Thank you so much for your 12 cooperation. Chair Ayala, we are ready to begin. 13 CHAIRPERSON AYALA: Good morning. 14 Thank you. Good morning, everyone. My name is Diana 15 Ayala and I am the Chair of the Committee on Consumer 16 Affairs and Business Licensing. Welcome to our 17 remote vote on proposed introduction number 936 A. 18 would like to recognize my fellow Council members, 19 Council members Rose, Levin, Rosenthal, Menchaca, 20 Diaz, Koo, Koslowitz, Chin, Dinowitz, Lander, 21 Brannan, and [inaudible 00:00:51]. Intro 936 A, 22 sponsored by Council member Helen Rosenthal, aims to 23 restrict single use plastic beverage draws, beverage 24 stirrers, and beverage [00:01:00] sticks. For most

people, these items are completely unnecessary and

With climate change now well upon us, we have new behaviors and attitudes, especially when it comes to our reliance on plastics. More than 320 million tons of plastic are consumed each year and our use of plastic is still expected to double over the next two decades. Even though we tend to use these items only once before disposing of them, plastics in the environment can take hundreds of years to break down. We need to break down, they leach chemicals back into the environment in smaller shots and up in the waterways and eventually in the ocean. Each year, at least 8 million tons of plastic leaks into the ocean, figure that is the equivalent of dumping a garbage truck of trash into the ocean every minute. If we don't change our behavior, the world economic forum predicts that there will be more plastic in the ocean then finished by 2050. Plastic straws our common contributor to this debris. Due to their size and their weight, they often end up in the ocean. when recycled, they are too small to be picked up by the machines and they don't make it through the process. It's no wonder that they are one of the

most common types of garbage found in coastal

This seemingly banal item has disproportionately negative impacts on the 3 4 environment and, clearly, it is an issue that needs to be addressed. Policies that operate to support 5 the environment should not, however, become the 6 7 burden of only certain groups of people. That is why I am happy to support the A version of this bill 8 which includes important provisions to serve the 9 needs of people with disabilities. Since our 10 original hearing on this bill in 2018, we have worked 11 12 closely with advocates for the disability community, as well as environmental advocates and experts and 13 members of the restaurant and hospitality industry to 14 15 present a bill today which delicately balances the 16 needs of all. We will join jurisdictions across the world that have recognized the need to reduce the use 17 18 of single use plastic and restrict items like plastic straws while accommodating those who need plastic 19 20 straws for medical reasons. Small businesses in the city are also struggling and any new legislation that 21 2.2 creates new requirements subjecting them to fines 23 must be balanced to ensure that businesses will not face burdensome costs and penalties. I am proud of 24

this piece of legislation that we are voting on

The climate is real and disproportionately 2 impacts -- The climate crisis is real and 3 4 disproportionately impacts lower income communities and communities of color. The bill ensures that New 5 Yorkers in our many tourists will no longer be 6 7 offered a plastic straws at a food service establishment. This will drastically cut down on our 8 use of plastic straws in the city and hopefully 9 10 inspires city residents to be more conscious of the plastic that we use. At the same time, individuals 11 12 with disabilities who need a plastic straw will be 13 able to request a plastic straw that food service 14 establishments where staff will be required to supply 15 straws upon request, and no questions asked. 16 service stations where customers obtain items like utensils, napkins, and straws will contain signs 17 18 alerting consumers that if they need a plastic straw, they may request one. This bill will make our city 19 20 greener without minimizing accessibility for those with disabilities at our food service establishments. 2.1 2.2 And so I urge my colleagues to vote yes. before I 23 hand it over to Council member Rosenthal, I want to make a statement. I would like to thank former 24

Council member Rafael Espinal and his team for all of

their work on this bill. I would also like to thank committee staff and legislative counsel, Stephanie Jones, policy analyst, Noah Metzler, and Leah-Leah, I'm going to get it. Scriptech-- Sorry. No,
Leah. I'm not going to get it. I'm sorry. I love you anyway. And finance analyst, Florentine Caboori.
I would also like to turn it over to Council member Rosenthal to deliver her statement on the bill.

What is so wonderful is that the staff at the Council was able to juggle the needs of three different an important communities. environmentalists who push us so hard and correctly to get plastics out of our lives, the restaurant industry which is struggling to come back, especially now, we all want to support, and, of course, the disabilities community. Those with disabilities who cannot drink something out of a glass and must have a plastic straw now can just ask and they will get a straw, no questions asked. That is such a critical part of this compromise. So, I am really here just
