SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you, Public Advocate James. Good afternoon everyone. We begin today on a tragic note. An Amtrak train carrying some of our Republican colleagues in Congress crashed into a truck this morning, and as of now, there has been one fatality, and though we may disagree on a lot with folks from the other side of the aisle, we are all friends and colleagues who are working to improve the lives of everyday Americans. Everyone in Washington is in our hearts, and I hope and pray for the safety of everyone involved in this tragic accident this morning, which took place in West Virginia. I would like to take a moment to acknowledge the passing of retired firefighter Ray Phillips, affectionately known and Gonzo, the first responder we lost over the weekend to a 9/11 related illness. Ray brought joy to everyone around him, playing the official Santa Claus at the FDNY Widows and Children's Holiday Party, and sharing stories of his favorite team, the New York Rangers. We will all remember Ray for his heroism, and my thoughts and prayers are with his family during this very

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2 difficult time. I also want to recognize the loss of 3 a civil rights trailblazer, a key player in 4 establishing racial justice, the Reverend Dr. Wyatt T. Walker. Dr. Walker served as Chief of Staff to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and served as the first 6 7 board chairman of the National Action Network whose 8 founder, my friend Dr. Al Sharpton announced his passing. We all have just celebrated the life and legacy of Dr. Martin King and thus the work of Dr. 10 11 Walker and the importance of his participation and 12 leadership in the Civil Rights Movement. And as we 13 approach Black History Month, we especially recognize 14 the impact African-American have had on our nation's 15 history especially Dr. Walker and, of course, Dr. King. My thoughts and prayers go out to the family 16 17 and friends of Dr. Walker, and let us please take a moment of silence in honor of the victims of this 18 19 morning's train crash, firefighter Phillips, and Dr.

While Mayor de Blasio has announced paid parental leave for city employees, I was disappointed to learn that it leaves out our police officers, our teachers, our principals, transit workers [bell] and civil servants, and I firmly believe we must provide all of our public employees with the same benefits we are now demanding of the private sector. I'll just skip to the end, which is just to say I hope that we have Paid Family Leve for all New Yorkers and, um, that our society begins to expect from its fathers that they'll take full paid paternity leave, and I can only lead by example joining my colleague Antonio Reynoso, who's currently on paternity leave. When the inspector went in there, the main staircase was in such disrepair that he had no choice but to vacate the building putting nearly 100 individuals from infants to their elderly into shelters. Even though Joseph Batesh (sp?) and other landlords like him is required to pay the fines and cure the problem, he has still reason to do quickly.

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2 Furthermore, every day those tenants are without a home. The city foots the bill to provide the 3 4 shelter. Intro 30 will require that the landlord pay his share by requiring the landlord to create an escrow account with HPD and pay at least 10% if the 6 7 rent roll into the account for the duration of the 8 vacate. We need to continue holding bad landlords like Patesh accountable for their action or in this case, inaction. We can no longer allow them to 10 11 displace their tenants on the taxpayers' dime. 12 urge my colleagues to sign onto Intro 30, and I thank 13 Council Member Cornegy, the Chair of our Housing and

Also, Intro 378. When we resurface our streets, it should be curb to curb. From some reason, the city of New York does not fix or repair curbs, which is a major safety hazard and risk particularly for our senior, and Intro 379, which would require communication between the Department of Transportation and utility companies. COUNCIL MEMBER CONSTANTINIDES: --call my colleagues' attention to two bills that I'm reintroducing today that will help expand-expand wind energy in New York City. We have a great solar map thanks to CUNY-to our friends at CUNY and others, but we don't have a good wind energy map. This would direct the city to create a map so we can map where good wind potential is so homeowners can look and see if wind energy is an opportunity for them to look for renewal sources. Our second bill Intro 50 would create basic standards for installation of wind turbines. Right now, if you want a wind turbine on your home, you have to go through the Department of Buildings and get a special permit, which is reinventing the wheel every single time. shouldn't be that way. So, this bill will create basic standards of-of color, of noise, how to install it, or how to uninstall it. How to make sure that during a hurricane it is secured and not being able to be blown away. But in setting these basic

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parameters, we're giving people a path to walk to
renewable energy to make sure they can get away from
fossil fuels and help us green our city and make it
more sustainable. So, I hope my colleagues will sign

on to both Intro 48 and Intro 50 today. Thank you.
