storm and we will never forget those. As we remember those we have lost, we must recommit ourselves to do all we can to help our waterfront communities that are still struggling to recover and we must do more to protect them from future hurricanes and extreme weather. Climate change is real, it is not going away. We have bill today that helps in the global fight again climate change and I look forward to working with my colleagues on other ways to tackle 10 this important issue. Before we dive into 11 12 Legislation, I want to acknowledge the death of Cecil Corbin Mark. He was instrumental in the Council's 13 Climate Agenda. Cecil was always making sure 14 15 environmental justice was top of mind in our work 16 together. He left behind an incredible legacy and our hearts go out to his loved ones. I also want to take 17 18 a moment to acknowledge the lives that we have lost to COVID-19, 23,980 New Yorkers have succumbed to the 19 impact of the virus as of yesterday. This is always 20 21 such a devastating number to think about and a tremendous loss for our entire City. This week the 2.2 2.3 United States reported a record of more than half a million COVID-19 cases. States across the country are 24 25 experiencing a massive surge in cases and it is a

painful reminder of how important it is to remain vigilant. The virus is far from over, it will not magically disappear. It is not a hoax and though many of us may have coronavirus fatique, that is a natural thing but it is not an excuse to stop wearing a mask or to stop socially distancing. Together we can save lives and we must do everything that we can to stop 8 the spread of this devastating virus. I would like for us to take a moment of silence to acknowledge the 10 lives of those that we've lost to COVID-19 and to the 11 passing of Cecil Corbin Mark. (brief silence). 13 Today, October 29th is Latina Equal Protection Day which is the day this year that Latin-X women 14 15 finally catch up to what the average white man has 16 earned in 2019. Let that sink in, it is almost November of 2020 and Latina women are just catching 17 18 up. Overall, women earn \$0.82 for a man's \$1 but that pay impacts black and Latina women the hardest. Latina 19 women earn \$0.55 for every \$1 earned by white non-20 21 Hispanic men. Black women earn \$0.62 for every \$1. We need to do better and that starts here in New York 2.2 2.3 City. The Council today, released a preliminary analysis of the City's payroll data that shows trouble 24 pay discrepancies among gender and race in our public 25

workforce. We are also getting access to more data and will do a deeper analysis in the coming months. This is the beginning of a long-term effort to seriously address these disparities once and for all. We have this data thanks to Local Law 18 which was sponsored by Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo and Council Member Daneek Miller which passed in 2018. This Law 8 requires the administration to annually issue payroll It forces us to lift the screen on pay 10 discrepancies in our City, we can't truly address this 12 inequity without regularly examining the numbers and 13 releasing them publically and I want to thank Majority Leader Cumbo and Council Member Miller for their 14 15 leadership on this issue. I also want to thank, CWA 16 Local 1180 whose fight for equal pay for their members, largely women and people of color, women of 17 18 colored, inspired this Legislation from a lawsuit that they filed. Special thanks to CWA President Gloria 19 Middleton who is helping us continue this fight for 20 21 all City workers, not just her members and I am proud 2.2 to say is a friend. And now, on to today's agenda. We 2.3 will be voting on the appointment of Kenseth Armstead as Painter Member and Deborah Marton as a Lay Member 24

Introduction 1339-A sponsored by Council 19 Member Diana Ayala will require the Department of 20 Social Services to provide written notice to CityFHEPS 21 rental assistance program applicants with information 2.2 about source of income discrimination at the time an 2.3 applicant receives a shopping letter from DSS and from 24 the staff I want to thank Amanta Killawan (SP?) for 25

her work on those Bills. Source of income discrimination or discrimination based on your source of income including rental assistance vouchers remains a barrier to too many New Yorkers seeking housing. Introduction 2082-A sponsored by Council Member Keith Powers will align the City's Human's Rights Law with recently enacted State Law Source of Income 8 discrimination provisions. Currently, prohibitions against discrimination in housing accommodations based 10 on lawful source of income currently do not apply to housing accommodations comprised of five or fewer 12 13 units. This Bill would repeal that exception. would also expand the definition of lawful source of 14 15 income to include all other types of lawful income 16 that low income New Yorkers may have access to, such as child support, alimony and other types of housing 17 18 assistance and I want to thank Balkes Murig (SP?) for her work on that Bill. Super Storm Sandy unscored the 19 dangers of extreme weather and the serious risks this 20 City is facing because of climate change. This is why 21 I am proud of the work the Council has done to lead in 2.2 2.3 the fight against climate change. In 2019, we passed a ground breaking Climate Mobilization Act which is 24 25 paving the way toward a serious reduction in

greenhouse gas emissions from buildings. Today, we are strengthening that Legislation. The time is now to take aggressive action to mitigation climate change not tomorrow. Introduction 1947-A sponsored by our Environmental Protection Chair Costa Constantinides will amend the definition of rent-regulated accommodations for purposes of compliance with Local 8 Law 97 of 2019. Under this law, buildings in which rent regulated units make up less than 35% of the 10 11 total units would be required to comply with Local Law 12 97s greenhouse gas emission limits. The mandate for 13 buildings in which rent regulated units make up 35% or more of the total units, would not be changed. 14 15 buildings are still required to complete a series of 16 low-cost prescriptive measures to increase energy efficiency. This bill would also provide a two-year 17 extension to newly covered buildings to comply with the first building emissions limits. 19 Introduction 2072-A sponsored by Council Member 20 21 Constantinides will require the City of New York to 2.2 submit a report to the Mayor and the City Council 2.3 detailing the outreach and education efforts to provide information about compliance, with the 24 25 greenhouse gas emission limits pursuant to Local Law

- 2 97 of 2019. The City would be required to report on
- 3 its outreach efforts about incentive program
- 4 opportunities and other sources of funding available
- 5 to buildings. This Bill would also require building
- 6 owners to report on the methods that they used to
- 7 comply with the greenhouse gas emission limits which
- 8 the City would report on to the Council and to the
- 9 Mayor and I want to thank Nicola Bend (SP?) for her
- 10 work on these really important but complicated bills
- 11 and congratulations Costa on this, I know you have
- 12 worked really hard on it. That is our agenda for

This change will primarily affect 13 the laws and rules under the Department of Health 14 and Mental Hygiene, Administration for Children 15 Services and the Human Resources Administration. 16 As New Yorkers, we pride ourselves on setting the 17 curve for other cities nationwide; however, on 18 this issue we have fallen woefully behind. 19 introduce this Legislation today fueled by the 20 belief that we can all do better and the 21 knowledge that what is better for New York City 2.2 has to begin within us as Municipal Leaders. The 2.3 city's continued use of mental retardation in law sends a message of derogatory language such as 24 this R slur is socially acceptable. It is not 25

and it has not been for quite some time now. By replacing this term with intellectual and developmental disability, we guarantee that the City is equipped to provide inclusive, compassionate, person for services to the New Yorkers that need them. I urge you to join me and our supporters in this campaign including a Center for Independence of the disabled New York, Harlem Independent Living Center, AHRC and the 504 Democratic Club in co-sponsoring this bill and to support its swift passage. We cannot leave our neighbors behind any longer, we need to embrace a new R word for all in our community and that is respect. Thank you.
