





As of February 23rd, 2021, there are 23,912 confirmed COVID-19 deaths in New York City. The highest rates of deaths were concentrated in communities of color and within the boroughs of Queens and the Bronx.





As of December 2020th, Information, government, financial activities, and education and health services sectors have had minimal job losses. However, leisure & hospitality has lost nearly half jobs over the past year.

Low & middle wage workers are seeing higher unemployment than high wage workers. Since January 2020, employment in low and middle wage income decreased by 18.2 percent and 16.1 percent respectively. Nearly three times the percent change of that of high wage workers.


All boroughs have seen big increases in unemployment, but the Bronx is by far worst hit.

(Percent Change since January)**




As of January 31, 2021, total spending by all consumers in NYC decreased by 13.9 percent compared to January 2020. This only accounts for people using credit/debit cards.

The arts, entertainment, and recreation industry has been hit the hardest with a loss of 68.1 percent since January of last year in consumer spending. Other industries, such as the transportation and warehousing, and the accommodation and food service industries saw lost in consumer spending during the same time period of 49.3 percent and 35.8 percent, respectively.


On the other hand, the grocery and food store industry saw a jump of 33.4 percent in consumer spending since January. Other industries such as retail and health care and social assistance saw a jump in consumer spending of 17.1 percent and 7.3 percent, respectively.

(Percent Change since January 2020)**




***Average Level of Job posting

Overall, there were 17.1 percent less job openings and 41.5 percent fewer small businesses open in New York City in February 10th, 2021 compared to January 2020.

The highest decreased in job postings in the city took place in the Leisure and Hospitality industry, followed by the professional and businesses services. The manufacturing industry was the only industry that gained job posting during the same time period.
