SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon. Нарру Earth Day. Today is a reminder of how we must all work together to protect our communities from environmental hazards and not just, ah, about, it's not just about creating a cleaner, greener city. It's about environmental justice, and that means banning the use of chemical pesticides from public property, which is one of the bills we're voting on today. These chemical pesticides are harmful to our children, our seniors, and everyone who plays in our parks and lives in public housing. Our legislative package today also includes, also calls for reducing food waste, increasing opportunities for sports and recreation for youth, and keeping our boardwalk safe, among other bills. I'm proud that the council's fighting to make our city a safer, healthier, and more livable city for all New Yorkers. Before I delve into our agenda, I want to provide an update,

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of course, on the battle against COVID-19 here in New York City. Ah, in our city, as of yesterday, 32,200 New Yorkers, 32,200 New Yorkers have died from the coronavirus. While we continue to reopen our city slowly it's important to remember that the virus is not over. We want people to get vaccinated, to wear a mask, and to stay home if you're sick. I'm really, really, really sad to report that, ah, we are all mourning the loss of two members of our council family. As many of you know, Laurie Constantinides, the wife of our former colleague, Costa Constantinides, died on Monday. It was an unexpected loss, even though she had faced a long illness. was only 47 years old. It was obvious to all of us, it is obvious to all of us how deeply in love Costa was with Laurie. He always spoke about her with admiration and with great affection, and my heart breaks for Costa and their 11-year-old son, Nico. behalf of the council we are sending them our deep thoughts and prayers as they mourn this tremendous loss and I think all of you know that there is services tonight, ah, this evening, so if we could try to get through the Stated Meeting, ah, today, I know many, many colleagues reached out and said they

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want to go at the beginning of this, ah, to be here for Costa. Um, I'm so devastated, ah, for him, and I've spoke to him the last few days and it's been really, really hard for him and his son. So I hope any of you that can go to those services today to be there for him will, will do your best to make it. Costa and his son need us right now. So, um, we're thinking of them. I also am really again devastated to report that someone that I loved so much, Christine McLaughlin, who served the council for 17 years, before recently retiring, died in late March. As director of events and production services and CED in the council, Christine perfectly managed more than 30 events each year. She was a remarkable, remarkable person. She was a constituent of mine, lived not that far from me, and a dear friend of many of us. I am so sad, ah, that Christine is gone. on behalf of myself and of course the council I want to extend our deepest condolences to her family, friends, and former colleagues. Two really painful losses that we've experienced recently. I'd also like to acknowledge those in our city who died while on the job. Angel Aguilar Duran, a sanitation worker for Cogent Waste Solutions, died after being struck

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2 by a mini van on April 11 in Brooklyn. He was 52 years old. And as I do at every Stated Meeting I 3 want to remember the lives of those recently lost to 4 9/11-related illnesses. They include retired 5 firefighter Joseph Daly, he was 70; retired police 6 7 officer Andy Stromfeld; retired firefighter James David Shaunessy, he was 76; retired fire lieutenant 8 James Winters, he was 83; retired NYPD detective 9 Michael Dye, he was 56; retired NYPD sergeant Thomas 10 Burn, he was 51; retired NYPD detective Linda Eaton 11 12 Louis; and NYPD officer Vincent Richtie, he was 42. 13 If we could take a moment of silence for Laurie, Christine, Angel, all who have died from 9/11-related 14 15 illnesses, and all of those we've lost to COVID-19. 16 [moment of silence] Thank you. Today I also want to welcome, and many colleagues have already welcomed 17 18 them, I will welcome two new members to the council, both from the Bronx. Eric Dinowitz won the seat for 19 20 Council District 11, which includes Riverdale, Bedford Park, Kingsbridge, Norwood, Van Cortlandt 21 2.2 Village, Wakefield, and Woodlawn, and more 23 neighborhoods that I didn't name. And Oswald Feliz won the seat for Council District 15, which includes 24

Fordham, Bedford Park, West Farms, Bathgate, East

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2	Tremont, Van Nest, Belmont, Allerton, Olinville, and
3	Mount Hope. So I want to welcome you, Council Member
4	Dinowitz. Welcome to you, Council Member Feliz.
5	Congratulations. If we could have a big virtual
6	round of applause for our two new colleagues
7	welcoming them to the New York City Council. We look
8	forward to working, ah, with all of you.
9	Congratulations to you and your families. Before we
10	move on to our agenda today I'd to acknowledge a
11	significant point in time in our nation that occurred
12	this well. Former police officer Derek Chauvin in
13	Minneapolis, was found guilty on all counts of
14	murder, of the murder of George Floyd, an innocent
15	black man who was murdered in cold blood.
16	Unfortunately, a people of color dying in police
17	custody is not that unusual, but this week something
18	unusual did happen. The jury saw the injustice and
19	actual delivered a guilty verdict. Nothing will ever
20	bring George Floyd back to his family. He should
21	still be alive right now. Nothing will ever
22	alleviate their pain and suffering, and true justice
23	would be if George Floyd was never killed in the
24	first place. But it is a significant verdict and I
25	hope that it brings some measure of comfort to George

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Floyd's family, his loved ones, and those who bore witness to his death, including 17-year-old, then 17year-old Darnella Fraser, the teenager who changed history by filming this brutal encounter. So rest in peace, George Floyd. Rest in peace. I want to acknowledge a historic moment for this council. proud that the council today is voting on a rules change that constitutes the next step in the process to recognize a union for council aides. This comes at the urging of more than 30 council members who signed a letter calling for voluntary recognition. The resolution specifies that collective bargaining matters, including recognition, ah, within the jurisdiction of the speaker. This council proudly supports labor and union efforts of our vital staff. Ah, the Land Use Committee will be voting on the following item: 737 Fourth Avenue rezoning will facilitate the development of a new 14-story mixed use building with approximately 142 units of housing, of which 35 will be permanently affordable and ground floor commercial space in Council Member Carlos Menchaca's district. The council will vote on two Article 11 property tax exemptions out of the Finance Committee. One of them is in Majority Leader Cumbo's

2 district and the other is in Council Member Moya's 3 district. Moving into our legislative agenda, the council will be voting on a resolution by Majority 4 Leader Laurie Cumbo and Council Member Margaret Chin calling on the Congress to pass and the president to 6 7 sign the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2021. Our first two bills come out of the Committee 8 on Parks and Recreation. Introduction number 1888-A, 9 sponsored by Council Member Mark Treyger, will 10 prohibit all non-city-owned or non-authorized motor 11 12 vehicles from being used on city elevated boardwalks. 13 The bill also require that authorized city employees or contractors only use small utility vehicles under 14 15 2400 pounds for activities on wooden boardwalks, 16 unless larger vehicles are necessary for 17 construction, maintenance, or public safety needs. 18 want to thank from the staff Kristoffer Sartori and Patrick Mulvihill. Also out of the Committee on 19 20 Parks and Recreation we're voting on a bill to establish the Office of Sports, Wellness, and 21 2.2 Recreation. Introduction number 1959-A, sponsored by 23 Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez in conjunction with the Brooklyn Borough president, will require the 24 mayor to establish an Office of Sports, Wellness, and 25

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Recreation. This office will have the authority to promote and enhance sports-related opportunities for youth and to promote the role of sports in education. And from the staff I want to thank Kristoffer Sartori and Patrick Mulvihill. The council is committed to tackling food insecurity and reducing food waste. I'm proud of the work we've done on food policy. very happy we're doing more today on this important We're voting on two bills from our Economic issue. Development Committee to reduce food waste and to provide us with more information on food insecurity in our city. First, Introduction number 1680-A, sponsored by Council Member Paul Vallone, will require the Mayor's Office of Food Policy to include the following additional information in the Food Metrics Report - the number of individuals eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, SNAP, who are not currently enrolled in the program, disaggregated by borough and age, information about retailers that are authorized to accept and redeem SNAP benefits, information about food insecurity in each borough, trends in dietary consumption and longterm diet-related health outcomes, across socioeconomic and racial groups where practicable,

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additional sources of information selected by DOHMH. And we will require the Mayor's Office of Food Policy to express all data in the Food Metrics Report in absolute numbers and as a percentage of the relevant population. And from the staff I want to thank Andrea Vazquez and Nadia Johnson. The second bill, Introduction number 1673-A, sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera, requires city agencies that procure food to develop food waste prevention plans, as well as make recommendations on how to safely and efficiently donate surplus food. The legislation requires agencies with food waste prevention plans to submit such plans to the Sanitation Commissioner for approval and the plan then must be submitted to the council speaker. And I want thank Andrea Vazquez and Nadia Johnson again. Also regarding food governance from our Committee on Education, we have Introduction number 1675-A, sponsored by Council Member Debbie This bill will expand on Local Law 4 of 2018 by requiring the Department of Education to provide information to every student regarding summer meals and provide them with three locations for summer meals closest to their homes. And from the staff I want to thank Andrea Vazquez and Malcolm Buttehorn.

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Finally, we have two bills out of the Committee on Health. Introduction number 1748-A, sponsored by Council Member Danny Dromm, will require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to conduct a public information and outreach campaign regarding the provision of medically unnecessary treatments and interventions performed on individuals born with intersex traits or variations in sex characteristics. As part of this campaign the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene will create and distribute educational materials and resources for parents and quardians of individuals born with intersex traits or variations in sex characteristics, create resources for medical practitioners, and identify community outreach partners and stakeholders. The department would consult with individuals and organizations with expertise in intersex traits or variations in sex characteristics, including individuals who are intersex or have variations in sex characteristics in the development of such public information and outreach campaign. From the staff I want to thank Carbany Ahuja, Sarah Liss, Em Balkan, and Sarah Ginsberg. And finally today, Earth Day, the council will vote on a bill aimed at protecting all New

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Yorkers, but particularly our children. We're voting to ban the use of any non-biological pesticide, such as glyphosate, on any playground, park, and any other property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, ah, sorry, the Department of Parks and Recreation. This is a bill from Council Member Ben Kallos. It's important that as technology changes and evolves New York City government keeps We no longer burn coal in our buildings. don't light our offices with gas lamps. And we shouldn't be using toxic and dangerous chemicals in our public spaces. Our NYCHA residents deserve Families enjoying a day in the park deserve better. New Yorkers deserve better. And I'm proud that we're voting on this bill to modernize our pest control and keep New Yorkers safe. This legislation would expand the list of prohibited pesticides, to also include pesticides classified as a human carcinogen by the Office of Pesticide Programs of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, pesticides classified by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment as a developmental toxin, and pesticides containing active ingredients listed as, ah, carcinogenic by the

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2 International agency for Research on Cancer of the

3 World Health Organization. And I want to thank Sarah

SERGEANT AT ARMS: The clock is ready.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Today is Earth Day, and Earth Day is the day we will ban toxic pesticides from our parks. We will stop poisoning our children, stop poisoning our workers. We'll stop poisoning Mother Earth. We'll stop choosing cancer over weeds. I will take weeds any day over cancer. Now this is personal for me, and countless families like mine who went through this pandemic in a cramped one-bedroom apartment that weren't designed for shelter in place, who relied on parks as a refuge. As a new dad with a baby, now a toddler, the parks are scary. Young children crawl on the ground. touch everything, then they inevitably put everything in their mouths and ingest toxic pesticides. Black Institute found that pesticides are an issue of environmental justice, as they found pesticides like Roundup were being sprayed more frequently in black

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2	and brown communities than in white communities.
3	Introduction 1524 will prohibit chemically based
4	pesticides from being used on any property owned or
5	leased by the city with very limited exceptions.
6	This legislation puts New York City at the forefront
7	nationally of addressing this important issue. Than
8	you to Council Member James Gennaro for starting the
9	fight in 2005 with Local Law 37, the kindergarten at
10	PS-290, Paul Rogoven, their teacher, Bertha Louis at
11	the Black Institute, Jay Feldman from Beyond
12	Testified, Beyond Pesticides, Doug and Patty Wood of
13	Grassroots Environmental Education, who many of you
14	heard from, and lastly Speaker Corey Johnson for
15	hearing the bill last term, for approaching me to

Ah, he mentioned we did this in 2005. Ah, you know, these bills get old pretty quickly, these technical bills, and we came back again and, um, made amendments to it in 2007. The world has changed a lot since 2007. Ah, and this, this issue need a real champion to step forward and, you know, make a modern bill that would take into access, ah, everything we know now that we didn't know back in 2005 and 2007. So I thank, um, Council Member Kallos in a special way. Um, I thank the chair of the committee Levine, and, ah, of course Speaker Johnson, the, you know, 35 cosponsors of the bill, um, including myself and, ah, ah, thank you, Council Member Kallos and Speaker Johnson and Mark Levine for this really nice birthday

Members Kallos and Gennaro for the very important
pesticide legislation. Um, it's long overdue. I'm
sorry that it takes so to get these things done, but
it is definitely important. Um, my colleagues today,
I am thrilled to be voting on my bill, Intro 1675,
which will inform more families that there is a
secure place nearby that they can send their children
to receive free meals during the summer months. This
bill will require the Department of Education to mail
summer meal information to every eligible student.
This information would include the three nearest

locations to their homes, the operating hours and

2 eligibility, ah, guidelines. Summer meals are 3 offered to all children age 18 and under at no cost at several sites across our city, including public 5 schools, community pool centers, public parks, libraries, and NYCHA locations from June through 6 7 August. Low-income parents often rely on New York City school food for free meals for their children 8 throughout the school year. And this need doesn't 9 10 simply disappear during the summer months. As the number of summer meals sites continue to increase, 11 12 families should be properly notified about the free meal options that are available to them. And as we 13 14 turn the corner of a pandemic that has threatened 15 food security for thousands of New Yorkers, many of 16 them children, this bill is especially important. is my hope that this, the passage of this bill will 17 18 let low-income parents know that there is, there are resources available to them that will ease the burden 19 20 that they face during the summer months, which is finding food to feed their children while juggling 21 2.2 the cost and out of school care and work schedules. 23 I want to thank Speaker Johnson for his leadership

and his efforts to end food insecurity, Chair

COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Thank you, Majority Leader. I have been extremely critical of our land use process, which makes people believe that I am against development. But I am not, and nor are my neighbors in Sunset Park. What we have always demanded is for community control and deference in making land use decisions. That is a tall order, since most projects are developer driven, and so I have rejected many proposals in the past. The 737 rezoning is different, and we're gonna be voting on it today in the council. From the start, Community Board 7 took control. CB7 forced the developer to redo their proposal several times before considering Then CB7 held multiple public hearings and it.

demanded binding conditions. The developer, Totem,
agreed to a CBA, a community benefits agreement, that
codified all the community board's conditions. And
it executed a CBA before the council held its first
public hearing. When I asked the developer to also
present the CBA to our community in multiple
languages they did so. People learned about it and
asked questions. What will happen now at 737 Fourth
Avenue is incredible. A parking lot will now become
a building with 33 permanently affordable units,
ground floor commercial space, mostly reserved for
local businesses, bike stations with a third reserved
for deliveristas, and a free easement to the MTA so
it can build an ADA accessible elevator to the subway
next door. Because CB7 led the process and a CBA is
in place, I have decided to honor their work and
support this rezoning. Democratic participation and
decision-making does not always mean you will agree
with the outcome. I would have preferred 100%
affordable, for example. But it is what we need
right now to recover from the pandemic. I ask you,
my colleagues, ah, to support this rezoning and thank
you for your time.

similar verdict. I think that it calls for people

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who are upstanders, as we say, and see something and
want to take action to in fact follow through and do
that. Ah, I was very moved by the witness who said
that she felt guilt that she didn't do anything to
intervene. Perhaps that would have resulted in her
death as well. But we certainly want to encourage
people who are active in the streets and raising a
voice and making this issue a priority to continue to
do that, and yes we have a verdict, but let's not
forget Akai Gurley who had a verdict, ah, Peter
Liang, and that he served not one day in jail. So
let's still be vigilant and let's see what happens at
the sentencing, and I still say that we need to
change. We need to have a elected civilian review
board that has the authority to really mete out the
appropriate responses to cases such as this. But,
once again, I support the legislation and encourage
my colleagues to vote in the affirmative.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: At this time, prior to the vote, um, I would like to speak on this particular resolution. On Tuesday the whole nation watched with bated breath as the jury deliberated over the murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer. I'm positive that many, if not all of us, breathed a collective sigh of relief when the judge read out the guilty verdict. Yet George Floyd still does not breathe. His life was cut short violently, publicly, and without any sympathy, care or recognition of the fact that he was a father, a son, a brother, and a friend to so many people. Yesterday in remarks to the public Vice President Kamala Harris said that because of smart phones so

many Americans have now seen the racial injustice
that black Americans have known for generations. The
racial injustice that we have fought for for
generations. By the time Vice President Harris and
President Biden made their remarks, newspapers had
confirmed that yet another black girl, Ma'Khia
Bryant, had been shot and killed by the police, this
time in Columbus, Ohio. The federal George Floyd
Justice in Policing Act tackles law enforcement
misconduct in various ways, including lower the
criminal intent standard from willful to knowing or
reckless to convict a law enforcement officer. It
also limits qualified immunity for police officers,
something our City Council legislated and passed last
month. We are living in very precarious times. VP
Harris urged passage of the George Floyd Justice in
Policing Act, not as a panacea to every problem, but
as a start. It is in that spirit that we as members
of the City Council in one of the greatest and
biggest melting pots in the United States must join
together and resoundly affirm that the federal
government must pass this bill. This legislation
will also transform law enforcement culture by
prohibiting all racial and religious profiling.

2	creating accreditation standards for police
3	department, banning chokeholds, and no knock
4	warrants, limiting military grade equipment transfers
5	to state and local law enforcement, and empowering
6	communities to create new public safety approaches
7	through grants for community-based organizations.
8	This is really baseline. This is a simple
9	resolution. This is an opportunity for us to put
10	structures in place that should have been a part of
11	our police departments all across this country all
12	along. We have to make sure that we send a message
13	loud and clear, that the verdict in the George Floyd
14	case is not a substitution for legislation.
15	Legislation must still be put in place as Council
16	Member Barron so eloquently stated. This because of
17	the worldwide presence and the worldwide fight that
18	so many people put forward the entire world is
19	watching us and that's why this verdict was handed
20	down. But for so many other cases that do not have
21	that worldwide global support legislation is critical
22	and it's needed now more than ever. And so I thank
23	all of my colleagues for all of your support,
24	particularly the Black, Latino and Asian Caucus. I
25	want to thank at this time as well, ah, Speaker Corey

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Johnson for recognizing the timeliness of this. Ah,
I also want to thank Jason Goldman, ah, the chief of
staff to the City Council, and I also want to thank
my staff, Jason Herr, as well as, ah, my chief of
staff, ah, Tasha Young, ah, Jasmine, ah, Jasmine
Cuello, as well as Gigi Elliot Davis, and all of my
staff for getting us to this particular point. So at
this point, Mr. Parliamentarian, are there any other
members who wish to speak on today's resolution,
1372?

PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, Madam Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I'll now read today's resolution into the records. Resolution 1372 calls upon the United States Congress to pass and the president to sign HR 1280, the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2021. Will all those in favor say aye?

[Multiple voices saying aye]

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: All opposed?

Thank you. I'll take all the ayes. We'll now open it up for the nays. Any abstentions? The ayes have it. And it's a proud day in the City Council. We will now move into general discussion. As a

5	who wish to speak at this time?

PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, Madam Majority

Leader. Council Members Kallos, Louis, and Cornegy.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member Kallos, you may begin.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Today is Earth Day. The council just passed legislation to ban pesticides in city parks and property, and we can and must go further. We've been working with Speaker Corey Johnson on using every penny of our 22 billion dollar contracts budget towards saving our planet. We haven't updated our city's environmental procurement program since it was adopted in 2005, and with some materials from 2012 that refer to cassette tapes, mini disks, and answering machines. Introduction 2271 will update the EPP to adopt electronics standards testing class known as EP, include furniture, ban halogen lamps, and more ambitious standards, including net zero greenhouse gas emissions, eliminating reliance on virgin materials, eliminating reliance on hazardous

substances, improving outdoor air quality, reducing
the negative effects, and generating positive effects
for our environment from our purchases. Introduction
2272 would establish a task force to research and
consider other social costs associated with
production of textiles, including the nature of labor
conditions along with the supply chain, along with
reporting on whether the textiles are recycled or
organic or whole and in part, the supply and source
of textiles, the value of the contracts, the lengths
of the use, and disposals. Both bills will be heard
tomorrow, Friday, April 23, in the Contracts
Committee. We'd love to have you on board. Last but
not least, Introduction 2273 will install over 1000
solar-powered waste receptacles through the city.
Our streets are a mess. Sanitation is not doing
enough to do pickups. These things can hold six
times more trash, plus they're rat-proof. Please,
ah, sign on to all three. I yield my time.
MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,
Council Member Kallos. We will now move to Council
Member Louis.

COUNCIL MEMBER LOUIS: Thank you so much,

Speaker Johnson and Majority Leader Cumbo for the

2	opportunity to share information on two critical
3	pieces of legislation that I'm introducing today.
4	Last money this body voted for the mayor's police
5	reform plan and I introduced two bills that would
6	enable us to take a meaningful step in executing the
7	pledge and agreements made in those plans.
8	Therefore, I am introducing a supplemental bill today
9	concerning the Civilian Complaint Review Board.
10	Intro 2274, a local law, will amend, to amend the New
11	York City Charter in relation to the creation of a
12	database to facilitate the Civilian Complaint Review
13	Board's access to police department records. For
14	years the NYPD has been negligent in providing the
15	CCRB investigators with sufficient details and
16	information they deem necessary to investigate
17	civilian complaints against officers. Now is the
18	time for us to expand the scope of the Civilian
19	Complaint Review Board by removing barriers to the
20	relevant information that would enable them to gauge
21	the merit of civilian complaints against officers
22	more accurately. Intro 2274 will help improve the
23	CCRB's efficacy while increasing police
24	accountability. I urge my colleagues to sign on to
25	these bills, including Intros 2248 and 2249, which I

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2	introduced last month.	Collectively we can implement
3	solutions to deliver on	the promise of a fairer and
4	more transparent system	of checks and balances for
5	our police department.	Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,

Council Member Louis. Mr. Parliamentarian, are there
any other members who wish to speak? I see Council

Member Cornegy. Are there any other members
following behind him?

PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, Madam Majority
Leader. Council Members Gennaro and Yeger.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member Cornegy, you may begin.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. Ah, I'm Council Member Robert Cornegy and I'd like to start off by sending condolences to my friend, Costa Constantinides and the passing of his wife, Laurie. She was an adored member of the community in Astoria and she will be missed far and wide. She can never be replaced, and I want to send a special prayer to their son, Nico. Our business agenda today includes seven bills and one resolution that I'm introducing. In partnership with my colleagues to start, to start Intro 2260,

2 will require the Department of Environmental 3 Protection to test for air contaminants in underground subway stations and study the sources of 4 air contaminants. On Earth Day we must care for the air quality that impacts our residents and 6 7 particularly our subway employees. Working with the Department of Buildings, we're proposing several 8 construction safety bills and code changes. I do not 9 accept that construction deaths are inevitable, and I 10 do not accept that elevator mishaps should lead to 11 12 We must strive for safety through thoughtful legislation, incorporating input from a wide range of 13 14 stakeholders. The sweeping legislation and complained revisions puts on the path to a healthier, 15 16 more sustainable city. It also makes sensible 17 improvements to increase affordability. I'm 18 particularly pleased to confront the reality of climate change by better preparing our city for 19 20 flooding and supporting sustainable building materials. Bravo to everyone who worked so hard to 21 2.2 bring these proposals forward. We'll also discuss 23 another transformative property - public banking. Establishing a city-owned bank that would hold city 24 deposits would create a civic-minded financial 25

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institution centered on the people of our city and our economic development. A city public bank would be able to take our values into account as it operated to assist small businesses, worker cooperatives, immigrant communities, student borrowers, and neighborhoods who have been underserved by traditional financial institutions. A public bank presents the city with a fresh opportunity to advance socially conscious goals through a time-tested avenue. Indeed, we have over a hundred years of proof of concept of public banking with the bank in North Dakota. This bank has weathered numerous downturns and crisis.

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COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. I wanted to wait until this time, ah, of the meeting to, um, you know, to, to pay tribute to, to Costa. He, um, many people may not know that he worked as my legislative director for six years. Ah, I've known him for 13 years. know Laurie and Costa before Nico was born. we're family. We talk all the time. Um, and, um, he's been there for me and, and, um, and I, I, I just want to thank everyone for their heartfelt expressions of, of, of love for Costa and his family. Ah, the, the speaker, everything he had to say, ah, ah, Council Member Vallone and everyone who knew him so well, Barry and everyone who spoke so eloquently, ah, um, about Costa and, um, I just, you know, I don't want to belabor. I know people want to get through the meeting and they want to get to the wake. But I, I, I felt a special need to put some of my thoughts and feelings on the record regarding my dear friend, and I thank everyone in this body for your love of Costa and all, and, and, and the, you know, regard with which you hold him and always have held him and always spoke very highly, um, of this council and how, um, you know, they really showed him a lot

of love, and I thank everybody for it. And, um, that's all I have to say. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Here we go, we got it, OK. It's the buttons. Ah, thank you very much, Madam President. Today I am introducing, ah, Introduction 2287, ah, together with 10 of our colleagues. Ah, a very broad coalition of legislators in our body. Um, as we all know, enforcement of COVID-related executive orders over the last 13 months or so, ah, was, ah, many times arbitrary and discriminatory. Many neighborhoods in our city, and particularly, ah, predominantly black, Latino, and Orthodox Jewish neighborhoods were targeted for enforcement in ways that wealthy, predominantly white neighborhoods were not. Ah, this is a fact. It's been publicly reported. Ah, it's not just anecdotal. We saw it over the last year. Ah, this is still going on today, although, granted, not as bad as it was last year. Ah, but nonetheless

it has to stop. Our bill will require the dismissal
of summonses issued for violations of these COVID-
related executive orders. Ah, as we emerge from the
pandemic and we begin to restore to some normalcy,
ah, I think it's also important to restore New
Yorkers' ability to move forward without back-
breaking fines hanging over their heads. I'm very
proud of the broad coalition of 11 members of our
body, from different races, from different
backgrounds, from all walks of life, from all places
on the political spectrum who have come together, ah,
to join us, to introduce this legislation. It's a
large coalition. I really would urge all of my
colleagues to join us and get this done. Ah, please,
you can join us by easily signing on to Introduction
2287 to at least bring us some minor relief and
closure to a very painful year in our city's history.
Thank you very much, Madam President.
