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2 You know, the history of what this city has done for people in shelter when it comes to vouchers is not a 3 history of success. It's not. We have had program 5 after program that has been undermined by the city 6 and the state having unfair limitations placed on it 7 and the people that pay the price for that are people in shelter who just want to be able to get into 8 permanent housing and get their foot in the door. 9 10 And, you know, I do give credit to this administration for creating a new program where one 11 12 didn't exist for the last three years of the Bloomberg administration when Advantage was 13 14 discontinued in 2011. Between then and 2014, there 15 was no program. No voucher program for people to get 16 out of shelter and that's when we saw significant increase in the shelter population, particularly 17 18 among families. When this administration did create the LINK program in 2014-2015, it was cumbersome. 19 Ιt 20 was dealing with the fallout from the Advantage debacle and it needed to be -- it needed to work and 2.1 2.2 it was set at a very low rate to pay for apartments. 23 That continued when the city moved to CITYFEPS, which is the current iteration of the voucher. And the 24 25 problem is-- at least one of the problem and, I

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think, the main problem with the voucher in terms of its effectiveness, and we know that it's not very effective based on data -- is that for every voucher, the value is pegged at far below fair market rent. Hundreds of dollars below fair market rent and, as we all know, in New York City, there are no vacancies at those discounted rent levels. There are no vacancies and so, for every person that has a voucher to get out of shelter, they are all searching for a handful of apartments throughout New York City and maybe a handful of neighborhoods and it is a disgrace what we have done. It is a disgrace because we have given people hope by giving them this voucher and telling them that this will be there exit out of shelter, but we have handicapped that voucher to the point where it is not-- and is not at all usable. And so that is going to change with this bill. In this bill will increase that voucher level to the section 8 voucher level and it will make a meaningful impact in terms of the number of units that are available for voucher holders. Just to give an example, Street Easy a couple of weeks ago did an analysis and showed that, because of the pandemic, with the softening and the rental market in New York City, the number of

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available units for a section 8 voucher went up from about 29,000 to over 70,000 from 2019 to 2020 as an economist named Nancy Wu that did that report. reached out to Ms. Wu and I asked her she could do an analysis of CITYFEPS levels and she showed that at those levels there were 564 apartments available on Street Easy compared to the almost 72,000. So, that is what we are talking about here. It's just we are giving people the opportunity to get out of shelter and a place to go and the means to get there. to thank all of my colleagues that have been supportive of this legislation. I want to thank-in particular, I want to thank Speaker Johnson who, from the outset, has been supportive of this legislation and this spring when we saw ourselves climbing out of Covid and with the help of federal stimulus dollars, it really made it a priority to get this done. And so, I give a lot of credit for that and I want to thank him for his support. I want to thank Jason Goldman, hours Chief of Staff. Jason has been steadfast in these recent weeks in support of this legislation and making sure that the heart of it comes through and gets past. I want to thank committee staff Crystal Pond, Natalie Amari, Aminta

2 Kilawan, you have done, you know, just a tremendous amount of work on this. Frank Sarno from our finance 3 division, [inaudible 00:06:38], our unit head, Deputy 4 5 Director Regina Prater Ryan and our finance director, 6 Latonya McKinney. I also want to acknowledge Louis 7 Chilton brown and Andrea Vasquez in our legislative 8 division. And, in particular, I want to thank the advocates who have really prioritized to this bill 9 and called attention to this issue and I want to 10 thank Christine Quinn, our former Speaker and her 11 12 team at Win who have done an amazing job of calling public attention to this issue. It was not easy 24 25 to do all of this and so I just want to thank

New Yorkers to get off the streets and out of

shelters and into housing and we have done almost

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nothing to make that happen in recent years despite seeing it and this is really the most practical, the most immediate thing that we can do and it is going to have an enormous impact in the lives of families and in the lives of our city. So, I want to thank you for your fierce advocacy and then just, you know, the advocacy groups who have been fighting for this are remarkable crews. So, to Local and the Safety Net Project and Coalition for the Homeless and Legal Aid and Human.NYC standing up for homeless New Yorkers is really amongst the most important things anybody is doing. So, thank you for all of it and I proudly vote aye.

When you talk about the CITYFEPS voucher and making sure that it's about you recognizes Covid 19 and the fact that so many families are rent burdened, many of them are paying 30% or over 30% of their income towards rent and many are struggling four basic necessities. always talk about the faces of homelessness and they are every day New Yorkers that look like us and, from our communities and many of them are working full They have a full-time job, but they simply time. cannot afford the rents of our city and if we are going to have a city that is affordable to everyone no matter where you come from, no matter what your ZIP Code is, nor how much you have in your bank account, it is initiatives like this raising the value of CITYFEPS that recognize that we have to provide equity in the system. So, I want to thank, again, all of the housing advocates and many of my own groups in the Bronx like Northwest Bronx, Community and Clergy Coalition, and CASA Bronx who have been at so many rallies and demonstrations and zoom calls really making their voices heard on behalf of homeless New Yorkers who we must protect.
