Thank you Chair Cornegy. 14 We are ready to begin. 15 CHAIRPERSON CORNEGY: Thank you. (gavel) Good afternoon and thank you for coming. I'm Council Member Robert Cornegy Chair of the Council's Committee on Housing and Buildings. We're here to

16 17 18 19 vote on two bills that extend looming deadlines for 20 requirements related to gas piping inspections and 21 carbon monoxide detector installations. A pair of 2.2 gas explosions in New York City injured nearly a 100 23 people and too ten lives in 2014 and 2015 shadowing 24 the peace of mind of mind of many more East Harlem, 25 East Village and city residents. In the wake of

COMMITTEE ON HOUSING AND BUILDINGS 4 1 2 these tragedies, tragic explosions in 2016 the city 3 passed a collection of gas safety legislation aimed at upgrading safety measures by city agencies, 4 utility companies and building owners. Local Laws 5 152, 159 of 2016 represented an effort to ensure 6 7 that the tragic events of March 12th 2014 and March 26, 2015 would never be repeated in another city 8 neighborhood. That's the origin of Local Law 1152 or 9 2016. After passage the Department of Buildings 10 crafted rules that set up the inspection regime. The 11 12 rules included DOB occupancy, Group R-3 from the 13 inspection regimes. The rules hold that the first 14 set of inspections in community districts 1, 3, and 15 10 should be conducted by December 31, 2020. The 16 rules also set out a possible \$10,000 civil penalty 17 for failure to file the inspection certificate 18 before the application deadline. The pandemic upended that time table. Guidance from public health 19 20 authorities, Governor Cuomo and Mayor de Blasio meant having a licensed master plumber conduct the 21 2.2 gas pipe inspections simply could not happen for a 23 part of the year, and individuals concerned with keeping their household contacts small meant that 24 either without emergency orders and a state of 25

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2 emergency conducting the inspections could run 3 counter to that goal and put vulnerable people at The pandemic also meant altogether less 4 risk. public bandwidth for messages like upcoming gas pipe 5 inspections deadlines and more focus on the serious 6 7 crisis occurring around us. Introduction 2151-B recognizes that context and proposes changing the 8 current compliance deadline by six months, from the 9 current law's December 31, 2020 deadline to a 10 proposed June 30, 2021 deadline. It also requires a 11 12 more thought going effort by the DOB on outreach and 13 notice to impact the communities. Intro 2151-B also 14 directs the Department of Buildings to pursue more 15 targeted outreach, engage community based 16 organizations and take on board feedback from the 17 public. Intro 2151-B is set for a final vote by the 18 City Council on December 17th. Going forward, City policy has to include consideration of important 19 20 safety goals Local Laws 151 through 159 set out. At the same time as recognizing the reality of the 21 2.2 pandemic and the challenges Buildings encounter in 23 complying with the law, the ultimate goal must be pubic safety, not collecting penalties and not 24 eroding the equity building owners have built by 25

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imposing unreasonable got you fines. Colleges in co-2 3 authoring or co-sponsoring this legislation have seen the merit in the approach and include co-author 4 Council Member Dromm and co-sponsors Council Members 5 Kallos, Gjonaj, Brannan, Chin and Public Advocate 6 7 Williams, several of whom were also (ringing phone) co-sponsors of Local Law 152. The pandemic has 8 required us to be flexible and look again at the 9 context of multiple deadlines set out in law. Intro 10 11 2151-B is in the spirit of taking a reasonable look 12 and reassessing how we can pursue safety while 13 recognizing the reality the pandemic has imposed on 14 all of us. Proposed Intro No. 2171-A, which I 15 sponsored, would extend the deadline by which carbon 16 monoxide detectors are required to be installed 17 under Local Law 191 from January 2021 to July 2021. 18 I'm joined today by Council Members in no particular order Louis, Rivera, Gjonaj, Rosenthal, Perkins, and 19 20 Cabrera. We'll now hear remarks from our Finance 21 Chair and sponsor of the bill Council Member Danny 2.2 Dromm.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you very much
Chair Cornegy. Intro 2151-B will give much needed
reprieve to the tens of thousands of buildings in

2	Community Districts 1, 3 and 10 that like all of us				
3	are still reeling from this pandemic. Without this				
4	bill there will be less scrambling to comply with				
5	Local Law 152 of 2016 with its looming December 31,				
6	2020 deadline. The goals of Local Law 152 are				
7	laudable to ensure the gas lines in buildings				
8	throughout the city are sound. However, the initial				
9	deadline set well before anyone could foresee this				
10	pandemic it is not practical at this point. As				
11	responsible policy makers we are simply interested				
12	in ensuring compliance with any legislation that is				
13	passed and enacted. When circumstances change and				
14	call for reassessment, we have to respond, and that				
15	is what we are doing here. Intro 2151-B does not				
16	only extend the gas line inspection and				
17	certification deadline to June 30th. Fortunately,				
18	Chair Cornegy insisted on including text that				
19	required the Department of Buildings to conduct				
20	thorough outreach to the public. I hope that these				
21	provisions Sorry. I just Oh, no, allow one				
22	moment, one moment. I'm sorry. I've lost the power				
23	in my, in my phone so I'm going to have to stop				
24	here, but I thank you Chair Cornegy for moving this				
25	legislation forward, and I'm sure that folks will
