and myself in relation to requiring the Department of
Cultural Affairs to publish information on COVID-19
reopening plans and resources for art and cultural
institutions in New York City.

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Before I defer to Majority Leader Cumbo for a statement on her bill, I just want to say that I'm proud to Co-Sponsor the bill with her and thank her for her efforts and leadership on this and on all things culture and art in the city.

While in some ways our culturals never closed, as many of you know, the hard truth of the matter is that the city's art and cultural institutions were and have been and continue to be very effected among the first to close their doors through COVID-19 and some have reopened thankfully, but some will be among the last to reopen as museums recently excluded from Phase 4 reopening plans.

The past several months have left many of our cultural institutions in dire financial circumstances by risk of closing and in need of support.

This bill responds to the crisis directly by bringing access information and resources to the virtual doorsteps of many of them. But we are on a journey and must continue to remain vigil in

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supporting and defending the heart of our great city,
the arts and culture of our town.

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Before I ask Billy to call the roll for a vote, I will turn to the Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo to ask if she has a statement on the bill today.

JOHANNA CASTRO: Majority Leader Cumbo has logged off. She seemed to have audio issues. We can go into the vote and then circle back as soon as she logs on.

CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Okay, I can also take this moment to thank my Legislative Director Jack Bernatovicz, my Chief of Staff Matt Wallace, the Committee's Principal Financial Analyst Aliya Ali, our Policy Analyst Cristy Dwyer, and our Committee Counsel Brenda McKinney for all of their work on this legislation. And did that buy us any time to get Majority Leader Cumbo back on the call?

JOHANNA CASTRO: She is back.

CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Great. Majority Leader Cumbo, would you like to speak on your legislation?

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: Yes, I would, thank you so much Council Member Van Bramer. I am very excited to be here today and thank you so much for your patience. Today is a big day for young people and

COMMITTEE ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS, LIBRARIES, AND INTERNATIONAL INTERGROUP RELATIONS going back to daycare today. So, it's a little bit stressful.

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CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: You got this. You got this.

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: I got this. So, thank you to Chair Van Bramer for holding this hearing today and to Brenda McKinney from our legislative division, who is not only a talented hard working attorney with the Council but an inspiration to all working mothers, yes.

CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Amen.

COUNCIL MEMBER CUMBO: We have had to adjust to their new working environment and co-workers amidst a global pandemic. The cultural sector in New York City is one of the largest industries in the city which employs approximately 400,000 workers, pays over \$30 billion in wages per year and generates more than \$110 billion in economic activity. It does not stop there.

This industry is the driving force for our city's cultural tourism, restaurants, and hotel industries.

Our cultural institutions are not merely local attractions, they bring millions of patrons from continents across the globe. It is critical that we

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recognize their importance as we plan for the future.
When they suffer, our entire economy suffers as a
result.

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When cultural institutions closed their doors in March of 2020, the city's artists, actors, musicians, and freelancers suddenly found themselves unemployed and severed from their communities and livelihood.

They have lost billions of dollars in revenue and it is possible that some may never recover but we are here to help.

It is up to us to guide them down the road to recovery in order to restore their livelihoods.

However, as we begin to reopen our cultural institutions to visitors, we must approach the new normal with both cautious optimism and a commitment to proper planning, preparedness, and affective safety measures to prevent the resurgence of COVID-19 in our city.

As a cultural leader, prior to coming into the

New York City Council, it is so important to me that
we protect this sector and I know Council Member Van

Bramer and many of my colleagues share this
understanding of the importance of the cultural
sector to New York City and doing all that we can to

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protect it and our patrons who come to New York City

for the love of art, culture, music, dance,

photography, the history and everything that makes

New York City what it is today.

Thank you so much to my colleagues for your patience. Thank you to my Legislative Director Jason Hur, as well as my [INAUDIBLE 6:45]. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much
Majority Leader Cumbo for your statement and your
passion and love for all things culture and the arts
and we have deep appreciation for all that you are
doing, including on your way to daycare apparently
right now.
