Thank 4 you. 5 SERGEANT POLITE: Back-up is ready. 6 Thank you and Sergeant WILLIAM MARTIN: 7 Polite if you would be able to start with your 8 opening statement. 9 SERGEANT POLITE: Thank you. Good 10 morning and welcome to the remote hearing on 11 Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Group 12 Relations. Will all Council Members and staff 13 please turn on their videos at this time. Thank you. 14 To minimize disruption please place all cell phones 15 and electronics to vibrate. Chair, we are ready to 16 begin. 17 CHAIR VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much. 18 Good morning everyone and welcome to today's 19 hearing. I'm Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer, Chair 20 of the Committee of Cultural Affairs, Libraries and 21 International Intergroup Relations, and we are now 22 in session. Today the committee will be voting on 23 two important bills, and I'm thrilled that we're 24 joined by the entire committee this morning, 25 Majority Leader Cumbo, Council Member Mark Gjonaj,

The first of the two bills is Intro 3 2034-A related to coordinating the use of open space 4 for arts and cultural programming sponsored by our 5 colleague Majority Leader Cumbo, and I'm proud to be 6 7 a co-sponsor of that legislation. Secondly, Intro 2068-A or Open Culture as we've been calling it, 8 which I'm proud to be the lead sponsor on as related 9 to a temporary use of outdoor space for artistic and 10 cultural events. Before I defer to Majority Leader 11 12 Cumbo for a statement on her bill, I just want to say that I would like to thank all of my colleagues 13 as well as the cultural community, the artists and 14 15 advocates for their tireless efforts and partnership 16 in responding to the crisis that our community's art 17 and cultural sector has been experiencing this year. 18 2020 has seen the worst pandemic in our lifetimes for sure, but as we all know while culturals have 19 never truly closed, the hard truth of the matter is 20 that the city's art and cultural institutions were 21 among the first to be forced to be close their doors 22 23 particularly for Coronavirus venues of all kinds, and it has been a difficult road. We've lost at 24 25 least 260,000 cultural sector jobs in the last nine

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 1 months. Just think about that for a second. They 2 need these bills to pass. The cultural community and 3 culturals are a major contributor not only to our 4 economy but to the heart and soul of the city. We 5 you think of the this city the iconic images and the 6 7 moments that New Yorkers come to value and remember it's often art and culture in communities in the 8 neighborhoods where they live, which brings the 9 greatest joy, culturals while being the life of our 10 city have been fighting resiliently to survive this 11 12 moment even with limited reopenings and performances that we've seen over the last several months, but 13 artists then use an institution many of which are 14 15 small businesses themselves, of course, are in dire 16 financial circumstances. Many have closed. Many more 17 are at risk of closing, and that's why it's so 18 important that we pass these bills today, and why we introduced Open Culture. Open Culture responds to 19 crisis directly by allowing eligible art and 20 cultural institutions and at-risk to be approved for 21 22 use of open space, and I just want to say that 2068-23 A is not just a cultural bill, it's s small business bill. It's a jobs creation bill. It's all of those 24 25 things in one creating a one-stop shop for expedited

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 1 6 permits that allows for donation based and paid 2 3 ticketed events wherein cultural organizations artists including individual artists to charge for 4 those performances and actually start to receive 5 income for the art that they create and produce once 6 7 again, and this will be in conjunction with SACO and DOT opening up open streets and other areas in 8 consultation with local Council Members, which is a 9 really important piece of a bill that's been added 10 and there are thousands of arts organizations, 11 individual artists that are available to 12 participate, but also non-DCLA funded organizations 13 can and will be able to access this program as long 14 15 as they partner with any one of the 2,000 arts 16 organizations and individual artists including the 17 Five Borough Arts Council. So virtually everyone can 18 access this program and start performing as early as 19 March 1st as we get this program up and running and it is incredibly exciting to be able to have dance, 20 music, poetry, opera and a comedy breaking out to 21 22 literally all over the City of New York in the 23 street. As the weather gets a little bit nicer we hope for the best with COVID, but we are going to 24 25 save a lot of arts organizations, and put to work a

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 1 2 lot of artists and allow them to get paid for their work because the days for performing for free often 3 the time have got to be over. Artists deserve to get 4 paid for their performances and their work, and this 5 allows for that to happen. So, I want to thank 6 everyone in the community for working with us. I 7 want to thank Majority Leader for her support of 8 this bill and also for her additional intro that 9 she'll talk about in a moment, and I want to thank 10 my Legislative Director Jack Bernatovicz who worked 11 12 incredibly hard on this piece of legislation. It's his first piece of legislation that we've seen 13 through from beginning to end, and my Chief of Staff 14 15 Matt Wallace, the Art Committee's Principal 16 Financial Analyst, Aliya Alli, our Policy Analyst 17 Christy Dwyer and Art Committee Counsel Brenda 18 McKinney who I know worked incredibly hard on this piece of legislation and worked back and forth and 19 back and forth multiple times. So we're very excited 20 for this day, very excited about this bill and to 21 22 hear more about her incredibly important bill Intro 23 2034-A, I would like to invite Council Majority Leader Cumbo to say a few words. Majority Leader 24 25 can you hear us?

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 1 8 2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I can hear you now. 3 4 CHAIR VAN BRAMER: Great. 5 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: You ready for me? 6 CHAIR VAN BRAMER: We are ready for you. 7 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Hello and can you hear 8 me? 9 CHAIR VAN BRAMER: Yes, I can hear you. MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Okay, perfect. Good 10 morning and good morning to the entire committee 11 12 today. This morning I'm so happy to be here with all of you and to our Committee Counsel Brenda McKinney 13 14 who has worked tirelessly throughout this entire 15 pandemic to make our legislative visions a reality. 16 Ove the past seven months COVID 19 has impacted 17 every sector within our city's economic structure 18 with arts and culture being one of the hardest hit. Prior to the pandemic the cultural sector in New 19 20 York City was one of the largest industries in New York City employing nearly 400,000 workers paying 21 22 them \$31 billion in wages and generating \$110 23 billion in economic activity. Yes, we are talking about the life line of New York City, the heart and 24 25 soul, our cultural economy. In merely seven months

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 1 employment within this sector had fallen over 60% 2 3 with 95% of organizations being forced to cancel some programming. In light of the obstacles our 4 cultural sector is facing it is critical that we 5 meet this moment by passing Intro 2034 in the spirit 6 of innovation and progressing towards a reimagined 7 approach to how we enjoy arts and culture in New 8 York City and beyond. Into 2034 will require the 9 coordination of relevant city agencies to create a 10 mobile application that will provide information 11 12 about and coordinate the use of opens space for art and cultural programming as well as providing 13 information about low cost or free public programs 14 15 in such locations. We have seen first hand the 16 success of opening spaces for entertainment purposes 17 most especially with the use of open streets for our 18 restaurant industry. Now, it is time that we rise to the occasion and provide public spaces for 19 performance so that every New Yorker can enjoy the 20 rich and diverse cultural enrichment that our city 21 22 has to offer in a socially distant setting, and I 23 just want to conclude by saying: These are only first steps towards many that we are discussing and 24 25 planning to make sure that the cultural economy

Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries and International Intergroup Relations 10 1 comes back to New York in an incredible and amazing 2 way. There's so much work that needs to be done. 3 4 We've been hearing you. We are listening, and we are working toward solution. This is simply a first 5 step towards that movement. I also want to add that 6 7 I want to thank at this time Speaker Corey Johnson as well as Jason Goldman who have worked incredibly 8 hard on this during a pandemic with there being so 9 much need in the city of New York. I applaud them 10 for recognizing that we can lift up the City of New 11 12 York and support the cultural community at the same time. It is possible and that we have to make sure 13 that we bring back the arts and cultural community. 14 15 I want to thank also my Legislative Director Jason 16 Hunt as well as Alicia Mercedes my Communications 17 Director, and Tasha Young my Chief of Staff. So, I 18 thank all of you today for being on this hearing. We've got a lot of work to do, but we are moving in 19 the right direction, and thank you so much, Chair 20 Jimmy Van Bramer for hosting and organizing this 21 22 particular hearing.
