult for me to focus being stuck in the house with my family. Somehow my professors have added more assignments because we “have more time now” ... which is just false. In my home We all have to use the internet, so the WiFi crashes almost everyday. My sister and I both got laid off, so we are worried about our financial situation and what to do next. I am just thankful I am graduating and don’t have to pay another semester of tuition because my family definitely couldn’t afford it now.

It is criminal to increase tuition in the face of an economic depression. How dare you make life even harder for working class students who are trying to get an education to better the life of not only themselves, but also their family and community. An additional \$320 would be the deciding factor for thousands of already broke young people to not pursue secondary education. I ask the trustees to reflect on their own personal six figure paychecks before condemning thousands of nycs most vulnerable to a future without education. This decision to increase tuition now will be felt in the years to come when New York has a lack of educated professionals and even more people dependent on state assistance.

My name is Paige Beaucant. I am a Freshman at Hunter College.

I receive Pell Grant and Tap to pay for college.

I’m a Freshman at Hunter and instead of being in school and learning in person, I’m online either via Blackboard Collaborate or not even engaging with my professors because not all of them are using that tool. Remote learning could never compare with online learning and I can’t wait to go back to in person learning. I feel like myself as well as other students are being cheated. We aren’t working, we’ve lost our jobs (some permanently), we are worrying about groceries and how to afford them. I don’t get to experience team work collaboration, I don’t get to enjoy learning the way I should be- just like every other student would agree.

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic, I have lost both of my jobs- one of them being a permanent loss. This in turn, puts financial stress on me which affects my mental health. I have been feeling extremely stressed and overwhelmed which makes school right now harder. I know that many other students feel the same as I do. My dear friend, Samuel, is thinking of withdrawing this late in the semester (out of Hunter this semester) because his laptop which was very old broke and he can’t afford a new one. He’s also disabled and therefore doesn’t work. I think this is so unfair to

do to students during a crisis such as this. Students are struggling, especially those in CUNY. I can't qualify for the stimulus check because I don't make enough money to file for taxes and I live at home (I'm an 18 year old freshman) so I am a dependent, so where is the help for me? My parents can't receive \$500 for me because I'm over 17, people like myself are stuck in a position where we are powerless.

My name is Pooja Chopra. I am a Senior student at Hunter College.

I receive Tap, Pell Grant, and some external scholarships to pay for college.

All of my scholarship money has been going to paying for familial expenses (rent, food, utilities). My family is burdened with saving this money up and allocating a certain amount for each month. We don't even know how long this pandemic is going to last. Like many other families, my family is surviving on the edge. Both my parents got laid off. We JUST got unemployment benefits (which barely cover any costs).

\$320 dollars is a lot. That is at least six weeks worth of groceries (providing, we buy just what we need). The increase will affect not only my life and my expenses, but my families. It is just one bill that pushes us closer to financial instability. Please understand that for working class communities in NYC, every dollar makes a difference.

My name is Destiny Howell. I am a Freshman student at Hunter College.

I receive Tap, pell, and fasfa to pay for college.

My online classes experience was not productive. For example, we would take 20-30 minutes of helping the professor on how to use the blackboard ultra to do lectures. It is so glitchy. For example, the white board disappears with all of the notes and diagrams. The audio is on and off without the professor and students knowing. Also, professors feel less motivated to teach us! They do not have the necessary tools to teach us. No white boards, markers, or online programs to help us. CUNY needs to invest more!

I thought CUNY was for the poor and minority people who wanted to change their fate. I thought CUNY was a good system to make education affordable. I would truly appreciate it if they do

not raise our tuition because of this pandemic. My mom is currently unemployed and things would not get back to normal right away. So I do not think it is a smart idea to raise tuition while this is going on. Why raise the tuition if the quality of CUNY isn't great at all? The building still needs to be repaired. The professors aren't that great. The quality in general isn't up there.

My name is Jose Menjivar. I am a Junior student at Hunter.

I pay college through Excelsior.

It's been difficult to adjust to classes. In addition to uncertainty of the housing situation is a source of stress. While we were promised credits, the vague terminology produced more questions.

It doesn't make sense to increase tuition at the time being. People have other expenses to worry about due to the coronavirus. While I won't personally be affected by the tuition hike, it's unfair for people struggling to pay off other bills at the moment.

My name is Andrew Shkreli. I am a junior student at Hunter College. I received a Tap and Pell Grant to pay for college.

I was forcibly evicted from my dormitory and still don't know if I'll be allowed back there next year. Considering this, I still don't know if the financial aid that went towards my dorm expenses will be given back to me or apply to dorm costs next year. I've also been falling behind in my academics due to personal difficulties that COVID-19 exasperated.

I don't think the Board of Trustees should punish students already experiencing financial strain, especially considering the pandemic. The increase in cost will also strain my resources, as I hope to use that money to cover necessary expenses such as textbooks. I also don't want to have to work to meet extra costs, as I believe I should prioritize my academics.

I am Laura Sedra. I am a Freshman student at Hunter College. I pay college with money from Pelle, TAP, out of pocket

I chose to live at Hunter for my first year, which meant that I had to pay thousands of dollars out of pocket. Now I feel like all that money has gone to waste, since the majority of my second semester has been moved to remote learning. I also feel that I do not have the same resources available to me now.

CUNY shouldn't raise our tuition, as right now students are practically teaching themselves. It is not fair to charge them extra when they are staying home studying on their own. Also, many parents are stuck at home unemployed and relying on unemployment checks. This shows that right now many families are going through a financial crisis, and may not be able to support their children with extra money for school.

My name is Xin Weng Hunter College. I am a Junior from Hunter College. I receive money from Both Pell and TAP for college.

The remote distance learning is a big challenge for me. I lost track of things often which is no good to me and others.

If the increase does happen, I might be forced to drop out of college.

I pay college with TAP, Pell Grant, and Scholarship.

The coronavirus pandemic has negatively affected my CUNY experience. I do not have access to the school facilities, which provided me with places to study independently. Additionally, being stuck inside has lowered my motivation to continue to do my schoolwork in a timely manner.

The increase will affect me personally because I will have less money available after scholarships. In addition, I feel that I will have to take money away from supplies I need, as one

textbook can be \$200 or more. Lastly, I feel this will make it harder for me and my friends, who may already have increased anxieties and stress from the effects of Covid-19.

I am Maria Coutroupis. I am a Sophomore student at the Borough of Manhattan Community College

I receive money from TAP and FAFSA to pay for college.

I don't like online courses , online courses for me are not working. I'm not learning anything.

A lot of people will drop college after covid 19, because they will not be able to pay the increase in tuition and fees. Why make it harder ?

I am Hiren Bip. I am a Sophomore student at The Borough of Manhattan Community College.

I receive ASAP, Pell, and I use Out of Pocket money to pay for college Tuition.

It has made it super hard to focus on school work since I am now home watching my cousins and family more.

I had to work less to afford going back. I live about an hour away and ASAP thankfully helped me with traveling expenses and textbook expenses.

My name is Melane Andeliz. I am a Junior student at The Borough of Manhattan Community College. I receive FAFSA money to pay for college Tuition.

I am impacted by this pandemic. Sometimes it is difficult to work online if the sites are down.

Raising tuition is incredibly irresponsible and shows the students that the board does not care about them or their wellbeing. This will affect my family because I come from a single mother

household and it is hard for her to make money especially with this going on in the world . It is just irresponsible on their part. They don't care about the students.

My name is Aidin Murtha. I am a Senior college student at Hunter College.

I receive money from Scholarships and I use out of pocket money to pay for college Tuition.

As a senior pursuing a BA/MA in mathematics and a BA in German, many of my classes this semester were independent studies. Unfortunately, the covid pandemic has made scheduling meetings with professors extremely difficult. As such, most of my classes have been reduced to little more than e-mails with my professors. Similarly, I also TEACH a course as an adjunct lecturer; my experience as an educator has also been dampened by the pandemic as my course's transition to the online format has severely reduced my ability to interact with my students.

For me, personally, as I will be graduating, this hike in tuition has no effect. However, as a soon to be alumnus, I find all of the recent tuition hikes shameful, and this one in particular is sickeningly irresponsible. My name is Zoe Schacht-Levine. I'm a second year at the CUNY School of Public Health. I pay for school out of pocket. COVID19 has impacted me by shifting all my classes to online. I also am out of a job, can't pay for rent and don't have enough money for food during this time.

I believe the BOT absolutely should not raise tuition, especially since we are getting less now than we were before. No access to in person classes and teaching, no access to gyms and libraries and other things my tuition pays for. Lower quality education. I can't learn as well as I was before the crisis.

My name is Julie Seepaul. I'm a senior at York College. I pay for classes out of pocket. I don't believe the BOT should raise tuition because students like me have no job and no finance coming from anywhere.

My name is Jasmine Shaikh. I am a third year at Hunter College. I receive TAP and Pell and also pay the remaining balance out of pocket.

The COVID19 pandemic has affected me personally. I was pushed out of my dorms back to the state of Connecticut in a household that is mentally taxing. I lost my job due to the fact the schools are closed because I am an after school teacher. I don't do well online and that has been affecting me a lot academically. If the tuition is raised I will have a lot of issues because I have been out of a job for quite a while now due to the virus. I have been paying for housing out of pocket because I'm from another state. I will not be able to go back to school.

Tuition should not be raised because I cannot afford to pay my bills since covid 19. I lost a lot this year and please don't raise tuition because I cannot afford my education to be taken too.

My name is Soneya Uddin. I am a senior at York College. I pay for school through Pell and TAP. Because of COVID, I am financially broke with no work. If the BOT raises tuition, it will impact me because I'm currently doing a second degree and can't afford the spike in tuition.

Because we had to transition to distance learning due to COVID, my online classes are not nearly as effective as in-person instruction. Due to COVID-19 I am financially unstable.

If the BOT decides to raise tuition by \$320, it will be impossible to pay my tuition.

My name is Noor Sharlin Jahan. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

I have to start paying for my summer and fall 2020 session and I'm still paying for my spring 2020. I literally have to work since we went into social distancing. I might have to take the semester off because i cannot pay which sucks because i was two semesters away from graduating

These are students who work and go to school and have other responsibilities we're not rich that you can hike up the price just because.

My name is Ottavio Castaldi. I am a freshman attending Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I feel out of touch with my education. Zoom classes can only do so much and I do not feel I am getting much out of my classes since in-person classes ended. It's simply made it worse overall.

My parents are helping me pay for college and I am fortunate for that, but there would simply be more strain on them or loans I would need to take out if the tuition is raised. This is unfair to the students, as we are getting less out of our classes since we have moved to distance learning, and we barely enjoy the benefits of our tuition money as it is.

My name is Marguerite Coles. I am a first year grad student at Hunter College. I pay for college by taking loans.

My classes were moved online. Some of my professors have had difficulty transitioning. There have been a lot of changes to the syllabi. It's also just hard to concentrate on class when the world is going to hell in a handbasket.

Students are struggling enough financially already in the current climate, and the economy is imploding. Many, including myself, don't qualify for the stimulus payments. I already won't be able to have a job because I'll be doing classes full time and doing a year long, time intensive internship for my program. Adding more costs on top of that is just salt in the wound.

My name is Makeda Andargachew. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and PELL

Because of the COVID situation, learning has become difficult. I am thankful for my professors' efforts to make the situation better, but it's hard to concentrate at home. I also know that my professors are even more limited in what they can teach.

CUNY students are already struggling as it is. I am personally lucky enough to receive enough financial aid that I do not have to pay anything. I can't imagine what would happen if there was a price increase since a lot of students have jobs to support their families.

My name is Maame Tiwaa Ocran. I am a sophomore at The City College of New York . I pay for college out of my pocket.

Because of this pandemic, I lost my mother who was a Nursing Educator at Jacobi Medical Center.

Personally tuition shouldn't be raised because now my father has to help pay my tuition along with other house bills.

My name is Toni Collier. I am a freshman at the Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with the help from ASAP.

Professors are not available to speak to and are assigning extra work compared to when the class warning person.

They shouldn't raise the tuition because CUNY prides itself in being affordable, if it rises less people will apply to CUNY. Not every student is eligible for tuition assistance.

My name is Anslem Joseph. I am a junior at Brooklyn College. I pay for college with TAP, PELL, EXCELSIOR

Doing online classes is stressful to manage.

I believe tuition shouldn't be raised because everything is already too expensive and in this economy and pandemic we need to put our needs first before our school.

My name is Michael Osei-Bonsu. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and SEEK

It's hectic now. The workload is even more overwhelming than it was before.

My family isn't doing the best financially; the refund checks I get back help a lot at home and if the tuition is raised, I will get less money back and after allocating money for books and other expenses, I'll have nothing left.

My name is Adamma Ogbennaya. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell, TAP and out of pocket.

It has made registering for next semester and talking to people who can help a lot harder.

Even though I get partial financial aid, it's still a lot if you include me and my 4 siblings who are all also in college/graduate school.

My name is Adam Fane. I am a senior at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I pay for college out of pocket.

Covid 19 impacted my learning habit, while at the same time, it made shift all of my summer plan, which was to work on my LSAT skill.

I believe the Board of Trustees should not raise the tuition because many students struggle with obtaining the fund for their current tuition. And many of us have to work two jobs while taking over 5 classes a semester in order to graduate on time.

My name is Matthew Simbana. I am a freshman at Queens College. I pay for college with TAP, financial aid, and out of pocket.

This pandemic has absolutely demolished my ability to learn. Everything is so needlessly convoluted and difficult. The workload is all do it yourself with no ability to use professors as support.

I can barely afford to pay this tuition others would deem minimal especially coming from an already alarmingly low income household.

My name is Tania Campos. I am a sophomore at Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with the help of FAFSA and ASAP.

This pandemic has affected my CUNY experience because I don't like online classes and learn best face to face. I also can't take advantage of the tutoring available, or the workshops hosted on campus or any of the other events.

I will be transferring to a senior college by Fall 2020, and most 4 year CUNY colleges don't have ASAP which I relied on to cover my tuition. This means I will have to pay out of pocket.

My name is Yomairy Vargas. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with a pell grant and out of pocket.

I honestly felt really scared and upset the last day of in person-class and at the same time I understood that it was for our safety but I never agreed that professors and staff had to be visiting the institution for almost a week to prepare remote learning. Besides everything, we are still getting fees in our tuition and on top of everything it's been almost a month and we still take classes with a poor quality app and my expectations was that CUNY will develop an app or type of website for CUNY students to make our remote learning easier for everyone. It's disappointing!

We might be paying less than in private institutions and that's part of what makes CUNY and SUNY different. We're NOT having a good quality of learning, we're not using classrooms and there's a very small percentage of students that walk-in in a week so the light bill, water, food, cleaning , and other services are not being used. So what is the point of increasing tuition instead of decreasing or freezing it at least ! We're receiving classes in pajamas ! we're afraid to go outside ! We don't even have enough for our own bills and food. There's no reason for raising tuition AT ALL!

My name is Jennifer Pajak. I am a junior attending John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I pay for college by taking Private loans; I'm out of state so my tuition is absurdly high.

I'm a student from out of state, so I left my family and came to NYC to attend John Jay. Because of COVID I can't go home to be with them, so now I'm basically stuck here not even attending school or work. I chose John Jay for the experience of attending my classes in person and having quality interactions with my professors, who are experts in their field. They offer a lot of valuable life lessons and career advice that we simply just aren't able to get through an online class environment. I understand all students are deprived of this, but it especially sucks for me considering I pay four times what most local students pay, if not more, to attend the college, receive the same education, and utilize the same facilities and resources. So basically, I'm paying almost \$10,000 a semester to sit in my apartment and take classes online that I didn't sign up for online, and I'm missing out on all of the in class experiences and resources that I specifically chose John Jay for.

To be blunt; we are broke !!! All college kids are typically broke, but this is especially true for students living in New York City. CUNY was once free, so why are we hiking up tuition so much, for something that originally didn't even require tuition in the first place? You're preying on struggling students who can hardly afford to pay for tuition as it is. For students who pay out of pocket, that \$320 could have been their groceries. That \$320 could have fed their family. That \$320 could have covered their commute so they could even attend their college period. That \$320 could have covered their textbooks. That \$320 is VITAL to our survival in this city. For out of state students like me , that \$320 will be exponentially higher, just like every other hike in tuition, someday when we can finally pay it, due to the crippling interest rates we face on our loans. CUNY should be protecting its students, not monopolizing their wallets. John Jay for example probably already makes enough money giving out usage of the campus for the filming of various TV shows, inconveniencing students and making them late to class on a regular basis.

I am afraid I can no longer focus on my classes. Therefore I think my grade will drop and ultimately affect my GPA. I also have been struggling with my mental health

I am low income as it is. I rely on financial aid and refunds to sustain myself while I go to school.

My name is Malka Tomsy. I am a sophomore at Kingsborough Community College. I pay for college with the help of Pell.

It has affected me psychologically, emotionally, socially and physically. My family can't afford to pay a lot more we live paycheck to paycheck. It has been really hard

Many CUNY students can't afford to pay and live a day to day life. Personally I have so many health issues but I want to finish college as well. I lost my job due to the coronavirus. My mom

is the only person in my life who helped me through and all my siblings are special needs so it's very difficult.

My name is Tyler Campbell. I am a sophomore attending The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

I have been drowning in school work. Unfortunately, the pandemic has also closed down everywhere, so people can't even hang out with their friends at a diner or a movie. It honestly feels like house arrest with countless amounts of work to do from my school.

Raising the tuition would make absolutely no sense. During a pandemic, one would expect for people to be understanding. If anything, the students that agreed to do a regular class in a classroom setting within their schools should be the ones to get a discount on their tuition for as long as the school is not holding regular classes in the institution.

My name is Christina Marrow. I am a sophomore at Bronx Community College. I receive a TAP that pays for my education.

Well, my experience thus far has been interesting . For the most part I travel a lot less . However I haven't been able to step foot on my campus which has limited my resources from computer loans to quiet study time in the library .

We as students already have a lot on our hands . CUNY is supposed to be an institution that allows students an opportunity to become great. We are already paying for college and we also understand that college isn't a privilege so why make it harder ? This tuition hike will result in me getting 4 jobs and/or cutting my classes or better yet leaving college all together. There many things I have to worry about but for now at least my education is not one of them .

My name is Lauren Turner. I am a senior attending the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college with Pell, out of pocket, loans

Yes, my husband has been sick and out of work since we started sheltering in place. My daughter, who attends Queensborough Community College has lost school time. We are struggling to pay bills, tuition, light, heat and food.

This kind of increase consistently affects those of us trying to improve our circumstances. As contributing members of society we add to the fabric of this city instead of becoming a burden. To dangle an education in front of someone then tell them they cannot have it is a misuse of the system. To some \$350 does not sound like a lot, but when you are just making what you have covered the basics it's everything.

My name is Maryam Oguntola. I am a freshman attending John Jay College of Criminal Justice. I pay for college with the help of the SEEK program.

As a first year student who has never taken online classes, I am struggling to focus and concentrate while staying at home.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition because it would affect students who either pay out of pocket and students who are struggling to pay for college. Tuition increase puts lower income and undocumented students at an unfair advantage. The tuition raise would make CUNY less accessible for people in poverty and immigrants.

My name is Shidedsi Martinez-Santos. I am a sophomore at LaGuardia Community College. I pay for college with TAP, Pell, ASAP, and out of pocket if Tap/ASAP doesn't cover it which has happened twice.

It has affected me a lot. School is not the same, I have to teach myself all the material while having to teach my two younger nieces that I take care of everyday because their mother is a nurse. Some professors are being considerate and giving us less work. Other professors are just drowning us in assignments and deadlines. I already have to pay tuition out of pocket because TAP didn't kick in and ASAP can't help because without TAP and FAFSA helping first they can't do anything. I'm without a paying job, struggling to pay rent (I'm not for NYC), struggling to buy groceries, stressed at school work, and having to teach and take care of two girls ages 3 and 8 and having to somehow still pay for tuition this semester is frustrating.

After this pandemic and many people living paycheck to paycheck, I think it would be right to actually lower tuition or give back the money that was paid/going to be paid from us the students. Online learning is NOT the same as going to class, asking in person questions, and having the material be taught to you. It does not make sense to charge someone for services they are not receiving. \$320 may not seem a lot to upper class people, but to the majority of the New Yorkers/ non New Yorkers that live paycheck to paycheck and still pay for school to try and better their socioeconomic status through education it is a huge amount of money. In my situation that is half of my rent money that the Board of Trustees would be asking for.. and rent in NYC is not cheap. I would greatly appreciate it if you guys at least gave us either our money back, gave us a major tuition relief, and not increased tuition.

I lost my job. I have to take care of my elderly parents. I cannot see my wife because she is a nurse.

The BOT should not raise tuition as it will put a major financial strain on me.

My name is Cristina Stivala. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Since the whole online learning is very new to students and teachers everyone is disoriented. I'm finding it extremely difficult to do well in certain classes because of the distance.

We should be paying less since physical classes are cancelled. I'm struggling with school because I need to work and make money to provide for myself and my family during these difficult times.

My name is Yesenia Kim. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with DOE Voucher and out of pocket

It has caused stress over continuing my education and whether I should drop out due to the pandemic.

If they raise tuition, I will not only be unable to attend next year but I will be forced to stop pursuing my education degree due to lack of funds.

My name is Isabela Buitrago. I am a freshman at Baruch College. I pay for college with TAP and Pell.

I am now not able to attend school physically, yet of course I understand it's important to practice social distancing.

Well I am very lucky to receive FAFSA, and TAP but not everyone has that privilege. In addition my refund check goes towards monthly metro cards and books, if they increment the tuition, I'll have to start paying these out of pocket. For other kids, especially those whom are undocumented they pay for everything out of pocket, this would take a huge toll on their families, especially since these families are very rarely offered job security due to their immigration status. Overall this would be terrible, and professors have already expressed they don't get paid well, which is outrageous considering it's higher education. The CUNY system needs more funding but not from its students, or staff, it has to come from budgeting correctly.

My name is Annaliese Gayle. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college TAP, federal aid, and out of pocket.

I was already having issues with the financial aid office. Now I'm uncertain about the money I currently owe. I don't believe students should have to pay for this semester at all.

The Board of Trustees should not increase tuition at all, especially when it will not improve the quality of education/campus resources.

My name is Alexis Fisher. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell and out of pocket.

Because, our city is facing a global pandemic and our people are dying. This would be a shame on the Board of Trustees if they raised our tuition. How do they not see that we are suffering emotionally and physically? Several of my classmates have been diagnosed with the coronavirus. This tuition hike would mean I wouldn't be able to get some groceries for my family. We deserve a partial refund, not another charge!

My name is Jamell Henderson. I am an Alumni.

I worry as I have applied to the Ed.D program at the College of Staten Island and I don't know how this will impact my journey if I am chosen to be in the cohort; I worry about covering this financially as well as connecting with the cohort and experts who will be teaching us

Students are hurting, and literally dying and the BOT should have a heart and understanding that you cannot operate this great university on the backs of students.

My name is Yunis Wong. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with the help of TAP and Pell.

The pandemic caused the loss of part-time jobs and increased my financial burden. Also, I found a hard time to adjust to the remote classes in the beginning.

The increased tuition will increase my family financial burden, especially if we lose our job during the pandemic.

My name is Edna Lopez. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college by taking loans.

It has become very overwhelming. It has also been a mess throughout this entire experience, I'm not that happy with this virtual semester.

The tuition should not be raised because everything is already more expensive, so since the workforce is extremely slow at the moment, we have other bills to pay. I have to save for my tuition and it is even harder now that I have less work and bills to pay. We're forced to do office hours online making the impact of connecting with students tougher.

It's highly inappropriate for the university to consider raising tuition during a pandemic crisis.

My scholarship money is about to run out and I need to apply for student loans or, worse, pay out of pocket for my education. Now is not the time to hike tuition, as it would be detrimental to my progress as well as many others. Do the right thing.

My name is Lyne Bercy. I am a junior at CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

Since the pandemic I have been out of work and unable to fulfill my monthly payment plan

During this pandemic, it would be hard on the majority of students who are out of work to pay an increase of \$320.

My name is Melanie Seeman. I am a freshman at the City College of New York. I pay for college in multiple ways including Pell, TAP, Honors Scholarship, rest out of pocket.

My name is Anna Compton. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP, PELL, and loans.

I've lost both sources of income to this virus. Honestly I'm not even sure how to continue paying for housing in the fall without income. It scares me to think that tuition will go up despite the economic trouble a majority of all CUNY students are currently facing. The COVID crisis has impacted me as a student with an IEP. Online classes have been a major bump in my college career. I've always avoided taking online classes because of my learning disability. I'm worried about my GPA and how this will impact my financial aid, as more than 90 percent of my tuition is covered by TAP and PELL. Now, because summer classes are online I will not be taking classes as this has been an extremely difficult adjustment. Due to not taking summer classes I will be graduating a semester late and will not receive tap, as this is an additional semester for me.

CUNY students cannot afford a tuition hike. We have been laid off. I am not sure how we are supposed to come up with an additional 320 dollars when we are paying for resources currently that we are not even receiving. I've been a student at Hunter College since August and still have yet to find a therapist through the references the counselors on campus have given me. We don't have enough counselors on campus yet we are being asked to pay more money for wellness fees?

My name is Diana Pelaez. I am a freshman at Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college out of pocket.

This pandemic significantly affected my CUNY experience by making it much harder for me to even learn from the classes I'm currently taking. I was also planning on taking summer classes, but now I have to take my summer classes online. I was planning on taking courses that are more challenging for me, and now this pandemic caused me to become more hesitant on taking these challenging summer classes, since I was looking forward to being lectured by a professor in person. I was also looking forward to meeting new people in these courses, making connections that would've possibly benefit me in the future. This pandemic has also caused me as well as many other individuals I know who are also CUNY students to have more of a difficulty with focusing on our classes since we are all already occupied with keeping ourselves and our families/friends healthy. I know many people who unfortunately passed away due to this pandemic, and I have relatives and friends who are very ill.

I believe the Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition by \$320 because we are already experiencing economic difficulties as a nation, and we are already struggling with making money since a lot of people are unemployed due to this pandemic. We will unfortunately not be able to afford as many things as before this situation occurred. This increase could mean I wouldn't be able to attend. As a 19 year old going into their senior year, I am incredibly proud of my academic abilities, especially as a disabled student. However, tuition hikes like these make it incredibly difficult to attend college.

My name is Kerwin Simon. I am a student at CUNY School of Labor and Urban Studies. I pay for college out of pocket

Changed my in class experience to zoom classes. The entire syllabus had to be changed to accommodate online, which I am having difficulty with. My focus and attention toward the professor is a challenge. The in-class discussions are what we look forward to. This environment helps us prepare for the real world as we know it.

Raising tuition at this time is unacceptable. Many students are unsure of their job status after covid-19. Today and for some time to come, many of us will continue to struggle to pay rent, feed and care for our families. I agree that CUNY needs a raise but timing is everything, this is not the time. We are making the sacrifice to stay in school, added tuition raises will quarantine thousands from receiving education. Everyone is fearful during this pandemic creating added stress by raising tuition at this time will increase students panic and lose hope in CUNY. CUNY is known for providing hope and security, let's keep this hope alive for many. Please think about this, it will affect many.

My name is Ishrat Jahan. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and Pell

It cut short my first semester here and drastically impacted learning. I am not getting the same quality of teaching I would have if I had attended in person lectures. Furthermore, paying for

summer classes has been far more difficult as I am out of a job and am put in a strenuous financial position.

\$320 is a lot and I fear that this “minor” tuition hike will give incentive to further raise tuition. The majority of students at CUNY are low income students who chose CUNY due to its low tuition. To rob us of that is to rob the schools most valuable asset. Furthermore, students already have to pay for housing, transportation, educational materials, etc. Why add to the burden by raising tuition? What exactly are you bettering by taking more money from students?

My name is Margaret Stone. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket

It has been much harder to get the help I need from professors. I have also missed class time because of COVID-related technical difficulties (my internet is much slower than it was before the pandemic). It also takes much longer for me to obtain the resources I need for research. The numerous changes to the schedule that resulted from CUNY going on pause and changing spring break dates with very limited notice has rendered course syllabi inaccurate, making it harder to stay on top of schoolwork. There have also been times when technical difficulties caused class disruptions, and class had to start and stop multiple times.

So many students and their family members have lost their jobs and/or are facing financial strain. New York City is the world epicenter of the pandemic, and many students have been or will be infected and face the financial burden of the associated medical expenses. I lost my job because of the pandemic, as did one of my family members. This increase would place additional financial strain on my family.

Increasing tuition by \$320 because not everybody has the money for it. If financial aid is able to cover for it's ok for those that have financial aid, but not everybody gets financial aid. Me personally, I don't get financial aid for being undocumented so this would be more money for me to pay out of pocket.

Online classes are an adjustment. Future tuition payments are a scare.

I am an international student and based on current exchange rates this would be almost 7x as much for my family which is a difficult adjustment given the changes in economy during the pandemic.

My name is Lunisha Augustin. I am a sophomore attending Brooklyn College. I pay for my college out of pocket.

I am paying tuition to be only submitting one assignment after the other . It is harder to get the campus's resources I need. I am also not going to be attending graduation this year.

Without our current situation increasing tuition shouldn't be normal. Also, I won't be able to afford my degree if that happens . I will not be getting support to help with tuition.

My name is Mahmeema Mohiuddin. I am a freshman at York College. I receive TAP and Pell.

In my building we live with 22 people and already 7 of them have been infected. And one lady had died. Everyday we are passing through a very horrible situation...My mom is also sick. Fortunately it's not covid-19. But.... even we went out the last day after 32 days as we had no food left to eat. So, in these circumstances how can I concentrate in my study and these all. It's hard to do things like normal.

I have to pay my tuition by TAP and Pell. Also I have to help my parents to run households by the refunds. Since I have a speech disability, I can't get a good job. So, it would be very difficult for me if the board of trustees raise the tuition.

My name is Tiffany Whyte. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college out of pocket.

COVID19 has made me face a loss of job, failure in classes- unable to study, increase medical expenses.

CUNY should not raise tuition because I cannot afford to pay any increase. I lost my job and unable to pay rent so as soon as the pandemic is over I won't even have a home much less to pay the current costs. So an increase would only add more insurmountable challenges.

My name is Md Masudur Rahman. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college out of pocket.

COVID has impacted me. It became so tough financially. It affected my work and family life.

I am sure so many people have lost their job. Especially those who lay out of their pocket like me. So I believe CUNY shouldn't raise the tuition fees especially in this pandemic situation!

My name is Marilyn Antoncuri. I am a senior attending York College. I received a Pell which helps with my tuition.

The coronavirus impacted me greatly because it set me back an entire semester since my study abroad trip was canceled. Initially I was distraught and upset but I didn't take it to heart because I understood that nobody intentionally set this up. However, now the impact of the coronavirus has seeped into my internship (credit bearing). My internship site was shut down. 50% of my grade is based on my evaluations from my field supervisor. CUNY has not refunded even a tad bit of the tuition. The quality that I personally get from in person courses is not the same with online ones, even through blackboard ultra. It took several weeks for things to settle and now we're nearly the end. Yes, there is support and essential services still being offered but CUNY can do

more for its students. I am not a student who simply goes to school and has nothing else to worry about. I had an on campus job and CUNY said the federal work study students would still be paid. Unfortunately, I have not received any federal work study pay and I have reached out to my York College campus financial aid office via email. CUNY should make sure staff is pushing for these payments to happen. CUNY promises to do a lot but do not fully come through. Thankfully the actual professors are doing an amazing job to support the students but of course CUNY administration seems to care only for their administrators. I already work full time to pay for my tuition and due to the virus I had to stop working. I will most likely have to drop out the coming semester especially if there is an increase in tuition.

My name is Kevin MacColl. I am a faculty at York College.

It would be a financial burden on the majority of this student population if the BOT decides to increase tuition. Most students come from underserved and low income families.

My name is Hillary Deane. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Being at home has caused many distractions causing me not to focus as effectively as I would at school.

Personally I'm out of work, this is my first time paying tuition by myself. It's been stressful because I need to take summer courses to graduate Spring 2021. But this raise will hinder me from my goal cause I will need to work overtime and won't have time to focus on my studies.

My name is Tanuja Anirude-Deonarine. I am a student at York College and I pay for college out of pocket.

The workload hasn't been minimized due to this pandemic but even though 2 members of my household tested positive and had to be attended to at home. Most professors aren't able to teach online due to not being aware of the techniques.

Due to being quarantined I've had to stay home from work without pay. I usually do payment plans for my tuition and this increase would take a toll on me where I would have to borrow money in order to make these payments. I don't think this is the right time to raise the tuition when we're all suffering from a pandemic.

My name is Giassary Chinchilla. I am a freshman at Queensborough Community College. I pay for college with the help of FAFSA.

I started class online, I lose my job and I don't know how to pay my bills

I'm a single mom, I have to pay a lot of stuff. With this tuition increase, it will make my life more stressful than it already is.

My name is Bowlee Kortee. I am a sophomore at the College of Staten Island. I pay for college out of pocket.

I was out of work for a while and wasn't getting paid. My aunt is out of work right now and it's been hard balancing school work with online classes.

This will affect me badly. I provide for myself and I haven't even been able to pay for my spring 2020 tuition.

My name is Danilo Bonilla. I am a freshman at Queensborough Community College. I pay for college with help from ASAP and TAP.

Coronavirus has taken a big emotional and physical toll on me. All the members of my family that work have been let go and therefore I became the sole breadwinner. My job has not closed so far but we have had our hours cut drastically. All of these challenges and plus the basic survival needs have required me to take a second job overnight to make extra income all the while still doing my classes and assignments. Also, people need to eat and my jobs both deal with food and customer service so I'm also doing my little part to help others.

To be honest, I'm not sure how it would affect my Excelsior scholarship.

I am not working anymore due to COVID-19. Many of my friends who are CUNY students as well are relying on unemployment benefits to support themselves, now we need to pay extra for

school? Where is the money going ? The campus is closed, why are we paying extra when we are not getting what we are paying for this semester?

My name is Jacqueline Beckvermit. I am a sophomore at Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with Financial aid and loans

Yes, I'm a painting major and going online has been challenging. I miss my awesome teachers and the studio. But the professors are really making it better by being so attentive and understanding.

I will have to take out larger loans. As an art student, painting and drawing supplies do not come cheap. I really feel there must be another way for the board of trustees to raise the money other than charging their students who have chosen this school for the great education at a great price for the first two years.

My name is Cindy Lucero. I am a junior at New York City College of Technology. I pay for college out of pocket.

Just made my learning experience so hard. There are professors who still don't know how to handle technology and provide the correct resources.

As a current student , we should actually be getting a refund back because we never signed up to this whole virtual education. We aren't using their institutions anymore so why should we pay an additional \$320? This affects me because I pay out of pocket!

My name is Lourdes Santana. I am a junior at the College of Staten Island. I pay for college with Pell and loans.

I'm a special education student and not computer savvy so for this reason it's hard for me to keep up with my distance learning process.

It means that from now on, I won't be able to pay for my medications copayment and my grocery list is going to greatly reduced

My name is Britney Mak. I am a freshman at Queens College. I pay for college with Excelsior and out of parents' pockets.

For my ARTS class, I never got to use some of my supplies making me feel I wasted money on something that would have been used had the pandemic not happened. My name is Erica Gambino. I am a Junior at Queens College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Coronavirus pandemic has affected me mentally and financially. Switching from classroom learning to virtual took a while to adjust to. Financially I lost my part time job.

I think we as a country are going through a difficult time, especially economically. With most students without an income it would increase stress on the students and their families during this already stressful time.

My name is Mur Afra Humaira. I am a Freshman at the Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college out of pocket.

All 5 of my courses have become online, i can't print anything from school even though i paid money for it. I paid for student activities, and there's really nothing I'm getting from it. No clubs, nothing.

I pay out of pocket and due to the pandemic, there are less jobs available. It would be unjust to hike tuitions now because people are already having economic trouble and increasing tuition is an added burden.

My name is Osa Onaghinor. I am a sophomore at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Pell/Tap/Out Of Pocket.

First, I have not been able to finish my first year of college on an actual campus. All of my classes are lecture classes, and adjusting to online was and is still a little difficult. There are a lot of classes that don't work online. It defeats the purpose of the actual class. Not only is it hard to keep up with a whole bunch of emails from teachers, administration and the city but it can be overwhelming.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition because it is already very expensive. Alongside tuition we are paying for books, transportation, fees and food. College seems to be more of a privilege then a right. I pay for most of my tuition out of pocket because I don't get enough financial aid and an increase in tuition is just a set back. Most students now don't have a job because of the coronavirus pandemic, so how is CUNY still charging/expecting us to pay?

My name is Elodie Dorvile. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Pell and Tap.

While I am accommodating just fine to the remote learning; however, I learn better in the presence of the professors.

I would like to start by asking the most absurd and obvious question here, why should our tuition be raised? I simply can't comprehend it. The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise the tuition by any means. If anything, they should instead consider lowering the tuition due to the fact that so many CUNY students have been laid off from work (or their parents, whoever pays the tuition) as a result of this pandemic. This implies that the Trustees are telling the students not to come back the next semester because they can't pay the tuition. Personally, I receive assistance from Tap, if tuition is set to raise for the next semester I'll receive less money that won't fully cover my education cost.

My name is Naydeline Mejia. I am a Junior at Brooklyn College. I pay for college with Pell and Tap.

The coronavirus pandemic has halted my CUNY experience. The quality of my courses has greatly decreased as courses have moved to remote forms of learning for our health and safety. Professors are expecting the same type of engagement and academic excellence, with half the quality of an in-person course. Not to mention, the number of assignments has increased which has put even more pressure on students to perform well, while dealing with the mental and emotional impacts of working from home and living through a global pandemic.

I don't think the Board of Trustees should raise our tuition by \$320 because that money should be going towards students and their well-being during this time. A lot of students and their families are being laid-off, groceries are becoming more sparse and expensive each day, and not to mention the costs of therapy, a service which is sure to be exacerbated during the COVID-19 crisis. Personally, the increase scares me because as the economy crashes, there is the possibility of students losing state-funded financial aid and I am someone who relies on financial aid to fund my education; right now I am not in a position to pay for my CUNY tuition out-of-pocket.

My name is Mariana Proshak. I am a Junior at Brooklyn College. I pay for college out of pocket.

This is a good decision and I do support it. However not next year since it's been a huge financial stress for everyone and to keep everything running smoothly I would postpone it to the better times.

My name is Aseefa Farrouk. I am a senior at York College. I pay for college with financial aid.

It's harder to learn online without classroom experience. I'm worried for the safety of my family if we were having classes on campus. It's unfair that we are not getting a refund for things we can't have access to.

The increase will affect me as a student that gets financial aid in a negative way. It's unfair that we have to pay more next year but not get a refund for this year. They should at least give us a refund for the resources that are not being used currently.

My name is Cindy. I am a junior at the City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

My classes haven't been affected, I grew up with computers so it doesn't really matter to me if classes are online or not as long as the same material is provided. Learning wise, it hasn't changed.

You shouldn't raise our tuition because I personally am paying for my own college education out of my own pocket. Since the beginning of high school, I worked part-time to save money for my college education. And the money gained here isn't much either. Because of COVID-19, my current part-time job is closed until further notice. I do not qualify for unemployment or the stimulus check because of personal reasons I do not want to disclose. I live with my family who thankfully provides me with shelter and food but they do not help me with my college tuition. Now I have to focus on learning a different way of learning and worry about my family, friends, and everyone else going through the pandemic.

The board of Trustees shouldn't raise the tuition by \$320 because of everything that's going on. More than ever parents are not working and those who pay out of pocket going to have a hard time paying for their classes and might even drop out of school. Education is the number one thing that everyone should be giving the opportunity to afford. To be able to educate themselves and make their dreams a reality.

My name is Djene Isaac. I am a sophomore at Medgar Evers College. I pay for college with Tap, pell, and asap.

The coronavirus has affected my CUNY experience in a lot of ways. I wanted to interact with my fellow students in the classroom and not online. Having all online classes is extremely hard and stressful, having to navigate the internet constantly and making sure you are not missing an assignment. Staying home all day can be a struggle when you have to complete a lot of assignments.

The coronavirus has affected a lot of families. Some people have lost their family members, and some have lost their jobs. Taking advantage of the situation is extremely inhuman.

My name is Jenny Qu. I am a senior at Queensborough Community College. I pay for college with Tap, Pell and ASAP.

The Coronavirus hasn't really impacted me as I have access to a computer and I can still take my classes online. Some my professors using zoom or blackboard collaborate ultra to teach their class.

The board of trustees should not raise tuition because even though I attend CUNY tuition free, I know some students pay tuition out of pocket. Tuition may be a big financial barrier, especially if

they are from a low income family and/or they do not have a job to help to cover the cost. Even if a student is getting financial aid, it may not be covering the entire cost and there are other expenses besides tuition, like textbooks and transportation. In terms of learning the subjects; it is a bit harder without meeting tutors face to face.

Prices at some local supermarkets are up. Price gouging is everywhere and it is a strain on those who were already financially challenged. Money right now should be spent on: medical masks, essential grocery items and the needy.

My name is Kleo Bollguri. I am a freshman at the Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college out of pocket.

The lessons are all online. And they have changed most of the classes for fall2020 into fully online too. The quality of these classes is terrible and I barely learn something from the professor. It's all on me.

First of all I am paying twice as much as residents because I am an international student. Now just like residents here are suffering from COVID-19, so are we. So is the rest of the world. My family is not working either because of the pandemic. And they are my only source of income. It's absurd that they wanna increase the tuition. This would only make my situation worse and make it a lot harder to be able to pay. Not only shouldn't they increase it but they should try and find ways to help us overcome this pandemic by maybe decreasing it because the quality of the lectures is a lot worse than it was in person. How can we pay more and get less from the school. It's unjust!

My name is Roussena Jean Pierre. I am a sophomore at Medgar Evers College. I pay for college with a pell grant.

The pandemic has affected my CUNY experience mentally. I did not get the opportunity to fix my GPA the way I wanted to this semester. I really hope I get to go back on campus next semester.

The board of trustees should not raise the tuition by \$320 because there are a lot of people who might have plans to go back to school to follow their dream and save just enough to pay their tuition raising the tuition up to \$320 might affect these people. Raising the tuition will affect me personally because the pell that I am getting might not be enough to pay for all my class which

going to make me work more hours which can affect my grades.

It's hard on my undocumented friends as well since they cannot even apply for benefits such as unemployment benefits but are fired or laid off.

My name is Mary Cuevas. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Excelsior.

My parents are currently not working, and I have to pay part of my tuition out of pocket. Not only that but we have rent to pay for and also food expenses.

The \$320 increase will create a big change on top of what I have to pay towards my education. These \$320 could be used towards my family's weekly expenses like groceries or rent.

My name is Malaika Casimir. I am a senior at York College. I pay for college with Pell, TAP, & out of pocket.

One of my parents contracted the virus while working at the hospital and has been out of work for a while because of it. Due to the fact we are a household of 5 people and there is only one person working currently, we are struggling to pay for food and groceries.

It is difficult to save money for the next semester to take care of all our needs especially considering the difficulties people are facing currently because of the conditions COVID-19 has required us to set for our own safety. The tuition hike already would have been difficult before this pandemic.

My name is Adeola Lawal. I am a senior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

Not really. Although in person classes are lacking there are adequate resources to make lectures the same as from home.

I think they should raise it. Tuition hikes are a thing across the world and most students receive aid to cover tuition. Those who pay out of pocket can Afford the 320 hike.

My name is Saba Nasim. I am a senior at Brooklyn College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Scraping every dollar trying to pay tuition for summer and fall approx \$7k. Last year of college really affected my mental health.

My Family can't even afford to pay for food and rent. Three family members lost their jobs during covid-19. Am using everything I earned from my internship to help pay for rent & food. And still have 7k tuition left to pay.

My name is Mariia Sarlayan. I am a freshman at The Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college out of pocket.

First of all, the quality of teaching has changed drastically when the classes were moved to an online platform. Most of my professors do not give lectures anymore, they only provide the material to study on my own and extra assignments. I feel like if I wanted to study on my own I could do it without the school but why I choose to go to school is to get the experience and the knowledge of people I respect which are the Professors. However, I feel the lack of this sharing with the start of pandemic.

In addition to that, I am not able to use school resources like the library, computer labs, or study space. I cannot work with my peers the same way we did in in-person classes. We are not encouraged to have interesting discussions and do the best in class.

I was lucky to have a normal semester in Fall 2019 that's why I am very understanding of the situation and CUNY's decisions at the moment, patiently waiting for the next semester and being excited for in-person classes and communication. That's why I am still paying out of pocket as an international student, even though I do not think online classes are worth the same money and it is very challenging for me.

But now I learn that CUNY is considering increasing tuition. Plus, some of the classes I have already registered for fall are switching to online learning as well because of the pandemic. And I can imagine all the classes will have the same fate eventually. It makes me really upset that I will still have to pay out of pocket, even higher price for the worse quality of education than I applied for when I came to BMCC. I love my school but the school should also love its students, especially international students, who contribute to school's achievements and success. It is unfair that we have to pay the full price for online classes, we have to pay 3 times more than american students and we have to pay even more money with the increased rate.

As an international student I pay out of pocket. The price for me is about three times higher than for a student who is a resident of the United States. There is no financial aid or loans available for me from the government. To keep my F-1 international student status I have to maintain a minimum of 12 credits per semester which is a lot of money. I do not have a family living here like most of the american students and BMCC doesn't provide housing, I have to pay for my accommodation. Being a full-time student, I have to work to find money to pay for my school, my accommodation and other necessities. I have to find time for work when my main occupation is already a full-time student. There are very few jobs on campus, I tried getting a job for two semesters, I couldn't. So, I have to find some other means of earning money where the rates are so little that even working 4 days a week is barely enough to cover the necessary expenses. I am not even talking about savings or cases of emergency, medical bills. Plus, I also have to study outside of school and work, do well in classes, turn in assignments on time (I want to maintain a 4.0 GPA). And on top of that, international students have harder time to transfer later, so I need to participate in all the extra-curriculum activities to be considered on the same level as other students for the future transfer and to receive potential scholarships in a senior college. With the COVID-19 I am not able to work and get any financial support and I still pay full price out of pocket because CUNY didn't consider changing anything for international students. How is it possible for me to pay even more in this case?

I don't understand how the school can be so proud of their successful students with high GPAs, who will later transfer to prestigious schools (NYU and Columbia are on my list) and at the same time try to do everything possible during hard times to get rid of these students, to not even help with tuition but raise it even more! I believe in CUNY's sense of community and I always felt like I was a part of it but right now CUNY is proving the opposite with thousands of international students left not knowing what to do

My name is Julie Medina. I am a sophomore at LaGuardia Community College. I pay for college with TAP, Pell, and ASAP.

Lack of concentration and there's more stress and more work to do now rather than in person.

I am supposed to be transferring to a 4 year after December and I'm considering going to a school like Fordham university or Hofstra but their tuition is too high and my financial aid doesn't even make half of It doing this would bring more stress.

My name is Geraldine Guese. I am a senior at York College. I pay for college with TAP, Pell and out of pocket.

I was supposed to start working again for my seasonal job but because of the coronavirus, I can't work to earn money to pay for school and other expenses.

Many students who also work during school time stopped working.

My name is Maheen Rahman. I am a senior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

It's been overwhelming with sick families that can't work and people passing away. The quality of the education we're now getting has dropped so low, it almost feels worthless. It might jeopardize my chance of even continuing school.

My name is Sinthia Reya. I am a senior at Lehman College. I pay for college with Tap.

I need to order some books. But it's not possible due to lack of money.

It will be a tough situation for students. We all have less money and mentally support.

My name is Korbae. I am a student at The Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with Financial aid and pell.

My family is affected by this pandemic due to lack of housing, being homeless and loss of jobs because of the economic crisis.

I am currently an attending student and I feel like it's unfair for those who can't afford to pay for school due to the economic crisis and loss of jobs during this pandemic.

My name is Tami Gold. I am a 33 year faculty member at Hunter College.

As a professor I can say that after 3 weeks of virtual teaching -- it is not the same as teaching in the classroom! The increase in tuition has many students even more depressed. This impacts their ability to learn, which has a direct impact on me and my profession.

This is not the first tuition increase. Each one hurts our students. And now it is devastating. Many of our students have precarious living situations. Others have parents who are essential workers - MTA workers, nurses, food service, etc. Students are frightened. They speak openly to faculty and staff. They can not take on an additional tuition hike. Free CUNY Now. If not now when?

My name is Maria Garvutenko. I am an alumni from The City College of New York.

It is unfair for CUNY to increase the cost of education on top of an inevitable decrease in the quality of this education. Everyone is in the same boat with the health crisis: losing jobs, health, loved ones. CUNY has no right to take it out on the students. Even airlines are refunding unused tickets despite prior years of ripping off customers: it is very sad that CUNY has finally hit rock bottom and could learn something from Spirit Airlines.

My name is progga choudhuri. I am a junior at the City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

I don't have access to a nearby library. Everyone is staying home due to the pandemic so it is hard to find a quiet place to study during the day.

Especially with the remote classes, I am not getting a high quality of education. I don't understand why CUNY continues to raise their tuition. If anything I should be getting a refund this semester because I haven't been able to print out papers, go to the gym or study at a library for exams. The libraries are usually overcrowded and I have to look for an empty classroom to study in. It is unfair to the students of CUNY paying out of pocket or getting limited financial

aid. Please reconsider for our sake.

My name is Agnes Fury Cameron. I am a faculty member at Hunter College.

Many of my students have been directly affected by the pandemic, both through their health, and their finances. As a faculty member, I have been transitioning my class to online learning, but, with students and students' families losing jobs because of the pandemic, it's been really hard to continue as normal. The virus has both highlighted and exacerbated existing financial barriers, with many students finding themselves in really dire straits.

Many students at Hunter are already unable to imagine how they might pay for next years' tuition because of this crisis: it's a really hard decision at the best of times, and this increase may push a number of them out of college altogether.

My name is Jacqueline. I am a freshman at Guttman Community College. I pay for college with Fafsa ,tap and pell.

Ever since CUNY transitioned to online learning it has been a bit hectic in the beginning because I am not used to doing online classes. At times it is hard for me to hand in work because I wouldn't understand it's better for me to learn it in person.

I believe that the board of trustees shouldn't raise tuition at all because some people who are not able to fill out financial aid applications cannot pay for college at all and have to take out loans. I also believe that it shouldn't be raised because Fafsa or tap probably might not give me enough to pay off for everything and I would have to do it myself. Which is hard for me because I am still looking for a job.

My name is Taylor Bellman. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Tap and out of pocket.

Well COVID-19 has affected my cuny experience by cutting my school Face to face and athletics short.

Well as college students we have a lot to pay for like food, bills, books, and school so raising the tuition will only stress people out and cause a lower numbers of admission because we can't

afford it.

My name is Ian Hansen. I am a Faculty member at York College.

I teach at York College. At a time when some faculty and staff are known to have died from COVID-19, and so many people have lost employment, it is wrong to tax working class CUNY students with a tuition hike rather than increasing the tax burden on the inordinate number of billionaires who live in NY state. It is time for them to pay their fair share. CUNY tuition should be completely free anyway, but now especially. A tuition hike during this time is morally perverse.

My name is Sanjidha Khan. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with 1 Pell Aid and out of pocket.

Classes have been remote, which does prevent me from learning to my full extent as I am better with in person lectures. I don't have a stable environment at home to study, so I haven't been able to give my full effort in my classes. And I've also been struggling with constant worry about my grandparents who live in my household and are Covid-19 positive. I have to take extra precautions, making sure my parents are safe while also making sure my grandparents make a full recovery. So I've had a lot more responsibilities around my house while also having to balance 5 classes at the same time. The endless stress has taken a toll on me mentally and physically.

Personally I think it's absurd for CUNY to increase our tuition considering that almost everyone is unemployed. The quality of our education that we are currently receiving due to the pandemic is already below what I paid for. As a student who barely gets financial aid and pays out of pocket, I feel like the Board of Trustees is targeting us at a vulnerable time instead of being practical with what they're offering and what their students and faculty are facing. Realistically, we will have to continue practicing social distancing, and it seems like fall of 2020- classes will still remain remote. I am not going to pay more for mediocre education, if anything tuition should be lowered, especially when we are facing a crisis during times like this.

My name is Joseph Connolly. I am a faculty member at The City College of New York.

This is especially inconsiderate timing to ask for a raise in tuition in the CUNY system. This pandemic has placed many students of the entire cuny system out of work. Many classes are hard to pass so I do not like the idea of me having to pay a lot of money to take it over for a decent grade. Most of the money I get from seek to buy books and supplies will all go towards my tuition and pay out of pocket for those materials. I do not work because I am a full time student from a low income home and I am a student who wants to graduate in 4 even with my mental health problems of Depression and Bipolar disorder.

My name is Keyla Cabrera. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Tap, and out of pocket.

With the shut down of many campuses I can no longer see my advisors, professors, classmates, teammates because we are being asked to stay at home to stop the spread.

Many people are being laid off from their jobs. We are unsure if we will be returning back to our campus. Meaning there's a possibility we will still be doing online learning. And what's the point of an extra \$320 raise in something the students won't be benefiting from.

My name is Jeremy Sapeg. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college with SEEK.

I have a minor form of ADHD, so I'm someone who tends to lose focus a lot, so I of course take lecture classes instead of online, so I can stay more focused. Since this pandemic occurred we had to move to online classes completely. It hinders with my ability to not go & do something else.

It wouldn't be fair. This national emergency has affected many of us students financially & to raise our tuition would make even more difficult for us to complete our degree plans. Even harder if we're students who pay out of pocket for tuition.

My name is Ezequiel Aviles. I am a sophomore at Queens College. I pay for college out of pocket.

My father has been affected with COVID-19. He's the person who works and pays the bill. It's getting hard with him not working.

I get no help to pay for tuition or books. Increasing the tuition is going to make it hard for me to pay for class, which means I will need to take less classes to afford it. Which means I would need to stay in school longer.

My name is Ruth Wangerin. I am a faculty member at Lehman College.

First, I had to redo my syllabus and create recorded lectures and new online work for students, all for no extra pay. Second, I am struggling mightily to keep students on track with their educational plans but have "lost" a number of students from my classes due to the difficulties they're going through during the pandemic. Third, I am suffering the pain of sickness and death all around me and especially all around the students.

First, I believe public education should be free and paid for out of our taxes, especially for our population of students, many of whom can't afford even the relatively reasonable cost of CUNY. But on a practical note, it's obvious that we will lose students because they simply can't pay. Some of them have told me already that they're having trouble making payments this term, much less any hope of re-enrolling for the fall. If we are worried about enrollment and sustaining the

rich diversity of our educational programs -- and faculty -- we ought to cut rather than raise tuition.

My name is Jamaar Watson. I am a student and a staff member at York College. I pay for college with Loans/Tap/Pell/Out of Pocket.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition, because many CUNY students can't afford it as we have financial issues in our lives especially with our families. This increase will not only affect me, but also thousands of others in different ways. The increase during this time is irrelevant because many of us have lost our jobs, can't go out and we have to look out for our health. What's more important? Our health or money?

My name is Andrew Levy. I am a faculty member at The Borough of Manhattan Community College.

I'm spending countless hours online comforting and reassuring students, which I don't mind, but it has completely changed how the semester typically works. Many students, as well as faculty and staff are suffering. Lots of unemployment, illness, anxiety.

In the midst of an unresolved pandemic that has and will continue to enact harsh economic and health consequences for CUNY students, many of whom are now unemployed, whose parents have lost "essential" jobs, to ask of these families an additional \$320 is to be living inside an illusion, to willingly ignore the disparity in our city, and beyond. The raise in tuition would be a most despicable act, causing untold harm to many people. A BOT that would support such a decision at this moment should be permanently disbanded.

My name is Anthony. I am a student at York College. I pay for college with Pell and out of Pocket.

One of my professors was changed. It's not what I paid for, very unfair.

No one is able to work if you're a student. So how would you be able to pay more?

My name is Jaquan Eleazard. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college with Tap.

The workload has become really hard to complete because they are online and I'm a visual learner.

I currently pay some money out of pocket and the increase hasn't been seen in the build since i started going to York College.

My name is Katherine. I am a senior at Queens College. I pay for college with Financial Aid and Loans.

It has affected my experience by making me feel like classes have been cancelled with all these breaks !! It's hard for me to learn online, which is why I have never taken an online class before in my life !!

I myself do not have enough money to pay for school. My siblings are no longer in college Because both have graduated and one has dropped out. Now its a 50/50 chance that financial aid will not longer cover me because im the only one going to school and apparently my parents

make to much money. Which Is UNFAIR because all the money they make goes to the rent, food and hospital bills!!

My name is Jessica. I am a junior at York College. I pay for college with Tap, and Pell grants.

We're broke, laid off.....

The Board of Trustees has raised our tuition just last semester, there is no reason why you would need to raise it again if we didn't even physically attend school this semester. Its outrageous. You're supposed to make college affordable for students isn't that the reason of CUNY? we're students, we're not a millionaire like trump, or someone well off with a set career. How are we supposed to pay tuition if you keep raising it every semester?

My name is Jamal Chesney. I am a senior at York College. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

I can't work to earn some money to cover a part of tuition. I also can't do research to get stipends to help cover tuition. I don't have any other help other than me being able to cover most of my tuition bill on a semester-ly basis.

Not only is tuition already mind-blowingly expensive already per semester to cover, but it drains my finances from other aspects of my life. Tuition accounts for more than 85% of my financial expenses and increasing the amount would just result in me considering dropping out of college. I just want to be able to have a career in Physics that would require a substantial amount of tertiary education as a Wall. It's unreasonable to have that tertiary education even behind a even higher Pay Wall, just to be even Considered in the industry. How else am I supposed to put myself in a position to succeed if a tuition hike just makes it more out of reach?

My name is Devine Chisholm. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Fafsa, Pell, and Out of pocket.

Can't go to school. Can't workout for my next season, and can't pay my tuition.

That Just does not make sense at the moment especially for what's going on in the world right now. With a lot of people being out of work and not able to pay tuition already as it is, it will just make it more difficult for students to pay.

My name is Man Wan. I am a sophomore at CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college out of pocket.

As a registered nurse I have been required to work more hours than usual. More time is required for home maintenance, such as multiple food shopping trips due to purchase restrictions, empty shelves, and longer wait time in stores to promote social distancing. More laundry is performed to ensure my work clothes are free from contamination. Additional time is also required to procure PPE that my employer cannot provide. Furthermore, as citizens, we are obligated to check and help our elderly and less fortunate neighbors with these chores as well, so they can also remain safe during this period.

A tuition hike during a COVID-19 crisis is unjust because many people have either lost their jobs or furloughed. Although I am an essential worker and fortunate to continue working, other family members of mine are currently laid off or lost their jobs, and currently need my financial assistance.

My name is James Romberger. I am a faculty member at Hunter College.

I must teach my class online via Zoom, Blackboard and email--- which I am able to do easier than most, I think, because of the nature of my non-testing, primarily art-related class. But still, my students are missing the interactions that happen in person, where they learn so much from each other--that I think are very important.

I graduated from Columbia and CUNY Graduate Center and I teach at Hunter. I believe that online classes which are what will be the norm for the foreseeable future (and which are more difficult and time-consuming for professors, who are clearly not being paid adequately for the extra work involved); are less worth the tuition as it is or was because the students are not getting a major .benefit of the college experience: the social interaction, the forging of lifetime

friendships, the personal contact with brilliant professors and fellow students. A tuition hike at this time is thus unconscionable and absurd. In fact, some classes need to be refigured entirely because they do not work in online form in any way approximate to how they should to get the proper result: education.

My name is Monique James. I am a student at York College. I pay for college out of pocket.

The whole "experience" is gone and it's harder to access people and various resources.

First of all, we should definitely be refunded for lab & equipment fees since there are no labs. Second, we may have to take classes from home still, so most students will be using their own equipment, not Cuny's. Last, a lot of people lost jobs and job opportunities, so where are we getting extra tuition money from?

My name is Sachin. I am a sophomore at Queensborough Community College. I pay for college out of pocket.

It's hard because keeping track of all assignments and when things are due . Also you can't get the best information online. And when you don't understand things it gets annoying.

It will be harder to pay for class. And for those like me who pay out of pocket that digs into our savings more.

My name is Onica Alexander. I am a senior at Queensborough Community College. I pay for college with FASFA.

This has affected me because class being online has decreased the learning material for the year.

This will affect how I have to pay for my semester and also not being at work because of covid-19.

My name is Hasibul Hasan. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Excelsior and out of pocket.

Professors have been very helpful for the most part. I don't know if I can afford tuition for next semester.

We are going through a crisis where many people are afraid to work and as a result are not able to afford daily essentials. Hiking tuition now can mean people will have to choose between taking a semester off versus getting groceries or paying rent.

My name is Joshua Velez. I am a sophomore at The City College of New York. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

The pandemic itself has already been stressful on my family and I. Attending classes has become somewhat a burden because professors have complied so many assignments and exams that were not originally that much. School has become twice as hard being online. Also, my family is concerned about tuition payments and how this semester has impacted it. They are asking me why we should have to pay an "x" amount of money if everything is online and the standards aren't that same, especially since the student-professor interaction isn't as prominent as before.

I don't believe in paying extra money if I'm not seeing where my money is going, specifically if it's not impacting my education directly. My family is already living check to check and we are on a budget. We've sacrificed many things just to make a payment on time for these past two semesters. Simply increasing tuition would be a real struggle for my family and I. School is the most important thing to me but adding tuition costs only stresses my financial situation.

My name is Lilianapalen. I am a sophomore at York College. I pay for college with Tap and Pell.

My family are all out of work because some of our job places are closed and my brother and grandfather used to work in a grocery store, but my brother got sick. We live five people in a three-bedroom house and one bathroom so you can imagine it is not easy, it's really

hard to concentrate to do school work. For my part, I am trying to keep up with my class so I might give my family a better quality of life in the future.

I believe they should not increase tuition no even a cent because all people are facing a very difficult time. Millions of people are out of work and are using their savings to survive. CUNY should support students instead of wanting to make them quit.

My name is Marie Medjine Antoine. I am a sophomore at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Loans.

It has made school difficult. A couple of my teachers have been understanding but some of my classes need outside materials, I don't have the resources to make completing assignments hard.

I mainly pay for school by using loans. Increasing tuition would make my future harder, as well as school year.

My name is Erik Freas. I am a faculty member of The Borough of Manhattan Community College.

I'm not a student, but the coronavirus took my father's life three days ago, so I can relate on some level to what some of students are going through, and indeed, a few have reached out to me, either with stories of lost loved ones (in one case, three family members), ill family members whom they are caring for, and certainly stories of either lost employment, or working double-time to make up for income lost when other family members lost their jobs.

Clearly a lot of our students are not only suffering health-wise, but their finances are taking a major hit. Consider also that health issues will likely mean increased healthcare costs.

My name is Jenifer. I am a senior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Tap, Pell and Loans.

I have no space to study at home, and I can't concentrate.

The quality of education has already decreased due to pandemic. Why raise tuition?

My name is Kosta Rizo. I am a student at The City College of New York. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

My work ethic, which includes studying, has been devastated due to being home all the time. I am unable to interact with my peers, except through social media. And finally, I'm unable to communicate with some of my professors, even through email.

CUNY should not raise tuition because the value of the tuition would outweigh the value of the CUNY experience.

My name is Evelyn Capellan. I am a senior at CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college with PELL, Scholarship, and out of pocket.

It is difficult to focus when completing assignments. More responsibilities at homes since my children are attending their classes at home and we live in a small apartment. I now have less time to allocate for my classes because I have to make sure my kids are attending their own classes, I have to go to work for more hours now since some of my peers at work are sick.

With the current events, people are losing their jobs or at least part of their paycheck. People are now purchasing more items for the households and those items are ridiculously expensive but necessary, like face masks, hand sanitizers, disinfectant, medicine, etc. Kids staying at home need more food at home. These are some of the difficulties we are facing. If the Board of Trustees raises our tuition, it takes away the possibility of complete our degree on time because students will not be able to enroll in classes and pay the tuition.

It will be my last year, but I am already struggling to afford tuition. Im an international student, so I can only assume my individual credits will go up significantly. There have been many hikes since I came into school and I don't see much difference on campus. I think there should be a better allocation of funds within CUNY.

My name is Burnsley Lafleur. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

My household income has significantly decreased. Many of my financial supporters have been heavily affected by the Corvid19 pandemic. As for myself, I would have to take a break, possibly permanent, from CUNY due to financial issues.

An increase in tuition cost is unwarranted, especially during this pandemic. If this goes through, college will be even less affordable for me. Therefore I would need to take a break from CUNY or transfer in order to search for better opportunities.

My name is Royal S. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Pell, Tap, Tuition Waiver.

Simply, increasing tuition at this time is unjust because there is a prevalent, widespread, and evident lack of personal cash flow for individuals and households throughout the United States.

My name is Denisse Marone. I am a student at the CUNY School of Professional Studies. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

I lost a business that supported me which was a small restaurant and a barbershop.

I believe that this year has brought hardship to all in one way or another and it would be great if this year we did not get a raise in our tuition. In my case until this period is over and we can go back to work or look for a job it will be really hard to make ends meet.

My name is Frances Alswang. I am a faculty member at Hunter College.

As a faculty member at Hunter College, the majority of my students and advisors are now unemployed and their parents have been laid off due to the pandemic. They are struggling financially, many families are food insecure, some family members are sick with Covid19, and a raise in tuition would guarantee that many students would NOT be able to continue their college education and would have to drop out. It would be immoral, unethical, and inequitable during a public health and economic crisis of this magnitude to ask students to pay more in tuition.

My name is Jamescy Exime. I am a junior at The City College of New York.

It has made it difficult to learn, because so many of the things we were suppose to be learning will be cut off because we have missed so many class days in the midst of this pandemic.

The tuition shouldn't be raised because there are a lot of students who pay for tuition and because of the pandemic most of them were in able to work.

My name is Tali. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

Learning virtually has put many obstacles in actually learning.

Tuition should not be raised because we are not getting the fullest learning experience online. As an art student I can say that I no longer have access to the studios or materials I typically use for classes. Also there is no way to do work study and part of college is campus which we no longer are attending to. All in all this may affect my graduation date which will make me spend more on classes.

My name is Blanca Vazquez. I am a retired faculty member from Hunter College.

A tuition hike and "wellness" fee when students are hurting, have lost jobs at CUNY and in the public and private sector, is counter-intuitive (we do not want to see enrollment go down), and just plain cruel.

My name is John Pantazi. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell, TAP, Excelsior.

I can't work anymore, and am still currently waiting on unemployment which is stressful on its own. Studying at home is not ideal, due to the fact that many students simply don't have a quiet space to focus on their studies. Many students are doing worse in their classes because of this, and some professors are making matters worse by assigning more work, thinking "since they're home they have more time to study." This is NOT the case. Friends and family are dying, and attention/focus can't be directed towards schoolwork.

First I just want to say that the Board of Trustees is being very inconsiderate of the current situation at hand. Unemployment is currently at 22 million Americans, equating to 20%. During the Great Depression, the percentage of people unemployed was 24.2%. Families are struggling to pay for rent, there is a shortage of food, and there is too much stress in the world right now. The virus has CRIPPLED the economy, and raising tuition at a time like this is unjust. Doing this would make you no different than a thief taking money from a struggling family.

My name is Gabriela Flores Dominguez. I am a junior at Baruch College. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

CUNY no longer being open meant that many of my classes changed as the way my teacher teaches. Before COVID-19 students have been scraping as much money as they can to pay for tuition. The current situation has left people unemployed and on the verge of homelessness. Now, it is even harder to pay for tuition. CUNY also prides itself on manifesting an affordable, high-quality education. If tuition is increased during such a tumultuous period, it doesn't maintain its affordability.

My name is Ricardo Miranda. I am a faculty member at Hunter College.

I've moved my classes online.

Public education should be freely available. We pay taxes in order to build a stronger community. It should be our taxes that pay for CUNY so that impoverished families can afford higher education. The privatization of public education must stop.

My name is Say Sanchez. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college Out of Pocket.

Classes have moved online and have become more difficult to manage, especially with exams (I live with 5 other people). My father, who pays for my tuition out of pocket, lost his job a few weeks ago, which makes tuition payments extremely difficult (I have about 2 left).

\$320 is far too much for families who have been affected by lost wages — it is extremely unnecessary during this time, and will make access to an education more difficult for thousands of students. CUNY should be doing everything in its power to make classes accessible for its students during this time of need — to hike the tuition now of all times shows the CUNY systems' money-hungry intentions and how little it cares for its students. Tuition hikes should ESPECIALLY not occur if classes end up moving online for Fall 2020.

I have short supply of food and not secured places

I think I will have to work more if I had to.

I understand we're in a financial crisis right now but the money just has to come from somewhere else. People just cannot afford it on top of everything else they are paying for.

I will miss being able to graduate due to this pandemic.

I don't think raising tuition is fair to students that have to pay out of pocket. From experience it's hard to have to pay tuition while paying the bills needed to be paid for survival.

My name is Jessica Arroyo and I'm a Junior at Hunter College. I pay out of pocket for tuition.

I'm currently out of a job and have already been struggling to finish school since I have been paying for school on my own all along. I don't have access to school resources such as the library which I would use in order to limit how much I spend on books. It has also taken away from enjoying the interactive aspect of the classroom.

Raising tuition will make it more difficult to pay for school. Because we're not allowed on campus, we'd be paying more for less access to the resources we need to succeed. Also, it'd be a nice cause if it were going to our hard working and dedicated adjunct faculty but it is not.

Because of this pandemic I've had to move out of my dorm and switch to online classes. I worry my senior year will not happen. This has caused great anxiety and I've switched to teletherapy.

The reason I'm going to a cuny is because it's affordable. I'm lucky enough to have a scholarship but whenever student fees are jacked up that's coming out of my pocket. Each time it increases I'm forced into a worse position.

My name is Janiah Taylor, I'm a freshman at Hunter College, and need to take out loans for my tuition.

Since this pandemic many of my professors are older and have a hard time adjusting all of the content to an online learning experience. The workload has intensified and it can be very stressful.

Since I do not qualify for financial aid, i can only take out loans that are accumulating interest as I type. CUNY is supposed to be an affordable option for a quality college education and raising the tuition will make it harder for students like me to be able to graduate debt free.

My name is Dina Vukel, I'm a senior at Hunter college, and my tuition is covered through Pell and scholarships

Since remote learning has begun, I am no longer able to use many resources provided by Hunter. I am no longer able to print materials as I was before the pandemic. I am also no longer able to use the library to study.

Raising tuition will not affect me personally but I can see how it will negatively affect others. Many students and parents are unemployed at this time and struggling to pay for rent and necessities. Increasing the cost of tuition will only make this time more unnecessarily stressful.

I am in a science course that requires a lab. Because of the virus, I am missing out on valuable lab experience.

It is already a stretch for me to afford tuition at the present moment and, with me not even being able to have full access to facilities needed for my course, it is entirely unfair for me to have to pay more in tuition. I have also lost my job due to the pandemic and money is already tight so a raised tuition would simply result in me no longer being able to attend school at all anymore.

My name is Loveth Edema, I'm a junior at Hunter College, and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

The sudden switch to distant learning was hard to adjust too! It was a necessary switch but it is still difficult as someone who is a more hands on learner. My name is Amanda Ramkishun, I'm a first year grad student at the CUNY school of Professional Studies, and all my tuition costs are out of pocket!

COVID-19 has greatly impacted my financial situation. I have to pay for tuition, utilities bills have gone up since being at home, buying more in food, and working less hours. I am a student living in Canada and thus am ineligible to apply for CUNY scholarships or the CUNY COVID-19 Emergency grant. This makes it incredibly difficult to support myself financially. Because I am not living in New York, I am also unable to receive counselling services through CUNY SPS and thus am finding it even harder to take care of my mental health. I am going through a really difficult time, and feel all alone that CUNY is not doing enough to help me in regards to my well being. More importantly, because I live in Canada, I am paying substantially more due to the currency exchange rate from CAD to USD. One class costs me \$1500 which is just too much! The \$320 increases in tuition and fees for the next academic year would make this even worse especially at a time where the world is in crisis and I am barely able to afford the current student fees.

Please do not raise our tuition by \$320. If you increase the fees, I would be in a tremendous amount of financial stress. That extra \$320 could be going to buy basic supplies that I need to survive. \$320 could be used to supply me with a month's worth of groceries so that I can put food on the table for my family so we don't go hungry. \$320 could be money that I used to donate to my local food bank for others to not go hungry. \$320 is taking 40% of my biweekly pay cheque that could be spent on a down payment for tuition. \$320 is just too much money that unfortunately I do not have at the moment and can not afford to lose so unjustly.

My name is Isola, I'm a freshmen at CSI, and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

\$320 more is a very big jump for everybody, especially for some of us that everything is out of pocket. For me personally as an international student who is not even allowed to work would be very hard to pay such a big tuition. Coronavirus like most of all families right now economically hit my family too. So, please don't raise it. Thank you!

My name is Maria Garcia, I'm a 1st years at BMCC, and I use both TAP and out of pocket costs for tuition.

I'm limited because I didn't have a computer when online learning was implemented. I had to buy one on payment and get it shipped to my home. Which delayed my ability to access my assignments and lectures.

Raising tuition would probably make me have to get a second job ; and require me to take fewer classes a semester. Making my degree harder to achieve in 2years.

My name is Miriam Jovanovic, this is my first semester at CUNY Graduate School of Public Health, and 100% of my tuition is paid for out of pocket.

School was already online. Now further diminished to online with barely present professors, professors who are not paid enough to care.

This is putting me further in debt. The tuition money goes to higher level administration, not even towards professor salary raises. The professors and students get the short end of the stick. CUNY standards are falling rapidly, professors are not paid enough to care. CUNY has become a joke. It's not affordable anymore.

My name is Priscilla, I'm a senior at Hunter College, and my tuition costs come from TAP, Pell, and out of pocket expenses.

I have no space to do my school work and complete certain assignments such as for theater class. I get no interaction with the professor and have less time to communicate regarding questions. I have lost motivation to complete assignments and often have chores to do at home and need to cook for myself, taking away time from school work.

I wouldn't be able to spend this \$300 on textbooks and school supplies. I would have to save more and spend less on food... I would need my Pell to increase if that is the case. We are already paying way too much for a college education as New York citizens. We pay taxes and we pay for every other fee. Tuition shouldn't be raised at all. It should be lowered!!

My name is Laurie Williams, I'm a sophomore at Hunter College, and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

This pandemic has made me unable to attend events. It has affected my classes. It has made it harder for me to learn and understand material.

Since I pay out of pocket these hikes will further deplete my resources. My mother would have more financial strain since she helps me pay college fees. In addition, she already has the pay bills since every home all the time and takes care of my grandmother. Overall, I see a tuition increase as unnecessary since students are not getting the full college experience and it's the worst timing for me and many other students.

My name is Alison Duverge Cordero, this is my last year at Brooklyn College, and i rely on pell and out of pocket costs for tuition.

held on campus, I don't think students will see an improvement in their experience. A lot of students have lost their jobs and the stimulus check barely covers rent.

My name is Monique Clarke, this is my first year at QCC, and my tuition is covered by ASAP, excelsior, and financial aid.

I was infected with the virus I was out of school and now I'm way behind in my classes.

With the stress of worrying about yourself and your family in this pandemic, the stress of worrying about paying extra on our tuition is enough to cause mental health issues as most of us are out of a job.

My name is Brian Sukhnandan, this is my last year at Queens College, and both Tap and pell cover my tuition.

This pandemic is terrible, I can't learn shit.

\$320 is a lot more for a struggling student, especially when CUNY can allocate funds to each individual college instead of it going to waste by administration pocketing money (cough cough, CCNY).

I'm a senior in my sixth and final year at City Tech, to pay for school I use FAFSA and out of pocket when the tuition isn't fully covered. No TAP received this year/exhausted.

I didn't learn anything this semester. Some professors did not teach. I don't feel so good about passing in some of my courses despite having a cumulative GPA of 3.6. What am I paying for exactly?

I have taken dozens of courses that cost roughly ~\$950 each and I did not learn much, if not anything in those courses. I passed those courses with A's so what does that tell you? That is not the only issue. Textbooks are also expensive and oftentimes, courses cover less than half of textbooks. What I am trying to say is, even if you had taken over 10 courses and had covered

over 10 textbooks, you may still find yourself lacking in terms of skill set and you may have a hard time looking for an internship because employers don't want you. I have grown tired of CUNY after witnessing my fellow students struggling to find jobs out of "college". I make less than \$1000 a month at my part time job and recently, I had to borrow from my grandma. Do you know how humiliating that is? The fact that CUNY won't refund students' tuition because of this pandemic is already annoying. Now they're asking to increase tuition? The Board deserves to be jailed!

My name is Tariq Huggins, this is my 4th year at Lehman College, and I rely on pell and out of pocket expenses for tuition.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected my education this semester negatively. The cancellation of on-campus classes was intrusive and disruptive as it happened during the week I had an exam. After classes moved online, my coursework became exceedingly more difficult due to the lack of contact with my professors in a physical setting. The idea that the Board of Trustees are raising the tuition by 320\$ clearly shows how much they do not take a student's needs in consideration. We are currently living in a time where many people are being unemployed and not being able to meet their needs to live during the coronavirus; I strongly disagree with the decision to raise the tuition by 320\$. This will definitely affect me due to the fact that I barely receive any financial aid and raising the tuition would make paying for my tuition even more tedious than it already is.

Also dealing with losing my job and having no source of income how would I pay for my summer class and following classes?

I won't be able to pay for my school if it continues to raise the tuition especially given I no longer have a job. Also it's hard to be paying \$320 on top of what's already coming out of pocket to pay for school. It's really too much given the point in time and also what's going on. It's very insensitive and annoying especially given that we can't even attend school as usual

My name is Swapnil Barua. I am a senior at Queens College. I pay for college by taking loans.

Of course. It's so hard to do the assignment and under the class online.

We are now locked down in our home. Our family and I have no income. We are already behind the due dates of our payments. As for tuition If there is more burden for us, this will be very unjust to us.

My name is Tiandra Thompson. I am a freshman at York College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I'm not learning much of anything anymore just submitting assignments before 11:59.

The board of trustees should not raise tuition because like a lot of students I can't afford it. I can barely afford the current tuition. My mom works multiple jobs to pay for my tuition out of pocket. I was let go from my job due to the strike of the corona virus. I recently received tap but it doesn't cover the whole of my tuition and I will have to pay the rest out of pocket. Last semester I was at risk of dropping out of school due the stress of having to find money to pay my tuition. People go to CUNY to get an affordable education; it used to be free but now that we have to pay to attend, raising the tuition goes against that purpose.

My name is Naiomy, I'm a sophomore at BMCC and rely on tap and pell for my classes.

I have had a bad experience with online classes , this semester I only took June because I had no other choice and I was doing poorly . Now all my classes are online and the school environment isn't the same as the home environment while learning. I cannot concentrate the same , and studying for classes has become way harder than usual because of all the distractions I have at home. I feel like this semester will probably be a very poor one academically speaking . Honestly , I have lost most of my motivation for school.

I am receiving aid , but I will not qualify soon, and that means I will have to pay out of pocket . \$320 may not seem like a lot , but those \$320 when totaled in can help pay my transportation fees(metro card) that I use to get to and from school . I am also a single mother so that money will impact my budgeting at home

My name is Kermina, I'm a junior at John Jay and I rely on loans and out of pocket payments for tuition.

This pandemic is horrible, I lost my job. I don't appreciate you raising my college money when i see no change.

My name is Silvia Pérez, I'm a senior at John Jay and I rely on financial aid and out of pocket tuition payments.

This pandemic has affected my mental health because it has been very difficult to focus and try to stay motivated. I participate and attend my classes but, being able to do my assignments has been a great struggle for me. I have been speaking to friends and peers and I feel like a lot of us are feeling the same thing. Also living in fear of the virus has also been taking a toll as well.

It would be a great disservice to raise tuition during a pandemic. it shows that the board of Trustees have no morals, it is insane that a human being has the thought process to even think that it is okay to raise tuition when there are students who can't even get food on the table during this time. It saddens me that the Board of Trustees isn't looking for ways to implement help and some help during a great time of need. This is what New York City is about, being strong in times like this and being able to help others. CUNY should be better than this!

My name is Hadja Bah, I'm a student at John Jay and I rely on TAP and Pell.

I've had to grow accustomed to distance learning in a space not conducive to do so. Certain classes are also not optimal for online learning, such as labs, which makes it difficult to transition. The workload has also increased since social distancing has begun.

Considering the recession we are undergoing and the amount of individuals who have lost their source of income, this tuition increase is simply unnecessary. My father has lost his job and my mother is unable to work. I am also reliant on federal assistance to pay my tuition and am unsure of how that will be impacted by the pandemic. The tuition hike creates another unnecessary burden and financial strain on myself and my family, during a time of absolute uncertainty.

My name is Asslye Rodriguez, I'm a sophomore at CCNY, I usually pay out of pocket for tuition. Just last semester I received help from TAP for undocumented students, however it did not cover the entire tuition and I had to go out of pocket as well.

This pandemic has affected everything, it is the worst thing that has happened. Some of my professors are being lazy. They prefer to send recordings and us studying out of our time. No longer having class online lecture, just connecting for attendance and if you have a question, however it is very rushed. Some of my professors are cutting off class time, sometimes I lose an hour and a half from my laboratory class. Sometimes I don't have recitation class because it is canceled saying we are "advanced", what if I still have questions from previous chapters, we still can practice. Aside from that, they barely teach and they assign you a whole lot more of things due in a short amount of time. And a whole more issues such as internet connection being sometimes bad and I can barely hear the class because it is cutting off, etc.

It would be extremely unjust to raise tuition because CUNY is not offering anything good. This is a complete disrespect towards hard working students. Everybody has a different situation at home, the trustees could be good because first of all they have documents so you are able to keep your fancy jobs and still be paid or receive the compensation from the government. Students who are undocumented, that live by paycheck that lost their jobs, their family lost their job as well. How do you expect them to pay a rise in tuition when they are only thinking on HOW TO FREAKING SURVIVE? My name is Natalie Rodriguez, I'm a second year at Queens, and although I get excelsior I still rely on out of pocket payments.

I suffer from anxiety and depression. Having academic responsibilities during such a rough time where I know so many are suffering, I have to worry about economic issues, and my family's health is overwhelming. I know hundreds of other CUNY students feel this way too. Additionally, we all have our own personal issues. It's a tough experience

Tuition should not be raised, by doing so the board of trustees is explicitly saying students who are poor or cannot afford tuition are not worthy of education. We all deserve an equal chance to prosper and tuition doesn't allow that

My name is Carina, I graduated from Hunter College in 2019.

The Tuition hike during the pandemic would create more chaos for students who are dealing with the health crisis and homelessness simultaneously. The tuition hike ultimately will lead to higher dropout rates among vulnerable students such as the homeless.

My name is Joanna Jainarine, I'm a freshman at Queensborough and I pay out of pocket.

CUNY has transitioned to online classes, making it mandatory for all students to continue their classes online. If I wanted online classes, I would've signed up for them at the beginning of the semester, rather than paying the out of state tuition for on campus classes. Students should be given the chance to continue classes in a physical classroom, because that's where they learn best, with being able to ask questions, and getting hands on examples and assistance. Many students are already having trouble in class because college professors are inept at doing their job in the first place, can you imagine how much worse it is for these professors who lack teaching degrees to become online classroom professors? My spring semester sucked with COVID 19. People depend on their paychecks, the stimulus check. How can they pay an additional 320?

My name is Rossella Ginestri, this is my last semester at Queensborough and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

COVID-19 has affected my CUNY experience because distance learning is much harder than actually being in class and visually seeing how to do the work.

I believe tuition shouldn't be increased because not everyone has the money that they keep raising and it risks people from actually attending college . It would affect me personally because it's hard enough to already pay an raising it won't make anything better

My name is Farhat Hyder, this was supposed to be my last year at Queensborough and I relied on FAFSA for tuition costs.

This pandemic has affected my education. I was supposed to graduate by summer 2020 and now I won't get the experience I wanted.

I lost my job over the COVID-19. While I was working I barely made enough to help me survive and raise tuition for what? to make the poor more poor?.

My name is John Carlos Rodriguez, I graduate in fall 2020 from Brooklyn College and used loans for my tuition payments.

This pandemic cancelled my masters internship. I have to attend classes online. It's hard for me to do my capstone project.

The BoT shouldn't increase the tuition because I already paid out of pocket and I'm paying other bills. It is hard for me to keep track of everything

My name is Feyzanur Kara, this is my first year of grad school at Queens College and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

I lost my job that I paid the tuition for. I lost my paid internship. My family lost their jobs. I haven't done an assignment in weeks and my research stopped.

I have another year to graduate and even before pandemic I was having a hard time paying for tuition and trying to make a living in New York City by myself. Now that I lost my job and paid internship with no one to support me financially I don't even know if I'll be able to attend school next semester let alone pay a tuition hike.

My name is Marilyn Ridley, I'm a senior at the CUNY School for Professional Studies and I use both out of pocket payments and scholarships for my tuition.

These increases are going to make it harder for me to pay for tuition during downturn in income

My name is Michael Yarbrough, I'm an assistant professor at John Jay.

I have gotten sick. Many CUNY faculty and staff have died, sometimes with no acknowledgment from their campuses. And most importantly, at least 25% of my students have had COVID-19, 60% have had a family member with it, and growing numbers are mourning family deaths. My name is Desiree M Dejesus, this is my second year at BMCC and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

You can't raise tuition when people are losing their jobs and are trying to make or save just enough to continue on with their education.

My name is Sadat Rahman, I'm an alumni from York and the SEEK program.

Raising tuition will hurt my friends.

My name is Anastasia blue, I'm a senior on TAP.

Classes have become so much harder. Not having the teacher there really is a stress. This whole pandemic made school so rushed.

I feel like students are saving money right now with everyone being home they should need to raise the money. 320 is a lot of money to pay on top of what we already pay. The school doesn't show a change for the good with all the rise in tuition.

My name is Sadia Hoque, I'm a junior at CCNY, paying for tuition with TAP, FAFSA and out of pocket expenses.

Online classes are a struggle to deal with because my internet sucks and the connection may be buffering and causing constant disconnections. More assignments are due and more deadlines to be aware of. There's still a lack of understanding, especially people who are sick and affected or in risk of being so because they're busy taking care of loved ones and stuck at home with no money to cover basic survival necessities.

Raising tuition is unjust and unreasonable because it causes unnecessary stress and anxiety, especially for many students who already can not afford to pay for meals and books and have families of their own or are currently unemployed and looking for a job. This is extremely unfair and insensible

My name is Arjun Kapadia, I'm a grad student at queens and get my tuition through access vr.

We have to do our course online for the remainder of the semester and my agency might not be able to cover the increased tuition bill in full. I might have to pay out of pocket.

My name is Matt Brim, I'm a faculty at the College of Staten Island.

This pandemic has revealed the urgency of supporting public higher education, Tuition hikes at CUNY are classist and racist.

My name is Nikola Baci, I'm a third year at Queens College and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

The coronavirus pandemic has made my education more difficult. The online classes are very challenging especially for math classes. We see professors struggling to write on the board they hold by their shoulder and the quality of the video via Blackboard collaboration is so low, we can barely decipher what the professor is writing.

I hope the board doesn't raise tuition. Not now at least. We are paying for classes that are covering only half the material of what was described in the syllabus. Hard to have a normal class. And total chaos, where professors are having trouble updating the students about the Grades, the changes in syllabus and the exam dates. On the other side we are having home exams and crossing finger and hoping students show integrity. As an international student I pay \$7000 per semester and I don't deserve to pay even more in such a crisis that is rising so many problems to CUNY schools.

My name is Melkisedec Francois , I'm a freshman at John Jay, and I pay for school through TAP.

My mom is on social security disability income and my dad is an Uber who is having a hard time finding work during this pandemic. My dad, sister, and I also have to be extra careful when going outside for necessities because my mom's condition makes her vulnerable to COVID-19. I was laid off from my job placement site through CUNY Service Corps and I am currently looking into alternative sources of income to help support my family. Thankfully, I was able to borrow a laptop from my school which I am grateful for. It's been a struggle to keep up with my assignments as online courses are not currently my strong suit and I have to take active steps to manage mood swings due to my anxiety.

A tuition increase wasn't a good idea before this pandemic, but now it would just be cruel. The Board of Trustees must not be tone deaf to the current state of things. People are suffering in more ways than one, and if you think that we're being dramatic, just turn on the 24 hour news cycle. Maybe \$320 is not a lot of money to most Trustees, however on principle, if there was ever a time to take a stand and show compassion for the students of this university, now is that time. I don't even know if my TAP will cover the \$320 increase and I personally don't want to find out. As a Freshman, I'm worried about how much tuition is going to increase by the time my class graduates, I'm worried about how many of us are going to have to drop out of school before then, I'm worried about how many of us have to choose between food, rent, and tuition. This is unjust, why does it take a pandemic for you to see that? There's a disconnect between your Board of Trustees and students, let's fix it. Thank you for your time.

My name is Denisse Gachupin, I'm a CUNY student paying out of pocket for tuition.

I no longer have access to my college resources. It's different being there in class. With the crisis, there is a minimum cost of income, and any extra money is going towards other needs. Having the tuition increase is money that can go somewhere else in our budget, like food, Bill's, etc.

My name is Robin Green.

I am a Brooklyn College Alumni and I believe that a \$320 tuition hike would be detrimental to the current and aspiring CUNY student community. During this time, hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers have lost their jobs and that includes CUNY students. Now add on increasing rents, transit prices, food and other obligations students have to face while living in the city, this would make it impossible for many students to continue their studies or attend school! Why must the students continue to pay for the lack of funding from our city? A tuition hike is not the answer. Students deserve the right to have access to AFFORDABLE higher education.

My name is Omar Pineda, this is my second year at the CUNY School of Professional Studies, and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

This pandemic has affected my ability to pay for classes.

These are difficult times financially for most of us and the increase by \$320 can decide whether or not we can sign up for an additional class and graduate on time.

My name is Kate Little.

I'm a former public school teacher, civil rights lawyer, and lecturer at Yale Law School. I care deeply about the access to education in this country and the disproportionate burdens born by already marginalized communities. I'm also lucky to know multiple faculty members for CUNY

and the passion for the students they serve. I stand with them and others calling for a fairer more equitable world.

My name is Yarmina Peralta, I'm an alumni for York and had to use loans for tuition.

CUNY should remain the affordable, quality options for students. The tuition hike is unjust not only during this time but in general because the cost of living in NYC is rising as the wages continue to stay the same. In order to improve their quality of life our students will have post graduation we need to ensure we are providing them access to it. Raising the tuition is denying students access.

My name is Mohammed Sayem Uddin, this is my senior year at brooklyn college, even with TAP and Pell I still rely on out of pocket payments.

The quality of education is below poor due to this pandemic. TCUNY is saving tons of money by putting classes online, they should ask the federal government to help them instead of students who will have difficulty getting jobs until everything goes back to normal which won't happen until next year.

My name is Gabriella Abreu, this is my third year at The CUNY School for Professional studies and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

My teachers have been a great support during this time. However due to outside factors such as getting laid off and worry about paying tuition, rent and other bills, it has made it difficult to concentrate on school. I am hoping things get better.

Raising the tuition especially at this time would not be great. Especially during these tough times where students are highly affected by the pandemic. Many of us have lost jobs and are barely making ends meet while trying to get a great education. Raising tuition would put most of us back. One of this things Cuny promotes is affordable tuition. However raising tuition completely contradicts this. Personally I have been one of those affected by the pandemic and can barely afford a roof over my head. Each time tuition is raised, it makes it difficult for me to continue

taking classes. I have been employed by CUNY for over 5 years and it was only last year, I resigned to pursue a job in my major. CUNY does great by their students, but raising tuition would have the adverse reaction and allow for many students seeking affordable education nearly impossible. Many of us do not qualify for grants because of our age or other reasons, and it is because of affordable tuition that we are able to strive for a great education provided by CUNY. Raising tuition will make this difficult.

My name is Jane Guskin, I'm a PhD student (3rd year at CUNY Graduate Center), faculty (adjunct), and alumni.

As a PhD student I pay no tuition; I support myself through teaching as an adjunct and savings from prior employment. When I was a full time undergrad at CUNY (2015-2017) while working at a nonprofit I paid tuition out of pocket but got tax breaks and some merit scholarships through the CUNY BA program that covered much of the cost; my salary covered the rest.

I am an adjunct faculty member at Queens College (since 2018), a current PhD student at the CUNY Grad Center (since 2017), and an alum of the CUNY BA program and Queens College (2017). As adjunct faculty we were not paid for the time spent converting to online and we are not paid for course prep or grading, just for class time and office hours. Now the pandemic threatens our jobs. Students can't afford tuition right now. They need a refund for spring 2020 and they need for CUNY to be free so they can continue to attend and we can continue to teach them. The state needs to pay the full costs of high quality public higher education by taxing the wealthy. Otherwise CUNY is just reproducing social inequalities instead of challenging them.

CUNY should be free. CUNY's opportunity programs have a great success rate because they give students the support they need. That's the model that should be extended to all CUNY students to ensure that the whole people of New York can build their skills and develop their talents to address this pandemic and future crises. The state needs to stop shifting the cost burden onto students. Any undergrad tuition hike (and any tuition at all right now) will affect me personally as an adjunct because enrollment will drop and I will lose my job. And every time enrollment drops, that means students are giving up their dreams.

My name is Briana, I'm a student at the CUNY School for Professional Studies and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

Being that all my classes were online already, not much has changed. However, the course work could have been minimized a little to accommodate for changing times. Since the coursework was already online, some professors expect us to still keep up with it without being as understanding with everything else going on around us.

The board should not increase the tuition due to it already being an economically hard time for everyone. We just want an education and not have to worry about how we are going to pay for it or if some people need to take out extra money. Personally, I need to pay out of pocket and my dad has been generously paying for school since undergrad and now grad school so I don't need to have the burden of loans. So the increase will affect my dad and my family, as that money could have been spent on something else such as bills and necessities during this time especially with everything being so uncertain.

My name is Tiffany Barrios, I'm a junior at Queens and I receive both TAP and Pell.

Online learning makes it hard for me to follow up with the lessons. Along with worsening my mental health. Yet I can't do anything about it.

Raising tuition is unjust. Loans are always being pushed on students and I think it's unfair. About 60% of students come from low income families who can barely afford transportation, supplies, food, etc.

My name is Diahann Perez. I'm a student at Brooklyn and receive both TAP and Pell.

Most of my classes require fieldwork so I can learn from active teachers. Some assignments are left unclear. Most of those assignments I would have to go outside or use the studio art room as help.

The point of CUNY schools in NYC is for students to go to affordable colleges. Most of the residents of NYC do not make much money especially during this pandemic. Why does CUNY want to slowly have the same tuition as Private colleges.

My name is Josiah Ramesar, I'm a freshman at BMCC and receive both TAP and Pell.

I have had all my classes be online. Many of my professors are not keeping up to date with the class. I am not learning to the best ability I can.

We cannot afford a tuition hike because so many students pay out of pocket. Students should not have to sacrifice rent or food in order to just pay for school. Many people use the remainder of financial aid to pay for textbooks.

My name is Shira Safia, I'm a junior at Brooklyn college and I receive both TAP and Pell.

The coronavirus pandemic affected my CUNY experience since all classes are now all held online. It is significantly more difficult to study at home while attending to family responsibilities. Moreover, some professors increase the workload and even give less time on exams, which makes it even harder for students to do well during this time.

During Covid-19, many students are unemployed and their families are struggling to make ends meet. Raising tuition will make it so much harder for students and is unjust, especially now that classes are all being held online. Personally, I will need to start paying out of pocket if the tuition increases and I am not able to afford that given the current circumstances.

My name is David Stein, I'm a freshman at Brooklyn College, and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

This pandemic has led to so much emotional stress.

CUNY has just received millions of dollars due to the coronavirus stimulus package. Use that money for the good of the students and not to line the pockets of the presidents of colleges. Student lives matter. We are not suckers!

My name is Sabina Buniatof I'm a senior at brooklyn and even with TAP I still need to take out loans.

COVID-19 has made my education worse. The school is not ready technologically for distance learning. The professors do not even hold online live classes. They expect us to self-study without adequate teaching.

Tuition is already high for a public school. the more you increase tuition, the more debt many students will be in. During this crisis in our economy this is not the right time to increase tuition, on the contrary, there should be more scholarships (need based and merit based) available for students in this challenging time.

My name is Jonathan, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn, I pay out of pocket though I also received a NYS scholarship for academic excellence.

I'm part of clubs in which most of the events got canceled. I didn't get to go to the internship fair because of the virus. And, I work better academically in a structured setting like a classroom, online classes don't compare.

Most of my cost is out of pocket because I'm not eligible for any financial aid nor any other scholarships. I'm not wealthy, but there is an expected family contribution, and it doesn't matter whether actual family contribution is \$0.00 to financial aid. If I was wealthy, I'd have went to a better school than cuny, it's known that wealthier schools have better resources. I try to get back some tuition by getting the nypirg refund, because they should be audited like every other club, but they stayed out of their office for the first 10 days this semester, they also owe me money from last semester when I did fill out the form but they seemed to have just ignored it.

My name is Jonathan Graber, I'm an upper Junior at Brooklyn College and I pay out of pocket.

I am not able to get the in person lectures and lab experiences which are helpful in the learning process. The online lectures do not have the same capacity to facilitate truly learning a concept. I am also missing out on all of the campus amenities, such as the library, the gym, the laboratories, and in person advice. Advisement over email is not nearly as smooth as it is in person.

We received a lesser product the current semester for what we paid for, to raise prices would be unfair. Regardless of the current semester, it seems the economic effects of the Corona virus will be felt for at least a couple of semesters to come. Therefore, to raise tuition now would potentially exacerbate that strain.

My name is Bobby Tawil, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn college and I pay out of pocket.

Not having class in person makes it much harder for me to learn. Classes like English are very hard to do online. I'd learn better by doing my own research on things than these online classes and for much cheaper.

We are not even on campus anymore. Everybody is struggling financially right now. CUNY should not raise the tuition, when everybody's struggling, especially if we don't even have in person class.

My name is Efrim Lebovits, I'm a third year at brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

Just like everyone else: this pandemic has made college more difficult for me than it already was as I'm a night student and work full time. Now I can't even learn the material in a classroom.

Tuition has skyrocketed in the past few decades and it has gone way past inflation rates it makes no sense to raise it even more when people are already struggling and getting laid off from work

My name is Shanice Anderson, I'm an upper junior at Queens and I pay out of pocket.

I can't cover the cost of my tuition for the 2019-20 school year, because I can't work during this pandemic. So I have no income coming in and the money I do have saved I have to use to survive by buying essential needs.

I may not finish my last year of college and that will suck because I worked really hard the past 3 years to get where I am. I earned my degree and it will be devastating to know my financial instability is the only thing holding me back from my goals.

My name is Ismael Almonte, I'm a sophomore at CCNY in the SEEK program.

After the pandemic my experience has been let down by a lack of focus and resources. It's hard to contact others and overwhelming amounts of extra work. We just went through a crisis and to raise the tuition is unjust. We are all going through a financially difficult time.

My name is Marwan Abdelazeez, this is my 3rd year at CSI and I pay out of pocket for tuition. Raise tuition and students will drop out.

My name is Ashley, I'm a junior at CSI and I receive both TAP and Pell.

It has been very hard to keep up with the online school. People are losing their jobs. People who are usually enrolled in cuny come from low income families

My name is Sophia DeMartino, I'll be a rising Junior this fall at the College of Staten Island, and I receive Discover Student loans.

My father had a severe pay cut while expected to work the same amount of hours as before. My mental state is currently deteriorating as I relied on being outside and in nature for emotional support and healing. I quit just before the pandemic was declared and I have no money or

adequate savings to help contribute to my family's financial struggles right now. And I'm still expected to pay my loan's monthly payments during this in full!!

I don't have the money for a tuition increase! We have significantly less income right now - we are barely surviving as we had always lived paycheck to paycheck. This tuition increase will also contribute significantly to my student debt and I can barely afford the LOAN for my tuition right now. I'm struggling to survive. My father may or may not need surgery but we won't know until this pandemic is over. This is so disheartening to learn that there will be another increase. This school is not benefiting me in the slightest. I have tried countless times to utilize the available resources and I've gotten no response from any of the staff members. I shouldn't be paying so much money when most of the available resources are unavailable all of the time. I'm struggling. This is a pandemic! A national emergency and all this college can think about is raising tuition bills! Why?! We are people too! We can't afford this school! I can't afford this school!

My name is Edgar Rodriguez, I'm a junior at CCNY and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

None of my parents are working including myself. We are struggling and CUNY has not made me feel better.

Personally I already struggle to pay the tuition. For there to be an increase in tuition during the time of a pandemic where it's hard to even earn money is an even bigger struggle. I'm not sure whether I would have the financial capabilities to meet the increase.

My name is Alberto Ballesteros, I'm a sophomore at CSI and receive both TAP and Pell.

We are all essentially paying for in class instruction but receiving online class value which is not what we paid for. The uncertainty of my job is really weighing on myself and many others in the same situation.

Increasing tuition in this dire time when many are strapped for cash and not sure if they'll be able to pay for things next month is incredibly inconsiderate of CUNY. It is a disservice to what CUNY stands for and its students which are already being greatly underserved at a high price tag.

My name is Shemar Branch, I go to CSI and will be graduating in 2023. I rely on TAP and loans for my tuition.

I miss having physical classes on campus. The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition by \$320 because most people aren't really financially stable to pay that much money.

My name is Melodie Perez, I'm a sophomore at CCNY and although I receive both TAP and FAFSA I still must pay out of pocket for tuition.

Covid-19 has negatively impacted my experience. It is harder to concentrate on course work and grasp material when staring at a computer screen and only having access to professors by email!

Since financial aid barely covers my tuition, this will cause an even greater out of pocket expense which will cause me to need to work more hours. Getting another job and working more hours will take away my time for studying which will ultimately lower my educational performance!

My name is Alexis, I'm a senior at CSI and I rely on both loans and out of pocket payments for tuition.

It's very difficult for me to focus on my work and I don't feel like I'm learning like I would in class.

The tuition shouldn't be increased because for the majority of the spring semester we didn't get full use out of our tuition expenses. We pay to be on campus including parking passes and we aren't on campus.

My name is Gabriella Feeney, I'm a sophomore at CCNY and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

I'm not able to have an in person class experience, not able to access proper mental health services, loss of student life participation.

Many students pay out of pocket. Although some are able to afford to do so by scholarships etc, \$320 is just enough to cause a student to place a hold on their college education. While in the midst of this pandemic, people are losing their jobs (like myself) and I will not be able to contribute to my education.

My name is Toni Scarpati, I'm a CUNY Alumni and my daughter right now is a senior at CSI.

She is an honor roll student at csi that is now failing a class! Instructional time has been lost with transferring remotely. Her syllabi have changed.

People have lost their jobs. Lives have been lost. Financial hardships are far worse now than ever before.

My name is Rabia, I go to CSI and receive TAP.

Nobody is working at the moment, raising tuition will make our situation worse.

My name is Gianna, this is my 2nd year at CSI and I receive TAP though still pay out of pocket.

Learning is much harder now, especially with my professors that don't even have blackboard accounts.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition especially after a pandemic. Not only is it difficult for students to continue education now, it'll be more difficult with a tuition raise.

My name is Anastasia, I'm a junior at CSI and I receive a work voucher though still have out of pocket payments.

I am having a hard time keeping up with assignments and worrying about failing and having to take classes over again and having to pay out of pocket if I fail!

How are they funding Harvard for the rich people yet raising CUNY tuition the money needs yet forgetting who really can't afford this on their own. I can't pay out of pocket if I fail the semester I'd be in debt and can't afford for this to happen.

My name is Enfany Hernandez, I will graduate from CCNY this year and have paid out of pocket despite receiving TAP and Pell.

Since this pandemic I am not able to go back to work, I have a child at home, my family including myself have contacted the virus, and getting access to advisors is difficult.

Not everyone is currently working at the moment which isn't fair for those who pay out of pocket like myself. How are we going to afford next semester if you increase the tuition?

My name is Fariha Rashid, I'm a freshman at queens and need to take out loans to supplement out of pocket payments as an international student.

Learning from home is difficult, I cannot concentrate as much as I could at college in class. Always worrying about family members being safe during this pandemic. Parents don't live with

me in the USA, I am worried about them. Also worrying about tuition, because parents cannot and should not work and if they dont work how would I get money and i am an international student, my tuition is already high.

I AM AN INTERNATIONAL STUDENT, I CANNOT WORK IN THE STATES, SO I DONT EARN ANY MONEY, MY PARENTS EARN MONEY, BUT DURING THIS PANDEMIC EVERYONE IS JUST TRYING TO SURVIVE AND OBVIOUSLY MY PARENTS ARE NOT WORKING, I TAKE LOANS AND MY PARENTS PAY OUT OF POCKET, JUST THE LOANS ALONE IS NOT GOING TO COVER MY TUITION ON TOP OF THAT, IF THEY RAISE THE TUITION, IT WOULD BE MORE DIFFICULT FOR THEM TO PAY MY TUITION, PLUS I AM NOT GETTING THE PROPER EDUCATION THROUGH ONLINE CLASSES, SO THEY SHOULD REDUCE THE PRICE IF ANYTHING!!! LAB CLASSES CANNOT BE DONE ONLINE, AND I MAY HAVE TO TAKE THOSE CLASSES AGAIN ANYWAYS, CAUS I AM NOT LEARNING ANYTHING ONLINE, SO I DO NOT THINK CUNY SHOULD RAISE TUITION!!

My name is Stefany de Brito, I'm a senior at CCNY that receives TAP and Pell.

I have been furloughed from my job, I am currently relying on Unemployment insurance benefits in order to pay my own bills. In addition, only one person in my family is considered an essential worker and she is the only one that has income right now. I Live with a toddler and two dogs, I am not able to concentrate or even participate during my classes because of the constant noise. When problems arise and I try to contact my professors, some of them take days to answer emails or do not even bother to answer. It is very hard to focus for me on anything else than the rising tolls of people losing their lives or getting sick and this whole situation has vastly affected my mental health to the point where I go through days of depression knowing that relatives are sick and friends are losing their parents/grandparents.

Tuition should not be raised because I am a student that, like Many on CUNY, has to pay her own bills. This means that I have to work at least 30 hours per week in order to be able to survive. As a consequence of this situation I am part of the working class that relies on hourly minimum wage pay. In other words, I live check by check. This way of living does not allow you to have a monumental amount of savings. In my opinion, it seems unfair to even consider the possibility of raising tuition especially after this time. This global pandemic has affected everyone economically, emotionally and physically in some way or another. After all this is over, I expect and hope to go back to my normal life, in which I work tirelessly to pay bills, with the

sole distinction that I will have even more debts and bills that could have not been covered during this time where I was not working. This means that I will have to work more hours and will be able to give less time into my studies. Therefore, although \$320 does not have a markable effect on some people's lives, it has an effect on mine and hundreds of other students that find themselves in this same situation. \$320 makes a difference for people like us, people that could use it to buy groceries, pay for childcare, or tools for learning.

My name is Deandra Kellman, I'm a senior at CSI and still have out of pocket payments after TAP and Pell.

My classroom time has become limited with zoom partnership during distance learning.

It already feels like the school have a problem with budgeting themselves. Taking an extra \$320 from students won't help get the college back on track and will put financial strain on students.

My name is Valeria, this is my first year at brooklyn college and I rely on out of pocket payments and loans for my tuition.

This pandemic has made it more difficult to access certain facilities that help with academic struggles.

As someone who is paying out of pocket with no help from parents and is covering the majority of my tuition, the tuition hike poses a difficulty and frustration. A tuition hike during this time of crisis also creates major frustration since I am currently unable to work, posing the question If I'll even be able to continue my education.

My name is Elizabeth Otoo, I'm a junior at CCNY and pay out of pocket for tuition.

Both my uncle and my dad passed away during Covid-19. It's hard enough figuring out how I'm going to pay my tuition every semester. My dad is the one who pays and now he's gone. Right now I still owe \$400 and if this tuition hike is approved it could have been \$720.

My name is Mariham Sedrak, this is my third year at CSI and I need to take out loans for tuition.

Covid-19 has affected my CUNY experience by stopping all the labs and practical classes and now we just read the lecture or labs without any contact with the instructors, so that my academic grades get decreased because I'm understanding better when I see and have contact the professor.

Now in this crisis time we don't use any facilities in the college ,no classes,no labs ,and there is no library or group classroom.

So that is why you increase the tuition fee even if we don't use anything and all the classes become online classes only .

Which should be decreasing the fee, not increasing it .

My name is Brenda Onger, this is my first year at CSI and I rely on fafsa and out of pocket payments.

It's been difficult for me as I'm getting a lack of attention because it's a whole new process of learning.

We shouldn't raise tuition because not all of us are able to pay the tuition fee and most of us are having difficulties with online learning.

I'm out of work so I might not be able to pay some of my tuition. People might not be able to accommodate for a tuition hike, especially the ones paying out of pocket.

My name is Amine Ridaoui, I'm a member of the class of 2020 at CCNY and I'm in SEEK.

I've been hurt by a lack of resources to study promptly and efficiently. Person to person classes are what I signed up for and this change has made my academic life much more difficult.

Why would The Board raise tuition in the first place? Seems like predatory behavior from the board.

My name is Sekou Blow, I'm a sophomore at CSI and I pay out of pocket and am in the ASAP program.

I'm missing my friends and professors from campus. I wish the coronavirus pandemic would come to an end so we all can go back outside again and everything goes back to normal. I think being at home is a little problem for me due to some distractions but I'm trying to stay focused.

I may not have that amount of money to pay for Tuition. It could affect my chances of getting my degrees to achieve my dream goals.

My name is Sabrina Benet, I'm a junior at CSI taking out loans.

This threw us into online classes where I personally do not work to my fullest potential. I'm feeling super run down and uninspired by the amount of work I get. It has 100% been a difficult time to be a CUNY student, or student in general.

No, the Board shouldn't raise tuition. This is a really bad time to raise tuition because of our country's current situation. We are dealing with a loss on more levels than usual, loss of jobs, pay, loved ones, routine. It is completely unnecessary to raise tuition now, so many people are dealing with hardships.

My name is Semiye Skudrinja, I'm a sophomore at CSI and despite receiving TAP and Pell I still pay out of pocket.

I have been doing distance learning which I am grateful for but it is not ideal. I do not learn well in an online environment, which is why I didn't sign up for online classes. I feel like this year I'm going through the motions but not actually learning anything.

The Board should not raise the tuition because I have lost my job and due to the amount of money I made the years prior I will not be receiving much financial aid to help pay for classes. Most of my tuition will be paid out of pocket and I won't be able to afford it.

My name is George Cooke, I'm a senior at CCNY paying out of pocket.

I couldn't pay the tuition on time and I'm not able to talk to an advisor. This will affect me dearly because I'm already having trouble paying for tuition now plus since Covid-19 I haven't been able to work to even pay it off and this will pre-long my graduation. I know this is how a lot of students fill the board of trustees always raising tuition other than helping us fight for more

funding all Cuny schools and most programs have been terminated because of this shortages of funds.

My name is Carolyn Morel, I'm a freshman at CCNY and need to pay out of pocket despite receiving TAP and Pell.

Classes have completely moved online, meaning i have to sit through video courses in a noisy environment because i don't live alone. Some professors I barely hear from, and the lack of a proper learning environment has hurt my studies and performance. I don't even know how to reach the registrar's office and I just feel very lost in this situation.

The reimbursement check I recieve will be smaller. I depend on this money to purchase all of my books and other necessities for school. It's also not fair to hike tuition right now if the guarantee of my being able to use the school facilities isn't guaranteed for the time being.

My name is Marina Ghobrial, I'm a senior at CSI paying out of pocket for tuition.

Some professors haven't been that responsive so we're forced to learn on our own. Online exams are made harder because they are open books so I'm struggling with a class. Not the same experience as learning in a classroom.

My dad pays for me and my brother. We are not covered by Fafsa or Tap because he is a part time student. So he pays out of pocket. We are already struggling financially and had to take out a loan. A \$320 increase means a \$640 increase for us. And With COVID, we aren't earning the same.

My name is Kimberliesa Bowen, this is my second year at CSI and I pay out of pocket.

My classes fell behind because of this pandemic. Sometimes it's really hurt for me to pay attention to all my classes and work because I'm not in school learning.

I pay for school out of pocket so it's going to be difficult for me to pay an extra \$320. I work a part time job to pay for school. School it's going to be too expensive for me and everyone else who pays out of pocket. A tuition hike is unnecessary and selfish of the state because not everyone have financial aid or assistance for tuition.

My name is Mariah Ramirez, I'm a junior at CCNY receiving TAP and Pell.

Since the pandemic all my classes are moved to a digital platform. From my experience, multiple teachers use different platforms- resulting in confusion for myself and my classmates.

The board of trustees should not raise the tuition because there are many students depending on financial aid to get them through their education. Raising Tuition will lead to students being at a disadvantage which may result in students abandoning their studies, or taking out loans that they cannot afford.

My name is Lucas Carvalho, I'm a senior at John Jay receiving loans and Pell grants.

The COV-19 pandemic has completely overhauled my academic experience with CUNY. The transition to online learning has been difficult nonetheless. The inability to work, socialize, and learn in person has affected me dramatically. Adapting to this new reality of social distancing has been the most challenging factor through it all.

In times like these, to propose an increase in tuition goes to show the greed and the lack of empathy the Board of Trustees has toward its student body. As a CUNY student, I am well aware of the cuts to crucial departments like advice, wellness facilities, and childcare centers. These departments are underfunded, understaffed, and unsupported from the top down. Although the proposal appears to attempt to remedy these issues, I have noticed that the previous proposals that have passed have not addressed these issues. How will I know the increase in tuition will be utilized effectively to support the student body if in the past it's been different? As a full-time college student living in NY, the cost of living has been increasing exponentially while the price for public education has done the same. It is impossible to expect students to pay the increase in tuition when the overall economy is on standstill. It is immoral, unjust, and overall wrong for the Board of Trustees to push this proposal at a time like this.

My name is Chad Henry, I'm an alumni med student from CCNY who had to take out loans.

Pandemic has put a strain on the finances of many. People are unable to work and make ends meet. Doesn't make sense to raise tuition now especially considering we cant even use the campus.

My name is Richard Kish, this is my third year at CCNY who relies on tap, pell, excelsior, and is still taking out student loans.

I relied on my college for Internet access, so I had to start paying for service. Trying to reach help through the college is much slower; I applied for an Internship Program at my college over a month ago and have yet to be accepted.

Not only are the university's physical resources no longer available to us, a lot of students, including myself, have lost their job or their work is severely compromised. I don't get any assistance from my parents so I relied entirely on loans and having a job prior to the pandemic; financial stability is unsure for thousands of students in the same situation.

My name is Angelina Coronado, I'm a student at CCNY receiving Pell, loans, and making out of pocket payments.

College education is now limited to distance learning through the form of video chat discussion and Blackboard discussion posts. As an English literature major and Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellow, I notice how the coronavirus has imposed great pressure on my peers — not only in terms of how the great change to the quality of our education but the changes in our family dynamics, health, and economic means. Class plans to go on field trips, attend literary readings, and other experiences vital to our growth as students have been completely cancelled.

I arrived at CUNY in search for a quality, affordable education that would provide me with ample resources for scholarship and research. As a transfer student, I can proudly say that I have experienced far more support at CCNY than I did at my previous private liberal arts Early College. I can go on about how tuition hikes affect students such as myself who have found an

intellectual home at CUNY, but my greatest concern rests in how this will affect my peers in tremendous ways — especially in light of this pandemic. I compel the decision makers on this matter to re-evaluate how they are supporting the CUNY colleges. I ask them to explain how these consistent, yearly tuition hikes (as well as the persistent budget cuts) are serving a purpose to the students, the overworked and underpaid adjunct faculty, and the overall university legacy and mission. A \$320 increase here and a budget cut there soon reveals striking austerity and detrimental effects to the overall CUNY system. If the decision makers care for this reality, then a re-evaluation needs to be made.

My name is Victoria Sparandera. I'm a junior at CSI and I pay out of pocket.

My classes are now online. I am unable to participate in social events. I am also unable to use the library, which is where I spend most of my time.

I am unable to get financial aid but that does not mean yearly tuition is easy for my family and I to pay. My parents and I all lost our jobs due to COVID-19 so paying tuition this fall will be much more difficult. Raising tuition during this unprecedented time is sick and twisted, especially considering we may continue distant-learning through the fall. Students are essentially teaching themselves during this time so paying more for tuition is just ridiculous.

My name is Tayvhon Pierce, a LaGuardia Community College graduate and current student at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, receiving TAP, SEEK, and taking out loans.

The coronavirus pandemic has taken our campus away. The place that continues to inspire so many people to strive for success. It has put a strain on many students including myself mentally, economically, and academically. It is difficult to focus on keeping up with assignments when a global pandemic is threatening our idea of the future. The world is on hold but our bills keep coming, the assignments keep coming. I have multiple people close to me who are sick and one who has passed away since corona. My bedroom now being my classroom, workplace, and meeting room makes it difficult to declutter mentally.

Now, We could talk about numbers.: We can talk about The 500,000 CUNY Students that are suffering from the Tap Gap which is at about 80 million dollars and rising because of tuition increases such as this. Or The Student to counselor ratio being 900 students over the

recommended ratio of support; overburdening the present counselors and preventing many students from accessing mental health services - a barrier they now would literally be paying for. Or the almost 50,000 food insecure students, me being one of them, already choosing between education and dinner

But I want to talk about CUNY's mission statement to provide affordable education. "a vehicle for the upward mobility of the disadvantaged in the City of New York using CUNY's own description." Let's talk about how these tuition hikes are a direct contradiction of this mission as well as a violation of the state education law. Let's talk about why the students are being profited off of instead of provided for.

Better yet, what is the mission of the Board of Trustees? The state education law says: The Board of Trustees are responsible for the governance, maintenance and development of both senior and community colleges. CUNY is supported on the assumption that the University will continue to maintain and expand its commitment to academic excellence and to the provision of equal access and opportunity for students, faculty and staff from all ethnic and racial groups and from both sexes

How does raising tuition increase the development of any of the CUNY schools that now have to find the money the state won't cover because of the fixed TAP amount? In what ways does affordable correlate with tuition hikes? How can a student be asked to pay more for the mental health services they aren't provided, or for the classes that are being held in trailers, or the adjuncts who aren't getting paid enough to provide the educational experience students need. This is not an expansion of equal access and opportunity, it is the cultivation of its demise.

If I was a trustee, I would want people to trust me. Trust me with the vehicle that is providing upward mobility to the disadvantaged, and know that I will keep it affordable, find ways to expand opportunity programming, request the necessary funding from those that promised to fund it aka the state. I would hear the student's pain and minimize the burden on their backs instead of adding to it in \$300 increments. Where were you when the students were in Albany advocating for funding? From CUNY's mission statement, that seems to be more of your responsibility than the students.

An additional tuition increase will threaten access to a college education and undermine CUNY's mission to provide opportunity for the low-income and working class students of New York City. A reality that has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 outbreak.

My name is Jason Morency, I'm a member of the class of 2020 from CCNY receiving TAP and Pell.

It's hard with online classes. Lots of responsibilities at home. I am afraid to go outside and get what I need.

I will not be able to pay for a lot of things. I already struggle to pay my rent. Having the extra cost will force me to work more and take away from my already difficult studies.

My name is Erin McLaughlin, I'm a grad student at Queen's college taking out loans.

The board can't raise tuition. Students are wracked with expenses because of coronavirus. Students are losing their jobs. Students are paying CUNY to go there and classes are being moved online.

My name is Bryana Paulino, I'm a sophomore at Lehman receiving Tap and Pell.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected immensely my CUNY experience, first and foremost, because we are now forced to take online classes due to the restrictions and it's something that has been pretty new to me and honestly not easy to adapt to whatsoever. I, for one, had to withdraw from classes because the situation at home has made it very difficult to focus or remember about taking digital classes. My name is Diya Qazeili Moushahwar, I'm a sophomore at BMCC receiving TAP, Pell, and paying out of pocket.

I work as an ASAP tutor so I luckily have gotten to keep that job but the workload and homework has gotten very overwhelming. I'm doing more labor now in the pandemic than I was before. I am very privileged to still have my job.

Next year I will be at Hunter College. Pell and TAP are not covering all of my tuition and I am waiting to hear back from Hunter as to if they will provide a transfer scholarship for me. Another \$320 for school is money that could go to my rent, my health insurance, my bills, my groceries. When your annual income is below the poverty line, every dollar counts.

My name is Kathy Velasquez, this is my second year at BMCC and I receive TAP.

This pandemic has been really bad, I'm not able to walk down the stage for graduation or even experience my real last semester. Although class is taking place online it doesn't feel like I'm in school.

It isn't fair to raise tuition at all, especially because of what is going on now. Personally I'm not sure if this is going to affect me but I know it will affect other Cuny students in a negative way.

My name is Bola Ghaly, I'm a freshman at CSI receiving TAP, Pell and excelsior.

This pandemic has made me more disciplined and organized.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition because I don't think that it's fair for students to pay that much extra and it might cause more people to drop out of college.

My name is Maria Perez y Gonzalez, I've spent 28 years as a faculty member at Brooklyn College and graduated from John Jay College: Class of 1987.

COVID-19 has created an isolating situation and made stressors that were unthought of before this for both students and faculty. It has hit our students of color even more so due to the inequities they experienced before this crisis hit in terms of socioeconomic indicators and even immigration status. For students who are parents, this was exacerbated because they have to also educate their kids from home while taking classes from home.

Raising tuition would be a devastating blow to students' ability to have to pay an increase during a time when so many of our students and their family members are unable to work/have lost their jobs due to COVID-19. This would have a particularly catastrophic impact on students of color as these communities have been the hardest hit in terms of infection and deaths. Our students need degrees to be able to achieve their goals in the near future and this would be another obstacle mounted upon the numerous others this virus has already imposed upon them.

My name is Lucas Agudelo, I'm a student at BMCC on the GI bill.

I've had to adapt to an online world with classes being taught all virtual. My days are monotonous and this quarantine is very boring. School work is becoming tedious and my motivation waning.

Raising tuition does not have an effect on me. But I'm the lucky few. Others are not. They pay out of pocket. With little form of income now due to the pandemic, how are they to pay this new increase fee? The teachers are moving everything online and are doing an amazing job teaching classes that were many times meant for personal and in person interaction. Is this new hike to

pay them? I doubt it. Since we aren't going into campus and or using facilities, how are you justified in raising tuition? For who? Who is this money going to?

My name is Peter Damour, I'm a senior at Queens College and I pay out of pocket.

I'm not in the correct head space to do any work. Financially I can't even afford school. Every student should be granted a pass grade for this semester. Students have jobs. Students are parents. Some Students are essential workers.

A tuition hike makes it worse for current students. Students are already stressed out and dealing with so much. For me personally, not only do I need to figure out how I will pay for school but the stress to academically succeed also weighs heavily on me.

My name is Imam H Mihan, I'm a senior at CCNY and I rely on TAP, Pell, and out of pocket payments.

I have lost my job. Currently facing a very tough situation due to the pandemic.

I can barely pay my tuition fees next semester. I have no idea what I will do if I don't get my job back. Increasing the tuition will only add to my sufferings.

My name is Viktorija Molodecka, I'm a senior at CCNY. I used to be on FAFSA but because the civil engineering degree ALWAYS takes more than 4 years, most of my Pell ran out and I'm starting to pay out of pocket.

I do not learn well at home. I need the college campus to get away from my home life and be in a productive learning environment. Being at home for quarantine canceled a lot of labs and in person tutoring which takes away even more from my educational enrichment. Not to mention there are no club activities going on anymore so I'm really only getting the bare minimum from my tuition! I can't go to campus infirmary, I can't use the tech labs or borrow laptops because I

live 2 hours away on public transport which isn't safe to use given the risks of living with elders. We should be having decreased tuition if anything!

Starting to pay out of pocket really puts financial strain on my low income household. Having to pay more while traditional work hours are cut is extremely difficult and unfair given my quality of education has gotten worse. If the college needs more money, it should be provided by the government or donation, not from the expense of the students. The reason a lot of students are in CUNY schools is because of lowered tuition relative to private schools and we can manage paying and working at the same time but that dynamic gets blown off with the pandemic and raising tuition is unfair and hard to manage.

My name is Loaiza Rivera, I'm a senior at CCNY and need to take out loans.

Things were bad before - they are inexplicable now.

The quality of CUNY is beyond subpar. I wouldn't mind paying more tuition but the quality that we are already receiving is despicable. If you need examples, look at Bard High School Early College at 525 East Houston Street for ideas on what an affordable, quality college education looks like. Until then, stfu on tuition hikes - or make the cuts where they are needed: the salaries of school presidents like Boudreau at CCNY and the salaries of other overpaid staff throughout CUNY.

My name is Ashley Sheppard, I'm a junior at Hunter paying out of pocket.

I haven't been not able to get the hand on experience in my production classes.

I won't be able to afford to go to school when tuition is raised. Since the pandemic I haven't been able to work. I haven't even finished paying for the spring semester.

My name is Abby Annaccone, I'm a freshman at CCNY and I rely on Pell and loans.

I was made to leave the state when we were kicked out of dorms and commuting to work became too impractical.

My dad lost two jobs because of this pandemic, and I was prevented from starting a position that took me a year to find. We were already struggling to afford for me to go to school before the pandemic, and raising tuition would only worsen that burden, especially now that 2/3 of the people chipping in are unemployed.

My name is Ariana, I'm a 2019 graduate from CCNY.

Many students have to work to pay for their tuition/support themselves, which is difficult enough in itself. Increasing tuition when the economy is so bad, many people are out of jobs, are sick, and are caring for loved ones is incredibly insensitive. Students are doing more independent learning now than ever and those with children and loved ones have even more pressure beyond their education (caretakers, educating their children remotely, elderly being moved from nursing homes, coping alone). Thus, increasing tuition can be detrimental to these students completing their degrees. Please have compassion, especially during this crisis.

My name is Swathi Mettela and I am a Maculay Honors Alumni.

CUNY is supposed to support students in getting an education and our student body is much poorer and includes more POC than another other institution in our state. We have a responsibility to aid these students so that they are able to make it through this difficult time.

My name is Pulkit Singla, I graduated from CCNY in 2019.

Students should not be forced to pay more especially now. People already do not have money. I am a CCNY graduate from 2019.

My name is Cindy Chee and I'm a CUNY alumni.

Many members of families are losing their jobs because of the pandemic. As times are tough, people are trying to survive off what they have saved up while they were working. Most CUNY students have part time jobs. However, many of those jobs have been taken away due to restrictions and quarantine. With economic hardships already in place, increasing tuition will add more financial uncertainties.

My name is Sammy Ahmed, I'll graduate from Hunter in 2023 when I receive TAP.

I have to be in online classes, when I paid for in person meetings. I shouldn't have to pay more for the same services.

My name is Chantal Garrido, this is my 4th year at CCNY and I receive Tap and Pell.

Studio classes have become remote. Architecture program feels very different.

If my tap and pell can't cover it, I can't pay for tuition and it'll be my fifth year transferring within the school in my first year. I can't work to cover the amount because I am already saving up for my last year of college.

My name is Judy Sanchez, I'm a third year at CCNY and I pay out of pocket.

I've had no interaction with people and no job opportunities.

We can't raise tuition because there are no jobs available as they used to.

My name is Isaac Corniel, I'm a sophomore at CCNY and I pay for college through tap, excelsior, loans, and out of pocket payments.

Things have been harsh for me during this pandemic, the BoT shouldn't raise tuition because it's not fair because students already have to deal with college tuition, exams, essays, and assignments. Furthermore, they have to pay for transportation such as the subway and train.

My name is Nada Elsayed, I'm a junior at CCNY on TAP and Pell grants.

It's hard to get work done from home as an architecture student going to the studio was essential to focus and get work done. I'm now unemployed and don't know when I'll have a job again. In addition, classes aren't fully successful being taught virtually.

The increase is simply unnecessary especially under today's circumstances, people are barely affording a living with the coronavirus pandemic. Also nothing has improved in the CUNY's system for them to increase tuition. What we pay is already a lot looking at the experience we get.

My name is Belisa Byberi, this is my third year at CCNy and my family supports me for college.

My family owns a small business and has had these hard times since it closed. We all are having financial issues.

These hard times should lower our tuition. \$360 is food for the entire month for us. We can not afford paying extra especially these days that business and jobs are closed. This is a world pandemic and during this time school should be lowered. We are not using the campus facilities so I see no reason to raise the tuition.

My name is Alix Salomon, this is my second year at CCNY and I'm on TAP.

The coronavirus pandemic has deprived me of my already paid resources at my CUNY campus. It has made it extremely difficult for me to obtain just learning experience. It has made me wary of the effect that adjusting to this learning mechanism will have on my future GPA.

As an architecture student, the constant demand for students to purchase their own materials are high. Whether it is wood, acrylic, or foam board that we're using, the amount of materials and tools that is required is excessive and very expensive. This pandemic has prevented many families from receiving any source of income. Raising tuition means taking advantage of the students and their families who are not able to afford it.

My name is Georgette Clarke, I graduated from Hunter in 1997 and I paid for college with grants and out of pocket payments.

Students lack access to campus resources, family loss and economic hardship. Many students who attend public colleges already struggle financially. The pandemic just worsened their plight.

This crisis has devastated every student and faculty member financially, academically and emotionally. To raise tuition at this time, would destroy the lives and future of all stakeholders! It would be the equivalent of shooting someone who is already dying from stab wounds!

My name is Anamaria Jovel, this is my third year at CCNY and I pay out of pocket for tuition.

I am forced to attend classes online, many of which do not work well without collaboration or material and workspace, such as my Studio and Ceramics courses. Now I must worry about internet at home with both of my siblings now home as well and my parents working from home. Now I have multiple responsibilities outside of school because I must also help my family deal with this new reality by cooking, cleaning and caring for our pets while balancing school work which hasn't been adjusted to this pandemic. I spend my days worrying for my dad who is an essential worker, and spend nights up trying to complete work I couldn't in the day because of my other chores now that I am home. I was forced to leave behind my belongings at the dorms because they were taken by the state, and still don't have specifics of where and how they were moved. It has become much harder to handle my workload now through this pandemic.

Raising tuition in this time will only ensure multiple students cannot afford to return to school. For my family we are struggling to get necessities in this time because my brother, sister and I returned so suddenly home and were suddenly in need of supplies in order to achieve our school and work responsibilities. This Pandemic, it changed everything. The quality of the education has diminished dramatically. Furthermore, I am lost with the courses provided online because of a lack of support like one on one tutoring sessions.

My name is Irene Boso, I'm a senior at Hunter College receiving TAP, Pell, and loans.

I have become financially during this pandemic unstable and higher tuition will cause more issues for me.

During this pandemic, my family does not have money to help me pay for college now, if there is an increase in tuition I will not be able to continue my education. I will then have to choose between school or pay for bills.

My name is Diana Ferreira, I graduate from Hunter in May and get financial aid through Tap and Pell.

I feel like remote learning isn't as effective. I'm not paying attention in my classes, professors keep assigning more work, and I feel like I'm not learning anything. On the upside, it's convenient to do classes from the comfort of my home.

Tuition already increases by \$100 a year and there will for sure be a recession after this pandemic is over, so to increase it to \$320 is absurd. Many people have lost their jobs and they can not afford basic necessities and bills, let alone a tuition hike. In case the Board of Trustees doesn't know, the cost of tuition is one of the main reasons why people drop out of college - they simply can't afford it. As a graduating senior this semester, I believe it's selfish to raise tuition \$320 to all my underclassmen friends and teammates that struggle to pay tuition as it is.

My name is Shania, this is my third year at Hunter right now I'm on Tap, excelsior, BUT next semester, out of pocket due to poor spring classes during COVID-19 pandemic.

Remote classes are overwhelmingly poor, and not worth the original cost. You are unable to learn at the same capacity. Also access to campus is pointless with mandated social distancing. Library access might as well not exist.

Raising tuition will make it harder for me to attend classes in the Fall. Every penny counts, and if classes continue to be remote, or fears over COVID-19 continue into the Fall semester, I doubt my educational experience would justify a tuition hike. Furthermore, many family members have unfortunately contracted Covid-19 and only some made it through and that takes a toll on my family and the extended. It is all chaotic and personally my experience is a lot harder. And I am sure I am

speaking for all of my family and a majority of students, faculty, and everyone outside of an educational institution.

I am lucky enough to have my tuition paid by the Macaulay Honors College. But I still pay for CUNY fees and textbooks, unlimited metrocards, unlimited Long Island railroad cards, groceries, personal items, etc. So I can not imagine adding another \$320 to my CUNY fees. I dorm and I had to move back upstate. Also, the quality of learning is nowhere near the quality of in person learning.

I live in a single parent household and paying for school is a struggle as is, even with the help we get from the aids listed above. A tuition increase for the next academic year, especially given that millions of Americans are losing/have lost their jobs, would put more strain on our financial situation.

My name is QinYan Chen, I'm a freshman at Hunter receiving tap, pell and excelsior.

So much extra work. Learning is difficult in classes that require hands on activity. Teachers are trying their best to calmly do things but the workload is ridiculous. My life for the past few

weeks has just been “oh there’s a pandemic going on haha yea no one in your family can work you’re running out of money. FAST. The mortgage? Food? Bills? Phone and internet? Pftthahaha good luck with that. But you know what don’t worry that 10-12 page paper is still due actually even sooner than before. 2 papers a week, long discussion boards all due on Thursday. Oh and that book you were struggling with? Yea read it in 2 weeks on top of books from the other classes THEN write 2 papers on it. Then repeat for all the other books until the end of the semester. As an officer of the Scholarship & Welfare Fund of the Alumni Association of Hunter College we will find it extremely difficult to continue to aid as many students this year as we have been able to help in the past. Every year as tuition goes up we find we can help fewer students, and often at lower levels of aid.

My name is Imam H Mihan, I'm a senior at CCNY and I rely on Tap, loans and out of pocket payments.

I have lost my job. Currently facing a very tough situation due to the pandemic. I can barely pay my tuition fees next semester. I have no idea what I will do if I don't get my job back. Increasing the tuition will only add to my sufferings

My name is Isabel Laus, I'm a freshman at Macaulay Honors which covers my tuition along with out of pocket payments.

Personally, raising the tuition would not be detrimental for me, but it would be terrible. We should not be paying more for education and should be accessible. Raising the tuition would make it less accessible for hundreds of people, and this is completely unjust.

My name is Danyel Marie Felder, I'm a freshman at Hunter I receive Tap, Excelsior and make out of pocket payments.

I was kicked out of the dorm building and now returned to my home state. Online learning is not effective and overwhelming. Professors are piling up the work and it's hard to retain info.

Given our circumstances, we should be given financial relief. It's ridiculous that they would use this time in which many are facing financial hardship to make more money. I already take out loans.

My name is Say Sanchez. I'm an upper junior at Hunter paying out of pocket.

Classes have moved online and have become more difficult to manage, especially with exams (I live with 5 other people). My father, who pays for my tuition out of pocket, lost his job a few weeks ago, which makes tuition payments extremely difficult (I have about 2 left).

\$320 is far too much for families who have been affected by lost wages — it is extremely unnecessary during this time, and will make access to an education more difficult for thousands of students. CUNY should be doing everything in its' power to make classes accessible for its' students during this time of need — to hike the tuition now of all times shows the CUNY systems' money-hungry intentions and how little it cares for its' students. My name is Amit Charran and I'm a senior from queens. I get financial aid and whatever financial aid does not cover I pay the rest myself.

My classes are terrible. I get so much work and I barely have time for myself. I am stressing out about so many things and a harder work load is making my time so much worse.

They should not raise tuition because it put so much unneeded stress to people. Especially with the current time, people do not need more stress. Especially since some people might have lost someone right now.

My name is Wilbert Disla, I'm a freshman at CCNY and although I'm an excelsior I still have out of pocket payments.

Distance learning has severely diminished the learning capacity of classes.

A person like me who is on excelsior isn't guaranteed each semester it is hard because of next semester I don't get excelsior I will have to pay the whole thing out of pocket and I have 5 siblings who all also lay for school and it will be more difficult on me and my family. Please don't raise the tuition price.

My name is Alexa Abbatiello, I'm a junior at CCNY taking out loans.

Just like every other college student in the world, I am no longer able to attend my classes in person, and I am now forced to get my education online. Learning from my professors via Blackboard Collaborate and Zoom has not been easy. This transition to online learning comes with technical difficulties with WiFi connections, lagging audio, and broken video cameras that we do not have to deal with face to face education.

I personally believe it is unfair for the Board of Trustees to raise our tuition during a global pandemic. College students pay for the experience of learning from their professors in person on a college campus, where they can take advantage of many services and programs available to them. If we as students can not use those services and programs available on campus, I believe we shouldn't be paying for them, let alone paying more than we did before.

My name is Stephanie. I'm a senior from City Tech on Tap, Pell and Liana.

Things have not been clear when signing up for the future semester. Raising tuition will affect us a lot, most of us even with help can't barely afford it now imagine if it goes up.

My name is Erica Kreisberg, I'm a junior at CCNY set to graduate next year. I pay out of pocket with some merit scholarship and aid from TAP.

I have had labs classes cancelled with lackluster teaching online to make up for it. Professors who try but not enough to understand their students' struggles to complete their work on time and studying for exams. Exams that put more pressure on students by having a computer camera on the student the entire time in a feeble attempt to prevent cheating while raising anxiety tenfold. How can I concentrate, focus, or learn with all of this?

A tuition hike is uncalled for, for many people including myself, it's hard to stay motivated for class online as well as not getting the on campus resources that are paid for through tuition.

Without access to those resources why should we be paying for them. Online access has been established and tuition for this type of schooling should not increase.

Online classes have made it harder to focus. People's incomes have been affected and it wouldn't be fair to raise it now that there is great uncertainty if we'll even have in person classes next semester.

My name is Jaspreet, I'm a 2nd year at City Tech on Tap.

I've been having financial difficulties due to this crisis and raising tuition will affect me personally because I haven't been to work and it's really hard.

My name is Ravonie Sidbury, I'm a first year at City Tech making out of pocket payments and receiving Tap.

Class is currently at home making it more hectic because professors now have to cram more work into a shorter turn in time.

My mom is an essential worker and not my father, I live with both and there's obviously a dent in income considering one parent can work and not the other, especially since my dad makes more money than my mom.

My name is Urusa Shafi, I'm a senior at City Tech and I pay out of pocket.

Due to lock down my campus is closed and I have to take online classes. The online class experience is so overwhelming that I feel like crying during lecture. Sometimes there are

technical issues and sometimes the professor isn't willing to cooperate. Also the online class timings are half of on campus class time. I feel like I wasted my tuition.

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My name is Kianna, I'm a freshman from City Tech and I rely on Tap.

I was more focused in a classroom than I was at home. They shouldn't raise the rate of our tuition because some people are already struggling with the tuition now.

My name is Abdulmatin Akindele, I'm a junior at City Tech on Tap.

I've lost my job and I lost my income. Increasing tuition would make it harder for me to pay tuition and that would increase my debt.

My name is Asha Bissoondial, I'm a senior at Queens College and I pay out of pocket.

The pandemic has changed every aspect of my life including school. Classes are now weirdly formatted and it has made it very hard to learn. Since the coronavirus I have been struggling in school.

A tuition hike is not fair, especially during a pandemic. We are already being robbed of time in the classroom, as it's being replaced with a powerpoint slide show. Schools aren't giving us enough that would justify increasing the prices.

My name is Max von Schmeling, I'm a junior at Queens and I'm on excelsior and pay out of pocket.

As I am a transfer student and this is my first year at Queens college, I feel like the corona virus has stopped me from getting the full Queens college experience. Also, being a junior and a transfer student, I have to rush to build relationships with professors in order to ensure that I have letters of recommendation for applying to graduate programs, or access to important internship opportunities. I haven't been able to use any on campus facilities, haven't been able to do work as quick as I use to and the online school was hard to transition to. I haven't had any access to the libraries and that severely impacted my studies. I understand that the libraries are open however, as a student that has a severe case of eczema it would not be a good choice to go out.

I feel like the board of trustees should not be raising our tuition by \$320. My family is paying out of pocket for my tuition, and during the lock down my family had to spend way more money they usually do on groceries and utility bills. Some consequences of this pandemic are death and unemployment. After this pandemic, the economy will be bad, many will be unemployed and the prices will increase. I do believe that the tuition will increase one day however the timing to increase it right now is unjust.

My name is Eman Ahmad, I'm a first year and Brooklyn College and I'm on excelsior and pay out of pocket.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected me in that I can't go outside at all. I'm currently not working but still getting paid as of now due to my job. My college has closed down like many others and we have moved to online courses which can be both beneficial and harmful.

The board of trustees should not raise the tuition for college students because most students are struggling enough as it is with paying tuition especially during this time of the virus. Many students have dropped out since they're out of work and can't afford their education, if the tuition increases then many more students will also drop out causing the rate of dropouts to increase. Personally I only have Excelsior to depend on, the rest comes out of my pocket so raising the tuition would add much more stress upon me and my family.

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My name is Jean-Michel Mutore, I'm a second year at Brooklyn College and I pay out of pocket.

I cannot take classes or study on my campus. Considering how this is my first semester at CUNY, the stay-at-home orders have severely limited my opportunities to make friends and join communities here. My productivity and attention span have reduced because of the crisis.

CUNY should not be raising its tuition while most of its students will likely be suffering economic hardship as a result of the covid pandemic. How will students be expected to pay even more for school with less opportunity for income? I pay for my education out of my own pocket and I have enough financial worries without having to worry about school again.

My name is Samantha Major, I graduated from City Tech in december of 2019.

As an alum I believe a tuition raise of \$320 is unjust and should be stopped. The reason being is that many people are suffering from financial difficulties at the moment. Raising the tuition will only add to more hardship for many people. Tuition hike shouldn't be raised during such times, especially when many people are experiencing loss of loved ones.

My name is Karin, I'm a junior at brooklyn college on TAP.

Neither of my parents are working and I'm not working either. I am a full time student and there is no source of income for me and my family right now. With rising tuition, I fear that it will become unaffordable and that I will have to drop out without a diploma and choose a different career that I am unprepared for.

It wouldn't be fair because many people who aren't front line workers or educators are either temporarily laid off or unemployed. The rise in tuition would make it harder for me to keep attending college given the fact that the only source of revenue for my family is unemployment

benefits. If tuition keeps rising, many students would be unable to attend college or take desperate and unhealthy measures to do so.

My name is Ilona Struzik, I'll graduate from 2023 from Brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

I went back to college to get my bachelors degree. I enjoyed being on campus, lectures, and taking advantage of all the school's resources especially the library and gym. I never wanted to attend school online, which is cheaper. It is very difficult to focus on assignments and lectures during these stressful times. Everyone I know is suffering financially and increasing tuition in such a subpar college learning environment is unacceptable.

I am no longer able to work my part time job and ineligible for unemployment. My husband is the only one able to work and he works an incredibly stressful job as an emergency room doctor. It's difficult to focus at home and the education I'm receiving online does not compare at all to an on-campus education, especially since there's a lot of self-teaching being done (for science labs) and some doing lectures via non interactive platforms and are slow to answering emails. I don't blame them, they must be overwhelmed as well and having to learn to teach online for the first time. It's unfair to ask students that already are suffering financially due to covid to pay more for tuition, especially since we are not on campus and can't enjoy all the available facilities. There's other schools that are only online that are cheaper than CUNY.

My name is Raisa Karim, I'm a junior at Hunter on TAP, Pell, and FAFSA.

Coronavirus pandemic has affected my learning experience because we are shifting to a completely remote system. The learning experience is a bit more difficult and I need to put in more effort to understand and work on things rather than have classes on campus. As Senate Chair of USG, I have been spending many hours assuaging the academic concerns of many students and making sure they get the support they need to finish the semester safely and strongly.

We shouldn't raise tuition by \$320 because I pay for my own education. I also contribute to the family and since I will not be working for one month (until my summer program commences) it would create a lapse in my budget. I will not be able to pay for books and supplies. Furthermore

as Senate Chair in USG, I represent the voices and concerns of others struggling to make ends meet.

My name is Mayar Safwat, I'm a 3rd year junior at Hunter, taking out loans.

This pandemic has been depriving me of my hand on lab experience and classes that are truly not meant to be taught online. Every dollar counts especially in this time of need. My family has lost their jobs and we are struggling to go on and live day by day. We lost loved ones and it is truly just a difficult time.

My name is Maisa Ahmad, I'll graduate from Hunter next year, I'm on excelsior and make out of pocket payments.

I'm stressed out all the time and I feel so overwhelmed by every class. Because we don't have to show up in person anymore, we're getting more work. And as a junior in computer science, the electives I'm taking require I learn new languages. It's so hard to program in new languages and absolutely no one to go to for help or a second pair of eyes. Even in the work field they need multiple people to check your program so I don't know why I'm expected to do this while isolated. I'm not even getting refunds for the services I pay for like technology fees and spiking up tuition is just selfish at this point knowing many of us are out of work.

Many of us could barely pay tuition to begin with. I've lost summer opportunities and I can't imagine what it's like for people who are doing worse off and had to work part time. No matter what you're background is, we are all struggling right now. I've always been against the tuition spike considering we don't even get spaces to study and Hunter's elevators are always out of service, but now it's just plain evil.

My name is Patrick, I'm a senior at Hunter on Tap, Pell, and making out of pocket payments.

Online class is not the way to learn! Classes are meant to be in person, people and studies show that in person class are better and necessary.

My name is Klaire, I'm a junior at Hunter taking out loans.

I have to take online classes which I didn't sign up for a reason! This is the hardest time that any student will have to go through so to raise tuition during it would be cruel.

My name is Amanda Stalcup, I'm a senior at hunter college taking out loans and on Pell.

It's been more difficult to do work. 3 weeks basically off threw off the teachers and work. I don't feel like I've learned as much as I have when I was in class on campus.

With corona, this affects jobs and the loans I have to pay off. I was hoping to do an internship this summer, but with corona, it seems unlikely. My job is done from home now and i only work 1-3 hours a week now. It is already hard to make everything work with low funds, but to tack on another \$320 is hard on students like me who are pure loan and grant based in our payment. I came to hunter because of the reputation and the affordability. Please keep it that way.

My name is Alsatia Ragusa, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn College on financial aid and paying out of pocket.

Had to drop a class that was impossible to complete online. Lack of resources due to campus being closed. Laid off from my job, trouble paying tuition and rent.

It's absurd to expect students to afford a tuition increase next year after the vast majority have currently faced job loss due to the pandemic. It's immoral to proceed with tuition increases and if anything tuition should be waived for this semester and the rest of the academic year.

My name is Carmilia Fontaine, I'm a junior at City Tech on Tap, Pell, and making out of pocket payments.

Due to losing my job , it has affected me a lot. Since I'm a part time student, I can't get financial aid and the residency department has charged me. Even though I sent my residency paper to lift off the balance.

It shouldn't because not everyone can get financial aid, Pell grant or have a job to pay out of pocket.

My name is Rikayla Davson, I'm a first year at City Tech paying out of pocket.

I've experienced multiple deaths in my family and family friends because of COVID and I'm struggling to teach myself also the workload has increased tremendously. This is my first semester and there is no session for some classes, just to submit assignments and discussion questions. I am sometimes kicked out of class because of my internet or I cannot join. I am stressed and losing motivation as my learning experience is limited.

Many people have been deemed nonessential workers and have no means of paying tuition. My father was one of them and I currently have an unpaid balance. I don't know if I will be able to attend next semester but instead to get a job.

My name is Robert Holmes, senior at city tech paying out of pocket.

It's been hard to schedule with online availability. I'm worried and distracted because of the deaths and experiencing Family and financial strains.

Raising tuition can take away from needed rent and food money.

My name is Shennelle St Clair, I graduate from Queensborough next year and I'm on TAP and Pell.

Online learning has been a challenge for me because it is not conducive with my learning style. I require extra assistance from teachers and utilize some of the learning centers on campus but with Covid-19 making this no longer an option it is tougher for me to stay on top of my work and

assignments. Having to do work from home is also another challenge because of the distractions that present itself when all the members of the house are present. It is easier for me to become distracted or fall behind on assignments without the structure and distraction free environments that are available on campus.

Tuition hikes during this time will create a barrier to people becoming college educated because many people are losing their jobs or experiencing other forms of financial instability due to not being able to work.

My name is Kelly Chan Ng, I'm a junior at City Tech. I'm in TAP, SEEK, and paying out of pocket.

This has affected my classes and I paid a lot of tuition that was only to meet in zoom. My parents, including me, are now unemployed due to the coronavirus. If The Board raises our tuition by \$320, we cannot afford it anymore.

My name is Arsela Mallick, I'm a student at Baruch who pays out of pocket.

This has changed the dynamic and emphasis on my classes. The motivation to focus, study, and be productive during and after class has shifted. It is hard to take classes seriously during such a crazy time in the world, where our health, which should be our first priority, is at such risk. I have family members/relatives that have been afflicted with this disease, and live in an area where the virus is heavily concentrated. These worries make it difficult to give the same attention to school as before.

This tuition hike is completely unnecessary. The rise in health and wellness fees, which is supposed to be more heavily focused on mental health, will only make things tougher for those that need these services. These fees will do more harm than good to many CUNY students, so it should not be implemented.

My name is Gazi Ohi, I graduate from Hunter next year and I'm on Tap and Pell.

I've had poor focus on online studying.

They should not increase our tuition this year because first, a lot of services are being withheld due to coronavirus. Second, this will negatively affect me as these costs are an additional burden on our family's loans (receiving less aid as more cost is taken). This is unjust and because of our situation, it should at least be held back another year or so.

My name is Katie Qiu, I'm a freshman at Baruch on TAP.

This has made it harder to get my assignments done and I miss going to my club. I'm currently unemployed right now and have no source of income.

My name is Tianna, I'm an upper junior at Brooklyn on tap.

Going from in person classes to fully online classes. It kind of disrupts things as I learn better in person.

A tuition hike during this time is unjust because there are so many CUNY students who pay out of pocket for classes and they struggle to do so. Raising tuition in a time where people are out of jobs and struggling to take care of family plus now having to worry about paying for school is outrageous.

My name is Alex, I'm a freshman from brooklyn college, I'm on TAP, Pell, Presidential Scholarship, and make out of pocket payments.

Though distance learning is the safest route, it can be overwhelming with inconsistency in some schedules that conflict with needs at home.

A tuition hike is pointless unless adjunct faculty get more money. They deserve higher pay. And it's ridiculous to raise the price of tuition when many are unemployed or furloughed during the crisis.

My name is Darya Stepanova, I'm a freshman from Brooklyn on fafsa and tap.

My education quality became worse. Is not the same to have online classes and learn as much as in person classes. Half of my professors don't really care and don't even respond. I don't like it.

I think it is unfair to raise tuition because a lot of people are suffering right now and it would take a long time to recover from it. It is not okay to raise tuition unless it would improve our education quality.

My name is Irene Suarez, I graduate from Hunter next year, I'm on TAP, excelsior, receiving scholarships and making out of pocket payments.

It has hindered my ability to obtain all the experience I need to become a teacher. I have been able to work on my classes and complete my work on time (because staff has been accommodating). It has been partially hard since I have close family members who are sick and I am no longer working.

I am currently obtaining three forms of awards and I'm paying the fees out of pocket. If the tuition were to be raised I would also have to pay the difference out of pocket. I have so far been able to not need any loans and am grateful for that opportunity and know this tuition hike will create an even worse situation for other families. It would change my financial situation slightly, but the tuition has been rising every year and the overall outcome has made a great difference from when I first attended this college.

My name is Mohammad Islam, I graduate from CCNY in 2023 I'm on fafsa and making out of pocket payments.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected my CUNY experience by not allowing me to attend in-class lectures that I have paid for. I do not have access to the resources covered (library, easy laptop borrowing, printing, etc). Although it has been inevitable, the last thing CUNY should be doing is raising tuition at a time where a lot of us or our parents have lost their jobs.

Our tuition should not be raised by \$320 because in the past, students have not reaped any benefit by raising tuition. If anything, the quality of our schools have been deteriorating. Our classes are overfilled and understaffed. We do not have the proper counseling to guide us post-graduation. This proposed hike is NOT addressing these critical issues.

My name is Pooja Suganthan, I graduate from Hunter in 2023, on TAP and making out of pocket payments.

I think the pandemic may put a financial strain on my parents so I don't want my tuition to be a burden to them.

Students have to worry about adjusting to online school and their own personal matters (hoping that their family is safe and healthy). A lot of us have family members who are essential workers. We can't increase the burden on students during a crisis.

My name is Liam Elkins, I'm a first year at Hunter in the macaulay program.

The way we interact with professors and the larger hunter community have been meaningfully altered. The relationships I wanted to re enforce at CUNY have become more difficult to maintain due to the effects of the ongoing pandemic.

I'm currently on scholarship that will cover tuition so it will not affect me directly. It's still a slap in the face for many students who will be forced to pay for these tuition hikes especially in such a time of heightened financial insecurity.

My name is Lorena Gonzalez, I'm a senior at queens on the pell grant.

The most impactful effect that the pandemic has had on my CUNY experience is kicking me out of where I live. Although it was not forcibly enforced, the Summit Apartments at Queens College told all residents that have homes that they have to go home. I was given less than 24 hours to pack all of my things and completely move out. I had to stay with my roommate's aunt for 4 days until I could go back home. I saved up a lot of money to afford on-campus housing

because I have no family in New York and thought it would be safer to live on-campus. My CUNY experience would have been much better if it were not for the coronavirus pandemic, and although I know that the virus is out of people's control, raising tuition is controllable.

I urge the CUNY Board of Trustees to not raise tuition, especially when the majority of students cannot even afford it as it is now. A \$320 tuition increase is crazy to think about when tuition was once free. I believe it should not be raised because most CUNY students, including me, are low income and cannot afford it. Most students work minimum wage jobs since we obviously do not have our degrees yet, with many other responsibilities to attend to besides being full-time students. We are not getting our money's worth because the already limited resources are getting cut back. The increase affects me personally because it creates an obstacle for me to receive my Bachelors degree.

My name is Jack Peterson, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn paying out of pocket.

This pandemic hasn't really affected my education, but I am out of a job.

It is entirely ridiculous to punish students for the advent of a loss of money by the wealthy organization that is CUNY.

My name is Eleni Katounis, I'm a junior at Hunter College I'm on financial aid and taking out scholarships.

The Covid 19 Pandemic has really negatively affected my experience, making it impossible to complete work in a proper school environment. Additionally, due to the lack of proper preparation time, some of my professors have not been the best at making contact whether that is responding to my emails or sending out assignments and announcements as a whole. Overall, its very difficult and stressful to try to do school work at home especially when I sometimes don't even know what to do.

A lot of students attend CUNY colleges due to the affordability of the school. For me personally, the only colleges I considered when applying was CUNY, as I knew I could not afford any other colleges and would be in severe debt otherwise. If the tuition is raised I am not sure if I will be able to attend, and especially when I'm so close to concluding my school year, it feels like an

additional hit to me, as not only now do I need to worry about perhaps losing my scholarship due to the hardships the Virus has caused on my learning, but now I also need to worry about where I will be able to get the money needed to pay for a tuition hike that seems completely tone deaf for the time. Especially with so many people getting laid off, even people within my family of people who already work for low wages, it feels incredibly poorly timed.

My name is Faisal Tariq, I'm a junior at city tech and I pay out of pocket.

I can't work so I can't pay for my college tuition because I'm not a citizen.

Because I'm an Uber driver and I can't work because of this pandemic it will be really hard for me.

My name is Maria Ramirez, I'm a senior at baruch and I pay out of pocket.

It has made it difficult to learn, and resources are limited to just being online. We have no way of using books, computers, or anything that the campus offers to facilitate our studies. It is difficult to not stress about school when we have no immediate way to communicate with the professors.

It is very unjust. Not only do we not have a proper classroom to be taught at and we can't even use resources professors provide, books are expensive. Calculators and other tools are expensive. Things add up, and most of us are unemployed. Everything is either shut down or slowed down to even get loans. We would have no way to pay if we pay out of pocket like I do.

My name is Sanaa, this is my first year at Brooklyn College and I'm on the Excelsior scholarship.

I am unmotivated to do work without going to campus. Some professors are overloading us with work without communication with us.

Increasing the tuition is not worth it because they rarely ever make improvements to the campus & we are in very harsh times. It's absurd to think that they are asking for MORE MONEY in a time like this. So irrational.

My name is Nesa, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn on FAFSA.

It's hard to focus without face to face learning. The workload seems much more online than it was in person. It's hard to feel motivated to do work when there's other things to worry about while being an essential worker.

Many people are unable to afford tuition as it is now and raising it again is unacceptable. If the tuition goes up I won't be able to help my mom pay rent since most of my minimum wage money will go towards paying for my transit, commute, food, and books.

My name is Richard Lee Chong, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn on tap, pell and financial aid.

Classes have been converted online. Raising tuition will make entering college harder in general and especially with the lack of payment from work and economic decline.

My name is Abigail Thomas, this is my 2nd year at City Tech. For my tuition I use Tap, Pell, ACCESS-VR, with the remainder out of pocket.

The Pandemic has affected my studies by way of accessibility. CUNY has yet to deploy a uniform accessible platform or set of platforms for all Campuses and Classes. This is very problematic. Also it affects my learning disabilities. Since I am learning disabled I really thrive on highly organized projects and set goals. Ordered structured environments. But without uniformity I have not seen a place where this is successfully applied. This makes it difficult for me to organize projects and set goals. Which is a huge amount for taking and passing classes. The fact I am not the only one experiencing these problems. CUNY has the means and the technology to accomplish this at little or no additional costs means the system is failing for a lack of effort.

Right now the tuition is too high as it is. But that's a discussion for future reference. As it stands there is a reasonable amount of money in the state budget too. Students like myself are already stretched to the maximum with budgetary concerns.

CUNY is a public institution which is supposed to make its services financially and equitably available to all. Yet with hikes like this CUNY largely putting itself out of step and outreach or most students. Putting it on or below par with private systems such as Columbia or NYU. It would not make sense at any point, but especially now for CUNY to raise their tuition. CUNY has substantially lowered its use of physical resources while greatly leveraging this against the amount of personal resources (pens, paper, electricity, ETC) each student must spend on in order for the students to learn at home. So by definition the fact CUNY has leveraged a great amount of savings through student expenses is a hike in financial hardship alone. It's a lot harder to work from home, especially when you have technical issues. Professors have no control over it. I'm not sure how I will do this semester due to the many complications.

Many students are already struggling to pay their tuition. Raising the tuition will only make it harder for them. \$320 is a lot more for a student and will negatively affect them financially and academically.

My name is Ashley Suarez, I'm a current junior at Brooklyn College on the Excelsior scholarship.

My grandpa is in the hospital so my mind has not been on school work at all.

The higher tuition is the more I have to pay out of pocket and this pandemic took a toll on my pockets.

My name is Jenny, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn on TAP and FAFSA.

All of my classes are online. I no longer use any campus resources especially since there's been a few cases at Brooklyn College.

My family no longer has an income and our expenses have increased dramatically due to this outbreak. In a time where we're all trying to make ends meet, it would be unreasonable to raise our tuition. Increasing the tuition would only impact my family negatively.

My name is Fathima Begum, I'm a third year at Hunter on TAP and Pell.

My fieldwork in the classroom is canceled and is substituted with watching videos which is nothing like the real experience I should be getting. All my classes are now online and rely on my highly unreliable Wi-Fi access, with teachers who are not all realistically readjusting the workload in their syllabi. If I wanted online classes would have signed up for those from the beginning, while I understand the need for distance learning it has been difficult and not my preferred or easiest learning method. Also, I think CUNY should have handled the shift better, handing out laptops to the students during the first week we had off. Cutting down our spring break was demoralizing too even if it was moved around. It was something students were looking forward to even if it would have to be spent indoors.

I'm a student dependent on my parents who both can not work anymore during the pandemic. I have a sister who is also attending a CUNY school and is also reliant on our parents for our tuition. Neither of us is willing to get a job right now or anytime soon in case we possibly get sick with COVID-19 and infect our parents who are susceptible to it.

My name is Teresa Rodriguez, I'm a senior at Brooklyn College on Tap and Pell.

Online classes have been hectic and chaotic. Students are not getting stimulus checks, students are still asked to pay in full [tuition, housing etc.] without employment, or possibility of it.

My name is Stephen DeMeo, I'm a faculty member at Hunter College.

Courses are online; extremely unsatisfying experience. Education is about building relationships and it is much more difficult to do so with technologies like Zoom.

It should be obvious; many families and students don't have money available to them due to the virus outbreak. Education is already an economic burden, why would you increase that burden.

My name is Liz vanunu, I'm an upper junior at Brooklyn College relying on my own money.

All learning has moved to online which makes it really difficult to focus. I lost all motivation and excitement towards school, which is not CUNY's fault but effected how I view school. It's overwhelming and sad what is going on right now and by cuny raising prices they are not making it any easier.

I am unemployed at the moment while I pay for my own school tuition on a below minimum wage salary which limits me from affording essential resources that I need for my health. All the money I make I save up for school which is not much and leaves me no money on the side to use to take care of my family. By raising the prices I will be stuck Without money. We are all going through Really hard times now and lots of Students are facing unemployment. I'm sure I'm not the only student who won't be able to afford tuition. Please don't raise tuition anymore, we are all struggling.

My name is Jie Zou, I'm a lower senior at Brooklyn paying out of pocket.

Classes are moved online and reduce interaction between students and lecturers. School life is cut down. Some activities like gym and ball games with classmates and friends are limited.

It is not fair to increase tuition in such specific circumstances because students like me currently lose the job, and I still need to pay the house rent and food. I understand people are all suffering now and it is reasonable for school to move classes online, however, it is so different when everything needs to be done home including in person communication, class participation and

more. Additionally, I understand that schools put a lot of effort to push class online, they may spend tons of money in building better web flows and enhance better user experience, but as a student, the most important thing is to keep the way of studying, if students like me or my other friends who already stress out in financial issue are in a high chance to drop from school. As a result, I think raising tuition now or next semester is unfair to students who try to go through this. School should give us more time to overcome all such mess.

My name is Caitlin Kwong, I'm a junior at Brooklyn College paying out of pocket.

We have all classes online now, which makes the lack of face-to-face interaction all the more apparent. In addition, many of my classes' assignments have been shifted to not include presentation or even ignored now. Finally, I worry that even when we go back to campus, the dynamics of just being in contact with other people will change because I want to protect myself as well as others.

I understand that tuition will inevitably rise, but more than usual students may be unable to afford it. Many have been laid off or even lost their jobs, so more immediate concerns like rent or food take priority than affording college—especially at a time like this. I may have been able to pay tuition, but others are likely less fortunate. This is evident by the fact that some were unable to afford their own laptops even before this pandemic.

My name is Anna, I'm a sophomore at Baruch on Tap and FAFSA.

I can no longer go to campus. It is difficult to access resources that would've been easily found on campus. It is also difficult to find a professor/staff for help in a faster way.

It's hard for my family to earn income during this time period. A tuition hike during this time is clearly unjust when we're already having trouble coping. Personally, the increase will affect me and my family negatively.

My name is Danilo, I'm a senior and brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

I already lost one of my two jobs. Raising tuition will limit the amount of classes I will take, I'm full time with 4 classes, \$320 more will limit or affect my food supplies ,my transportation, and it could affect us the students by not being able to buy books, especially those in science majors due to having to pay \$320 more in tuition instead of using it for buying the books for their classes.

My name is Nana Dei Sakyi, I'm a student at City Tech.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected me. I will like to go back to school but I can't even go back to the campus to readmit myself and that has left in in a place that I don't know what I will do or when I can do anything.

The board shouldn't increase the tuition because we all are struggling to get through this difficult time. Personally I'm disappointed in the board if what they are thinking of doing is increasing tuition when people are losing lives and when they do not know when this pandemic will be over.

My name is Meggie Cheng, I'm a freshman in my second semester at Brooklyn and I am on TAP and the Pell Grant.

Campuses are closed so many of the services offered and included in tuition aren't available. With classes switched to online classes the experience is just not the same. Rather than learning things it just feels like a battle against time to complete assignments every day.

What difference would it make for students to pay \$320 more in tuition? If there are more useful services provided it could be justified. Also with the increase in tuition, it might not effect me as much because of financial aid but for people with less aid, it would mean they would have to pay more out of pocket expenses. These expenses are just a small part of their everyday lives where there are other circumstances they need to account for such as money for transportation, food, and rent.

My parents are out of work themselves right now so there is pressure on financial strain. Luckily we're managing to get by but unforeseen price hikes will inevitably take a toll on our budget and wellbeing. I can imagine many other families are dealing with the same situation.

My name is Yasmin, this is my 2nd year at Brooklyn College and I'm on Tap and Pell.

I am not retaining any information in class. My professors have not adapted to an online structure yet. How the fuck are you going to raise my tuition when the quality of my education has decreased significantly?

My name is Julie, I'm a first year at brooklyn on Tap and Pell.

It's very hard to communicate with Professors and fellow students. It became difficult to focus on completing assignments when my community is heavily affected by COVID. I want to do my best in class and for credit and it's becoming harder and harder.

A tuition hike is not what students need right now. People are out of jobs. As it is, so many students depend on financial aid programs and scholarships to get them through college and it's not easy. A raise in tuition prices will make it even harder for students to attend college, especially those from lower income households.

My name is Brianna Gonzalez, I'm a freshman at brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

This pandemic has made it harder for me to keep up with payments and gain a proper understanding of the curriculum.

I started college with the savings I had, I had to work hard to make that amount since back in my country the currency is so devalued and our savings there are nothing if you live here... Now with the pandemic going on, I haven't been able to save money again. The pay I get from work is just enough so I can pay for college, rent and food.

My name is Aruna Parkash, I'm a third year at brooklyn on a payment plan and tap.

I've been experiencing financial issues, no income from both parents at the moment. We don't have enough money to save to pay for school and pay for other things, it's hard to make ends meet with this virus and school. Especially if a loved one has it.

My name is Erturk Turan, I'm a junior at brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

I have been fired from my job and get unemployment now which is enough to cover my rent and expenses but not enough to finance my education. School is only one of my bills. I still have to pay for rent/ electricity/ food/ phone/ WiFi/ and my pets and personal expenditures. We already struggle to afford tuition, why raise it?

My name is David Grande, this is my first year at Hunter and I rely on FAFSA.

I have no job. I lack the motivation to continue with my studies. It is impossible to take school work seriously when there is so much happening in the world right now.

CUNY was meant to be an affordable college for students who want to better themselves. I have great pride being a first gen college student but if the tuition rises I will be ineligible to get a

degree. NYC is impossible to inhabit as well as make money and save money. Do not let us down.

My name is Sofia Khavin, I'm a junior at Brooklyn. I rely on TAP, Pell, and loans.

Poor quality of education. No access to resources. No access to libraries and student clinics. No adequate internet access. Inferior quality applications that connect students with professors - they keep freezing, sound is distorted, etc.

With so many students losing their jobs, tuition hikes would be unimaginable. Students already forfeited all the resources they paid for in the Spring 2020 semester. Why do we have to pay more for less? Pandemic affected everybody. Financial aid is cut drastically for 2020-2021. This means more loans and more work for students with already heavy financial situations and busy schedules. Do not raise tuition!!

I already go through enough with trying to hassle the financial aid office to pay my tuition as is, this would be too much of a hassle for them. After a certain amount, TAP has to come in and sometimes I still end up paying money out of pocket. This would be too much of a financial and mental strain on me.

My name is Fakhrya Ahmed, I'm a freshman at CCNY in the excelsior program.

Online classes are just hectic. I cannot learn as well as I do on campus. Also, assignments are all due on the same day and it just collides with everything. Not everyone has access to online schooling and that has affected our grades. Especially during this crisis everyone is going through something and professors need to understand.

Parents are not working. Students may not be working as well. Not enough money to be giving money.

My name is Aeshah Mughal, I'm a freshman at CSI and I rely on TAP and FAFSA.

It's made it very hard to study and focus. Everything is all over the place. We're not in the same "education zone" we were when we were on campus.

Students should not be worrying about tuition raise. It's time to be around family. Many people have lost their jobs and will not be able to pay for their tuition for the next year. Raising tuition will only make it more difficult for all of us. Raising the tuition will make no difference. We're still gonna have small rooms, packed classrooms etc.

My name is Sarah Farr, I'm a student at Hunter paying out of pocket.

I am an essential worker and I am a full time graduate student dealing with the covid crisis.

I believe that the Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition by \$320 because of the pandemic. Many students have lost their jobs. They still have a balance in their accounts. The increase will affect me personally by having to take extra shifts at work to pay it in full.

My name is Sophia Chan, I'm a freshman at Brooklyn College and I rely on Tap, Pell and FAFSA in general.

Online classes have been hard to adapt to and frustrating to do online. There is an element of learning that is unique to physical classroom-type classes that can't be found in online learning. While some of my professors eased up and tried their best to make classes less difficult, others started piling on the assignments as if to compensate for the lack of in-class work. Whereas previously I believed I could contact my professors after class if I had any kind of difficulty, I now only have one way to ask questions - send emails and cross my fingers that they will see it and respond.

As a college student in a three-child family, where my older brother is also in college - in the CUNY system as well - and my younger sister will be attending soon, our family is already financially strained when it comes to supporting us. Fortunately, due to our situation, FAFSA covers tuition and gives a little bit back to me. The money I get from FAFSA is money that I rely on to focus on my schoolwork and activities that would contribute to my academic career, like internships, instead of wasting away long shifts at a minimum-wage part-time job. I voluntarily gave up the opportunities to go to private universities or dorms on campus in exchange for the significantly more stable financial situation that FAFSA aid for CUNYs would leave my family in. As a public institution, how can CUNY raise tuition significantly every year, knowing the strain that it will put on its students, many of whom choose to learn there BECAUSE of its affordability? It is understandable that public institutions also need to make money to support themselves. If I saw improvements on my home campus and that money was going toward the general wellbeing of staff and students, I could reluctantly part with that extra money. But what I don't understand is how adjuncts can still be underpaid, how our campus buildings can still frequently report leaky sinks and broken water fountains, WiFi shortages, insufficient chairs in classrooms... the list goes on. I don't even see the food at the cafeteria getting better. So where is our money going?

The transition process was fairly easy for me because my program is online. The cost of living in New York City is very high and many students can't afford an increase in tuition. There is a lack of food and financial security among students along with daily living costs that make it challenging to afford an increase in tuition.

I'm not able to pay for classes to apply next semester and I still have to pay full price even though the semester is completely shifted course.

Increasing tuition will make life more stressful affecting the amount of time I'm going to have to work. More working means I'll be less focused on school.

My name is Kristie, I'll graduate from the CUNY School of Professional Studies in 2021 or 2022 and I'm on financial aid and pay out of pocket.

It's been a challenge having to work, have children, sick family, and coursework in my space, and mind 24/7.

It's a slap in the face to raise tuition in general let alone during a pandemic. Given that we are in NYC and should set a standard for affordable or free college. The agenda to take more money from us is oppressive at best. We are out of jobs or if we are working from home, we are feeding the family around the clock, standing in lines for basic supplies, people are dying but tuition hikes are what's on the minds of those in charge.

My name is Christelle, this is my third year at brooklyn and I pay out of pocket.

I will not be able to graduate at the intended date due to Covid. I am a student that pays the full tuition out of pocket. The last three years have been stressful and if the tuition were to be raised I

would be able to afford classes. All of the time, effort and money that I put in would be for nothing.

My name is Taina, I'm a 1st year grad student who pays out of pocket.

School online is not the same. I am not paying for the same quality as in person.

I am not able to work the way I usually do. It would not be fair to increase the cost of tuition when many cannot pay for school in a regular year. The tuition should be CUT not increased.

My name is Sidra, this is my 1st year at kingborough in the ASAP program.

I still need help with work, there's just no point to raising tuition.

My name is Shereeza Ali, this is my 3rd year at Queens college and i pay for school via TAP and Pell.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected my CUNY experience in multiple ways. First of all, when you need help with something, there is no way you can see the actual person which sucks. Second of all, knowing that everything is online now, you must keep track of everything you need to take care of. Finally, there is no way a person could see their friends except via video chat.

I believe that the Board of Trustees shouldn't raise our tuition by \$320 because this seems unfair and plus the students are not able to go to school so instead of them raising it they should lower it. This will affect me personally because even though one of my parents is working and the other is not the money is still not enough.

My name is Jenny Chu, I'm a sophomore at Baruch and I'm on FAFSA plus making out of pocket payments.

The pandemic affected my CUNY experience in numerous ways. One being that it is more difficult to communicate with professors and classmates. Second would be the reduction in networking and club activities. Third would be that the resources that we were given prior to the pandemic have been reduced, such as computer labs, printing and the textbooks from the library.

This affects me personally since the majority of my tuition are paid out of pocket and without a job I won't be able to pay it.

I have to study and work at home. Any paperwork must be submitted through email. I have to use zoom as well and it is uncomfortable.

Honestly, students already have a hard time gathering money to save for themselves. I also feel as though if this increases now there is going to be more in the future. The faculty also wants what is best for students as well.

My name is Sylvia Welch, I'm a sophomore at Hunter and I pay out of pocket now but next semester the Bluhm scholarship will pay for it.

I've lost almost all interest in my academics. Some of my professors have increased homework load to compensate for loss of class time, which has added stress to my other classes, as well as home life. Most of my professors have enacted asynchronous learning, which has led me to have to teach myself all the material. During normal times this would be difficult, but adding this stress during the time of a pandemic is inhumane. I specifically did not take online classes

because I enjoy being in a classroom setting. The home environment is distracting and nearly impossible to learn in.

While I personally would not be affected by the \$320 tuition increase because my scholarship will cover it, I believe it is inhumane. We should not have to pay more for sub-par online classes. We are a public state school made for accessible education, and raising tuition limits accessibility. Students are particularly hurting during this time, as college-aged adults do not qualify for any government check.

My name is Ginikachukwu Egonu, I'm a freshman at Queens on FAFSA.

The Coronavirus has affected my CUNY experience by forcing all students to transition to online schooling which is much harder. Financially, it's also tougher because I lost my part-time job and my parents are working much less in comparison to before the Coronavirus. It has become harder to focus especially since my grandmother has recently tested positive for Coronavirus.

The hike will make it incredibly harder to pay the tuition. With the current tuition I have to pay, it's already hard to afford. In addition to that, not only myself, but many students have parents that are now out of work or work significantly less.

My name is Ashley Marie Villacis, I'm a junior at Hunter and I pay out of pocket, barely receive any aid.

I am directly affected by covid. I cannot focus, I cannot think. I paid for in person classes, not online. I should not be paying the price of in person classes.

Now I'm not sure how I will pay that off before fall registration, I'm afraid I will be forced to take a year off in order to pay my debt before the hold on my account gets taken off. I sincerely hope everyone in charge of CUNY listens to the financial hardships the majority, if not all, their students are facing. This pandemic has long term/very real consequences and tuition cannot be raised, it would simply be cruel and unjust.

I cannot afford to pay this shitty school \$320 more dollars. My whole life is in the air, please take this into consideration.

My name is Christian Chavez, I'm a sophomore at Hunter relying on Pell, TAP, and CD.

We have to be subjected to less than adequate lectures and forced to adapt to however the professor decides to teach the course. Classes are meant to teach students in order to pursue their career, not diminish it to a letter grade. We need to have classes of the same caliber and quality to match the amount that we are paying for.

Minority students like myself already have to work twice as hard to get half as far. Being a first generation student, I am the first and only person in my immediate family to go to college. We barely were making ends meet before the pandemic. My mother and I were removed from our previous home and we now live in a single room. Any amount impacts us.

My name is Jaime Weida, I'm a faculty at BMCC.

I have had to switch to distance learning, which I have never done before and with which I am still struggling. My teaching experience and, consequently, my students' learning experience is being negatively affected. I have had multiple students contact me because they are very nervous and overwhelmed during this precarious time. I have students who have sick relatives, may be sick themselves, are money- and home-insecure, and who are in the front lines of the

medical profession. They are struggling even more than I am right now and doing their best to complete their classes on top of everything else.

I am a tenured faculty member at BMCC. The tuition raise will affect me personally because it will affect my students personally. No one knows what is going to happen, and many of my students who have been furloughed or let go from their jobs may not be able to return to work by fall 2020. BMCC has a large population of lower-income and working-class students, as well as black and brown students. These are all demographics that have been disproportionately negatively affected by the coronavirus and its effects. The very last thing my students need right now is a tuition hike on top of everything else with which they are struggling.

Students are being taken away from their jobs and let alone trying to take care of themselves and other family members. Raising it would just make it worse for everyone who pays for school and is already stressing. It's like adding another bill that would be hard to pay for.

My name is Bhuvani Sukwah, this is my 1st year at BMCC and I pay out of pocket.

This pandemic has turned my life over. I can't afford to pay my tuition this semester and I'm more of a visual learner and it is so hard to not be face to face with my professor!

I can't afford now when they raised it how will I? Makes no sense we are struggling as we speak.

My name is Shadman Kazi, I'm a junior at CCNY and I pay out of pocket.

Online instruction is not the same as in person.

My name is Gia Love, this is my 2nd year in BMCC on Tap and Pell.

My name is Dominic Manzolillo, I'm a freshman at BMCC in ASAP.

The Board shouldn't raise tuition because my family can't afford that. Coronavirus has already put a strain on finances. We can't keep up

My name is Gabriela Zelaya, I'm a freshman at BMCC and I pay out of pocket.

I was furloughed and I had to pay the rest of my tuition from my savings - I am not sure how I will be able to afford the fall semester if my job doesn't open back up.

New York is already extremely expensive - the schools have plenty of money and frankly this is just about being greedy. Our tuition payments do not get used properly because if it did, we would have nicer classrooms, better teachers and more technology enhanced courses. On top of that, why should we pay more if our classes will allegedly be online now? We are basically teaching ourselves because some of these teachers are extremely incompetent. We should be paying half of the tuition now that COVID-19 has impacted us this way.

My name is Mohima Bahar, I'm a senior at Brooklyn relying on Tap and Pell.

It has affected my learning and it is overwhelming.

Many of my classes with labs have had to be rearranged because we don't have the ability to do them. Some of my classes have been turned into reading PowerPoints my professors have uploaded on blackboard. Many of the classes I am paying full price for I am barely getting an experience out of.

Raising tuition will put the burden of CUNY's issues on its students and not the state. The state of New York should be the ones keeping CUNY a proper place for education, however they have failed to properly do that. New York state should be finding a way to pay off CUNY's problems not its students.

My name is Jesse, I'm a senior at Brooklyn. In the past I relied on TAP, Pell, currently I pay out of pocket.

It's very confusing working online. I think the Board shouldn't charge us more because we are already missing actual classes and have to online and also we still paid for these classes. They would we have to pay more next semester

My name is Sonam Lhaki, this is my 2nd year at Queens and I rely on Tap, Pell and SEEK.

For two of my classes I don't even have classes online just doing assignments. Two of my classes don't even have an actual class online so I paid the school money to do assignments?

My name is Mohamed osman, I'm a sophomore at Queensborough, and I'm in Pell.

I miss the classroom dynamic. Unemployment is about to reach historical highs unseen since the Great Depression. Canceling the tuition hike is a no brainer.

My name is Esther Jean, I'm a junior at queens and I rely on Pell and cash.

Distance learning makes studying and school work harder because I have to do it at night while everyone sleeps due to noise and housework influx.

We've just had a recent increase. It will completely shift my budget and since I have a child to take care of it's not conducive at all. I may not even be able to attend with all these increases.

My name is Ellen Stoyanov, I'm a junior at Queens. I have a Macaulay scholarship HOWEVER FAFSA and TAP pay for my education and if there is anything not covered or not enough from those places, then the scholarship pays

It's really difficult for me because I am an "in-person learner." I've never wanted to take online classes. I learn best in a classroom setting and this virtual education is killing me. My grades will certainly suffer, in addition to my motivation and focus which have both already suffered.

The tuition shouldn't be raised because I am European and I cannot believe that there are developed and successful countries in Europe that offer FREE undergraduate education for EVERYONE. Meanwhile New York offers a more "affordable" option but it is still a significant amount of money and there is always the worry of tuition hikes as it is now. \$320 is a solid amount of money - it can be used to buy textbooks for a semester.

I'm unable to get the hands-on experience with my professors.

My name is Katelyn Sharma, this is my 2nd year at BMCC and I'm on Pell.

My teachers aren't reaching out to me on my course dates, which inconveniences me with my daily life. Most professors also do not post up deadlines and are constantly changing the syllabus.

I believe that the Board of Trustees shouldn't raise the tuition because it makes it harder for people to be able to afford it. Also, I feel like this semester was not worth even paying the tuition because I am not learning anything.

My name is Tamanna Yar, I graduate from Queens this year and I take out a federal student loan.

I have not been able to work. It's hard to be instituted when we are not currently working and able to afford loans.

My name is Devani, I'm a senior at Queens and I rely on TAP, Pell, SEEK and out of pocket payments.

I am used to having in-person classes because it is my learning style of choice and that was taken away from me. One of my classes canceled lectures so I only learned half a semester's worth from that class. I also have to work even harder to stay on task.

We have already suffered enough loss this semester due to Covid-19 therefore it would be unfair to ask students to pay more. Most people like myself have also lost their job and therefore having to pay more for school is ridiculous. CUNY did not provide relief for all students therefore they shouldn't punish us more by increasing tuition.

My name is Yunmee Han, this is my 1st year as a grad student at queens and I pay out of pocket.

Distant learning is a great method to stop the spread of Covid19 but we lack many services we usually get when class is in person. We had a lot of classes got canceled and ended up pushing everyone to the edge.

I lost my job recently and am struggling to pay for next year's tuition. This is absurd given how CUNY is increasing \$320 more on tuition knowing that we will learn remotely!

My name is Natalie Papazian, I'm a second semester sophomore at Queens paying out of pocket.

I've had no help from academic advisors. It is very difficult for me to pay for school in full due to the lack of financial aid my family is given. Each year professional judgement for financial aid is pushed aside and forgotten and we receive nothing but loans. Both of my parents have little to no income ever since my mother had lost her job. An increase in tuition would just cause more stress and cause more damage to our diminishing savings as we hope we would get financial aid for the next semester.

My name is Giovanni Diaz, I'm a senior at Queens relying on tap, pell, and out of pocket payments.

We are all affected by this tremendously and you want to charge us more money? It's common sense why it is unjust. Most students in CUNY are in the middle class or lower. As usual we are the ones who constantly get the short end of the stick. I refuse to accept that. Make the state fund city colleges again and stop trying to take from your own people it's despicable.

My name is Emilee, I'm a senior at Queens. I have a university scholar full-tuition scholarship from Macaulay Honors College, private loans for room and board at the Summit.

Only one of my classes still meets live over Blackboard Collaborate. Two of my classes are email only at this point. Another class has discussion boards on Blackboard and recorded materials, but no live classes. I've almost completely lost the classroom experience I went to college for in the first place.

Let's put it this way: raising prices on just about anything in a time where people are dealing with the constant threat of a deadly virus, supply shortages, and mass unemployment should be a criminal offense. Many of us are barely getting by right now, and to add a tuition hike- even if it's "only" a few hundred dollars- can make or break someone's ability to continue going to school right now. This pandemic has caused millions to be out of a job. Raising tuition will affect students like me already struggling to pay for school while attending.

My name is Viviana Y Arias Canchari, this is my 4th year at queens college and I rely on TAP, Pell and out of pocket payments.

I've lost my job during this pandemic; raising tuition would make it unaffordable to study at college.

My name is Catherine M. Tassini and I'm a taxpayer.

In the middle of a pandemic when unemployment is at the highest rate since the Great Depression? Really?! Any missing funds should be coming out of the pockets of the board and president, not those of students and/or taxpayers.

My name is Gabrielle Williams, I'm a junior at Queens and I pay out of pocket.

I don't learn as much with online learning and I feel like some of my professors are not putting in as much effort when it comes to teaching because of what is going on. I pay out of pocket for my education and really want to learn as much as possible, despite what is going on. I have one class that assigns weekly 100 word responses for work and provides no lecture (that's all the work).

This year, I believe tuition was raised by \$200. Given the circumstances related to Covid-19, you're going to have a lot of students that won't be able to afford this drastic hike in tuition. I might not be able to return to school because I don't get any financial aid and this increase might not be possible for me. I have friends that I know will not be able to afford school after this. I stopped working since the virus arose. I don't receive financial aid. Since my major is commercial photography and we're not allowed to use the studio or photo lab I had to use my savings to buy supplies and equipment for my classes.

I don't get financial aid. This would affect me because I would have to be working a full time job and be a part time student but since COVID-19 I don't know if the company I work with will open again.

My name is Justin Toro, I'm a junior at Queens in excelsior.

My mother has the Coronavirus, so my daily life has been full of worry and stress for her safety. These online classes have negated my full potential in participating in the lecture, and I find the lack of social contact to be damaging to my psyche.

Raising the tuition fee would have dire consequences on people trying to attend college. People all around this country are struggling to make financial ends meet, and raising the tuition is only going to hurt us even more. My family is just trying to make it, but increasing the tuition will only take away the chance for people to obtain a higher education.

My name is Dalian, this is my 2nd year working at my masters degrees at Queens and I take out loans.

I feel no motivation to complete my work. I'm also frustrated that I'm being charged full semester tuition even though I didn't pay for online class.

I'm already struggling to pay tuition, I can't afford to pay more.

My name is Abigail Gobin, I'm a senior at Queens receiving financial aid.

School is a bit more challenging now that it's online.

Raising tuition isn't fair because financial aid doesn't cover majority of the tuition and the rest has to come out of pocket while now we are out of a job.

My name is Neha Syeda, I'm a sophomore at Brooklyn receiving tap and pell.

Our classes have moved online. The resources available at school are difficult to access

Tuition is already unbearably high and it takes a toll on a lot of students. It will be difficult for me personally to be able to pay tuition.

My name is Pawanpreet Kaur. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I am fearful I will not graduate with correct requirements. Has made getting work done more difficult. Classes are all online and I'm not able to learn the same way I did while being in school.

Also, a lot of professors have added extremely to already dense workloads because they believe students to just be at home with plenty of free time.

People are losing so much money right now. By raising tuition, some people might not be able to afford to return to school. I am going to have to take out a bigger loan to afford it, which puts me in more debt.

My name is Alyssa Gomez. I am a freshman at The Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with Tap, Pell, and out of pocket.

My mental health has become worse. My classes are more difficult and there is not enough support

The thought of a tuition hike during record-high levels of unemployment is DISGUSTING. We are not currently received the education or services we paid for and I am ashamed by the response of CUNY.

My name is Emma stephens. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I have been receiving an EXTREMELY POOR education during this pandemic. I have been essentially instructed to TEACH MYSELF as my professors barely can manage remote learning because CUNY DOES NOT HAVE REMOTE INFRASTRUCTURE. I paid for IN CLASS

COURSES AND I AM BEING FORCED TO TAKE ONLINE CLASSES AND STILL PAY. THIS IS UNACCEPTABLE! My grades have suffered. I was a 4.0 student and relied on the library so I could study and I don't have any resources at home to study.

There are mass layoffs and many people in NYC and the country are unable to work and pay their rent. How CUNY can justify raising tuition during a time of such extreme GLOBAL financial hardship is beyond me. The selfishness of CUNY is pathetic and so far from what the original founders of CUNY believed in. My name is Diana Barreto. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

My parents have not been able to work therefore they have not been making money. We don't qualify for government assistance so we don't get stimulus checks. Therefore we don't know how we're gonna afford tuition, especially if it's going to be raised more.

I pay out of pocket, but right now no one in my family is working because of the virus. We can barely afford the normal tuition let alone another \$320.

My name is Chelsy. I am a senior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with TAP, Pell, and out of pocket.

All zoom meetings and not sufficient information in some lectures.

My job is not very stable due to the virus and if it comes to the case where I have to pay out of pocket for tuition I will not be able to afford it. I am so close to graduating. I don't want my dreams of becoming a doctor to shatter.

My name is Andre Fraser. I am a graduate student at York College. I pay for college with loans and out of pocket.

Learning on the fly via video conferences has been a difficult adjustment. I find learning is more on the students rather than what the school is able to provide. This is a stressful time for everyone both emotionally and financially. Many people are going to have a hard time rebounding financially from this crisis. How can one afford an increase in tuition in addition to this.

My name is Jocelyn Wills. I am a faculty member at Brooklyn College.

It has increased my concern for our students.

I'm already taking out a loan with Excelsior because there's no guarantee I'm going to stay in NY. Increasing tuition is just putting more money stress on me and my family and as a student I'm not seeing the positive outcomes of the trustees raising tuition. Hunter is supposed to be an affordable school, but increasing tuition does not showcase that. I do not receive any refunds or pell grants or any type of financial support besides merit scholarships so its unfair I have to pay so much when it's not even clear how the increase in tuition is benefiting Hunter faculty/resources.

My students at City Tech were in online courses already but some of them have suffered great disruptions in their lives and routines as a result of the pandemic.

My students/future fellow alumni cannot afford any additional expenses now. CUNY should be free again!

My name is Emily Chu. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell and Tap.

Remote learning puts a different pressure on a student's ability to learn.

Professors have been giving us way more work, one pretty much is ignoring students and not doing live classes and we are not absorbing anything. I feel like I'm not really learning anything this semester.

I struggle to pay college as it is, I'm an international student and I already have to pay more. If tuition keeps raising I may not be able to finish school.

My name is Bipasha. I am a freshman at The City College of New York. I pay for college with FASFA and Tap.

Trouble paying bills because of the low income coming in as my parents are not able to work. I was a part time worker at a tutoring center now I have to income. My loved ones died and are in the hospital because of the virus.

This would be so unfair and would cause a lot of trouble for those that don't have high income. Rather they should do something to help us out. Low income students need more support and

even other students need money to survive.

My name is Nathaly Ardiles. I am a senior at The City College of New York. I pay for college out of pocket.

It's dramatically changed my life my professors are giving me more material than they would if I were in school. No professor is showing empathy during this stressful time. I also work in school and it's very difficult to do all these task online and remotely. No one is managing the professors of tracking how the learning is working remotely. Many students and I are very behind on the material and are very stressed for finals.

I pay out of pocket and the cost keeps going up for studies here. Especially after this pandemic CCNY should be giving us back money for the student fees we didn't get to use with the campus shutdown. I am an engineering student and my labs and classes are very hard to do remotely.

My name is Shirley Whitney. I am an alumni of Hunter College.

It would be economically counterproductive for this city. I attended Hunter tuition-free. We even borrowed from and returned textbooks to the college. I subsequently obtained a federal fellowship for. graduate study and have earned enough to pay significant taxes as well as contribute to the support of others who otherwise would have been dependent on the government for support. Over the years, there have been many such people. I am currently partially supporting two other households to the tune of \$1300/4-week period. I also contribute a significant percentage of my income to charities and work hard as a volunteer in a not-for-profit organization providing financial support to students.

In appreciation of the value of government services, I transition from the private sector worked for a lower salary so that I could contribute in human services areas that mattered to me.

Without that free education, it is unlikely that I could have achieved so much. It is not clear to me that I would have been able to go to college at all. New York makes a huge mistake by undercutting its colleges. We need skilled and well educated personnel to support the technical, financial, and real estate, and health care sectors.

My name is Brittany Muscat. I am a junior at The City College of New York. I pay for college with Tap, Pell and out of pocket.

Zoom classes have been a bit difficult to get used to but I'm still learning as I would have if I was on campus. I participate more via zoom then in person but at the same time I feel like it is hindering my ability to participate in person. Overall, I'm doing okay in my courses.

I'm currently unemployed and my father just lost his second job. My mother isn't working any longer due to the pandemic. This whole situation is going to make financial matters worse for everyone. Raising tuition is ridiculous at this time and shouldn't even be an idea. Everyone is suffering, millions and millions of Americans have lost their jobs and are filing for unemployment. If the country goes into a recession, this will have a huge impact on our lives.

My name is Pawanpreet Kaur. I am a senior at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Has made me fearful I will not graduate with correct requirements. Has made getting work done more difficult.

Board of trustees should not raise the tuition because CUNY schools are known to be affordable and for those people who come from almost nothing being able to become something. If CUNY raises their prices they are going to make it so much more difficult for students and families to afford an education—especially in a crisis like this one.

My name is Keniell Scott. I am a freshman at the College of Staten Island. I pay for college with Pell, ASAP and out of pocket.

The spread of the covid-19 virus has negatively affected my CUNY experience. It is already very difficult for me to concentrate, and distanced learning makes my situation much worse. I am the first in my family to attend college and this outbreak completely ruined my college experience.

I believe that raising the tuition is unjust because this outbreak has reached a point where it has affected many jobs, This mainly threatens minorities and people with no citizenship. Personally

speaking my mother used the 3 jobs, even then she couldn't afford to offer much help with my tuition. Now that she only works 2 jobs it has become nearly impossible.

My name is Angela Pan. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell and Tap.

I've stuck at home and unable to leave the house for 1 1/2 months. Job site is closed indefinitely. There is no income and there is worry about how to pay for necessities.

I will have to pay more for tuition which i do not believe my family can afford to pay per semester.

My name is Alexandra Perez. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college with Tap and Pell.

Distance Learning has been an adjustment to say the least. I know that the situation is dire, but I feel we are not getting the attention we deserve for these classes. Having to balance both school and home life is an adjustment.

It is not our fault this has happened and they should understand that a lot of students have lost their jobs and cannot afford to pay more money for school.

My name is Abdurrahman sultan. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell and Tap.

I am losing motivation in all of my classes. The transition to online classes has impacted my focus and the whole situation of uncertainty is just making matters worse. Engagement in my classes is not the same as a lot of students including myself have to help family members who have been affected. Our studies must be put on hold because we need to address more pressing matters like getting groceries for family.

They should not raise the tuition at all because students are already struggling to make ends meet as well as their families. For my case I would most likely have to spend more money out of my own pocket. Having only a single parent working in my household especially during these times

when work is scarce puts a huge strain on our finances and we must make sacrifices.

I am unemployed, my mom is undocumented, the little money we have saved up is for bills and food. I feel anxious and a raise will only affect us all.

Remote learning is not the same as in person learning. We don't have access to facilities, It's not fair!

My name is Samantha Schuler. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

Moved to online learning with classes that are not live. More stress from the assignments and lack of communication from teachers. I've been kicked out of my dorm.

I will have to work more as it is coming out of pocket and right now I do not have the job I had for the past year.

My name is Jiaxin Santos. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with Pell.

Very confusing learning curriculum due to the changes needed to adjust to online learning. Having no income and worrying about classes next fall. Being socially isolated and having mental illness issues.

It is unfair to the entire student body to raise tuition while not only can the students not work but also their parents, of whom many depend on to support them through college, cannot work. Many college students are being left out from the federal stimulus package, leaving them already financially vulnerable, but they also are concerned about how they will continue their academic careers given the current uncertainty. Many of these students also deal with other issues like food insecurity and homelessness, and during this pandemic it is unfair to make a student prioritize paying this tuition hike in exchange for their well being and safety.

My name is May Chen. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with PELL.

I am not motivated to do anything these days and I feel like professors are creating extra work on purpose. I feel like I cannot even confront them about how my grades are or how they graded my report. My own family is not working and it is just a very confusing time right now.

I do not know why they would hike up tuition right now. No one has money to pay for school regardless of the increase of tuition. Also, why do we need to pay more for college when it is just online right now and we are using our own internet and resources to "go to" class. Also, there are other fees that cover services in school including the printing fee which we are no longer able to use anymore.

My name is Zaira Soto. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with PELL.

I lost my job, I'm couch surfing and struggling to keep up with school work. I really miss the library.

It leaves me with less financial aid refund which I use to get through tough times.

My name is Zhuohan Yang. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and PELL.

One of my instructors got ill. I feel like there is lesser communication in online education. I am unable to work on projects with friends.

The situation would most likely be like unchanged next semester. Financial hardships will continue to target most families. It is unfair to reach to the students for additional funds when situations are bad.

My name is Wen Zhen Li. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and PELL.

It has been difficult to keep motivated for school and to continue my studies. Participating academically has been limited. Internships and involvement in school affairs has been halted.

As a first generation student who comes from a low income background, it would put additional financial burden. I chose to go to a CUNY due to a limited budget for school and this would make it so much more difficult to continue working towards saving for grad school. The tuition has already raised significantly over the past few decades and it does not make sense to continue raising it.

My name is Karina Zheng. I am a freshman at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP and PELL.

I have to stay at home for online classes and in some of my classes there are technical difficulties with zoom. I attend classes regularly but sometimes because of the on and off scheduling with the breaks I forget to attend classes. My teachers are really accommodating when it comes to online classes, they are always there to help and offer other options in order for us to succeed in the classes.

It would affect me greatly because the cost of tuition is high already and being in a CUNY school it's supposed to be affordable for all. Raising the tuition means I need to pay extra money and I might have to end up taking less classes since I cannot afford \$320 per credit. I know a lot of other students who have multiple jobs just to pay off college debt and they aren't able to graduate on time because of this.

I definitely and I don't know what to expect for next semester. My teachers are trying their best.

Since my mom pays out of pocket for my two siblings and I it's ethically unfair to spike up the tuition cost during a time when money to live is needed and the ability to pay that spike is unaffordable.

My name is Daniel. I am a sophomore at Hunter College. I pay for college with loans.

No more physical classes, but Zoom sessions are better than expected. But, it's also the 1st semester in a long time.

Because there's a lot of people not working right now, and it doesn't help that people don't have enough funds either and then go back next semester with a price increase is just unfair.

My name is Monano Pierre-Paul. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with EXCELSIOR.

Out of work. A Lot of homework with incomprehensible professors. Need money to pay for summer classes.

Nobody is able to afford a tuition hike right now. Look outside!

My name is Ariel Cebelinski. I am a student at Hunter College. I pay for college out of pocket.

I am struggling in class because I am not used to an online platform. Some of my professors are having a hard time adjusting as well, with connectivity issues, and then other professors are not responding to any emails or concerns that I have. This is creating a lot of anxiety and uncertainty about my grades and the semester.

During these times, a raise in tuition would make it harder for those who have been hurt the most by the pandemic to pay for their education. The increase would make it harder for me to afford school, and I will have to sacrifice my school time and possibly grades in order to work and earn

enough money to pay off my tuition.

Even though I am lucky that I get financial aid, the majority of us have been laid off and don't have the means to pay for education. It's unfair that financial and economic situations are out of her hand yet we are still being punished.

My name is Mubarak Rahman. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP, Pell, and out of pocket.

All classes have gone to distance learning which was a difficult but doable adjustment. However one class was not adept into the transition and it seems to be because of the department's inability to transition smoothly too. Whether it's funding or not, that particular department and the professor are not able to facilitate the course before the lockdown.

It would help to see where the money would be spent one. Plus CUNY has more accessible tuition rates so by increasing it will price out some students.

The Corona virus has kept me from going to work and I would prefer to keep expenses to a minimum. Due to pre-existing conditions I cannot risk exposure to the outside world at this time. My name is Jessy Huerta. I am a freshman at The Borough of Manhattan Community College. I pay for college with TAP, ASAP, and Pell.

As a freshman, I enjoyed my time in college during the fall. I had hoped to finish the year on campus. In my opinion, I learn better in a classroom setting opposed to online. However, I managed to cope with the online classes.

The Board of Trustees shouldn't raise the tuition by \$320 because students already pay so much for college. As a student, I know that textbooks are expensive to cover. As well as, supplies needed for a class. The combined cost of textbooks, supplies and cost of classes is very expensive if one student doesn't have government help and is paying out of pocket. Adding more money will create more student debt which no one wants. Having to spend a lot of money is stressful and becomes a little distracting to the student. Not being able to cover tuition discourages students from attending college because of the expense needed. Having tuition raised will severely impact the amount I can contribute to my family.

I believe that increasing tuition is not fair at this time because the quality of our education has significantly decreased. We typically pay for onsite learning which is of a different quality of online learning, and online learning is very different and not what We signed up for, but what is necessary for our Health. I will still have to buy materials to be able to do work from home on top of tuition.

I have a very hard time concentrating at home, I usually would do all my work on campus and distant learning isn't really helping me learn anything. Also the resources that being on campus have (US) was somewhat essential to my school life and how good I was doing in my classes.

I currently pay for school out of pocket with no help from my parents, raising the tuition would just make things harder for me, along with other students as well. I had to take a semester off because I couldn't pay and I wouldn't want to have to do that again, forcing me to graduate even later than what I was originally intending. My name is Arlene Nguyen. I am a junior at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP, FAFSA, and SEEK.

Being a transfer and low-income student, the pandemic has affected my CUNY experience tremendously. I think our campuses are decent environments for students like me to do work as well as making friends. Due to the virus, I feel as though I'm only getting 25% of experience because Campus life is as important as academic life. It is already hard enough that our school's financial aid and bursar office has a bad reputation... trying to contact them during the virus is even worse than trying to get their attention in person. The services could be better.

My family is struggling to make ends meet and the tuition hike is not helping. CUNY being a public school system makes it different from private colleges and we deserve fixed tuition rates

because it gives everyone equal opportunity. Please hear our voices. CUNY. We can do better.

My name is Kaniz Hossain. I am a junior at Brooklyn College. I pay for college with PELL, TAP and out of pocket.

My classes have shifted to a remote learning style. As someone who is more of an interactive and visual learning, this changes the quality of education that I'm investing in. I now have to commit to school even more in the midst of a pandemic so that my grades won't drop horribly.

This increase affects me personally as I no longer receive TAP for most semesters. The amount that I would have to pay out of pocket will rise significantly and with limited income at the moment, it seems unfair for CUNY to profit off of students right now.

I am a nurse and single mother. Cannot complete courses- have to withdraw or get an extension.

We are facing huge economic uncertainty, many are already under huge financial strain and may already need to leave school. Tuition increases seem like an undue strain given the current economic situation.

I am at home 24/7. Teachers have increased workload. I'm not learning as much as I could be if I were to be physically in class.

I pay tuition out of pocket, the reason I chose this school is because it was cheaper than the others. My household has two kids in college. I also work to try to cover a bit of the tuition to help out, I don't want to be such a burden on my parents financially.

I'm a DACA student at Hunter transferred from Community College. My tuition fee has doubled and now I'm finding it more difficult to pay out of pocket for school.

I've lost a lot of pay and I have to stay home and help my parents maintain the house while I work on school. My mental health has also been affected.

It's unfair, our economic situation does not allow us to pay for these increases especially not at this time. This is a difficult time, and doing this would make the lives of students worse off.

My name is Fareena Samad. I am a student at Hunter College. I pay for college with TAP, PELL, and out of pocket.
